## ORDER REGARDING RELEASE FROM NAVY SERVICE ISSUED TO ALL SHIPS AND STATIONS

### AFFECTS RESERVES AND REGULARS

*Desire of Department is to Discharge  
at Earliest Practicable Time All  
Those Making Formal Applica-  
tion, Stated by Secretary Daniels.*

Secretary Daniels has issued to all ships and stations of the Navy the following order regarding release from active service:

"1. It is the Department's desire to release from active service at the earliest practicable time those members of the Naval Reserve Force and those of the Regular Service who enlisted for the duration of the war who wish to complete their education or who have urgent family and business interests demanding immediate and personal attention. No definite time can be set for the release of such men, but it will be done as soon as the exigencies of the service permit.

#### Formal Request in Writing.

"2. Those desiring to be released under the above conditions must, in every instance, submit formal request in writing through official channels, stating in full their reasons. Commanding officers and commandants will indorse these requests as to whether or not the services of the individual can be spared without relief, and if so, whether his or her services are needed in some other station within the command.

#### Through Bureau of Navigation.

"3. Requests will then be forwarded to the Bureau of Navigation, which will give them careful consideration and, as soon as circumstances permit, authorize the discharge of those in the Regular Navy who enlisted only for the war and the return to an inactive status of those of the Naval Reserve Force.

"JOSEPHUS DANIELS."

The Secretary said that the above applies to officers in the Naval Reserve Force as well as enlisted men.

## Salmon Worth \$7,000,000 Bought by Government

More than \$7,000,000 worth of salmon has just been purchased by the Army Subsistence Division. Pending determination of fair prices to be paid, the Government has advanced \$7.75 per case for red salmon and \$6 per case for pink salmon. Final prices to be paid will be based upon costs of the respective packers as determined by the Federal Trade Commission.

## President Going to France

The following announcement has been made at the White House:

The President expects to sail for France immediately after the opening of the regular session of Congress, for the purpose of taking part in the discussion and settlement of the main features of the treaty of peace. It is not likely that it will be possible for him to remain throughout the sessions of the formal Peace Conference, but his presence at the outset is necessary in order to obviate the manifest disadvantages of discussion by cable in determining the greater outlines of the final treaty, about which he must necessarily be consulted. He will, of course, be accompanied by delegates who will sit as the representatives of the United States throughout the conference. The names of the delegates will be presently announced.

## FOOD ADMINISTRATION RULES NOT ANNULLED BY ARMISTICE

Statement Issued to Correct the  
Misunderstandings Arising  
Among Licensees.

The United States Food Administration makes public this announcement:

A misunderstanding has arisen among licensees with regard to the effect of the armistice upon the regulations of the Food Administration.

The regulations are not annulled by the armistice. Modifications may be made by the Food Administration from time to time, but the specific regulations limiting margins of profit and preventing hoarding have not been removed and there is no present intention of dropping these restrictions, which will be rigidly enforced.

## POSTAL-CENSORSHIP REVOKED ON PRESS COMMUNICATIONS

The Censorship Board authorizes the following:

With the abolition of the voluntary press censorship which has been observed by the press of this country under the guidance of the Committee on Public Information, during the war, the Censorship Board has similarly ordered the discontinuance of postal censorship of press communications.

It is no longer necessary, therefore, to require correspondents abroad to route through the Postal Press Censorship, at 20 Broad Street, New York City, or the Postal Press Censorship, Postal Telegraph Building, San Francisco, for censorship, such press material as they have been sending for publication in this country. Such matter may now be forwarded in regular course.

## FUEL ADMINISTRATION WORK TO CONTINUE WHERE NEEDED

Reports of Wholesale Dissolution  
of Bureaus Are Said to Be  
Without Foundation.

The United States Fuel Administration, which will be terminated automatically upon proclamation of peace, will pursue its course with that end in view, relinquishing its various activities as they become unnecessary under armistice conditions, and continuing to function where its services still are required, it was announced to-day in response to inquiries.

#### Certain Reports Denied.

Reports of immediate and wholesale dissolution were said to be without foundation. Various subdivisions already are in process of winding up their duties. The mine track committee and some other sections, including several from the oil division, have been released at their request from further service, because the work which they undertook to do has been done.

Whatever machinery is necessary to the continuation of the full discharge of the duties of the administration will be retained until these duties are discharged or until the administration is relieved of them, and continuation of the larger activities of the administration through the winter was said to be the present prospect. The vigorous and careful supervision of anthracite coal was cited as an instance of the kind of work which still must be done.

The proper administration of the zoning system, under which millions of car-miles of haulage were saved and the supply of coal was correspondingly increased, was mentioned as another of the sort of duties which the administration can not abandon forthwith and which it will carry forward.

## LUMBER ORDERS FOR RAILROADS ARE GIVEN PRIORITY RATING OVER THOSE FOR ANY OTHER CLASS

### AUTOMATIC RATINGS CANCELED

#### *War Industries Board Action Taken to Permit Construction Work Delayed by War—Statement by Priorities Commissioner Parker.*

B. M. Batuch, chairman of the War Industries Board, authorizes the following:

The War Industries Board, through Judge Edwin B. Parker, Priorities Commissioner, has issued a rule giving to lumber orders for the railroads a priority rating higher than that accorded any other class of orders. This action is taken to permit construction delayed by the war.

Lumber priorities for the War Department are canceled by the new order while lumber priorities for the Navy, Shipping Board Emergency Fleet Corporation, the Housing Corporation, and the Labor Department's Bureau of Industrial Housing and Transportation are all accorded an equal priority—an automatic rating of Class A-5.

#### Text of the Order.

Following is the order which is addressed to lumber manufacturers:

The "Rules governing priorities in production and delivery of lumber" appearing on pages 6 to 8, inclusive, of Circular No. 54 issued by the Priorities Division under date of October 25, 1918 (Government print), are hereby amended as follows:

1. Paragraph numbered 1 of said rules is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"All orders placed after clearance through the lumber section of the War Industries Board (a) by or for the Navy Department or some one of the divisions or bureaus thereof, or (b) by or for a contractor or agent of said department or some one of the divisions and bureaus thereof, or (c) by or for the United States Shipping Board Emergency Fleet Corporation, or (d) by or for builders of ships or other water craft under direct contracts with said fleet corporation, or (e) by or for the Bureau of Industrial Housing and Transportation of the United States Department of Labor or the United States Housing Corporation, shall have and be accorded by the mills receiving or holding the same an equal priority to wit: An automatic rating of Class A-5, unless a different specific rating shall have been given to one or more of said orders as hereinafter in paragraph 6 provided."

11. Paragraph numbered 3 of said rules is hereby repealed and there is substituted therefor the following paragraph:

"3. All orders heretofore or hereafter placed by any railroad company in the United States (except private railroads not operated as common carriers) shall have to be accorded by the mills receiving or holding the same an automatic rating of Class A-3. All of said orders shall take the rating herein named without the necessity either of an indorsement or affidavit by the officer or party placing

## ORDERS CONCERNING DISCHARGE OF CADETS AT FLYING SCHOOLS

### All to Be Given Choice of Leaving Without Commissions or of Completing Training.

The War Department authorizes the following:

The following instructions were sent by wire from the office of Maj. Gen. Kenly to all fields, camps, barracks, depots, etc., in the Division of Military Aeronautics:

"All cadets now in training at Air Service flying and ground schools will be given option of immediate discharge without commission or completing their training. Those who continue will, upon completion of training, both primary and advanced, be immediately discharged and sent to their homes, but will receive in due course commissions as second lieutenants in the Officers' Reserve Corps. Any cadet now in training who was transferred from the Students' Army Training Corps may be retransferred to the Students' Army Training Corps, if he so requests, provided he returns to college immediately. No further commissions will be issued at fields and no cadet will be continued upon active duty after he has completed his entire training.

"Every nonflying officer should be given an opportunity to complete his flying training whether class 1 or 2.

"If any officers desire separation from the service and if their services can be spared, forward their names to this office for proper consideration."

In addition, orders have been issued for the closing of the flying fields at (Selfridge) Mount Clemens, Mich., (Chanute) Rantoul and (Scott) Belleville, Ill. Orders have also been issued for the abandonment of the Air Service Mechanics' School at St. Paul. Candidates for commissions at balloon schools will be discharged and commissioned in the Officers' Reserve Corps as rapidly as they complete their course of instruction.

#### Statement by Judge Parker.

Explaining the order, Judge Parker says:

"It will be observed that the effect of the above amendments is (a) to cancel all automatic ratings on orders placed by or for the War Department or any one of the divisions or bureaus thereof, or by or for a contractor or agent of said department or any one of the divisions and bureaus thereof (including orders for military cars); and (b) to give to all railroad orders heretofore placed and now unfiled in whole or in part, or hereafter placed, whether through the lumber section of the War Industries Board or otherwise, and whether or not the railroad is under the jurisdiction of the United States Railroad Administration, a priority rating higher than the rating accorded to any other class of orders."

## WORK IS ORDERED RESUMED ON U. S. PUBLIC BUILDINGS

### Secretary McAdoo Instructs Supervising Architect to Invite Bids from Contractors.

The Secretary of the Treasury to-day authorized the following announcement:

In December last, owing to the pressure of war conditions and the consequent necessity of concentrating the industrial power of the Nation on the manufacture of war material, I deemed it essential to direct the Supervising Architect of the Treasury Department to discontinue all construction work on public buildings except such as was absolutely necessary and to refrain from inviting bids for new work.

#### Instructed to Invite Bids.

The changed conditions brought about by the conclusion of the armistice and the manifest inability of Germany to renew the conflict, emphasizes the importance of resuming, with as little delay as possible, the normal industrial activities of peace. Construction work, which has been delayed because of the necessities of war, should now be resumed, and I have, therefore, instructed the Supervising Architect to invite bids for the construction of new buildings and extensions authorized by the Congress.

Among the first moves of the Treasury Department, in pursuance of the new policy of the resumption of building operations, will be to take up, with the commission appointed by the Congress for that purpose, the question of constructing an archives building in Washington. The necessity for such a building has been greatly increased by reason of the need of adequately safeguarding the large mass of valuable records and documents relating to the war.

#### War to Peace Basis.

The resumption of construction work by the Government will contribute toward facilitating the industrial transition of the country from war to a peace basis, and should serve to encourage others to undertake without delay the fulfillment of the many and varied industrial peace needs of the country.

#### CORRECTIONS IN DIRECTORY.

## EMPLOYMENT SERVICE PLANS TO PROVIDE JOBS FOR WORKERS RELEASED FROM WAR PLANTS

### CONSULTED ABOUT U. S. CONTRACTS

*War Department and Industries Board Cooperating With the Service and Employers—Places Already Found for Thousands.*

The Department of Labor announces the following:

To enable the United States Employment Service to find other employment for munitions and other civilian war workers as they are released the service will be consulted by the War Department and War Industries Board before any action is taken on war contracts.

By arrangement now effective the War Department, through the external relations branch of the Division of Purchase, Storage, and Traffic of the General Staff for suspension, curtailment, or extension of contracts will hereafter submit its proposals to a representative of the United States Employment Service and a representative of the facilities division of the War Industries Board. The chiefs of the commodities sections of the War Industries Board will be taken into consultation in the draft of proposals covering commodities, through the respective sections concerned.

#### Facilities of the Service Shown.

The facilities of the United States Employment Service for replacing large bodies of men released from war work have been indicated during the past 6 days when thousands of men from curtailed war operations were found new jobs and taken to them. The service is now engaged in rapidly expanding its system of clearance in order to meet the readjustment task laid upon it.

In Ohio, 11,000 men released from nitrate plants at Toledo and Cincinnati, and 1,700 released from an airplane plant at Dayton not only were found new employment, but were distributed by the Employment Service from the gates of their former plants. Six thousand workers from Camp Jackson, at Columbia, S. C., were immediately upon release sent to new work and a large number of cantonment workers from Camp Polk, Raleigh, N. C., similarly were replaced.

#### Employers Asked to Give Notice.

An appeal to subcontractors on war work and peace work employers to immediately notify the United States Employment Service of coming labor releases or needs was issued to-day by Nathan A. Smyth, associate director general of the Employment Service. The appeal reads:

"The arrangement with the War Department and the War Industries Board enables the United States Employment Service to know in advance of and to prepare for releases of men by war industries holding direct contracts.

"Subcontractors are urged to notify the Employment Service of coming releases as far in advance as possible, in

## MAXIMUM PRICES ANNOUNCED FOR SAND, STONE, AND GRAVEL

The Price-Fixing Committee of the War Industries Board authorizes the following:

At a meeting of the Price-Fixing Committee held on Thursday, October 31, the following maximum prices were fixed to cover purchases, whether by the Government or otherwise, and to be effective for the period ending February 28, 1919, for the Norfolk district, i. e., the State of Virginia, south of and including Petersburg, and the States of North Carolina and South Carolina:

For deliveries in full barge lots f. o. b. point of origin or f. o. b. cars plant, per ton of 2,000 pounds net: Sand, \$0.50 per ton; gravel, \$0.95 per ton; crushed stone, \$1.30 per ton; crushed granite, \$1.75 per ton—not including railroad ballast or screenings.

The Price-Fixing Committee of the War Industries Board authorizes the following:

Upon the request of the industry, the Price-Fixing Committee has agreed that the existing maximum prices upon Pennsylvania hemlock should be continued provisionally for 30 days, which means that these prices shall be continued until December 20, 1918, unless it is deemed expedient to remove restrictions before that date.

"It is particularly necessary that the United States Employment Service be advised of all openings for workers, and nonwar manufacturers who in their present and future operations need labor are requested to get into touch with the service.

"Only through having advance information of the easing off of war industrial operations can the Employment Service adequately devote its facilities toward relocation of war workers.

"Extensive transfers made during the past few days, which might well be considered the most dangerous period, give promise that the service can handle the situation, provided that all employers, whether large or small, keep it informed, and it is their patriotic duty to do so."

## COAST PATROL SHIP WRECKED OFF TEXAS; TWO MEN MISSING

The Navy Department is informed that coast patrol No. 1092 was wrecked about 7 o'clock Friday evening on the jetty at the mouth of the Brazos River, near Freeport, Tex. The Coast Guard rescued all of the members of the crew except two, who are still missing, though the search for them continues. It is expected the vessel will be salvaged and repaired.

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## American Communiques

### American Official Communique No. 201.

HEADQUARTERS, AMERICAN  
EXPEDITIONARY FORCES,  
November 17, 1918.  
MORNING.

This morning the Third American Army under the command of Maj. Gen. Dickman began its march into the territory evacuated by the enemy in accordance with the terms of the armistice. At nightfall advance elements had reached the line Ecouvieuz-Sorbecy-Nouraincourt-Marslatour.

### American Official Communique No. 202.

November 18, 1918.

The Third Army continued its advance to-day into the territory evacuated by the enemy.

On the left, crossing the Belgian frontier, our troops occupied Virton and by evening had reached Etalle and St. Leger. Between the Chiers and the Moselle they passed through Spincourt and the important railroad centers of Longuyon and Conflans. At the close of the day they entered the historic French fortress of Longwy, situated at the junction of the boundaries of France, Belgium, and Luxemburg. Farther south they have occupied Audun-Le-Roman and the town of Briey, the center of the great iron district of Lorraine.

### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

The Machinery and Engineering Materials Division of the Purchase, Storage, and Traffic Division of the Army General Staff has issued the following notice to contractors:

"In consideration of the military situation, and of the fact that the armistice has been signed, it is requested that you disregard Circular Proposal No. 1501 from this division.

"If further action be required in the future on any of the material covered by this proposal, your company will be borne in mind."

Notices similar to the foregoing have also been issued with respect to circular proposals No. 1502, No. 1503, No. 1504, No. 1505, No. 1508, and No. 1509.

## Our Industrial and Financial Outlook As Reviewed by Comptroller Williams

John Skelton Williams, Comptroller of the Currency and Director of the Division of Finance and Purchases of the United States Railroad Administration, makes the following statement concerning our industrial and financial outlook:

Four years ago, in September, 1914, at the beginning of the war, speaking with my knowledge of the resources and strength of our country and of the men in charge of them, I told a bankers' convention at Indianapolis that at the end of the war the United States would be "the gathering place for the renewal and distribution of hope and purpose, for the restoration and purification of a civilization drowned in blood and wrecked and dismantled by furious and reckless passion," and I expressed my conviction that "with the power gathered of peace, the resources derived of honest industry, and the will born of our own self-searching we will lead the world, and will be its dominating influence," and that this wonderful power and influence would be used by us to bless and brighten, to lift, and comfort all humanity.

### Common Sense Required.

That was no gift of prophecy. It was simply the application of business common sense to known facts. Now, looking forward, there is no excuse for fear or pessimism and no reason for wild extravagance or frantic optimism. We have money, enormous resources, men, and brains. We will need all for the task before us—the most enormous tasks that ever tested a nation.

As we mobilized our young manhood for fighting, we have to mobilize all the wisdom, virility, conservatism, courage, and wealth we can command to adjust ourselves to the new responsibilities and duties put upon us, to cooperate with our associated democracies and allies in giving peace, freedom, and happiness to the world. We have a vast load to carry. We have vast strength with which to carry it. Our part is to give our back to the burden, patiently, soberly, steadily, in the fear of God, and with broad conception of our privilege and opportunity.

### Skillful Guidance Required.

The time has arrived when these powers and opportunities will be exercised in the fullest measure. It will require skillful guidance and careful steering to turn the tremendous energies of the people which, for so many months past, have been dedicated to the production of engines of destruction into the implements of construction—to convert our swords into plowshares and our spears into pruning hooks, and shrapnel shells into locomotives and farm tractors. But the best thought of the Nation is now bent on these great problems, and that they will be solved so as to prevent panic or industrial demoralization we may be assured.

There has been much inflation of certain kinds which is incident to all wars, and there have been many inequalities in different directions. There has been a great scarcity of labor of every sort, and wages have been thrown out of proportion to living costs in many cases.

The firm hold which the Government found it necessary to take to prevent runaway markets for the necessities of life and for the raw materials needed in industry may now be exercised in a conservative and healthy way to establish a reasonable equilibrium and to prevent destructive and sudden movements, which sometimes in the past have precipitated panics. There is no reason why this country need fear such commercial revolutions or financial crises as those through which we have passed in the earlier years of our history.

The agricultural, mining, and industrial activities of this country are enjoying generally phenomenal prosperity, and from a financial standpoint our banks are to-day stronger and better able to cope with any situation which may arise than they have ever been in the past.

We have raised in the past 18 months nearly \$18,000,000,000 from the sale of Liberty bonds, and yet the deposits of our national banks to-day are several billion dollars more than they were before we attempted to place the first Liberty loan. As an evidence of the improved management and strengthened position of the national banks of the country it is doubly gratifying to point to the fact that during this calendar year of 1918, in which the strain upon our banking resources has been greater than at any time during our past history, there has been only one national bank suspension in our entire country. There has been no such record as this for nearly 40 years past. This immunity from failure is the more gratifying when we consider the extraordinary stress of these difficult times through which we have been passing with the whole world aflame.

### No Longer a Debtor Nation.

We are no longer a debtor Nation. Our Government is now lending to the allied nations nearly \$8,000,000,000, while our loans and investments in Central and South American countries also amount to hundreds of millions of dollars, which also go to swell our credit balance with the world.

The industrial capacity of this country as a producing Nation has increased enormously since the outbreak of the war. But the entire energy of the country, not absolutely required for the production of food and clothing, has been mainly engaged in the making of munitions and implements of war and terrific engines of destruction. Hereafter, these energies will be dedicated to the work of upbuilding and regeneration.

In the coming world adjustments, the fruits of the earth, of industry, and of commerce must be divided between capital and labor on the basis of equity and justice, and this will increase unspeakably the comfort and health and welfare of our people and of all peoples. This task is a stupendous one, but one which the American people are fully capable of solving; and I do not doubt that the manhood and courage and resourcefulness which have characterized our people in war will enable them to settle the tremendous problems of peace without real danger or interference from the bolshevik or the anarchist.

## PROCEEDINGS OF THE CONGRESS BRIEFLY TOLD

### SENATE.

The Senate Finance Committee yesterday advised party leaders that in view of the fact that the war revenue bill will have to be carefully considered and in some of its features largely rewritten as a result of the recommendations of Secretary McAdoo that the total estimated revenues be reduced to \$6,000,000,000, it will be impossible to report the measure before the 1st of December. Party leaders in both houses immediately discussed the wisdom of adjourning this session of Congress this week. Republicans were consulted and agreed to the proposal. Both houses adjourned until Thursday, upon which day a joint resolution will be adopted formally adjourning the present session of Congress sine die. The next next session will convene on Monday, December 2.

The conference report on the emergency agricultural appropriation bill was adopted yesterday after having been deadlocked for many weeks. This is the bill that carries the war-time Nation-wide prohibition amendment. The agreement was brought about through the Senate receding from its rent-antiprofitteering amendment. The bill will be signed by the presiding officers of the two Houses on Thursday and sent to the President for his approval.

#### Bills and Resolutions.

A number of measures were introduced yesterday afternoon some of which have a bearing upon the coming reconstruction period. Senator Gore introduced a resolution creating a committee on retrenchment and economy to consist of the chairmen of the Committees on Appropriation, Military Affairs, Naval Affairs, Agriculture, and Finance, and two other members of each of the committees named. Senator Smith, of Georgia, introduced a resolution directing the War Trade Board to inform the Senate "to what extent the export of cotton is still being restricted" and the reasons for such restrictions and how soon they will be removed. Senator Lodge submitted a resolution declaring that the Senate favors the creation of a strong, independent Polish State with free access to the sea. It was the subject of a brief and spirited discussion and was referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations. Senator Cummins, Republican, of Iowa, introduced a resolution providing that every honorably discharged soldier or sailor shall be permitted to keep the uniform he wears at the time of demobilization. Senator Pittman, of Nevada, Democrat, proposed in a resolution that the President be authorized to have struck a bronze medal commemorating the winning of the world's war and the valor of our military forces, and to present such medal to every officer, soldier, and seaman engaged in the service of the Government at any time during the war, as a memento of the glorious achievement and as an expression of gratitude on behalf of our Government and of all the people of the United States. Senator Lodge, of Massachusetts, introduced a bill providing that dealers in goods manufactured in Germany or Austria-Hungary would be required to display on a sign

over all entrances to their places of business the words "Dealer in German goods," and to use these words prominently in all published advertisements.

#### Nominations.

Among the nominations sent to the Senate yesterday were those of John W. Davis, to be ambassador to Great Britain; Alexander C. King, of Atlanta, to be Solicitor General to succeed Mr. Davis; and Capt. Albert P. Niblack, to be a rear admiral in the Navy. The Senate yesterday afternoon confirmed the nomination of Charles F. Clyne to be United States attorney for the northern district of Illinois.

George H. Moses, of New Hampshire, was sworn in yesterday afternoon to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Senator Gallinger.

A favorable report was made yesterday by the Judiciary Committee on the bill to prohibit "cost plus" contracts for Government work.

A resolution introduced by Senator Norris intended to curtail the power of chairmen of leading committees by denying them seats on other important committees was referred to the Committee on Rules. A bill was passed abolishing the Federal land office at Springfield, Mo., because of lack of business. The registrar of the land office resigned some time ago.

In a communication from the Civil Service Commission the recommendation was made to Congress that all field positions in the Departments of the Treasury, Justice, Agriculture, Post Office, Interior, and Commerce should be filled through the civil service instead of by Executive appointment.

### HOUSE.

Bills and resolutions were introduced in the House as follows: By Mr. Scott, Republican, of Michigan, a bill providing that on all railroads operated by the Government, soldiers, sailors, and marines shall be given free transportation; by Mr. Steenerson, Republican, of Minnesota, a resolution under which provision would be made to provide returning soldiers and sailors with the cost of meals and sleeping-car accommodations in addition to their railroad fare; by Mr. Heflin, Democrat, of Alabama, a resolution to make November 11, the date of the signing of the armistice, a national holiday, to be designated as "Wilson day"; by Mr. Maher, of New York, making November 11 a national holiday, to be known as "Liberty day."

## COTTON FABRIC PRICE CHANGE CONCERNING GINGHAM TRADE

The Price-Fixing Committee of the War Industries Board authorizes the following:

#### COTTON FABRICS.

1. The agreement between the representatives of the cotton industry and the Price-Fixing Committee dated July 1, 1918, and recently extended to remain in effect until January 1, as the basis of maximum prices that can be asked, has been amended in respect to gingham as follows:

2. Stipulation in schedule authorized in August, 1918, to the effect that sales in gingham shall be made only for delivery prior to April 1, 1919, is canceled.

3. Sales of this commodity as well as of any other cotton commodity may be made for any delivery period agreed on between buyer and seller at prices under no circumstances in advance of the published schedule.

## CHANGE IN THE PROCEDURE FOR U. S. EXPORTS TO MEXICO

In view of the increasing scarcity of many commodities of prime importance and necessity to the United States, and which at the same time this Government desires to share with Mexico, it has become necessary for the War Trade Board to allot such commodities for export to Mexico, in order to equalize the distribution throughout the neighboring Republic in an equitable and orderly manner consistent with the maximum amount of such commodities as can be spared, as announced in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 320).

### Copies of Order.

Prospective importers in Mexico will facilitate the granting of licenses for export by the War Trade Board by presenting copies of their orders for supplies in triplicate to the nearest American consular officer, who will vise such orders and retain one copy for his file, returning the original and one copy to the applicant. The importer should forward both vised orders to the prospective exporter in the United States, with instructions to attach the original vised order to his application to the War Trade Board for an export license covering the commodity specified in such order, or file the original vised order with the War Trade Board at Washington, D. C., and thereafter, in filing applications for licenses to export the commodities specified on such order, refer to the order by the consulate stamp serial number, which will be affixed to the order, and also the consular address, as "Mazatlan, Serial No. 4782."

### Attached to Order.

In cases where American consular officers are not easily accessible to the prospective importer, a statement to that effect should be attached to the order, giving the name of the nearest place where a consular officer is stationed.

## QUITS FUEL ADMINISTRATION.

Mr. White Resigns as Joint Director of the Bureau of Labor.

United States Fuel Administrator Harry A. Garfield announces his acceptance of the resignation of John P. White from the formal position of joint director of the Bureau of Labor of the United States Fuel Administration. Mr. White will still be available for consultation, but was relieved of official connection at his request because of the necessities of his personal affairs. He was president of the United Mine Workers of America, resigning this position to take that of labor adviser to the Fuel Administrator. The resignation is effective November 30.

In his letter to Mr. Garfield Mr. White pointed out that but few labor disputes remain to be adjusted.

"I believe I voice the sentiment of the officials of the miners' union when I state they desire to continue their affiliation with the Fuel Administration and cooperate with it to the fullest extent until peace is promulgated," he wrote.

In his acceptance, Mr. Garfield pronounced Mr. White's services "of inestimable value."

## ALL EXPORT LICENSES VALID UNTIL USED UNLESS REVOKED

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 328) that, except as hereinafter set forth, all export licenses issued on or after November 15, 1918, and all export licenses which were unexpired on the 15th day of November, 1918, will be valid until used, unless revoked, notwithstanding such licenses are stamped as expiring on November 15, 1918, or subsequently thereto.

Collectors of customs and the Post Office Department have been advised accordingly, and therefore they will accept licenses (excepting those hereinafter set forth) when the expiration date is specified on the license as November 15, 1918, or later.

The foregoing rule does not apply to licenses for the exportation of any commodity to Norway, Sweden, Denmark proper, European Holland, Iceland, Faroe Islands, Switzerland, or Greece; and collectors of customs and the Post Office Department will not accept licenses for the exportation of any commodity to such countries except in accordance with the regulations with respect to the expiration date of export licenses. (W. T. B. R. No. 241, issued Sept. 27, 1918.)

## MARRIED WOMEN IN CLASSIFIED POSITIONS IN POSTAL SERVICE

Section 157, Postal Laws and Regulations of 1913, as amended by Order No. 7676, of November 19, 1913, is further amended to read as follows:

SEC. 157. No married woman will be appointed to a classified position in the postal service, nor will any woman occupying a classified position in the postal service be reappointed to such position when she shall marry, unless her husband is in the military or naval service of the United States, or she shall have a son in such service; provided that these prohibitions shall not affect the appointment or reappointment of postmasters at fourth-class offices.

2. Whenever any woman employed in the postal service marries, she shall, if retained in the service, take the oath of office anew.

# PRESIDENT'S PROCLAMATION TAKING TITLE TO LANDS FOR ORDNANCE PROVING GROUNDS ON POTOMAC RIVER BELOW WASHINGTON

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF  
AMERICA.

### A PROCLAMATION.

Whereas the act of Congress approved April 26, 1918 (Public No. 140—65th Congress), to authorize the Secretary of the Navy to increase the facilities for the proof and test of ordnance material and for other purposes, provides as follows:

"That the Secretary of the Navy is hereby authorized to expend the sum of \$1,000,000, or any part thereof, in his discretion, for the purpose of increasing the facilities for the proof and test of ordnance material, including necessary buildings, construction, equipment, railroad, and water facilities, land, and damages and losses to persons, firms, and corporations resulting from the procurement of the land for this purpose, and also all necessary expenses incident to the procurement of said land: *Provided*, That if such lands and appurtenances and improvements attached thereto, can not be procured by purchase within one month after the passage of this act, the President is hereby authorized and empowered to take over for the United States the immediate possession and title of such lands and improvements, including all easements, rights of way, riparian, and other rights appurtenant thereto, or any land selected by him to be used for the carrying out of the purposes of this act. That if said land and appurtenances and improvements shall be taken over as aforesaid, the United States shall make just compensation therefor, to be determined by the President, and if the amount thereof so determined by the President is unsatisfactory to the person entitled to receive the same, such person shall be paid seventy-five per centum of the amount so determined by the President and shall be entitled to sue the United States to recover such further sum, as added to the said seventy-five per centum, will make up such amount as will be just compensation therefor, in the manner provided for by section twenty-four, paragraph twenty, and section one hundred and forty-five of the Judicial Code. Upon the taking over of said property by the President as aforesaid, the title to all such property so taken over shall immediately vest in the United States. For the purposes of this act there is hereby appropriated, out of any money in the Treasury of the United States not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$1,000,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary: *Provided*, That no railroad shall be built in the District of Columbia under this act until Congress has approved the point from which such road may start and also the route to be followed in the District of Columbia."

And whereas, by proclamation dated June 10, 1918 (No. 1458), issued in accordance with the provisions of the act aforesaid, title to and possession of certain lands in the County of King George, State of Virginia, and in the County of Charles, State of Maryland, was taken by the United States for the purposes recited in the act aforesaid; and

Whereas it is a military necessity for the United States to take title to and possession of certain additional land in the County of King George, State of Virginia, adjoining the land embraced in the proclamation of June 10, 1918, together with all easements, rights of way, riparian and other rights and privileges appurtenant or appertaining thereto, and to begin without delay the development of said additional land for the uses and purposes aforesaid.

Now, therefore, know all men by these presents that I, Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States of America, by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by said act of Congress approved April 26, 1918, do hereby on behalf of the United States take title to and possession of the following described tract of land, being

All that certain tract of land situate in the County of King George, State of Virginia, on Mathias Point Neck, on the Potomac River, beginning for the same at the point of intersection of the center line of Gambo, otherwise known as Gumbo Creek, with the line of the low-water mark of the Potomac River; thence in a general northwesterly direction following the center line of said Gambo Creek to its point of intersection with the property line between the land of James H. Arnold and A. B. Hooe, a distance of thirteen thou-

sand two hundred feet (13,200') more or less; thence in a general easterly direction following the boundary line between the land of the said Arnold and the land of the said Hooe to its point of intersection with the low-water line of the Potomac River, a distance of four thousand eight hundred and thirty feet (4,830'), more or less; thence in a general southerly direction following the low-water line of the Potomac River to the point of beginning. Containing in all three hundred and seventy-two (372) acres, more or less. Together with marshes and flats and all improvements, easements, rights of way, riparian and all other rights and privileges appurtenant or appertaining in any manner to said above-described tract of land, including also all privately owned rights in the underwater lands of the Potomac River lying in front of the said above-described tract of land, which said tract of land is shown on a certain blue-print on file in the office of the solicitor, Department of the Navy, which blue print bears the legend, "U. S. Naval Auxiliary Proving Ground, Mathias Point, Va. Property map compiled under the direction of Lieut. Commander S. A. Clement, J. W. Russell, Sur., C. E. Isbell, Del., Mar. 28, 1918, submitted. S. A. Clement, Lieut. Commander, U. S. Navy, Assistant Inspector in Charge, Auxiliary Proving Ground. Approved, H. E. Lackey, Commander, U. S. Navy, Inspector of Ordnance in charge.

The said above-described tract of land, together with all the aforesaid rights and privileges appurtenant or appertaining thereto is hereby declared to be and the same is set aside for the naval purposes aforesaid, and is placed under the exclusive control of the Secretary of the Navy, who is authorized and directed to take immediate possession thereof in accordance with the terms of the act aforesaid, on behalf of the United States of America.

The Secretary of the Navy is further authorized and directed to take such steps as may, in his judgment, be necessary for the purpose of conducting negotiations with the owners of property or rights whatsoever therein within the said tract of land, for the purpose of ascertaining the just compensation to which said owners are entitled in order that the compensation therefor may be made in accordance with the provisions of the act aforesaid. All owners of land and improvements, title and possession of which are hereby taken in accordance with the terms of the act aforesaid and all persons having claims or liens in respect thereto are hereby notified to appear before the board to be appointed by the Secretary of the Navy and present their claims for compensation for consideration by the said board in accordance with the provisions of the act aforesaid.

All persons residing within said above-described parcel of land or owning movable property situate thereon are hereby notified to vacate the said tract of land and to remove therefrom all movable property within thirty days from the date of this proclamation.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

War farms and gardens which have been operated at camps and cantonments throughout the country under the direction of the farms branch of the salvage division have proven successful financially as well as in providing soldiers with fresh vegetables. The net profit of the farm at Camp Grant, Ill., on its first year's operations approximates \$10,000.

## Secretary Houston Writes to Senate Explaining His Inability to Furnish Reliable Data on Farm Growing Cost

In response to Senate Resolution No. 310, asking for information regarding the cost of producing wheat and other farm products, Secretary Houston has sent the following letter to the President of the Senate:

NOVEMBER 7, 1918.

The honorable the PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE.

SIR: I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of Senate Resolution 310, instructing the Secretary of Agriculture to furnish the Senate with information in the Department of Agriculture showing the cost of producing wheat and other farm products. I regret that I can not send to the Senate dependable information on this subject.

Certain studies of the cost of producing a number of farm products have been made by the Office of Farm Management. About a year ago the results of one of the studies were brought to my attention. After an examination of them, and in view of criticisms by competent experts of similar studies, I indicated to Dr. Spillman, who was chief of the Office of Farm Management until September 1, that I questioned the validity of the methods pursued in the studies and was of the opinion that the exposition and interpretation of the data were not adequate. I indicated to him my desire that careful consideration be given the whole matter, and that a system of inquiry and interpretation be devised which would be regarded by competent students of farm economics as sound and which would furnish results reasonably reliable and creditable to the department. Notwithstanding my directions, the inquiry proceeded according to former methods, and a number of weeks ago some of the results were embodied in several manuscripts. These were not brought to my attention until after some publicity was given them.

### Asked Opinion of Competent Experts.

I gave the studies in question very careful consideration. I asked competent experts, including students of grain farming in the department and on the outside, to give me their opinion of them. I was convinced, as they are, that the studies are unsatisfactory in method and faulty in exposition and interpretation, and that the conclusions drawn have no validity. The studies have never been formally approved by the department. I assume that these studies, especially those on the cost of producing wheat, which the former chief of the office, without consulting me and without my knowledge, submitted to the Senate Committee on Agriculture, are the ones contemplated in the resolution.

Not content with my own examination of these studies and my conclusions concerning them I submitted them separately to three well qualified students of farm economics and requested their opinions. Their reports were adverse. I then referred the reports on the cost of producing wheat to a committee consisting of an economist from one of our agricultural colleges, one from the Bureau of Markets, a statistical economist from the Bureau

of Crop Estimates, and a member of the staff of the Office of Farm Management. This committee reported that these documents were not analytical studies of the problem and that they might be considered merely as opinions. Later, the author of the manuscripts in question asked for permission to withdraw them, stating that the data were not sufficient to entitle the documents to be regarded as analytical studies in any sense, that he could not defend them on any substantial ground, that they were based rather on personal observation of local conditions and notes taken on farmers' experience, and that they should not be given publicity. He further stated that the inquiry was hurriedly made; that the costs were not taken from cost-accounting records; that the agents talked with farmers and made up their minds; that there was, therefore, no tabulation of accurate data; that there was "a sort of adjustment from these figures" secured in the way indicated; that there was a lot of guesswork done and mental impressions formed, and that the figures given were not accurate, but rough approximations.

### Declares Material "Wholly Inadequate."

As a further precaution, I requested a committee consisting of the president of the Kansas State Agricultural College, the chief in crops of Purdue University, an agricultural economist of the University of Wisconsin, an agronomist of the Pennsylvania State College, an assistant in farm management of the University of Minnesota, and a farm economist of the Agricultural College of Texas to make an inquiry and to submit me a report. They did so under date of October 31, expressing the view that they found "this material to be wholly inadequate upon which to base a conclusion as to the true cost of producing the 1918 wheat crop, for the following principal reasons:

"That the areas chosen represent only three out of six major winter wheat areas, and furthermore,

"That the seven counties selected in the winter wheat area east of the Rocky Mountains are not sufficiently representative,

"That the number of farms investigated (about 158 for the wheat area east of the Rocky Mountains, and 115 for the Pacific and Northwest wheat areas) was small; but of more importance even than this, that the data secured therefrom were very incomplete.

"That the manuscripts appear to be more largely based upon the authors' general knowledge of the items of cost of production than upon the specific data collected in the surveys made in the spring of 1918."

It will be noted that the committee points out not only that the number of farms dealt with was small, but also that the data secured were very incomplete, as I have already indicated. Even the sample of the questionnaire inserted in the record by the former Chief of the Office, Dr. Spillman, was not actually the one employed in the inquiry, and those

## REEMPLOYMENT ON RAILROADS OF SOLDIERS AND SAILORS

The United States Railroad Administration issues the following:

WASHINGTON, November 1, 1918.

GENERAL ORDER No. 51.

The majority of railroads under Federal control have already made announcement with respect to the preservation of seniority rights for employees who have entered the military service of the Army and Navy and have indicated that so far as practicable preference in reemployment or reinstatement would be given to soldiers and sailors when mustered out of the service.

(1) In order that as nearly as practical there shall be a uniform treatment of this matter, the following general principles will govern:

(a) In the case of an employee having established seniority rights, so far as practicable, and where the employee is physically qualified, he will be restored to such seniority rights.

(b) In the case of employees who do not have seniority rights under existing practices a consistent effort will be made to provide employment for them when mustered out of military service.

(2) Upon railroads where the assurances given on this subject have been more specific than the provisions of paragraph (1) hereof, such assurances shall be observed.

that were employed contained fragmentary data secured through conversations with farmers, as the author indicated in his communication to me.

### Regrets Publicity of Incomplete Data.

I regret that the former Chief of the Office of Farm Management and the Acting Chief should have given publicity to the studies dealt with, since it is clear that they constitute no basis for satisfactory thinking or proper action in this difficult matter.

I have for a long time appreciated the difficulty of attempting to secure satisfactory studies of cost of producing farm commodities. There are many millions of farmers producing the leading crops. Conditions differ not only from farm to farm, but also from section to section, and averages mean very little. If such studies are undertaken, it is of the utmost importance that they give actual facts, that approved methods be employed, and that the services of the best-trained men be secured for their proper exposition and interpretation. I am taking steps to see that further studies, if made in this field, shall be satisfactory; and to this end I am inviting the cooperation of the best agricultural economists and students of farm crops outside of the department, as well as inside of it, to assist us in formulating projects for cost studies and in recasting the work of the Office of Farm Management along the best possible lines.
