#### JAMES ARTHUR BANKSTON TREASURER

James Arthur Bankston was born on December 23, 1892, in Butts County, Georgia, the son of William James and Edna Glass Bankston. He finished his high school education in 1910, and graduated from the American Institute of Banking in 1915. He continued his post graduate work under the LaSalle Extension and the Alexander Hamilton Institute.

James A. Bankston's military career began on his entrance in the First Officers Training School, Fort McPherson, Ga., May 12, 1917 to August 14, 1917, from which he was graduated as a Second Lieutenant. He was promoted to First Lieutenant in the 326th Infantry, 82nd Division. He saw service through the Marbarche, St. Mihiel, and Argonne offensives.

He was a charter member of the Charles D. Montgomery Post No. 1, Atlanta, and has served as Department Treasurer since

the establishment of the Legion in Georgia in 1919. His term of office far exceeds that of any Legionnaire in the Department.



Unselfishly devoting himself to the interest of the War orphans of the World War, his plans for the education of these little ones, has been adopted by many States, and each year finds additional States providing legislation to carry forward the work which has been so religiously promoted and unselfishly labored for by General Peter C. Harris.

General Harris is a member of the Joseph S. Brewster Post No. 86 of Cedartown. He was Chairman of the Committee on the Education and Vocational Training of War Orphans, Department of Georgia, 1927-1929

and National Director of the Education of War Orphans for the American Legion, 1928.

**EDUCATION OF WAR ORPHANS  
RESOLUTION**

The Twelfth and most important resolution adopted at the convention was one pertaining to the Education and Vocational Training of War Orphans, and commending the unflagging interest General Peter C. Harris has taken in this worthy work. The resolution is as follows:

WHEREAS, The National Executive Committee of The American Legion, through a special committee composed of Major General P. C. Harris, Chairman, Dr. John J. Tigert and Captain M. S. Eddy, early in 1927 promulgated a plan for providing college education and vocational training for orphans of the World War; and

WHEREAS, In furtherance of said educational program the Georgia Department in its 1927 Convention adopted a resolution ap-

proving and adopting the program for the State of Georgia; and

WHEREAS, The Georgia School of Technology, Emory University, Oglethorpe University and other institutions of higher learning in this state have generously provided free scholarships for all eligible war orphans in this state; and

WHEREAS, At the last session of Congress, Senator William J. Harris and Congressman Wright of Georgia, successfully sponsored to enactment the Harris-Wright Bill, providing additional Federal compensation for war orphans desiring college or vocational education; and

WHEREAS, At the last session of the Georgia Legislature, Senator Erle Cocke and others were instrumental in having certain proposed legislation providing for the establishment of State scholarships for war orphans given a privileged status at the next session of the General Assembly of Georgia; and

WHEREAS, Comrade General Peter C. Harris, Comrade M. S. Eddy and other loyal Legionnaires of this Department have rendered most valuable service in the promotion of this educational program in Georgia and throughout the country;

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Department of Georgia, The American Legion, deeply appreciates the assistance given by the said educational institutions and by the said Legislators and loyal Legionnaires; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Georgia Department during the ensuing year, continue the said educational program to the end that all qualified war orphans in this State desiring college or vocational education may be given the opportunity such as they would have enjoyed but for the supreme sacrifice of their fathers.

This June 27, 1928, in convention assembled, Athens, Ga.

### THE GEORGIA LEGIONNAIRE

It was at this convention that definite action was taken in establishing a Department publication. At many annual meetings of the Legion of the State in the past there had been much talk about a publication and some resolutions passed pertaining to this but until

1928 nothing of a definite nature had been accomplished. A contract was entered into with Kabler Brothers Company, Mount Morris, Illinois, by which the Department committed itself for a year; the provisions of which the payment of \$1650.00 to this company and the Department reserving the rights to solicit and collect for advertising matter. The American Legion Auxiliary of the Department of Georgia was invited to participate in this venture.

This magazine was a credit to the Department, more news of the activities of the Posts could be carried than in the "Adjutant's Letters" which was merely a makeshift until the Department could establish a better means of disseminating news.

The first issue of the "Georgia Legionnaire" was the September 1928 number. Prior to this time The Auxiliary had edited a leaflet known as the "Gala News", but upon the publication of an official magazine of the Department "Gala News" was consolidated with and formed part of "The Georgia Legionnaire."

In September, 1930, the "Georgia Legionnaire" was converted into a newspaper.

Spence, Jr. Post of Thomasville, serving that Post as Commander, Historian, etc. He has been a delegate to several National Conventions and has served on a number of National Committees.

Major Louis S. Moore has held many

posts of responsibility and is a moving figure in many organizations and clubs. Some of these were, member of the Georgia State Senate; City Attorney of Thomasville and Boston, Ga.; member of the Board of Registrars of Thomas County, Ga., member of the Thomasville Board of Education; Trustee of the Georgia State Women's College; Vice President of the Georgia Bar Association; President of the Thomas County Bar Association; Member of the American Bar Association; and member of the bar of the Supreme Court of the United States.

#### ACTIVITIES 1928-1929

##### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETINGS

The first of the meetings of the Executive Committee was held in Atlanta, November 25, 1928, in which plans were made and a program outlined for the administration's major efforts during the year. This program embraced the establishment of an Emergency Relief Corps in each Post, the Junior Baseball Program, Protection of the children of Georgia by the erection of safety signs on the roads, and Child Welfare, without however totally disregarding the other features of the Legions activities.

A second meeting of the Executive Committee was held in Atlanta on May 5, 1929.

##### CHILD WELFARE

John J. West, Albany, Chairman. Edward H. Carvin was sent by National headquarters into the State for a period of two months to make a survey of the situation. His recommendations were that the Department of Georgia not try to carry on its own program of child relief but that the Department co-

operate with the Georgia Children's Home Association, as the amount of money appropriated to the Department through the Endowment Fund Corporation, was not sufficient to authorize the operation of a separate department of Child relief by the Legion of the State.

son of Charles Wallace and Sarah Elizabeth Pentecost Graddick. His early schooling was secured in the grammar and high schools of Barnesville, Ga., Huntsville, Ala., Louisville,

Ky., Rock Hill, S. C., and Atlanta, Ga. He graduated in 1911 from the Gordon Institute, a military school in Barnesville, Ga.

From 1907 to 1911 he was Private, Sergeant, First Lieutenant, Gordon Battalion; this being the beginning of his military career.

From January 7, 1913 to July 16, 1916, he held the grade of Private Sergeant, First Sergeant of the Georgia National Guard, Company G, second Georgia Infantry. From July 17, 1916 to November 12, 1917 he was Second Lieutenant, Second Georgia Infantry, which was redesignated the 121st Infantry, and on November 13, 1917 he was commissioned First Lieutenant, 121st Georgia Infantry, holding this until August 5, 1918. From August 6, 1918 to April 8, 1919 he

served as Captain of the 121st Georgia Infantry and the 49th Infantry. From December 29, 1922 to January 10, 1927 he was Captain 121st Infantry, Georgia National Guard, and on January 11, 1927 he was promoted Major of the 121st Infantry, Georgia National Guard, commanding the first Battalion, holding this commission until December 1930.

Charles P. Graddick saw service on the Mexican Border (being called out June 20, 1916), in the vicinity of El Paso October 22, 1916 to March 23, 1917. Upon his return from the border he entered the World War, serving in the A. E. F. in France from October 4, 1918 to January 16, 1919.

Charles Graddick's Legion activities date from his attendance at the organization meeting in Macon in 1919. In the same year he was organizing chairman of the Leon Martin Post No. 25, of Barnesville, District Commander Sixth District, 1927-28; Commander Leon Martin, Post No. 25, Barnesville, Ga., 1928-1929; Commander of the Department of Georgia June 1929-July 1930 and National Executive Committeeman July 5, 1930 to November 1930, resigning due to his promotion and transfer to another section of the United States. Aside from these activities Charles Graddick was Markmanship Chairman 1928-1929, and also served on other Committees.

On August 12, 1917 Charles P. Graddick was married in Rochelle, Ga., to Miss Tilly Adeline Woolvin, of Abbeville, Ga.

They have two children, Charlene Woolvin Graddick and Tilly Elizabeth Graddick.
