U. S. INFLUENCE TO SUPPORT ROUMANIA IN HER RIGHTS AS AN INDEPENDENT NATION

ASSURANCE BY SECRETARY LANSING

*This Country in Full Sympathy
With Aspirations of Roumanian
People Without and Within King-
dom, He Tells Charge d'Affaires.*

The Secretary of State makes public the following:

From the Secretary of State to the Charge d'Affaires ad interim of Roumania:

DEPARTMENT OF STATE,
Washington, November 5, 1918.

Sir: The Government of the United States has constantly had in mind the future welfare and integrity of Roumania as a free and independent country and prior to the existence of a state of war between the United States and Austria-Hungary a message of sympathy and appreciation was sent by the President to the King of Roumania.

Conditions have changed since that time and the President accordingly desires me to inform you that the Government of the United States is not unmindful of the aspirations of the Roumanian people without as well as within the boundaries of the kingdom. It has witnessed their struggles and sufferings and sacrifices in the cause of freedom from their enemies and their oppressors. With the spirit of national unity and the aspirations of the Roumanians everywhere the Government of the United States deeply sympathizes and will not neglect at the proper time to exert its influence that the just political and territorial rights of the Roumanian people may be obtained and made secure from all foreign aggression.

Accept, sir, the renewed assurances of my high consideration.

ROBERT LANSING.

The American Legation at Jassy has been instructed by telegraph to convey the foregoing message to the Roumanian Government.

Dr. Frederick P. Keppel Arrives Safe In France

The War Department has received cable information of the safe arrival in France of Third Assistant Secretary of War Frederick P. Keppel. Secretary Keppel will remain with the American Expeditionary Forces for a short time in the interest of organized soldiers' welfare work.

CONTRACT ADJUSTMENT BOARD NAMED BY SECRETARY OF WAR

To Hear and Determine Claims
and Disputes Under Any
Department Contract.

The War Department authorizes the following:

A board of contract adjustment has been constituted by order of the Secretary of War. The functions of this board are to hear and determine all claims, doubts, or disputes which may arise under any contract made by the War Department. The board is clothed with all powers necessary and incident to the performance of its duties.

Decisions to Be Final.

Through the operation of the board of contract adjustment, contractors supplying the Army will be able to submit any differences that may arise between them and the contracting officers of the various supply bureaus to this board which will act without any of the technicalities of court procedure, thus insuring a speedy and equitable adjustment. The services of lawyers will not be necessary, as the contractor or his representative may appear before the board and state his case freely and fully with the assurance that he will be given an impartial hearing and a prompt decision. The decisions of the board will be final and conclusive on all matters submitted to it for determination, but appeals may be made to the Secretary of War.

Members of the Board.

The members appointed on the Board of Contract Adjustment by the Secretary of War are Lieut. Col. Christopher B. Garnett (chairman), Lieut. Col. H. H. Lehman, and Lieut. Col. Edward S. Malone.

Lieut. Col. Garnett was formerly chairman of the Corporation Commission of Virginia; Lieut. Col. Lehman is chief of the methods section, Purchase Branch, Purchase, Storage and Traffic Division; and Lieut. Col. Malone was assistant corporation counsel of New York City for the Borough of Queens. The legal advisor of the board will be a judge advocate appointed by the Judge Advocate General.

Recorder and Examiners.

The board will also have a recorder and several examiners, who will be commissioned officers of the United States Army and appointed by the director of the Purchase, Storage, and Traffic Division.

The office of the Board of Contract Adjustment will be in Washington, but hearings may be held in such other places as may be expedient and necessary for the proper performance of its duties.

COMMISSIONS AWAITING MANY TECHNICAL AND BUSINESS MEN; APPLICATIONS ARE SOLICITED

STATEMENT BY WAR DEPARTMENT

*Many Vacancies in the Various Staff
Corps of the Army for Those Who
Are Qualified—Places Primarily
For Experienced Older Men.*

The War Department authorizes the following:

Men of technical qualifications in administration, production and engineering are needed as officers to fill many thousands of existing vacancies in the various staff corps of the Army. These staff corps commissions are primarily for older men, whose technical and business experience would be of value in the Army, and men who largely were disqualified for general military service, either through being placed in the special or limited service class of the draft or in deferred classification other than essential industries.

Advice to Applicants.

Applicants should not come or write to Washington unless they live in Washington or in the immediate vicinity. The recruiting machinery of the War Department for obtaining by appointment from civil life the large number of officers needed for the various staff corps is in operation. The patriotism which prompts offers of service is best demonstrated by following the expressed wishes of the department and tendering offers of service in the place and manner designated.

Persons who believe that they have the necessary qualifications should apply to their local branch of the Military Training Camps Association. These branches are located in most cities of 10,000 population or over and are in direct touch with the needs of the War Department, and the officials of these branches have the facilities to expedite applications for commissions. These branches receive the applications and forward them with recommendations to the district headquarters offices, which are now in operation in 12 cities. These district offices have jurisdiction over the recruiting in the various districts into which the country is divided.

Location of Headquarters.

The district headquarters are located in New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Atlanta, Chicago, Cleveland, St. Paul, Dallas, Kansas City, Mo., Portland, San Francisco, and Los Angeles. Washington is also a district headquarters for candidates who live in Washington or near by.

EFFECT OF AUSTRIAN ARMISTICE ON THE ALLIES' WHEAT SUPPLY

Expected to Permit Reduction in Amount of Bread Substitutes Now Being Used.

The Food Administration issues the following:

The Inter-Allied Food Council in London is discussing the possibility of diminishing the percentage of substitutes used in wheat bread by January 1 in all Allied countries in view of the new situation. The Austrian armistice must result in greater safety of the Mediterranean Sea routes and the increased accessibility of the Indian and Australian wheat supplies, even if Germany does not quit the war.

Additional Wheat Available.

This, it is hoped, should make sufficient wheat from these countries available during this winter to reduce the amount of substitution in the bread of Allied countries and allow the substitutes now being imported to the Allies to be used for dairy feeds, of which there is a great shortage. The same situation in feeds exists in the United States and would also be indirectly relieved by relaxing the use of substitutes in bread.

The altered war situation would thus enable us to secure a better adjustment between human and animal food. The change in the war situation, however, does not alter the totals of food demands upon the United States but in fact will increase our load and therefore there will be increased demands for economy.

We must now participate in the preservation of newly liberated nations in Austria from starvation, and it is anticipated that while some wheat may be needed from the United States, the largest part of our exports to that quarter will be corn, rye, barley, and fats. The Austrian merchant shipping must be placed in service before exports can begin.

BRITISH WAR RISK RATES.

Premiums to Be Reduced 50 Per Cent in Event of Armistice.

Consul General Robert P. Skinner, London, reports by cable:

The British board of trade communicates the following to Lloyds: "Inquiries having been made as to the position of merchants and others who may now or in the future effect insurance with war-risks insurance office in event of a declaration of armistice between the belligerent powers, notice is hereby given that the rates of premium upon all insurances accepted on and after November 1, 1918, will be reduced 50 per cent in cases where vessels concerned shall sail during the continuance of such armistice."

ON 100 PER CENT HONOR ROLL.

Director General McAdoo announces that among the 100 per cent railroad organizations in the fourth Liberty loan campaign, were the offices of B. L. Winchell, regional director of the southern region, and R. H. Aishton, regional director of the northwestern region. These offices made 100 per cent subscriptions early in the campaign.

BOARD INCORPORATED TO GIVE ECONOMIC HELP TO RUSSIA

The War Trade Board, to which the President has entrusted the execution of plans for rendering unselfish economic aid to Russia, has now established a corporation to carry out or administer certain details of this economic program in regions and lines of trade where it is not possible to accomplish this through the ordinary channels of trade.

Articles of incorporation were on November 5 filed for this corporation, to be known as "The War Trade Board of the United States Russian Bureau, Incorporated." The capital of the corporation, which is to be operated in the interest of the Russian People, is placed at \$5,000,000, the amount of the revolving fund placed at the disposal of the War Trade Board for the purpose of financing the plans and policies of economic assistance to the Russian people.

IMPORTING OF RUSSIAN RUBLES INTO UNITED STATES FORBIDDEN

The Treasury Department issues the following customs decision:

To collectors of customs and others concerned:

The Federal Reserve Board, Division of Foreign Exchange, has decided to prohibit the importation of Russian rubles into the United States, except that each bona fide adult traveler arriving in this country will be permitted to bring with him 500 Russian rubles.

In case more Russian rubles than allowed and permitted are found upon a passenger or traveler, customs officers will take possession thereof and report the facts to the department for instructions.

cluding the Sanitary Corps), the Judge Advocate General's Department, and the Railway Transportation Corps—all staff corps of the Army now recruit their commissioned personnel direct from civil life with the foregoing machinery. Applications for the Medical Department (with the exception of the Sanitary Corps), the Railroad Transportation Corps, and the Judge Advocate General's Department should be made direct to these departments in Washington.

Applicants from civil life for commission in the Infantry, Cavalry, Field and Coast Artillery, and Machine-Gun Battalions should submit their applications to the Army office on duty at the educational institution nearest to the residence of the applicant.

The final selection of these applicants is made after the course of training, by the commanding officers of the various central officers' training schools. No applications of this character should be submitted direct to the War Department.

AIRPLANE MAIL FLYER MEETS SNOWSTORM 7,000 FEET ALOFT

The Post Office Department issues the following:

The air mail between Washington and New York got its first touch of winter flying on Sunday, when Ed. Gardner left New York in a cold rain, and flew for 40 minutes through a snowstorm at an altitude of 7,000 feet. The snow was so dense that he could not see the ends of the wings of the machine. He suffered no inconvenience save the chill.

Plans to Combat the Elements.

The air mail service has made all preparations to combat the elements for winter flying. Electrically heated clothing has been ordered, and individual heating plants for each plane have been installed. These plants keep the motors warm in the hangars over night through the coldest weather, and will enable an immediate start regardless of the degree of cold. Arrangements have also been completed to keep a well-packed landing and taking-off area in the snow, and equipment has been devised for control of the plane on sleet and ice on the ground.

The New York-Chicago Route.

On the New York-Chicago route, construction has begun on a \$15,000 hangar at Chicago, donated by the business men of that city, and hangars are already in course of construction at Cleveland and Bryan, Ohio. Work on the hangars at Clarion, Bellefonte, and Lehigh, Pa., will be begun next week. All the airplanes on the New York-Chicago route will be equipped with wireless and everything that can be done to insure a perfect daily service between the cities on the air mail, regardless of weather conditions, has been provided for.

FILING OF APPLICATIONS FOR PATENTS IN FOREIGN COUNTRIES

An order entered October 8, 1918, by the Federal Trade Commission and affecting the filing of foreign applications by persons domiciled in the United States reads as follows:

It appearing to the Federal Trade Commission that the publication of inventions by the transmission out of the United States of applications for patent therefor, or of documents relating thereto, may be detrimental to the public safety or defense, or may assist the enemy or endanger the successful prosecution of the war;

Therefore, in conformity with the provisions of the trading with the enemy act and of the Executive order of October 12, 1917, it is ordered:

That inventors, their assigns, if any, and solicitors, and each thereof, and all others having knowledge of any invention, shall not transmit, nor attempt to transmit, out of the United States any application for patent therefor, or any document or communication relating thereto, without first obtaining the consent or approval of the Commissioner of Patents, or a license from the Federal Trade Commission. Progress By Draft Boards In Physical Examinations

The War Department authorizes the following:

Nine hundred and thirty-six local boards in the country have reported to Provost Marshal General Crowder that they are 90 per cent through the physical examinations of class 1 men, 19 to 36 years of age of the September 12, 1918,

registrants. Fourteen hundred and five of the local boards are 60 per cent through and 1,774 are 30 per cent complete with this work.

Four thousand three hundred and twenty-five of the local boards have completed 30 per cent of classification of registrants of September 12, 4,110 are 60 per cent complete, and 3,657 are 90 per cent through, while 2,581 report having forwarded all proper records to their respective district boards.

TREASURY CERTIFICATE ISSUE.

In connection with the issue of Treasury certificates dated November 7 and maturing March 15, it is announced that the issue of 4 per cent certificates, tax series of 1919, maturing July 15, 1919, closed at the close of business November 6. MONUMENT TO FIRST THREE U. S. SOLDIERS WHO FELL IN ACTION

The Secretary of State is in receipt of a telegram from the American Ambassador at Paris to the effect that on November 3 an artistic monument at Batheleumont was dedicated by the citizens of Nancy to commemorate the death of the first three Americans who fell there in action just a year ago while fighting under the American flag. The names of these men are Corpl. James B. Gresham, Evansville, Ind.; Thomas F. Enright, Pittsburgh, Pa.; and Merle D. Hay, Glidden, Iowa.

Notwithstanding the fact that Batheleumont is still under enemy shell fire, early on the morning of the 3d there were some beautiful floral wreaths sent to the place and laid at the base of the monument.

The memorial is given by the people of the Department of Meurtheet Moselle. In a large salon of the city hall at Nancy a meeting was held at which there were made a number of speeches praising the bravery of the Americans and the services they had rendered to France. One of the ministers of the Government presided. Among the speakers were the mayor of Nancy, the prefect, and one of the senators from the Department.

American Official Communiques on Operations of U. S. Forces

American Official Communiqué No. 186.

HEADQUARTERS AMERICAN
EXPEDITIONARY FORCES,
November 5, 1918, evening.

The first army under Lieut. Gen. Liggett has continued its success.

Crossing the river south of Dun-sur-Meuse under a heavy artillery fire, which frequently wrecked the newly constructed bridges, the troops of Maj. Gen. Hines's corps fought their way up the slopes of the east bank. Breaking the enemy's strong resistance, they captured Hill 292, Hill 260, Liny-devant-Dun, and drove him from the Bois De Chatillon. During the afternoon our gains in this sector were extended northward; Dun-sur-Meuse was captured, and our line pushed forward a mile beyond that town, as far as the village of Milly.

The troops of Maj. Gen. Summerall's corps reached the river at Cesse and Luzy and mopped up the forest of Jaulnay. The important road center of Bertmont fell before our victorious forces, who pushed on to the Bois De L'Hospice, 2 miles north of that town, capturing in their advance the village of Letanne. At Beaumont we liberated 500 French citizens, who welcomed our soldiers as deliverers.

The advance of the past two days has carried our line to points within 5 miles of the Sedan-Metz Railroad, one of the main lines of communication of the German armies.

Between Beaumont and the Bar Maj. Gen. Dickman's corps, in close liaison with the French fourth army on its left, pushed forward under heavy artillery and machine-gun fire through the rugged forest areas beyond Stonne. The villages of Yonco, La Besac, and Stonne were taken.

We have taken to-day west of the Meuse 51 additional guns, making a total of more than 150 since November 1.

Thirty of our bombing planes executed a successful raid on Meuse and on Rachourt this morning, dropping over 2 tons of bombs with good effect. Reconnaissance and pursuit squadrons carried out many successful missions, machine-gunning enemy troops, and greatly assisting the advance of our infantry. Seventeen enemy airplanes were shot down and 2 enemy balloons burned. Seven of our planes are missing.

American Official Communiqué No. 187.

HEADQUARTERS, AMERICAN
EXPEDITIONARY FORCES,
November 6, morning.

Between the Bar and the Meuse the First American Army continued its advance northward, opposed by strong resistance.

Our troops are in the Bois Du Fond de Limon, whence the line extends through the Flaba, Maisoncelle, and Chemery.

On the line of the Meuse which we now hold from the Bois de L'Hospice, inclusive, to Sassey, and on the heights to the east of Milly, and thence to Dun-sur-Meuse, there was severe artillery and machine-gun fighting during the night.

France-American units, operating in the difficult terrain east of the Meuse against positions long held by the enemy on the front Sivry to the Bois de la Grande Montagne, were heavily engaged.

During successful air combats yesterday afternoon, three additional enemy planes were brought down. All of our machines returned.

FORWARDING MAIL TO SOLDIERS WITH UNPRONOUNCEABLE NAMES

The War Department authorizes the following:

There has been a marked decrease in the number of complaints from families of soldiers of foreign extraction in the United States Army over the nonreceipt and delay of allotment checks, due to plans providing for a careful checking of the names and addresses of nonspeaking registrants.

The camp authorities in most cases have used the names and addresses furnished by the draft boards, with the result that on long and unpronounceable names, strange cities, provinces, and countries in European countries, many mistakes have been occasioned in the forwarding of mail.

The office of the Provost Marshal General has directed a careful checking of such names and addresses to eliminate the possibility of error.

FOUR NEW STATE DIRECTORS.

Appointments Announced in the Personnel of Four Minute Men.

Prof. Charles T. Burnett, of Bowdoin College, Brunswick, Me., is now State director of four-minute men for Maine, succeeding Lieut. Paul Nixon, who has resigned to enter the military service of the United States.

Albert B. Houghton, of Milwaukee, Wis., has been appointed State director of four-minute men of Wisconsin, succeeding Roger Y. Flanders, who resigned to become a member of the staff of the War Department, committee on training camp activities.

Lowry F. Safer, Columbus, Ohio, succeeds Harry L. Vail as State director of four-minute men for Ohio.

R. E. Cavanaugh, Indianapolis, Ind., is now State director of four-minute men of Indiana, succeeding Philip T. White, who has been promoted to a position in another State by the Director General of Railroads.

The Secretary of the Treasury, under the authority of the act approved September 24, 1917, as amended by the act approved April 4, 1918, offers for subscription at par and accrued interest, a limited amount of Treasury certificates of indebtedness of the United States, Series T, dated and bearing interest from November 7, 1918, payable March 15, 1919, bearing interest at the rate of $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent per annum.

Applications will be received at the Federal reserve banks.

Bearer certificates will be issued in denominations of \$500, \$1,000, \$5,000, \$10,000, and \$100,000.

Said certificates shall be exempt, both as to principal and interest, from all taxation now or hereafter imposed by the United States, any State, or any of the possessions of the United States, or by any local taxing authority, except (a) estate or inheritance taxes and (b) graduated additional income taxes, commonly known as surtaxes, and excess profits and war-profits taxes, now or hereafter imposed by the United States, upon the income or profits of individuals, partnerships, associations, or corporations. The interest on an amount of bonds and certificates authorized by said act approved September 24, 1917, and amendments thereto, the principal of which does not exceed in the aggregate \$5,000 owned by any individual, partnership, association, or corporation, shall be exempt from the taxes provided for in clause (b) above.

Certificates of this series will be accepted at par, with an adjustment of accrued interest, during such time and under such rules and regulations as shall be prescribed or approved by the Secretary of the Treasury, in payment of income and profits taxes when payable at or before the maturity of the certificates. The certificates of this series do not bear the circulation privilege and will not be accepted in payment on bond subscriptions.

The right is reserved to reject any subscription and to allot less than the amount of certificates applied for and to close the subscriptions at any time without notice. Payment at par and accrued interest for certificates allotted must be made on November 7, 1918, or later allotment. After allotment and upon payment Federal reserve banks will issue interim receipts pending delivery of the definitive certificates. Depositories duly qualified under Department Circular No. 92 of September 21, 1918, will be permitted to make payment by credit for certificates allotted to them for themselves and their

GERMAN NEWSPAPER IS QUOTED ADMITTING LOSS OF THE WAR

The Department of State is informed that the Schwaebische Tagwacht, a leading south-German socialist paper, contained the following in its issue of October 30:

We have lost the war; we are conquered. These bitter words which we were long reluctant to express now force themselves upon the lips of all. After defection of Austria and Turkey, even the blindest must see clearly. We can not expect Austria and Hungary in their present state to reject the same condition imposed by the entente on Bulgaria. The situation is clear. Although the German Army in the west holds its ground against overwhelming forces with great valor, new dangers arise on our hitherto safe flanks. We are conquered and only mendacious demagogues can dare to try to conceal this terrible fact. Three months of war cost us 100,000 dead and many more wounded. Nothing can be gained by such sacrifice. It is surely better to have populations heretofore belonging to the German Empire under foreign sovereignty than under the sod. We have nothing to expect from a further prosecution of the war but an enemy invasion and complete internal collapse. We have no alternative to-day but to acknowledge our defeat and conclude peace with the victors. What we wish is a just peace, but we are unable to enforce such a peace. If adversaries impose humiliating armistice terms and entente socialists and peace friends can not prevent them, the future will be poisoned and the result would be that all those who hoped for gain for mankind from this war would share defeat with Germany. We should have to prepare ourselves for the future in which we could regain our liberty. But there is no sense in continuing the fight now, no matter what the entente does. In all probability publication of the armistice terms will be tantamount to their acceptance, and peace negotiations will soon follow; they will not be broken off but conducted to an issue, come what may. It will depend on the wisdom of the adversaries whether that peace shall be a lasting peace or preface to new and more terrible world catastrophe.

COLLEGE STUDENTS TRAINING CORPS IS FULLY ORGANIZED

The War Department authorizes the following:

Organization of the work of the collegiate section of the Students Army Training Corps, under Brig. Gen. R. I. Rees, scheduled to begin on or after October 1, was hindered by the epidemic of influenza, which delayed some of the inductions, but it is now practically complete and every college unit is functioning. No special difficulties, other than those arising from the epidemic, were encountered. The cooperation of the collegiate authorities has been admirable.

Vocational Section.

In the vocational section the turn-over is approximately 55,000 men each two months. It is a significant fact that among the 89,824 graduates of this section there has been not a single court martial or an important breach of discipline.

The authorized enrollment of men in the collegiate sections is 200,000 of whom 186,400 are in the Army section, 12,000 in the Navy section and 1,500 in the Marine section.

HOSPITALITY IN SOUTHWEST TO THE U. S. ARMY AVIATORS

The War Department authorizes the following:

Cities and towns of the Southwest under the air lanes used by Army flyers are rivaling each other in their hospitality to aviators. They are building landing fields, organizing the inhabitants into reception committees, and raising money for entertainment. One town, which calls itself "The Dynamo of Central Texas," is sending out invitations by cards to flyers. The cards read:

"Upon presentation of this card all courtesies will be offered you, including shower and pool baths at the Y. M. C. A.'s \$87,000 plant, Country Club's \$75,000 plant, Elk's Club's \$47,000 plant. Coffee and sandwiches will be handed out by the Red Cross canteens; hair cut, shave, and shine given free at any barber shop; cold drinks at the soda-water fountains; also local carfare."

INCREASE IN CROSS-COUNTRY FLYING BY AMERICAN AIRMEN

The War Department authorizes the following:

Reports from the Air Service schools in this country show an increased amount of cross-country work by the pilots. Much of the territory covered by these pilots is without suitable landing fields and the emergencies presented at times by forced landings are developing their resourcefulness in more ways than one. In one recent flight of this kind nine planes from Payne Field, West Point, Miss., led by Lieut. Jack W. Heard, started in formation for Birmingham, Ala., 200 miles away.

After reaching Fayette, 140 miles from their destination, the planes were forced to fly solely by compass, the weather having become very thick. All made Birmingham according to schedule, except one plane, piloted by Lieut. Albert O. Spencer, which suffered a break in the gas line when nearly 10,000 feet up and at a time when the pilot had not been able to see the ground for some 45 minutes. Forced to spiral down through several layers of clouds and rain to a level of about 1,000 feet before the ground became visible, he found himself over a town and was obliged to make a forced landing in a vacant lot. This drew a crowd of curious inhabitants and to avoid hitting the more venturesome who ran across his path, he made a sharp turn, colliding with a telegraph pole, damaging a wing. With the aid of two broomsticks and some muslin temporary repairs were made, and the gas lines having been repaired, resumption of the trip was possible.

The lot was hardly large enough for a good take-off, but by squeezing between telegraph poles, the pilot was able to get a run through a cornfield and take the air with barely enough clearance to jump a big warehouse up wind from him.

Almost Lands in Pond.

Assurances from the townspeople had let Lieut. Spencer to believe Birmingham was only a few miles distant, but it had already grown dark before the lights of the city came into view. Again difficulty in finding a landing place was experienced, but having picked out a black spot which appeared to be cleared land, Spencer leveled out for a three-point landing. A few feet off the surface of his black spot he suddenly discovered that particular surface to be water and he was in the middle of a good-sized pond. He "zoomed" just in time to keep his tail planes out of the wet, climbed about 300 feet and began a circle of the city searching for the other ships. He met with no success in this effort and again picked out another spot for a landing. This appeared to be a vacant lot. Again he settled to the street level and flattened out, when to his surprise instead of feeling ground beneath him he kept on settling and finally brought up in an excavation 20 feet below the level of the lot and stopped on the brink of a ditch which was invisible until disclosed by the headlights of an automobile in the street above him.

PLAN ENABLING RAIL SHIPPERS TO KEEP IN SIGHT OF FREIGHT

Director General of Railroads McAdoo authorizes the following:

In order to accommodate as far as possible shippers in keeping in touch with their freight, B. L. Winchell, regional director of the southern region, with the approval of the Railroad Administration, has just been issuing a plan in the southern region, which it is hoped will meet this situation.

A central organization in Atlanta has been established which will maintain records of the interline carloads passing the southern region border line gateways, as well as certain interior junction points.

For instance, if a carload of freight from New York for Memphis is overdue at destination the Memphis merchant to whom the shipment is consigned can call up the freight service bureau at Memphis for information as to the car's whereabouts and communication with the central office of record at Atlanta ordinarily will develop the facts without delay.

The local freight service bureau will be expected to show solicitude as to the transportation necessities of shippers.

NEW GENERAL IMPORT LICENSE COVERING ALL SUGAR SHIPMENTS

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 306) the issuance of a new general import license, to be known as PBF No. 28, which will be effective for shipments made on and after November 9, 1918. This license covers the importation into the United States of all sugar when consigned to the United States Food Administration, Washington, D. C., or 111 Broadway, New York City.

This new general license covers the importation of sugar from all destinations, and this action has been taken to avoid any possible delay that might arise in connection with the shipment of this important commodity from foreign ports.

American consuls have been instructed to certify invoices covering shipments of sugar consigned to the sugar equalization board, care of United States Food Administration, or 111 Broadway, New York City, without official notification of the license numbers and without notification from the importers themselves that a license has been granted.

The provisions of the trading with the enemy act are not affected by this general license, and American consuls will continue to refuse to certify invoices where there appears to be any enemy interest in the shipment.

PARITIES ON COTTON PRICES AS ANNOUNCED BY COMMITTEE

The War Industries Board authorizes the following:

In accordance with the agreement between the representatives of the cotton industry and the price-fixing committee, July 1, 1918, the following parities based on the maximum prices then agreed to have been fixed by the price-fixing committee, to remain in effect until October 1, 1918; which agreement was on September 24 extended to remain in effect until November 16, 1918:

586 Sick and Wounded Landed in U. S. During the Week Ending November 1

The War Department authorizes the following statement from the office of the Surgeon General:

The number of sick and wounded soldiers landed in America from the American Expeditionary Forces during the week ended November 1 was 586. The men were sent to Army hospitals where facilities for their physical reconstruction have been provided.

LARGEST PHOTOGRAPHIC MAP MADE IN U. S. BY AVIATORS

The War Department authorizes the following:

What is said to be the largest photographic map ever made in this country is just being completed of the territory in and around Fort Sill, Okla., by the Photographic Section of the Air Service attached to Post Field. This map shows not only highways, lanes, trees, buildings, railroads, fences, and every landmark, but indicates every elevation and depression in the terrain. With over 4,000 separate prints pasted into one huge mosaic, the finished product covers a space 16 feet long and 6 feet wide, representing a ground area of 310 square miles. The map takes as its center point the town of Lawton, which lies 3 miles south of Post Field, extending from this point east and west 3 and 5 miles, respectively, and from the northern boundary of Fort Sill Reservation, 31 miles south to a point below the town of Walters.

When work was started on this map slightly over a month ago, the territory was plotted out on a ground map, and by figuring the exact area possible to cover with three magazines of plates, allowing for the proper overlaps, zones, or strips of country were established to be covered on every aerial flight. Observers were sent up with assignments to cover specified zones of strips, and as fast as the finished negatives showed that these strips had been covered satisfactorily, the work proceeded to unfinished zones. Three planes went up daily at the start, and negatives were produced with great rapidity. A summary of the negatives made shows over 4,200 separate exposures, but the number of prints, allowing for overlapping, spoilage, etc., will of course exceed this number. Figuring three magazines, or 72 exposures on each flight, approximately 60 trips averaging an hour and a half per trip have been necessary to produce the map—or total flying time of some 90 hours.

WILL CONVERT FIVE BUILDINGS TO ARMY HOSPITAL PURPOSES

The War Department authorizes the following:

Authorization has been given to the Construction Division of the Army to take over and proceed with the work of altering five buildings and institutions for hospital purposes. The cost of these alterations will approximate \$685,000. When finished they will provide beds for 4,650 wounded soldiers.

Almshouse to Be Converted.

The work consists of altering the Westchester County Almshouse, at Westchester, N. Y., the construction of roads, increase of the water supply, sewage, and lighting, new quarters for nurses, new wards, and alterations to existing buildings. The cost is expected to be \$235,000. Beds will be provided for 1,350.

The buildings at Exposition Park property, Rochester, N. Y., are to be modified, and in addition to hospital wards quarters for nurses are to be provided. These buildings, when ready, will accommodate 1,000 beds and will cost \$175,000.

Another of the projects is to alter the Commonwealth Armory, Boston, Mass., and make it suitable for a hospital containing 1,000 beds. This will cost \$40,000.

To Remodel Hotel In Indiana.

The West Baden Hotel, West Baden, Ind., will be made suitable for a 1,200-bed hospital. It will cost \$125,000.

Changes will be made in the Henry Ford Hospital to make it suitable for Army needs. When these are done the Army will have a 2,000-bed hospital. The estimated cost is \$80,000.
