The Georgia Department was represented at the Sixth Annual Conference of Depart-

ment Presidents and Secretaries held in National Headquarters, in November, by Mrs. P. I. Dixon and Mrs. J. O. Minton.

The Christmas program for the hospitalized veterans was a complete success. Under the direction of Mrs. James Maddox, Department Rehabilitation Chairman, the Hospital Contact Committee, composed of Mrs. Arthur McCoy, of Atlanta; Mrs. C. T. Gause, of Augusta; Mrs. W. Y. Seymour, of U. S. Veteran's Hospital No. 62, Augusta; Mrs. Edwin Allen and Mrs. Wilbur Scott, of Milledgeville. Eleven hundred patients in Georgia Hospitals were given a box of Christmas gifts and the families of these men were contacted and remembered at Christmas. The Units at Atlanta, Augusta and Milledgeville assisted the committee in hospitals and the Units throughout the Department took care of the families of the hospitalized veterans.

On February 5, 1934 the Department Executive Committee met in the Dempsey Hotel, at Macon, in conjunction with the Unit Presidents and Secretaries Conference that had been called by the Department President.

The Executive Committee convened at eleven o'clock on the morning of February 5, with the Department President, Mrs. P. I. Dixon, presiding.

The Lord's prayer was repeated in unison, followed by the pledge to the United States Flag.

Mrs. Nolan McCrary, President of the Joseph N. Neel Unit, of Macon, welcomed the Executive Committee, and Miss Floride Allen, President of the Tenth District, responded to this address.

After the minutes of the meeting of the Executive Committee, held in Decatur on August 16, 1933, were read and approved, the secretary called the roll and the following members of the Committee responded; Mrs. P. A number of interesting reports were given by the officers and Chairmen of committees, Mrs. John G. Young, Fourth District President, stated in her report that every Unit in her District, except one, had exceeded one hundred per cent in membership.

When the reports had all been given the Department President asked the First Vice-President to take the chair while she gave the report of the Finance Chairman, who was not present, explaining a request from National Headquarters that the Department dues be raised from twenty-five cents to one dollar, so that the National aid that the Georgia Department was then receiving might be continued.

A motion was made, and carried, that the Executive Board recommend an increase of seventy-five cents per member for Department dues, making the Department dues one dollar and National dues twenty-five cents, and that a notice of this recommendation be sent to the Units at least thirty days prior to the Department Convention, to be held in June, 1934, so that the question might be voted on by the Convention.

At one o'clock Mrs. Nolan McCrary announced that luncheon was served and the meeting adjourned to the dining room where business was resumed at the luncheon table.

After the luncheon the Executive Board adjourned to meet with the Unit Presidents and Secretaries whose Conference convened at two o'clock.

An interesting program, patterned after the Department President's and Secretaries Conference, held each year in National Head-

quarters, was presented and proved very helpful to the large group of Unit officers who were present.

At four o'clock the National President, Mrs. William H. Biester, was introduced and made an interesting address.

Mrs. Dixon represented Georgia at the National Defense Conference, held in Washington, D. C., in January. While there she was the guest of Princess Catacuzene, National Chairman of National Defense, at a luncheon. At the Conference dinner, which is always an elaborate affair, Mrs. Dixon was hostess to Senator and Mrs. Walter F. George, of Georgia; General Peter C. Harris, Mrs. Boyce Ficklen, Jr., Mrs. J. W. Oglesby, Jr., of Quitman, and Miss Leila Summerall, National Committeewoman from Georgia.

Two new Units were organized during 1933-1934. They were the Jeff Davis Unit No. 100, at Ocilla and the Lindsey Garrett Unit No. 64, at Monroe. Three Units were re-organized.

The total membership for the previous year was two thousand eight hundred and seventy-one, (2,871). At the close of Mrs. Dixon's administration it had increased to three thousand and eighty-four, (3,084), an increase of two hundred and thirteen (213) members over the previous year.

Early in the year Mrs. Dixon began painting a picture of a bowl of Cherokee roses and announced that a rose would be painted in this picture for each Unit attaining its membership of the preceding year by December 31, 1933. Buds were painted for the Junior Groups. The finished picture contained twenty-seven roses and five buds, which meant that twenty-seven Units would receive National Citations and that five Junior groups had been organized.

The Fourteenth Annual Convention of the Department of Georgia, American Legion Auxiliary, was held in Savannah, on June 7, 8, and 9, 1934.

At seven o'clock, on Thursday evening, the officers and guests of all the organization, in session in Savannah that week, were entertained at a banquet in the main dining room of the DeSoto Hotel. A dance in the main ball room of the hotel followed the banquet.

An Area "C" Conference on Rehabilitation was held in the Savannah Hotel, in Savannah, Georgia, on June 6, 1934.

Rehabilitation officials from North and South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama and Texas were present to discuss The American Legion's rehabilitation policies.

Mr. Watson B. Miller, chairman of the Legion's National Rehabilitation Committee, presided at the Conference. Among these present were: Major O. W. Clark, Assistant Administrator of the Veteran's Bureau, of Washington, D. C.; Colonel E. Julian Peacock, of Macon and Washington, Clerk of the House Naval Affairs Committee; Miss Calhoun Harris, of ElPaso, Texas, Chairman of Area "C" of the National Rehabilitation Committee of the American Legion Auxiliary, and Mrs. James Maddox, Rehabilitation Chairman for the Georgia Department of the American Legion Auxiliary.

A joint session, of the Legion and Auxiliary, was held on Friday morning, at ten o'clock, in the City Auditorium. The Convention was called to order by Commander A. Sidney Camp, of Newnan.

In the absence of the Department Chaplain Rev. W. A. Reiser, Father Dan McCarthy, of Columbus, offered the invocation, and, while the audience remained standing, the colors were advanced.

Addresses of welcome were made by Honorable Thomas Gandy, Mayor of Savannah; Mrs. Hunter Henderson, President of the Chatham Unit, and Mr. Sam Cann, First Commander of the Chatham County Post.

Responses were made by Major Quimby Melton, National Committeeman from Georgia, and Mrs. P. I. Dixon, President of the Georgia Department of the Auxiliary.

At eleven o'clock the Auxiliary withdrew to Gregory Hall.

The opening business session of the Auxiliary was called to order by Mrs. Hunter Henderson, President of the hostess Unit. After a few words of greeting, Mrs. Henderson introduced Mrs. Dixon, who took the chair and proceeded with the business of the convention.

After the pledge to the flag and the preamble had been repeated in unison, the invocation was given by the Department Chaplain, Mrs. T. D. Murphy.

All of the officers and distinguished guests who attended the meeting of the Executive Committee the previous afternoon, were present at the opening session. The National Vice-President, Mrs. Charles Miller, of Ar-

Quimby Melton, National Committeeman from Georgia; Charles Barreur, Grande Chef De Gare, of the 40 and 8 in Georgia; Sam Ries Heller, of Norfolk, Virginia, Chef De Chemin De Fer of the 40 and 8, and A. Sidney Camp, Department Commander of the Legion, were introduced and all spoke briefly to the Convention.

Mrs. J. R. Youmans, of Columbus, was appointed Chairman of the nominating committee, with Mrs. W. E. H. Searcy as the appointees of the chair. Mrs. J. Witherspoon Daniels, of Waycross, Mrs. I. A. Sutton, of Clarkesville, and Mrs. Carl Adams, of Newnan, were elected from the floor.

The report of W. E. H. Searcy, Chairman of the Department Constitution and By-Laws Committee, was read by the Secretary, and was as follows:

"That the Executive Board recommends an increase of seventy-five cents per member for Department dues, making the Department dues one dollar and National dues twenty-five cents. And that notice of this recommendation be sent to the Units at least thirty days prior to the Department Convention to be held in June, so that the Constitution and By-Laws might be changed and this subject voted on at the Convention."

A motion was made, by Mrs. Searcy, that the report be accepted. It was seconded by Mrs. Max Kutner, of Rome. The report was discussed, after which the meeting adjourned until the afternoon.

At one o'clock the Department officers, distinguished guests and delegates were entertained at a luncheon in the Tavern of the De Soto Hotel. The Chatham County Unit was hostess at the luncheon, and the charming hospitality of the Savannah ladies, together with the beautifully appointed tables and the delicious food, made this an outstanding event of the Convention.

At the afternoon session the President and Secretary-Treasurer announced that their reports had been mimeographed and would be distributed at this time.

Mrs. Charles Miller, National Vice-President was introduced by the President and gave a splendid address, after which Mrs. Joseph M. Toomey presented a Naval Print Plate to Mrs. Miller as a love gift from the Department of Georgia.

Mr. Wm. Sirmon, Department Adjutant presented a resolution on Americanism which had also been presented to the Legion. This resolution was given to the resolution committee to be brought in with other resolutions.

At three-thirty o'clock the Convention adjourned to enable the members to attend the Committee Conferences that were held in the DeSoto Hotel at that time.

The beautiful Chapter House of the United Daughters of the Confederacy was the scene of a tea at five-thirty Friday afternoon, where all the visiting ladies were entertained by the local Units of the American Legion Auxiliary, Veterans of Foreign Wars and Disabled American Veterans.

The Past President's Parley breakfast was served in the DeSoto Hotel, at seven-thirty Saturday morning. Mrs. Joseph M. Toomey presided at the breakfast where a round table discussion of the work of the Parley took place. A motion was passed to have the funds of the Past President's Parley handled through the Department treasury the same as all other department funds.

The Convention was again called to order, at nine o'clock, on Saturday morning, June 9, 1934, in Gregory Hall, by the Department President, Mrs. P. I. Dixon.

The resolutions committee presented a number of resolutions and the following were adopted: A resolution accepting the offer of Miss Ruth Blair, Director of Archives and History for the State of Georgia, of a room in Rhodes Memorial Hall as a repository of valuable records and books of the Auxiliary.

The resolution to raise Department dues from twenty-five cents to one dollar per member was passed.

The resolution on "Americanism" presented by the Department Adjutant of the Legion the previous day, and which had been passed by the Legion in its Convention was adopted.

A resolution from the Child Welfare Committee, asking that a joint Child Welfare Committee be appointed which should consist of a representative from the American Legion, the 40 and 8 and the American Legion Auxiliary. The Department Child Welfare Chairman of the Legion be general chairman of this committee with the power to appoint District and County chairmen to complete the State Child Welfare organization.

This resolution was adopted.

Mrs. J. R. Youmans, Chairman of the nominating committee submitted the following names for officers of the Department for the year 1934-1935: President, Miss Mattie Kate Bagley, of Columbus; First Vice-President, Miss Helen Estes, Gainesville; Second Vice-President, Mrs. W. B. Bennett, Cordele; Historian, Mrs. Myrtle Armstrong Young, of Eatonton; Chaplain, Mrs. Hunter Henderson, of Savannah; National Committeewoman, Mrs. P. I. Dixon, Thomasville; Alternate National Committeewoman, Mrs. J. O. Minton, Thomasville.

As there were no other nominations for these offices, the women, whose names were presented by the nominating committee, were unanimously elected.

District Presidents were nominated by their Districts and were elected as follows: First District, Mrs. W. E. Simmons, of Metter; Second District, Mrs. Wilmot Wimberly,

of Bainbridge; Third District, Mrs. W. M. Norman, of Cordele; Fourth District, to be appointed; Fifth District, Mrs. Mark Stephenson, of Decatur; Sixth District, Mrs. Nolan McCrary, of Macon; Seventh District, Mrs. C. G. Kirkland, of Rome; Eighth District, Mrs. Carl Shepherd Baldwin, of Madison; Ninth District, Mrs. W. L. Norton, Gainesville; Tenth, to be appointed.

The following women were elected delegates to the National Convention, to be held in Miami, Florida in October: Miss Mattie Kate Bagley, of Columbus; Mrs. P. I. Dixon, of Thomasville; Miss Helen Estes, of Gainesville; Mrs. Arthur Hazzard, of Atlanta; Mrs. J. Witherspoon Daniels, of Waycross; Mrs. J. O. Minton, of Thomasville; Mrs. Augusta Wood DuBose, of Savannah.

The women who were elected as alternates were: Mrs. W. G. Fleming, of Cordele; Mrs. Lucy Mae George, of Columbus; Mrs. Edgar Johnson, of Columbus; Mrs. A. L. Henson, of Atlanta; Mrs. J. T. Bond, of Greensboro; Mrs. Hunter Henderson, of Savannah; Mrs. Max Kutner, of Rome; Mrs. George Roberts, of Macon and Mrs. John G. Young, of LaGrange.

The officers for 1934-1935 were installed by Mrs. A. L. Henson, a Past Department President, and Miss Bagley took the chair and adjourned the Fourteenth Convention of the Department.

The year 1933-1934 had been a difficult one for the Department but in all, a very successful one. The reports of the various officers and chairmen of committees showed that seven hundred and eighty-five dollars and sixty-two cents (\$785.62) was received from the preceding administration and that nine hundred and ninety-four and thirty-five cents (\$994.35) would be transferred to the incoming administration.

Approximately ten thousand dollars was spent for Rehabilitation by the Department and the Units and two thousand five hundred and sixty-one dollars was spent for Child Welfare.

Seven hundred and fifty-eight families, including five thousand four hundred and thirty-six children were given assistance by the American Legion Auxiliary in Georgia.

Seventy-eight thousand and sixty-five poppies were made in Government hospitals in Georgia, and seventy-two thousand eight hundred and twenty-two were sold.

1934-1935

The election of Miss Bagley to the office of Department President brought Headquarters to Columbus, the city in which the Georgia Department of the Auxiliary was organized and where it held its first Convention. Miss Bagley appointed Miss Lucy May George to the office of Secretary-Treasurer

and together they set up Department Headquarters in Columbus.

Miss George was secretary to a business concern in Columbus and due to the increase of business of this firm she found that it would be impossible to handle the work of the Secretary's office of the Auxiliary and she was therefore forced to resign the office of Secretary-Treasurer of the Auxiliary. On August 15, 1934, Miss Bagley appointed Mrs. Robert McNulty, of Columbus, to fill the office made vacant by the resignation of Miss George.

Soon after assuming the office of Department President, Miss Bagley created an advisory committee composed of all the Past Department Presidents, with Mrs. Boyce Ficklen, Jr. as Chairman.

Georgia was represented at the National Convention, October 22, to 25, 1934, by Miss Mattie Kate Bagley, of Columbus; Mrs. R. H. McNulty, of Columbus; Mrs. Augusta Wood DuBose, of Savannah; Mrs. J. Witherspoon Daniels, of Waycross; Mrs. A. H. Hazzard, of Atlanta; Mrs. Myrtle Armstrong Young, of Eatonton; Miss Helen Estes, of Gainesville; Mrs. P. I. Dixon, of Thomasville, and Mrs. Boyce Ficklen, Jr., of Washington, as delegates, and by the following alternates; Mrs. Hunter Henderson, of Savannah; Mrs. George Roberts, of Macon; Mrs. J. W. Oglesby, Jr., of Quitman; Mrs. F. H. Murray, of Ashburn, and Mrs. H. E. Brown, of Athens.

En route to Miami for the National Convention, Mrs. Lowell Fletcher Hobart, stopped over in Columbus, Georgia, where she was entertained elaborately by all of the patriotic organizations of that city. A delegation from the Charles S. Harrison Unit of the American Legion Auxiliary met her upon her arrival and presented her with roses.

She was taken to Warm Springs and Fort Benning and afterwards entertained at a luncheon at the Woman's Club by the Daughters of the American Revolution, the United Daughters of the Confederacy and the American Legion Auxiliary. That evening Miss Mattie Kate Bagley, Department President of the American Legion Auxiliary, enter-

tained at dinner in honor of Mrs. Hobart, her other guests being the heads of the patriotic organizations of Columbus.

Mrs. Hobart was the first National President of the American Legion Auxiliary, a past president general of the Daughters of the American Revolution and Presidente D'Honneur du Comite des Femmes de la Federation Interalliee des Anciens Combattants. From Columbus Mrs. Hobart proceeded to Miami for the National Convention.

The beautiful tropical city of Miami welcomed the men of the Legion and the women of the Auxiliary with open arms. From the moment the convention opened on the water-surrounded stage of the Biltmore pool until the gavel sounded a last ringing tap, and Mrs. Biester declared the convention adjourned, every moment was filled with interesting activities.

At the Southern Division caucus, when the Southern Vice-President was nominated, Miss Bagley, Georgia's Department President served as chairman of the tellers counting the votes. Mrs. Tom Gammie, of Ponca City, Oklahoma, was nominated by the Southern Division and later elected by the Convention.

A meeting of the Department Executive Committee was held, at the Henry Grady Hotel, in Atlanta, October 9, 1934, with the Department President, Miss Mattie Kate Bagley, presiding.

Mrs. John G. Young, Americanism Chairman, led in the pledge of allegiance to the Flag, after which Mrs. T. D. Murphy led in prayer.

The appointments of the Department Secretary-Treasurer, and the Chairmen of Standing Committees, by the Department President, were ratified by the Executive Committee.

The following officers and members of the Executive Committee were present; Miss Mattie Kate Bagley, Miss Helen Estes, Mrs. R. N. McNulty, Mrs. Myrtle A. Young, Mrs. P. I. Dixon, Mrs. H. G. Johnston, Mrs. Nolan McCrary, Mrs. C. G. Kirkland, Mrs. C. S. Baldwin, Mrs. Boyce Ficklen, Jr., Mrs. A. L. Henson, Mrs. James Maddox, Mrs. Ernest Travis, Mrs. Joseph M. Toomey, Mrs. J. G. Young, Miss Leila Summerall,

Mrs. Harvey Kennedy, Mrs. J. W. Oglesby, Jr., Mrs. John M. Slaton, Jr., Mrs. J. M. Sigman, Mrs. J. H. Allison, Mrs. J. W. Daniels, and Mrs. T. D. Murphy.

After the reading of the minutes of the last day of the Savannah Convention, June 9, 1934, Mrs. Boyce Ficklen, Jr., moved that the resolution in regard to Child Welfare be stricken from the minutes, as it was out of order. This motion was seconded and carried, and the minutes were approved as corrected.

Lieutenant Stanley Jones, Department Adjutant of the Legion, was introduced and spoke briefly to the Executive Committee. He offered the space allotted to Gala News, in the Georgia Legionnaire, to the Auxiliary, free of cost. The Auxiliary had previously paid for this space and the generous offer of the Legion was received with gratitude.

Mr. John M. Slaton, Regional Director of U. S. Veterans Administration; Mr. Marion O'Connor, of the National Employment Agency; Mr. A. L. Henson, Director of the Veterans Service Office, and Mrs. D. M. Robinson, were introduced and discussed Rehabilitation and Hospital work.

At one o'clock the meeting adjourned for a luncheon in the Henry Grady Hotel.

The Executive Committee convened again at two-thirty for a short afternoon session during which reports were given by officers and committee chairmen. The meeting adjourned at four o'clock.

The National Commander of The American Legion, Mr. Frank L. Belgrano and Mrs. Belgrano, visited the Georgia Department in October and were entertained at a dinner at the Capitol City Club. Miss Bagley represented the Department at this dinner.

In November Miss Bagley and Mrs. McNulty attended the Department Presidents and Secretaries Conference at National Headquarters in Indianapolis, Indiana, where a program was outlined for the guidance of the Departments and Units during the ensuing year.

Under the direction of the Department Rehabilitation Committee the usual program of remembering the hospitalized veterans and their families was carried out and the many lives that were brightened by the thoughtful-

ness of the women of the American Legion Auxiliary, made the Christmas season a very happy one in Georgia.

Mrs. P. I. Dixon, National Committee-woman from Georgia, attended the National Executive Committee meeting in Indianapolis, Indiana, the last week in January and traveled from there to Washington for the National Defense Conference. Miss Bagley, Department President, also attended the National Defense Conference, and presided at the Georgia table at the Conference dinner to which all Georgia Senators and Congressmen were invited.

When the National President made her official visit to the Georgia Department on February 20, she was entertained at Macon where the Department Executive Committee was meeting as well as the Unit Presidents and Secretaries Conference.

The Department Executive Committee met on the morning of February 20, in the Dempsey Hotel, with the Department President, Miss Mattie Kate Bagley, presiding.

The following members of the Committee answered the roll call: Miss Mattie Kate Bagley, Miss Helen Estes, Mrs. W. B. Bennett, Mrs. Myrtle Armstrong Young, Mrs. J. B. Calhoun, Mrs. Nolan McCrary, Mrs. Nat Breedlove, Mrs. A. N. Durden, Miss Latimer Watson, Mrs. J. N. Sigman, Mrs. Ben Smith, Mrs. Charles Hogan, Mrs. J. Witherspoon Daniels, and Mrs. James Mad-dox.

After Lieutenant Jones, Department Adjutant of the Legion, had read a letter from John I. Morris, stating that the government would begin work immediately on four hospitals for women, one of which would be located in the southeast, a motion was made by Mrs. P. I. Dixon, seconded by Mrs. Myrtle A. Young, that a committee be appointed to urge that one of these hospitals be located in Georgia. Miss Bagley named Mrs. J. M. Sigman, Mrs. J. B. Calhoun and Miss Ethel Worsham on this committee.

When the National President, Mrs. A. C. Carlson, arrived in Macon she was escorted to the Dempsey Hotel, where the Executive Committee was in session. She spoke briefly at this time and it was then announced that

she would deliver an address at the Presidents and Secretaries Conference that afternoon. The meeting adjourned at one o'clock.

Mrs. Carlson, the National President, was the principal speaker at the Conference of Unit Presidents and Secretaries when they met on the afternoon, of February 20, in the Dempsey Hotel. That evening she was the guest of the Georgia Department at dinner, in the Hotel, to which representatives of all the patriotic organizations in Macon, and the Department officers of the Legion were invited.

The National Commander, Mr. Frank N. Belgrano and Mrs. Belgrano, again visited Atlanta, on April 16, and were guests of honor at a dinner in the Henry Grady Hotel. About two hundred guests were seated at long tables in the main dining room. Among those seated at the speakers table were: Commander Belgrano and Mrs. Belgrano, Miss Mattie Kate Bagley, Department President; Mr. Delacy Allen, Department Commander; Mrs. A. L. Henson, President of the Atlanta Unit; Mr. Kenneth R. Murrell, Commander of the Atlanta Post; Mr. Quimby Melton, National Vice-Commander of the Legion; Lieutenant Stanley Jones, Department Adjutant; Mr. George Beck, Fifth District Commander; Mr. Fonville McWhorter, Commander of Fulton County Post No. 134.

The Georgia Department joined the National Organization in celebrating Mother's Day with a constructive program. Throughout the Department, programs were presented around the central theme of "Making Motherhood Safer for Mothers". These programs were in co-operation with the Maternity Center Association and the United States Children's Bureau.

Miss Bagley represented the Department at the Child Welfare Conference held in Macon in May. The Conference was called by Mr. J. P. Kelley, Department Child Welfare Chairman of the Legion and was attended by U. S. Government representatives.

Area "C" Rehabilitation Conference was held in Atlanta, on May 29, and 30. Representative of the American Legion Auxiliary were in attendance from several of the South-eastern states.

The year 1934-1935 was of fourteen and one-half months duration, the date of the Annual Convention being set for August 22, 23, and 24, 1935 whereas the 1934 Convention was held on June 7, 8, and 9, 1934.

Five new Units were organized during the year. They were organized at Baxley, Savannah, Hawkinsville, Unadilla and Danielsville. Total membership forwarded to National Headquarters before the National Convention was 2859. The Department won the fifteen dollars cash award, given by National Headquarters, to the Department in Group Three, attaining the largest percentage of its membership quota between January 1, and March 16, 1935.

A balance of \$1719.96 was transferred to the incoming administration after the fifteenth annual convention, which was held in Macon.
