RATES ARE ADVANCED ON WAR RISK INSURANCE ON U. S. SHIPS

Secretary McAdoo has announced that the rate of the War Risk Insurance Bureau of the Treasury Department on steamers and cargoes to Europe and ports on the Mediterranean coast of Africa and vice versa is advanced from 5 per cent to 6½ per cent as to all steamers sailing on or after August 15, 1917.

Number of Heavy Losses.

The experience of the bureau since the United States entered the war has shown that the 5 per cent rate is not adequate for the risks undertaken through the so-called war zone, as the bureau has sustained a number of heavy losses.

A change has been made in the applications for vessel insurance and hereafter they will contain a warranty on the part of the ship owners as to the dead-weight capacity of the vessel.

Monthly Payments if Wanted.

Secretary McAdoo also announced that a change has been made in the policies for insuring masters, officers, and seamen of American merchantmen, providing for payments in monthly installments, or in a lump sum at the option of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance, but without interest. Previously the policies provided for payments in a lump sum only in respect to most claims. The general plan will be to make the payments in installments whenever feasible.

SHIPPING BOARD BEGINS WORK ON ITS BUILDING PROGRAM

Shortly after his election as president of the Shipping Board yesterday, Edward N. Hurley said:

"We have actively begun work. We have found things in excellent condition and are now for making progress as rapidly as we can.

"We find that our problem has three phases—labor, timber, and steel.

"The labor situation is in satisfactory shape. We are getting into the timber and steel situations. To-day we gave considerable attention to the distribution of ships; that is, the bringing of certain ones from the Pacific to the Atlantic and the best utilization of others for the transportation of cargoes needed abroad."

TO ENCOURAGE FIBER GROWING.

To encourage an extension of production of sisal and other hard fibers in the Philippine Islands the Bureau of Plant Industry of the United States Department of Agriculture has sent H. T. Edwards, a fiber-crop expert, to the Islands recently. He will cooperate with the Fiber-Crop Division of the Philippine Bureau of Agriculture in the work.

PLAN ARRANGED TO EXPEDITE "LIFE AND DEATH" MESSAGES PASSING BETWEEN OFFICERS AND ENLISTED MEN OF NAVY AND THEIR FAMILIES

The Navy Department has arranged for the expedition of "life and death" messages passing between the officers and enlisted men of the Navy and their families. Telegrams of such a nature are to be dispatched to the Bureau of Navigation at Washington and will be forwarded by telegraph or cable immediately to the proper naval station or ship, no matter at what port or in what waters the latter may be at the time. Other messages will pursue a slower means of transmission.

Explanation of Plan.

In explanation of the plan, Commander D. W. Todd, Director of Naval Communications, has sent the following letter to the presidents of the Western Union and Postal Telegraph Cos.:

DEAR SIR: Orders have been issued to all naval personnel serving in the fleet directing them to inform their families that life and death telegrams are to be forwarded addressed to ships, care of the

Bureau of Navigation, Washington, D. C. For example:

Telegrams of less importance are to be forwarded from distant points with the same form of address with the understanding that such telegrams will be forwarded by the Bureau of Navigation to the addressee by mail. The above orders have been issued to prevent land line messages from disclosing the location of ships of the Navy.

It is requested that proper steps be taken in your organization to notify senders of telegrams of this order of the Navy Department.

Publicity is being given this matter in the press.

RED CROSS NEEDS 50 MOTOR TRUCK MEN TO GO TO FRANCE

Twenty experienced motor truck drivers, 20 helpers, and 10 expert mechanics are needed at once by the American Red Cross for service in France, according to a cable request just received by the Red Cross war council from Maj. Grayson M.-P. Murphy in charge of the Red Cross mission to France.

The mechanical squad will include master carpenters, body builders, painters, machinists, and electricians—two each. The trucks for which drivers are sought are of 2-ton capacity and will be used in the rapid transfer of Red Cross supplies from seaports to their destinations, a service made necessary by the congested condition of the railroads in France.

Have Asked for Volunteers.

Volunteers beyond military age have been asked for this service by the American Red Cross to work without compensation, and Red Cross officials are hopeful that employers of motor drivers and the other expert help required will contribute the services of the men, paying their salaries while in Red Cross service.

The Red Cross will pay the transportation and living expenses of the men while abroad. It is the intention when the men are recruited to give them intensive mechanical training, some drill, and if possible some preliminary instruction in the French language.

Contributions of Labor.

This contribution to the American Red Cross by employers of skilled labor would be similar to the contributions of large organizations to the Red Cross staff at headquarters, which includes nearly 75 volunteers, many of whom are paid by outside organizations while working for the Red Cross.

Offers of assistance along the line of these Red Cross needs should be made to A. W. Staub, director of the Atlantic division of the American Red Cross, Metropolitan Tower, New York City, or to the nearest Red Cross chapter.

ACTIVE DUTY FOR GEN. EDGERLY.

By direction of the President, Brig. Gen. Winfield S. Edgerly, United States Army, retired, is placed on active military duty under the provisions of the next to the last proviso of section 24, act of Congress approved June 3, 1916. Brig. Gen. Edgerly will report to the commanding general, Northeastern Department, for assignment to duty.

ORGANIZATION AND SCOPE OF OPERATIONS OF THE WOMEN'S LIBERTY LOAN COMMITTEE

The woman's liberty loan committee has sent the following outline of the organization and its work to the various State councils of defense:

The woman's liberty loan committee consists of 10 members, appointed by the Secretary of the Treasury to direct the activities of women in the sale of liberty bonds, and having headquarters in the Treasury Building at Washington.

For purposes of organization the committee has made the State the unit of organization.

State Organization.

Each State, the District of Columbia, and the territorial divisions of the United States all have a chairman (designated State chairman), nominated by this committee and the woman's committee of the Council of National Defense for membership upon the executive board of the State divisions of the latter committee.

This State chairman shall have active charge and direction of the liberty loan activities in her State, under the general direction of this committee. All reports shall be made by her to this committee.

The State chairman shall appoint a chairman for each county, such county chairman to perfect organization in her

county in cooperation with the State chairman.

There shall further be a chairman in each of the 12 Federal reserve banking districts of the United States, this chairman to be appointed by the national committee to act in an advisory capacity to the woman's liberty loan committee and to State chairmen in her reserve district. She shall be the delegate from the woman's liberty loan committee to the liberty loan committee of the Federal reserve bank board of her district. The reserve chairman shall initiate such activities as she deems advisable in addition to the activities inaugurated by State chairmen.

Chairmen in Foreign Countries.

There shall be a chairman representing the woman's liberty loan committee in all foreign countries not now at war.

This committee has established an advisory council composed of heads of woman's organizations of nation-wide membership. It is expected that the connection of the national committee and the headquarters of these great organizations will supplement the organization work of State chairmen among members of such organizations.

GUARDING OF HEALTH OF SOLDIERS AND SAILORS IS IN THE BEST MEDICAL HANDS, SAYS DR. MARTIN

Under Proper Conditions Camp Life Is Normal—Men Themselves Must Cooperate to Maintain a High Health Standard—Planning Far Ahead For Foreign Campaign.

The committee on public information has issued the following:

The scientific opinion and judgment of the medical profession of the whole country have been focussed during the past month on the preparations for maintaining the health and physical well-being of the vastly increased American military forces through the medical section of the Council of National Defense, Dr. Franklin H. Martin, chairman of the committee on medicine and surgery of the advisory commission, said in an interview made public to-day. In this way the Medical Corps of the Army and Navy have been able to draw on all the best medical thought of the Nation to aid them in solving the wholly new difficulties which have arisen in the course of the unprecedented task which they are facing. Dr. Martin gave unstinted praise to the personnel of the Medical Corps of the two branches of the service and to the capacity for expansion which they had shown in an entirely new situation.

Difficult to Visualize Problems.

"It is very difficult to visualize for the public the medical problems involved in making war in striking enough fashion to secure them the public attention they should have," Dr. Martin said. "The work of the Army surgeon, the care of the wounded, easily holds the public mind, but vital as it is, it is of small importance compared with the far greater task of keeping the men in the camps and on the ships free from disease, particularly during the months immediately approaching, when by far the greater part of the American Army will be in training. It is singularly true of the work of caring for an army's health that, if it is done properly, there are no unusual outward results; it comes to public attention only if it is bungled.

"The trained physician knows that unless certain precautions are taken dangerous epidemics, such as typhoid fever or meningitis, are almost certain to occur in the Army camps, striking often with the most surprising suddenness. If they do occur, the whole country is aroused and the entire medical force hears from it. If the proper precautions are taken, however, camp life is normal, nothing happens, and the layman does not know of, or at least never gives a thought to, the effort which was necessary to prevent the disaster. The successful Army medical officer can never point to his work and say, 'Here; all these men were sick and I cured them.' He can only take some dry-looking statistics and point out that in the long run few of his men were sick. It can be said with reasonable accuracy that the less heard of the medical branch of an army, the more efficient it is, because usually when much is said about it the comment is of a very unpleasant character.

"In some ways this is unfortunate, because in order to impress on the new troops themselves the necessity of cooperating in

every way with the Army physicians in maintaining a high health standard the public should have very clearly in mind the character of the problem and the steps which are being taken to meet it. The key to the whole situation is constant vigilance, and nothing can possibly be a greater spur to watchfulness on the part of the medical authorities than the knowledge that the American people will know, and know immediately, if conditions are not what they ought to be in the housing of the troops, the sanitation in the camps, and the general provisions against disease. I believe the country learned the medical lesson of the Spanish-American War. Publicity is going to be the big safeguard against similar mistakes in this vastly greater enterprise.

In Best Medical Hands.

"It would be well to emphasize here that the work of safeguarding the health of the Army and Navy could not be in better hands than it is right now. The Medical Corps of the United States Army and Navy have led the way in many directions in the development of military sanitation and disease prevention, and the confidence the country feels in their leadership is thoroughly justified.

"The general medical board of the Council of National Defense, composed of the country's biggest medical men, including the Surgeon Generals of the Army and Navy, has served as a clearing house of professional opinion and has brought to the solution of the questions at hand in concentrated form the best medical thought of the Nation. On the board are such men as Dr. Simon Flexner, of the Rockefeller Institute; Drs. William J. and Charles H. Mayo; Dr. Victor C. Vaughan, of the University of Michigan; Dr. John M. T. Finney and Dr. William H. Welch, of Johns Hopkins; Dr. Frederick A. Besley, of Northwestern; Dr. George W. Crile, of Western Reserve; and Dr. Charles E. Kahlke, of Hahnemann College, Chicago, to mention only a few. Through frequent conferences with these men the Surgeon Generals, themselves occupied constantly with administrative tasks, have been able to gain new points of view and gain a detached perspective in looking at their problems from time to time. The opportunity to exchange opinions has been invaluable. As the time for the mobilization of the Army approaches many of these civilian physicians are themselves entering active administration in the Army and Navy Medical Corps, but with the additional advantage of having helped to plan far ahead for the campaign in which they are called to assist.

"The question of planning for health now seems somewhat academic; when the Army is mobilized it will be vital.

Supply Question Difficult.

"The supply problem, which is cared for by Dr. Simpson, has been another source of difficulty in which the

TETANUS GERMS ARE FOUND IN COURT-PLASTER SAMPLES

The Department of Justice to-day authorized the following statement relative to its investigation of reported sales of poison plasters in various sections of the United States:

"The Department of Justice, without sharing in any sensational view as to the manner in which sticking plaster or court-plaster became infected, states that some of the samples submitted and analyzed have been thereby shown to contain tetanus germs. The public is consequently cautioned against purchasing this remedy except from approved sources, the warning being particularly directed against purchases in small packages from street peddlars and vendors.

"The samples of sticking plaster mentioned by Secretary of Commerce Redfield under date line of yesterday were received at the department this morning. These samples will be analyzed immediately."

CAPTS. HALL AND ELLIOT RETIRED.

Capt. Chalmers G. Hall, Tenth Cavalry, having been examined for promotion by a board of officers and found physically disqualified for the duties of a major of Cavalry, by reason of disability incident to the service, his retirement by the President from active service as a major under the provisions of an act of Congress approved October 1, 1890, is announced, to date from May 15, 1917, the date upon which he would have been promoted to that grade by reason of seniority if found qualified. Maj. Hall will proceed to his home.

Capt. Duncan Elliot, Cavalry, Detached Officers' List, having been found by an Army retiring board incapacitated for active service, on account of disability incident thereto, and such finding having been approved by the President, the retirement of Capt. Elliot from active service under the provisions of section 1251, Revised Statutes, is announced. Capt. Elliot will proceed to his home.

medical section has cooperated with the medical divisions of the Army and Navy. Faced at the beginning with a shortage, due to the country's previous almost exclusive dependence on Germany for its medical supplies, we have had both to arrange for taking care of civilian hospitals and private practice and at the same time to build up additional sources to meet the vast needs of the new Army. Through constant conferences with manufacturers and close attention to detail, especially standardization of products, this work is in a fair way toward accomplishment. There will be no serious dearth.

"The country can rest assured that everything of which the American medical profession is capable has been done to prepare for taking care of its new troops. So far as it is safe to predict anything, it can be promised that there will be no dangerous epidemics of preventable disease. This is a war of science, and medical science has been doing its part in the preparation."

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EXECUTIVE ORDER.

I hereby create a Committee on Public Information, to be composed of the Secretary of State, the Secretary of War, the Secretary of the Navy, and a civilian who shall be charged with the executive direction of the committee.

As civilian chairman of the committee I appoint Mr. George Creel.

The Secretary of State, the Secretary of War, and the Secretary of the Navy are authorized each to detail an officer or officers to the work of the committee.

American Ship is Sunk By German Submarine

The Department of State is informed of the sinking of the American vessel **AUGUSTUS WELT**.

The ship was shelled and burnt by a German submarine on July 21. The crew has been landed.

THE COUNTRY'S HONOR.

The large number of subscribers, more than 4,000,000, and the large amount subscribed, over \$3,000,000,000, to the liberty loan was a splendid demonstration of the worth of a good name. For generations the United States Government bond has been a synonym for absolute security, because the honor of our country is behind it. "As good as a Government bond," was as common a term as "As good as gold," in speaking of securities or investments.

The United States has reaped the reward from its own people for never having defaulted on an obligation. "Our sacred honor" is no idle phrase in the United States. The tradition of our national honor began in Washington's day, when in his first inaugural address he said, "The foundations of our national defense will be laid in the pure and immutable principles of morality," and it has been preserved through all our history.

The honor of the United States is back of the liberty loan bonds, and all America and all the world know that they are absolutely safe.

DELEGATION OF AIRCRAFT MEN TO VISIT THE PACIFIC COAST

A delegation composed of representatives of the Federal Government, the British, French, and Italian missions, American aircraft manufacturers, and Pacific coast spruce lumbermen will leave early next week for the Pacific coast to confer with lumber manufacturers for the purpose of obtaining their cooperation in turning out the quantities of spruce needed for the aircraft program of the United States and the allies. At the same time the members of the delegation will deliver a series of addresses in the coast cities and towns on the war situation. The trip will be made under the auspices of the aircraft production board and the Signal Corps.

Membership of Delegation.

The delegation will be composed of E. T. Allen, of the lumber committee of the Council of National Defense, who will represent the aircraft board; Lieut. Col. L. W. B. Rees, of the British Royal Flying Corps; Maj. R. Perfetti, of the Italian mission; Capt. Henry Dourif, of the French mission; a representative of the aircraft manufacturers; and Howard E. Jayne and F. A. Douty, representatives of the spruce lumbermen.

They will take with them a series of moving pictures showing work at the front and will talk to the public on recent war developments, urging general cooperation in all war activities.

Plan Number of Stops.

The schedule of the trip includes stops at Seattle, Tacoma, Portland, various other coast towns in Oregon and Washington, and possibly at San Francisco.

The aircraft production board states that even with the improved specifications proposed by the spruce manufacturers at their recent conference with Government representatives, which require more careful selection and less raw material than those in common use, it is estimated that the demands of the joint allied and American program will still call for far larger amounts of spruce than were manufactured last year. Although this will require an unusual output by the spruce manufacturers, both on the Pacific coast and in North Carolina and Virginia, where part of the supply can be obtained, it is regarded as by no means impossible.

GETS APPOINTMENT AS ENSIGN.

Gunner Axel Lindblad, United States Navy, has successfully passed the examination for appointment as an ensign in the Navy, and Secretary Daniels will recommend to the President his appointment.

Gunner Lindblad was born at Stockholm, Sweden, and is 33 years old. He is a naturalized citizen of the United States and a legal resident of the State of Massachusetts. He first enlisted as an ordinary seaman at Boston, Mass., on February 17, 1902, and since that date served as an enlisted man in the various ratings until January 13, 1913, on which latter date he was appointed to the warrant rank of gunner in the Navy.

Principal Ports of Country to Have Benefit After War.

Consul John Ball reports the following from Havre:

The creation of free zones in the principal ports of the country is being considered by the French Government. The project is of special interest to Havre, as it is the chief coffee market in Europe and also the leading port in France in the importation of cotton and in the commerce with the United States.

According to the understanding in the commercial circles of Havre, the proposed free zones would be limited to commercial transactions and would not include industrial operations. No manufacturing would be permitted, but only mixing, sorting, cleaning, and other manipulations intended to improve the quality of the raw materials and place them in condition for sale.

Although the proposal for the establishment of free zones is opposed by certain cities in the interior of the country, it is receiving serious consideration, and it is probable that it will be carried into effect soon after the termination of hostilities.

FRENCH COMMERCE DECISIONS.

New Import and Export Restrictions Are Made Known.

The Office of the Foreign Trade Adviser, Department of State, authorizes the following:

According to cable advices from the American consul general in Paris, a number of decrees and decisions of recent dates will still further affect French commerce.

The exportation of fir wood is prohibited.

Exportation from French colonies and protectorates of vulcanized fibers, milling machinery, crushing machinery, and mandrills of all kinds is prohibited, except to the usual allies and to American countries.

Special import permits must be obtained for all goods except those listed in a cable of April 16, but this decision is not applicable to goods in transit or for temporary admission and transshipment. Importers must not order goods nor have them shipped from abroad until import permit for same is applied for and granted. Goods admissible in limited quarterly quantities will be admitted if it can be proved that they were shipped directly to France or Algeria before July 8, 1917.

BRITISH EXPORT RULING.

Embargo Placed on Drawings of aeroplanes and Engines.

The following cablegram has been received from the American consul general at London:

"Exportation of designs, drawings, specifications, and other descriptions of aeroplanes or other aircraft or engines or accessories prohibited."

PROCEEDINGS OF THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES BRIEFLY TOLD

SENATE.

In supplying estimates of war needs for the remainder of the current fiscal year to the Senate Finance Committee and the House Ways and Means Committee yesterday, Secretary McAdoo estimated the cost of the war for the first year to be \$10,735,807,000. This does not include any funds expended by the United States prior to July 1 this year nor does it include any of the money loaned to the allies. The Secretary informed Congress that new revenues amounting to \$7,000,000,000 must be raised either from taxation or the issuance of securities, or both. If the advances to the allies continue throughout the year in the same proportion as in the past the total war bill for the year ending June 30, 1918, will be something more than \$18,000,000,000, the loans to the allies, of course, to be repaid in the future. The opinion of leading members of the Finance Committee yesterday was that not more than \$2,000,000,000 of the amount needed would be derived from taxation. In transmitting the estimates the Secretary of the Treasury estimated the receipts for the year to be \$1,333,500,000, exclusive of the amount to be raised under the pending war-tax revenue bill, which, when recently reported to the Senate, was estimated to yield \$1,670,000,000.

The Finance Committee met to-day to begin the serious consideration of the problem how to raise the additional needed revenue. Gen. Crozier, Chief of the Ordnance Bureau; Gen. Sharpe, Quartermaster General; Surg. Gen. Gorgas; Gen. Squier, Chief of the Signal Corps, and Gen. Black, Chief of the Engineer Corps, appeared before the committee to explain the latest estimates of the War Department. The War Department wants \$8,678,000,000, largely to meet the expenses of the new National Army. The Navy will require \$1,824,000,000. The remainder of the sum asked by the Treasury will be divided among various other departments.

Conferees on the administration food bill are making faster headway than was thought possible when they first began to discuss the differences between the two Houses of Congress. It was said to-day to be possible that a full agreement might be reported Monday, although the controversy over the Senate amendment providing for a three-man board to administer the law may require the conferees to seek instructions on that item. The conferees have practically agreed to eliminate the Senate amendment for a joint congressional committee on war expenditures. The Senate amendment authorizing the President to fix the price of coal and to take over and operate the mines, if necessary, has been accepted in principle by the House conferees but may be amended somewhat. The same is understood to be true of the Senate proposal to regulate the making of contracts for the Government by members of the advisory committees of the Council of National Defense.

The liquor provisions of the bill it is believed will end in a compromise in which each house will recede from some of its drastic provisions. A tentative

plan that probably will be agreed to, eliminates the mandatory provision of the Senate bill for the commandeering of distilled spirits in bond and the House provisions prohibiting the manufacture and sale of beer and wine. A substitute that probably will be agreed upon gives the President discretionary power in each case. The President would have authority to commandeer distilled spirits if the necessities of the Government required it and he would have power to restrict or forbid the making of beer and wine.

By a unanimous vote the Military Committee ordered a favorable report on the Chamberlain resolution to conscript aliens of military age in this country, other than subjects of Germany and citizens of those countries that are not entitled to American citizenship or who are exempt through existing treaty agreements. It is estimated that this resolution, if enacted into law, would add approximately a million young men to the list of those liable to military service. Chairman Chamberlain will report the bill to the Senate Monday and urge its immediate adoption. Senator Chamberlain said he expected the resolution to be adopted practically without objection.

The Foreign Relations Committee is dealing with the same subject in a different way. It has under consideration a resolution by Senator McCumber directing the President to enter into negotiations with the allied governments with a view to obtaining their consent to the drafting of their citizens resident in the United States.

Senator Chamberlain next week will offer an amendment to the law creating the new National Army that will make it an offense for any person to "give" intoxicating liquor to any soldier, sailor, or marine while in uniform. The present law makes it an offense only to "sell" to those in uniform. This law is easily evaded and the Attorney General has recommended the amendment that will be urged by Senator Chamberlain.

John P. Murphy, of Knoxville, Tenn., postmaster of the Senate, has resigned to take effect August 1. He will resume the practice of the law in Knoxville. It is presumed that his successor will be chosen from the same general section of the country.

Secretary McAdoo appeared before the Committee on Commerce to suggest certain minor changes in the trading-with-the-enemy bill which would clarify certain provisions affecting the duties of the Treasury Department.

HOUSE.

Representative Hulbert, of New York, has proposed to the Senate Committee on Military Affairs a plan looking to a new form of administration for the aviation service intended to include not only its military and naval but its commercial development as well. It provides for combining the aircraft production board, at present an advisory committee of the Council of National Defense, with the Chief of the Signal Corps of the Army and the Chief of the Naval Construction

Board and coordinating their activities into a separate board.

Mr. McLemore, of Texas, has introduced a resolution permitting Representative LaGuardia, of New York, to serve as an aviator in the United States Army without forfeiting his seat in the House.

NEW LAWS FOR MOTOR VEHICLES.

New Brunswick Changes System for Lights and Taxation.

Consul E. Verne Richardson at New Brunswick, Canada, sends the following:

A bill has been agreed to in the Provincial Parliament which amends materially the existing local laws governing motor vehicles. The principal provision of the bill is one requiring each car to be equipped with an appliance for dimming its lights on approaching another vehicle. The bill also changes the method of assessing the prescribed tax from horsepower to weight. The scale of fees will be \$0.60 per hundredweight for ordinary cars; motor trucks not exceeding 2 tons, \$10, with \$5 per ton or fraction of a ton over 2 tons; motorcycles, \$3.

Since January 1, 1917, according to local returns, 680 motor vehicles, chiefly pleasure cars, have been registered in New Brunswick; of these 42 are in Moncton. A large proportion of the 1917 registrations are for new cars, and Moncton's 42 do not include cars in use prior to the indicated date. While Canadian-built cars are the leaders in popularity for general use, a fair number of higher-class American cars have lately been imported by agents who are actively engaged in efforts to effect sales. Three heavy-duty trucks of American manufacture have also been put into road-repair service by a local contractor.

REPORTS ON NEGRO EDUCATION.

Adequate College Facilities Urged by Dr. T. J. Jones.

The Bureau of Education authorizes the following:

Adequate college and university education for colored people is urged by Dr. Thomas Jesse Jones, of the United States Bureau of Education, Department of the Interior, in the two-volume report on negro education just issued by the department.

"If college education is of value to any group," says Dr. Jones, "surely it is to those who are to be the leaders of the colored people. Only a broad-minded leadership, with a thorough grasp of human development, can understand the peculiar difficulties resulting from the close proximity of such widely varying races as the black and the white people of the Southern States.

"The race must have physicians of real skill and the spirit of service to lead against the insanitary conditions that are not only threatening the group itself but also its white neighbors. It must have religious teachers who can relate religion to the morals of the individual and to the common activities of the community. It must have teachers of secondary schools who have had a college education in the great modern sciences and in the historical development of civilization."

Dr. Jones points out that despite high ideals and notable enthusiasm on the part of the race and its benefactors, most of the colored institutions calling themselves colleges are poorly equipped and ineffectively organized and administered.

AIDING BREAD-SAVING CAMPAIGN.

State Councils of Defense Rendering Valuable Assistance.

The Council of National Defense authorizes the following:

Under the leadership of the section on cooperation with States, of the Council of National Defense, the State councils of defense have been actively carrying on the campaign of the commercial economy board to eliminate the return of unsold bread and to curtail retail delivery. The section has been cooperating with the commercial economy board in the work, and frequent bulletins have been sent out to the State councils to advise them on follow-up methods in securing the general acceptance of the board's recommendations in all parts of the country.

The State councils are rendering invaluable assistance in bringing local pressure to bear upon individual bakers and retailers, whose delinquency could easily jeopardize the success of the reform.

FRENCH SHIPPING DECREE.

The following cablegram has been received from the American consul general at Paris:

"Presidential decree 17th, published 18th, provides that from August 1 next every French vessel over 100 gross tons must possess license issued by Under Secretary of State. Each license application must indicate voyage and nature of cargo. Under Secretary will cause immediate requisition of vessels considered inadequately utilized."

WEEKLY FORECAST ISSUED BY THE WEATHER BUREAU

The United States Weather Bureau has issued the following forecast for the week beginning Sunday, July 29:

North Atlantic States.—Warm and generally fair weather during the coming week; hot wave indicated.

Middle Atlantic States.—The coming week will be one of generally fair and warm weather; hot wave indicated.

South Atlantic and East Gulf States.—The week will be one of warm and generally fair weather, although widely scattered thundershowers are probable.

West Gulf States.—The coming week will be one of generally fair and warm weather.

Ohio Valley and Tennessee.—The coming week will be one of high temperatures and generally fair weather, although there is probability of break to cooler weather and local thundershowers toward end of week.

Region of Great Lakes.—High temperatures first half of week will probably be followed by lower temperature after Thursday. Generally fair weather indicated, although widely scattered thundershowers are probable.

Plains States and Upper and Middle Mississippi Valleys.—The first part of week will be warm, probably followed by

seasonable temperature after Wednesday or Thursday. Except for widely scattered thundershowers, the weather will be generally fair.

Rocky Mountain and Plateau Region.—Except for widely scattered thundershowers the week will be one of fair weather with temperature near or below the seasonal average.

Pacific States.—Except for occasional local showers in the north Pacific States the week will be one of generally fair weather with temperature near or below the seasonal average.

MAJ. CRAFT RETIRED.

Capt. Edgar D. Craft, Medical Corps, having been examined for promotion by a board of officers and found physically disqualified for the duties of a major in the Medical Corps by reason of disability incident to the service, his retirement by the President from active service with the rank of major under the provisions of the acts of Congress approved October 1, 1890; February 2, 1901; and April 23, 1908, is announced, to date from May 15, 1917, the date upon which he would have been promoted to that grade by reason of seniority had he been found qualified.

Exact Order in Which Persons Registered Are Liable to Be Called For Military Service as Set Forth in Regulations Prescribed By the President and in Schedule of Numbers Prepared By Provost Marshal

WAR DEPARTMENT,
Washington, July 19, 1917.

Under authority vested in him by the act of May 18, 1917, the President of the United States prescribes the following rules and regulations and directs that they be published for the Government of all concerned, and that they be strictly observed.

PART I.

Rules and regulations prescribed by the President for determining the order in which the persons whose registration cards are within the jurisdiction of the respective local boards are liable to be called for military service by the respective local boards under the authority vested in him by the terms of the act of Congress to authorize the President to increase temporarily the Military Establishment of the United States, approved May 18, 1917. These rules and regulations may be modified at any time by the President.

SECTION 1. A drawing of the numbers from 1 to 10,500, both inclusive, shall be made in Washington under the direction of the Secretary of War on a day and at a time to be fixed and determined by the Secretary of War. The numbers, from 1 to 10,500, both inclusive, shall be printed or stamped on slips and placed in a receptacle, or receptacles, under the direction of the Secretary of War. A person or persons blindfolded shall draw one number at a time from such receptacle, or receptacles, until all the numbers therein shall have been drawn. Tellers will record as each number is drawn the exact order in which the number was drawn.

A schedule shall then be prepared by the Provost Marshal General containing all of such numbers from 1 to 10,500, both inclusive, and such numbers shall all be placed in such schedule in the exact order in which they were drawn from the receptacle, or receptacles, under the direction of the Secretary of War.

The first number drawn shall be placed at the top of the first page of such schedule, and the second number drawn shall be placed next below in such schedule; and this order shall be followed in making such schedule until all the numbers drawn shall be so placed in such schedule in the exact order in which they were drawn.

Called in Exact Order.

SEC. 2. Such schedule shall control and determine the exact order in which the persons whose registration cards are in the possession of the respective local boards and which have been given a "serial number," in accordance with the rules and regulations prescribed, are liable to be called by the local board for military service to be physically examined, exempted, discharged, or finally accepted into the military service of the United States as provided by the rules and regulations prescribed in accordance with the act of Congress approved May 18, 1917.

SEC. 3. Section 12 of the rules and regulations prescribed by the President under date June 30, 1917, provides that later regulations will prescribe the method and manner of determining the order in which the persons whose registration cards are within the jurisdiction of the respective local boards and which have been given a "serial number" in accordance with the rules and regulations prescribed are liable to be called for military service by the respective local boards to be physically examined, exempted, discharged, or finally accepted into the military service of the United States.

In accordance with sections 9 and 10 of said rules and regulations and the directions of the Provost Marshal General, the registration cards in the possession of the respective local boards on or before the 10th day of July, 1917, have each been given a "serial number" in red ink, and copies of the registration cards so serially numbered have been forwarded to the adjutant general of the respective States and of the District of Columbia, and four duplicate lists of the names of all persons whose registration cards are in the possession of the respective local boards have been prepared by each local board. The "serial number" of each person

registered before the 10th day of July, 1917, is on such lists before the name of each such person. One copy of the list prepared by each local board has been posted in the office of the local board, one copy made accessible to the press, and one copy mailed to the Provost Marshal General in Washington.

Each local board has numbered the registration cards taken into its possession from boards of registration, or from other persons, upon the organization of the board and has also made additional lists of all persons whose registration cards have since been received by it, but not of cards, however, received by it later than the 10th day of July, 1917, and such lists have been posted in the office of the respective local board, one copy made accessible to the press, and one copy mailed to the Provost Marshal General in Washington in the manner of the original lists.

Method of Determining the Order.

SEC. 4. The method of determining the order to be followed by each local board in calling for military service the persons whose registration cards are in its possession and which have been given a "serial number" in accordance with the rules and regulations prescribed is:

A list of the names of the persons whose registration cards are in its possession and have been so serially numbered shall be made by each local board as required by section 14 of the rules and regulations prescribed by the President under date June 30, 1917.

The first name to be entered on the list prepared by each local board shall be the name of the person the "serial number" of whose registration card is first placed in such schedule containing the numbers from 1 to 10,500, both inclusive, reading down from the top of the first column of the first page of the schedule, disregarding the numbers in the schedule which do not appear on any registration card so serially numbered and in the possession of the local board.

Before the name of the first person on each list shall be written the "serial number" of his registration card.

The order number, that is, the "number" designating the order in which he will be called for military service to be written on the list made by each local board after the name of such first person on each list is number one (1).

The next name to be entered on the list prepared by each local board shall be the name of the person whose "serial number" is next placed in such schedule containing the numbers from 1 to 10,500, reading down the columns from the top thereof and disregarding the numbers in the schedule which do not appear on any registration card so serially numbered and in the possession of the local board.

The order number to be written on the list made by each local board after the name of such person on each list is number two (2).

The order in which the names of all such persons shall be entered on the list prepared by each local board shall be determined in the exact manner above described for determining the names of the first and second persons on each such list, and this method shall be pursued by each local board until the name of every person whose registration card is in its possession and which has been given a "serial number" in accordance with the rules and regulations, shall have been entered upon the list required to be made by each local board by said section 14.

Making Up of Lists.

SEC. 5. The list shall be made by each local board on Form No. 102, provided by the Provost Marshal General.

SEC. 6. The list prepared by each local board shall be posted, made accessible to the press, and mailed as required by section 14 of the rules and regulations prescribed by the President under date June 30, 1917.

SEC. 7. In furnishing the quotas required to be called and furnished by each local board in accordance with the directions received from the governor of the respective State, or Territory, or from the Commissioners of the District of Columbia, as the case may be, acting for and by the direction of the President, each local board shall call the persons whose

names are on the list prepared by it as above required in the exact order fixed and stated on such list.

SEC. 8. All registration cards received by any local board after July 10, 1917, shall be copied and a list of the names of all persons whose registration cards are so received made by the local board. The original registration card shall be retained by the local board and no "serial number" shall be assigned by such local board to any such registration card, and no "serial numbers" will be placed before the name of any person on the list to be so made. A copy of all such cards and the list of the names of all persons whose registration cards have been so received shall be daily forwarded to the adjutant general of the State, Territory, or of the District of Columbia, as the case may be, or to the official who under the regulations is charged with the duties of the adjutant general of the State, Territory, or District.

SEC. 9. Whenever an examination of a registration card in the possession of any local board discloses that it has not been serially numbered, or that it has been improperly, erroneously, or illegibly serially numbered, or has not in some other respect been serially numbered as required by section 9 of the rules and regulations of June 30, 1917, it shall be the duty of the local board having jurisdiction thereof to forward such registration card to the adjutant general of the State, Territory, or of the District of Columbia, as the case may be, without assigning any "serial number" thereto.

Adjutant General May Supply Number.

SEC. 10. Whenever an examination of a copy of a registration card received in the office of the adjutant general of any State, Territory, or of the District of Columbia, and an examination of the list of the names of all persons whose registration cards are in the possession of the local board which forwarded such copy discloses that the registration card has not been serially numbered, or has been improperly, erroneously, or illegibly serially numbered, or has not in some other respect been serially numbered as required by section 9 of the rules and regulations of June 30, 1917, it shall be the duty of the adjutant general, under the direction of the governor of the State, Territory, or the Commissioners of the District of Columbia, as the case may be, to assign a "serial number" to such registration card and to certify the number assigned thereto to the local board having jurisdiction, as hereinafter provided.

SEC. 11. All registration cards so improperly, erroneously, or illegibly serially numbered shall be assigned "serial numbers" by the adjutant general of the State, Territory, or of the District of Columbia, as the case may be, as follows:

(a) When any registration card is found bearing more than one "serial number" there shall be assigned to such card the lowest in order of the numbers which it bears, provided such number is not borne by any other registration card in the possession of the local board having jurisdiction thereof. The remaining number or numbers appearing on any such card shall be disregarded.

Where Numbers Are Duplicated.

(b) When two or more registration cards are found bearing the same "serial number," with fractions added to the number for the purpose of distinguishing the cards, or with letters of the alphabet or other distinguishing marks preceding or following the serial number for the same purpose, one card of any such group of cards within the jurisdiction of any local board shall be drawn by lot and shall be assigned the common "serial number" which they all bear. All the other cards of any such group shall be regarded as having no "serial number" and shall be assigned serial numbers as hereinafter provided in the case of registration cards having no serial numbers.

(c) When the "serial number" on any registration card is found to be illegible and no unused number in the consecutive numbers from 1 upward on the list furnished by the local board having jurisdiction of any such card can be found to correspond with it, such card shall be regarded as having no "serial

number" and shall be assigned a "serial number" as hereinafter provided in the case of cards having no serial numbers.

Sec. 12. All registration cards received by any local board after the 10th day of July, 1917, and copies of which have been forwarded as heretofore required to the adjutant general of the State, Territory, or District, as the case may be, and all other registration cards which have been forwarded to the adjutant general of the State, Territory, or District, as the case may be, and which have not been assigned a "serial number" by any local board, or by the adjutant general in accordance with the foregoing provisions, shall each be assigned by lot a "serial number" by the adjutant general of the State, Territory, or District, as the case may be, under the direction of the governor or commissioners as the case may be.

"Serial numbers" so to be assigned to each such registration card shall be determined by lot for cards within the jurisdiction of one local board as expeditiously as possible, at such times and places and in such manner and under conditions insuring absolute fairness, impartiality, and the necessary publicity, as may be prescribed by the governor of the State or Territory or the Commissioners of the District of Columbia, as the case may be.

Assigning Serial Numbers.

The "serial numbers" so to be assigned by the respective adjutants general to all such registration cards within the jurisdiction of one local board shall consist first of all "serial numbers" on the consecutive list of the names of persons whose registration cards are within the jurisdiction of such local board which have not been assigned to any registration card within its jurisdiction. If there are no such "serial numbers" on the consecutive list from 1 upward, or when all such numbers have been assigned to registration cards, the "serial numbers" to be thereafter assigned by the adjutant general to registration cards within the jurisdiction of such local board shall consist of the "serial numbers" in their consecutive order beginning with the next "serial number" following the highest "serial number" on the list of persons, whose registration cards are within the jurisdiction of such local board, filed with the adjutant general by such local board.

Sec. 13. The adjutant general of the State, Territory, or of the District of Columbia, as the case may be, shall forthwith certify to the local boards having jurisdiction of the respective registration cards to which "serial numbers" have so been assigned a list showing the "serial numbers" assigned to each such registration card. It shall be the duty of such adjutant general to send a copy of such list to the proper district board.

It shall be the duty of any local board upon receiving any such list from the adjutant general of the State, Territory, or District forthwith to assign "serial numbers" to the original registration cards in accordance with such list, unless the original registration card has been assigned a "serial number" by the adjutant general as heretofore provided, and such local board shall thereupon place the names of all persons whose registration cards have as herein provided been assigned "serial numbers" on the list of the names and residences of persons in the order they are liable to be called for military service as required by section 14 of the rules and regulations of June 30, 1917.

PART II.

Schedule prepared by the provost marshal general which shall control and determine the exact order in which the persons whose registration cards are in the possession of the respective local boards and which have been given a "serial number" are liable to be called for military service by the local board.

Important Notice for Local Boards.

Draw a light pencil line through every number which does not at the present time appear on any registration card in the possession of your local board. The list as thus prepared controls and determines the order of call for every person whose registration card is now within your possession. Each person shall be called in the order in which the "serial number" on his registration card appears on this list. If additional registration cards are received, or registration cards which have been wrongly serially numbered, and are assigned "serial numbers" by the adjutant general of the State, Territory, or District, as the case may be, as provided in the rules and regulations, your list will be changed accordingly so as to include in their exact order such additional "serial numbers" as fixed in this schedule.

ARMY SUPPLIES EXPEDITED BY REDISTRIBUTING EMPTY CARS

Fairfax Harrison, chairman of the railroads' war board, authorizes the following:

In ordering empty freight cars to be promptly moved from one railroad to another, regardless of ownership, the railroads' war board has adopted a policy new to American railroad usage and hopes thereby to solve the problem of rapidly mobilizing in different sections of the country the freight cars necessary to handle the abnormal Government and commercial traffic that war conditions have produced.

Reports to the war board from the car service commission show that orders have been given to 36 separate railroads to ship immediately 68,814 freight cars to 54 other railroads. These cars are being moved without load and in the quickest possible time.

The reports show further that 46,682 cars have actually been received by the roads for whose benefit this arbitrary movement is ordered, and that 51,795 cars have already been delivered by the initial roads to intermediate lines in the direction of ultimate destination.

Give Increased Facilities.

Among the immediate and important results of this redistribution of cars will be the increased facilities for the prompt shipment of lumber to the Army cantonment sites and the shipbuilding yards. Lumber for cantonments is to be supplied from the Carolinas, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, and Arkansas. Thousands of extra cars have been supplied to the lines operating in these States.

Mississippi and Alabama will supply the bulk of the lumber for new wooden ships that are being built, and the extra cars ordered there assure the movement

of lumber to the Atlantic coast shipyards. The movement of lumber for commercial purposes is likewise being facilitated in Mississippi, Alabama, and Tennessee.

In addition to accelerating the lumber movement the redistribution of cars is expected to assist materially in the transportation of grain from the Middle West to the East. It has already facilitated the shipping of potatoes and other produce from Texas and the Southeast. It has also provided additional facilities for moving live stock from Texas into the western pasturage territory.
