SECOND NOTICE TO BERLIN TO ADDRESS ALL ALLIES AND NOT AMERICA ALONE ON MATTERS OF ARMISTICE

**WARNING IS SENT BY
STATE DEPARTMENT**

*Note Sent to Germany and
Austria Brought Out by
a Communication from
Lemberg About Boundary
Lines—No Evidence that
Associated Governments
Alike Concerned Had Also
Received Message.*

The State Department has given formal notice to Germany and Austria, through the legations in charge of the interests of those Governments here, that the United States insists that communications addressed to the United States Government or to the President of the United States as to the terms of armistice or as to other matters in which the associated Governments are alike concerned should be sent to all the associated Governments and not to this Government alone.

Latest Note from Lemberg.

This is the second request along this line which the State Department has made to the enemy countries. The latest note, which Acting Secretary Polk has sent to the Swiss and Swedish legations for transmission to Germany and Austria, is brought out particularly by a communication from the National Council of Lemberg, regarding boundary lines, and brought out also by various other communications received from Austria and Germany which bore no evidence of having been similarly communicated to the governments associated with the United States.

Finnish Food Conditions Reported Very Serious

State Department advices indicate that food conditions in Finland are very serious. It is reported that for 10 days no bread has been distributed for ordinary bread stations in Helsingfors, and that several ports in Finland are practically without bread. Food conditions in northern Russia are serious.

About 17,000 Influenza Deaths in Army Camps

The War Department authorizes the following statement:

A summary of the results of the influenza epidemic in the Army camps and military centers in the United States shows that a total of 338,257 cases of the disease were recorded, with approximately 17,000 deaths.

Due to the fact that deaths resulting from influenza and pneumonia were not separately grouped, only approximate figures can be given for deaths resulting from the epidemic. Since September 13, the date of the outbreak, to December 1, 19,694 deaths from all causes were reported from military stations in the United States. It is estimated that approximately 2,000 of these were due to causes other than influenza and pneumonia. This estimate is based on the figures for the same period last year.

ARMY'S SURPLUS WOOL WILL BE SOLD AT PUBLIC AUCTION

The War Department authorizes the following:

Brigadier Gen. Robert E. Wood, Acting Quartermaster General and director of purchase and storage, announces that after careful consideration with the experts of the War Department, the War Industries Board, and the War Trade Board the War Department has decided upon the following method of disposal of its wool:

A certain amount of wool will be disposed of from time to time at public auction to the highest bidder under such reasonable rules and regulations as may be found necessary. The amount to be offered is such as, in the opinion of the wool experts, the market can easily absorb. A minimum reserve price will be fixed below which no bids will be entertained.

The question of whether the embargo on importation of wool to this country will be continued is a question that is having the earnest consideration of the War Trade Board. Public announcements will be made as to time and place that the auctions will be held.

EDITORS WELCOMED TO U. S. BY PRESIDENT IN MESSAGE SENT BY WIRELESS FROM THE GEORGE WASHINGTON

**DETAILS ANNOUNCED
FOR ESCORTING FLEET**

*Nine Dreadnaughts and 30
Destroyers Under Com-
mand of Admiral Sims To
Meet Mr. Wilson's Ship
at Sea—Admiral Mayo in
Command of Combined
Vessels—Channel Marked
By Ships at Brest*

President Wilson has sent the following greeting, by wireless from the *George Washington*, to editors of Norway, Sweden, and Denmark now in Washington:

"I thank you sincerely for your message and beg to welcome you in the most cordial manner to the United States. I am sure that throughout your visit you will find every evidence of the genuine friendship which the people and Government of the United States feel for the great countries you represent."

Command of Welcoming Fleet.

Secretary Daniels announces that the naval escort of nine dreadnaughts and 30 destroyers which will meet President Wilson at sea and escort him into Brest will be commanded by Admiral William S. Sims, commander of American Naval Forces in European waters. His flagship will be the U. S. S. *Wyoming*.

Upon the joining of these ships with the *Pennsylvania* the entire naval escort to Brest and all ships accompanying the President will be under the command of Admiral Mayo, commander in chief of the Atlantic Fleet.

Vice Admiral Henry B. Wilson will be in charge of the harbor and port arrangements for the reception of the President, and the *George Washington*, flying the President's flag, as commander in chief of the U. S. Navy, will enter port through a channel marked by vessels of Vice Admiral Wilson's command.

Command of Divisions.

One of the divisions of battleships which will meet the presidential party is under Rear Admiral Hugh Rodman.

WAR TRADE BOARD STATEMENT ON EXPORTATIONS TO DENMARK

Applications for Shipment of Any Commodity Will Be Considered.

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 809) that it has come to their attention that there is some misunderstanding on the part of exporters as to the character and quantity of commodities for which export licenses are now being granted under the agreement entered into between Denmark and the War Trade Board.

Many exporters and manufacturers are apparently under the impression that only those articles which are specifically referred to in the so-called "ration list" are being considered. The issue of THE OFFICIAL U. S. BULLETIN of September 19, 1918, and Commerce Reports of September 20, 1918, contained a list of these rationed articles. This list comprises only those articles on which there is a limitation as to quantity. There are many articles not mentioned in these lists which may be exported to Denmark. Applications for licenses to export such articles will receive favorable consideration when filed in the customary manner, as provided for in W. T. B. R. 259, issued October 9, 1918. In other words, applications for the exportation of any commodity will be considered whether the commodity is rationed or not.

QUANTITIES OF ARMY SUPPLIES ON HAND IS SHOWN IN REPORT

The War Department authorizes the following:

The quantities of general supplies in stock for use of the Army is shown in a report made to Brig. Gen. Robert E. Wood, Acting Quartermaster General and Director of Purchase and Storage by the Statistical Division. This report covers the more important articles handled by the General Supplies Division and shows stock on hand at depots, camps, posts, and forts in the United States and stocks in France.

Items and Quantities.

The items and quantities are as follows: 548,212 axes; 10,773 crowbars; 3,918 commissary chests; 487,065 curry-combs; 13,239 large field desks; 60,865 small field desks; 14,973 portable forges; 890,458 hair brushes; 25,530 hatchets; 644,240 pickaxe helvcs; 563,219 lanterns; 213,291 pickaxes; 69,019 field and army ranges; 2,227 rolling kitchens; 616,914 shovels; 190,164 spades; 170,126 heating stoves and 2,012,300 tooth brushes.

Fuel and Oil in Stock.

The supply of fuel and oil on hand for use is also shown in this report covering stock of raw materials in depots and camps in the United States and on board ship in transit to France. Stock on hand as of November 1 is as follows: 35,070 pounds of solidified alcohol; 978,579 gallons of aviation gasoline; 2,523,205 gallons of motor gasoline; 240,472 gallons of fighting naphtha; 256,155 gallons of

DIVISION CREATED TO DISPOSE OF SURPLUS PROPERTY OF ARMY

The War Department authorizes the following from the Office of the Director of Purchase and Storage:

Considerable quantities of various commodities and materials which have been purchased for the Army are now in excess of the requirements of the War Department. For the purpose of disposing of surplus property Brig. Gen. Robert E. Wood, Acting Quartermaster General and Director of Purchase and Storage, has created a surplus property division, with offices in the Munitions Building, Washington, which will have charge of the disposition of all surplus stocks.

How Disposal Will Be Made.

It will be the policy of the new division to dispose of such surplus, in so far as possible, to other Government agencies. A considerable portion of the balance will probably be required for export by relief organizations of the United States, Belgium, Russia, and other countries. Such balance as remains will be distributed in the open market in such manner, at such times, and in such quantities, as to cause the least disturbance. In most instances offer of surplus property will first be made to manufacturers, so they may purchase and resell if desired. Any surplus still remaining will be offered, if market and other conditions warrant, for public sale, by advertising and bidding, at auction, or in such manner as may be determined after careful investigation.

Official Bulletin Free To Public Institutions Provided Files Are Kept

In revising the free list of The Official United States Bulletin in accordance with the Government's general plan for conservation it has been decided to continue sending this publication without charge to the chambers of commerce, boards of trade, and public libraries in all cities. It is to be distinctly understood, however, that these institutions shall keep their files of the paper complete and have them at all times within easy access to the public for whose convenience these free copies are primarily intended.

In addition, following the Postmaster General's order, files of the Bulletin are required to be kept open to public inspection at every one of the more than 54,000 post offices within the United States and Territories.

CONTINUED DECREASE SHOWN IN SOFT AND HARD COAL OUTPUT

Preliminary estimates of bituminous coal production for the week ended November 30, show an output for that period of 9,710,000 net tons, a decrease as compared with the preceding week of 1,280,000 net tons, or 11.7 per cent. Observance of Thanksgiving Day was a factor in limiting production. The figures for the week showed production to be 3 per cent less than the corresponding period in 1917.

Average Daily Production.

The average daily production per working day was estimated at 1,765,000 net tons as compared with 1,832,000 net tons the preceding week. Records for the coal year to date show that the daily average is 1,951,000 net tons. Total production for the coal year to date amounts to 400,754,000 net tons, as against 370,564,000 net tons during the same eight months last year.

Holiday Causes Decrease.

The holiday also caused a sharp decrease in anthracite production. Estimates place production during the week at 1,613,000 net tons, as against 1,778,000 net tons the preceding week. The daily average per working day was 293,000 net tons, as compared with 324,000 net tons for the coal year to date.

German Soviets to Fix Date of General Election

State Department advices indicate that the date of the general elections in Germany will be finally fixed by the National Soviet Congress which meets on the 16th instant. Date has been tentatively fixed for February 16.

MEDALS OF HONOR AWARDED 2 ARMY OFFICERS AND PRIVATE

The War Department authorizes the following General Order No. 118:

WAR DEPARTMENT.

Washington, December 2, 1918.

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved July 9, 1918 (Pub. 43, W. D., 1918), the Medal of Honor was awarded in the name of Congress on November 22, 1918, to the following named officers and enlisted men for the acts of gallantry set forth after each person's name:

CHARLES W. WHITTLESEY, major, (now lieutenant colonel), 308th Infantry. For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity above and beyond the call of duty in action with the enemy northwest of Binerville, in the Forest D'Argonne, France, October 2-7, 1918. Although cut off for five days from the remainder of his division, Maj. Whittlesey maintained his position which he had reached under orders received for an advance, and held his command consisting originally of 463 officers and men of the 308th Infantry and of Company K, of the 307th Infantry, together, in the face of superior numbers of the enemy during the five days. Maj. Whittlesey and his command were thus cut off and no rations or other supplies reached him in spite of determined efforts which were made by his division. On the fourth day Maj. Whittlesey received from the enemy a written proposition to surrender, which he treated with contempt, although he was at that time out of rations and had suffered a loss of about 50 per cent of killed and wounded of his command and was surrounded by the enemy.

GEORGE G. McMURTRY, captain, 308th Infantry. For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity above and beyond the call of duty in action against the enemy at Charlevaux, in the Forest D'Argonne, France, October 2 to 8, 1918. Capt. McMurry commanded a battalion which was cut off and surrounded by the enemy and, although wounded in the knee by shrapnel on October 4 and suffering great pain, he continued throughout the entire period to encourage his officers and men with a resistless optimism that contributed largely toward preventing panic and disorder among the troops who were, without food, cut off from communication with our lines. On October 4 during a heavy barrage he personally directed and supervised the moving of the wounded to shelter before himself seeking shelter. On October 6 he was again wounded in the shoulder by a German grenade, but continued personally to organize and direct the defense against the German attack on the position until the attack was defeated. He continued to direct and command his troops, refusing relief, and personally led his men out of the position after assistance arrived before permitting himself to be taken to the hospital on October 8. During this period the successful defense of the position was due largely to his efforts.

THOMAS C. NEIBAUR, private, Company M, 107th Infantry. For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity above and beyond the call of duty in action against the enemy near Landers St. Georges, France, October 10, 1918. On the afternoon of October 10, 1918, when the Cote de Chatillon had just been gained after bitter fighting, and the summit of that strong bulwark in the Kriemhilde Stellung was being organized, Pvt. Neibaur was sent out on patrol with his automatic rifle squad to enfilade enemy machine-gun nests. As he gained the ridge, he set up his automatic rifle and was directly thereafter wounded in both legs by fire from a hostile machine gun on his flank. The advance wave of the enemy troops counter-attacking had about gained the ridge, and although practically cut off and surrounded, the remainder of his detachment being killed or wounded, this gallant soldier kept his automatic rifle in operation to such effect that by his own efforts and by fire from the skirmish line of his company at least 100 yards in his rear, the attack was checked. Modification of Export and Import Restrictions on Various Articles Announced by War Trade Board

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 364), after consultation with the United States Food Administration, that they will now consider applications for licenses to export cornstarch to Canada, the West Indies, Cuba, Mexico, Central America, and South America.

Applications for licenses to export this commodity must be made in accordance with the rules and regulations of the War Trade Board. Exporters who in the past have been refused licenses may now submit new applications on Form X.

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 366) that applications will be considered for licenses to import Oriental rugs (as included under paragraph 300 of the tariff act of 1913) which were purchased prior to April 15, 1918, and the purchase price of which was paid in full prior to November 27, 1918. Proof of the foregoing facts must accompany applications.

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 367) that they will consider applications for licenses to

import any restricted commodities originating in and coming from Lower California when shipment is to be made on vessels of 1,000 dead-weight tons or less.

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 381), after consultation with the United States Food Administration, that they will now consider applications for licenses to export barley malt to Canada, the West Indies, Cuba, Mexico, Central America, South America, and Japan.

Applications for licenses to export this commodity must be made in accordance with the rules and regulations of the War Trade Board. Exporters who in the past have been refused licenses may now submit new applications on Form X.

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 384) that list of restricted imports No. 2 (W. T. B. R. 98, issued Apr. 22, 1918), Item 115, restricting the importation of lead, has been amended to permit the issuance of licenses for the importation of lead bullion, as classified under paragraph 253 of the tariff act of 1913, when originating in Mexico and coming by ocean transportation.

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 387) that W. T. B. R. 176, issued July 26, 1918, restricting the importation of rattans and reeds, has been revoked, and that henceforth applications for licenses to import rattans and reeds will be considered by the War Trade Board for shipment from any country by any means of transportation.

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 389) that the restriction on the importation of latch knitting needles has been removed and that applications for licenses to import this commodity will be considered.

enemy attacked Pvt. Neibaur at close quarters. These he killed. He then moved alone among the enemy lying on the ground about him, in the midst of the fire from his own lines, and by coolness and gallantry captured 11 prisoners at the point of his pistol, and although painfully wounded, brought them back to our lines. The counterattack in full force was arrested, to a large extent, by the single efforts of this soldier, whose heroic exploits took place against the skyline in full view of his entire battalion.

The Third American Army, continuing its advance into Germany, today reached the Rhine from Rolandseck to Brohl, and at nightfall was on the general line Rolandseck-Brohl-Wassenach - Munstermaifeld - Rheinbollen.

REPORTS ON AMERICAN LOSSES CAUSED BY GERMAN SUBMARINE WARFARE COMING IN RAPIDLY

In response to the notice given by the State Department calling on American citizens and concerns to submit to the department by December 31 information regarding losses sustained as a result of German submarine warfare, reports are coming in rapidly to the department from the parties interested. Insurance companies have been asked to furnish the department with estimates first of their total losses and then detailed statements of these same losses according to vessels.

American citizens and concerns who sustained hull losses due to submarine warfare are also reporting that data to the department.

The department is receiving a large volume of reports from American citizens owning property in enemy countries and countries which have been under enemy occupation. In some instances this property has been sequestered or requisitioned by the German Government and in some cases destroyed, and in other cases the owners, owing to a state of war, have been unable to learn the condition of their property. Record of all such property is to be made by the department. The value of American property in Germany is large.

In order that the reports be of value to the department, it is important that the actual condition of American property in enemy territory or enemy occupied territory be ascertained and reported.

Short Rations in France and Italy Not Ended with Approach of Peace

The Food Administration issues the following:

The signing of the armistice lifted the cloud of 50 years, and France broke into joy and color and dancing. She walked at last free in the sunshine and every good seemed possible at once. Peace, however, added nothing to food supplies and hardship must go on until next harvest. Victor Boret, the French food controller, announced shortly after the armistice was signed that it would be impossible to increase the war-time rations to civilians, but promised lower prices.

To Italy peace brought only increased food difficulties, as the newly acquired territory and prisoners added about 5,000,000 people who must be fed. With admirable foresight the Government set aside a great store of food for the immediate relief of the redeemed provinces and returning prisoners, and prepared to face the situation.

Rationing is vigorously enforced by the card system and war-time allotments of food have been severely cut. The new ration provides a monthly allowance of 17 pounds of bread and 13 pounds of other food for each person. This is only a pound of food a day and seems very little at any time, but especially meager in this hour of victory.

SUPPLEMENT TO RAILROAD GENERAL ORDER CONCERNING COST OF INDUSTRY TRACKS

U. S. RAILROAD ADMINISTRATION,
Washington, December 5, 1918.

SUPPLEMENT No. 1 TO GENERAL ORDER
No. 15.

General Order No. 15, dated March 26, 1918, is hereby supplemented as follows:

1. General Order No. 15 is not to be construed as requiring or authorizing a Federal Manager, to enter into a contract on behalf of the Director General to pay for that part of an industry track on the right of way from the switch point to the clearance point where, in the judgment of the Federal Manager, the amount of traffic to be derived by the United States Railroad Administration from the construction of the industry track is not sufficient to justify such expenditure. In cases where, in the judgment of the Federal Manager, the circumstances justify the construction of an industry track, but the amount of revenue to be derived therefrom by the United States Railroad Administration does not justify the payment by the Director General of the cost of that part of the track on the right of way from the switch point to the clearance point, an agreement may be made, otherwise in accordance with General Order No. 15, but providing for the payment of the entire cost of the track by the shipper with a provision for refund up to, but not exceeding, the cost of the part of the track from the switch point to the clearance point, at the rate of two dollars (\$2.00) per car of carload freight yielding road haul revenue, delivered on or shipped from the track during Federal control.

2. Track material contained in that portion of an industry track on the railroad right of way which was installed and paid for by the industry during Federal control shall remain the property of the industry, except to the extent that refund of the cost thereof shall have been made by the railroad or the Di-

rector General, but such ownership shall be subject to the right of the railroad to use the track when not to the detriment of the industry.

3. Upon the discontinuance of use of an industry track for the purposes of the industry, the industry shall have the right to have the track material on the right of way which was paid for by the industry during Federal control, taken up and delivered to the industry, except to the extent that the cost of such track material shall have been refunded to the industry by the railroad or the Director General. The work of taking up the track shall be done, if the Federal manager shall so desire, by the force of the Federal manager, but in any event at the expense of the industry.

WORK OF CONGRESS BRIEFLY TOLD

SENATE.

The Judiciary Committee which is investigating brewers' activities and German propaganda continued its hearing all of yesterday, with A. Bruce Bielaski, chief of the Department of Justice bureau of investigations, again on the stand. Mr. Bielaski read innumerable documents into the record showing the activities of German agents in this country.

Chairman Simmons, of the Finance Committee, submitted his report on the war-revenue bill yesterday afternoon. The measure was called up for consideration this afternoon, Chairman Simmons making an extended speech in explanation of its provisions.

The Judiciary Committee referred back to a subcommittee for further inquiry a bill introduced by Senator King providing that all persons, firms, or corporations having contracts with the Government since the war began be required to file copies of their contracts with the Attorney General and the Commissioner of Internal Revenue.

While the Committee on Public Buildings and Grounds was yesterday investigating the expenditures incurred for housing accommodations, Lieut. Gov. Wilson, of Connecticut, appeared and urged the committee to favor the completion of the Government's housing project at Bridgeport.

HOUSE.

Bills were introduced yesterday as follows: By Mr. Gallagher, of Illinois, proposing to increase from \$1,750,000 to \$6,000,000 the limit of cost for the new post-office site in Chicago. By Mr. Kennedy, of Rhode Island, a joint resolution requesting the American peace delegates to urge that the future government of Ireland be settled by a vote of the Irish people. By Mr. Mott, of New York, providing for the deportation of interned enemy aliens to their native countries. By Mr. Gray, of New Jersey, providing for a national railway system under Federal incorporation and charter, but not owned by the Government.

Secretary Daniels informed the appropriations committee that his department would have a deficit of a quarter of a billion dollars for the current fiscal year. Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo, in a letter to Chairman Kitchin of the Ways and Means Committee, recommended legislation to enable the Government to extend war credits and make loans to the allies after peace has been concluded. Representative Moore, of Pennsylvania, Republican, made this letter the vehicle for a severe criticism as indicating from the viewpoint of Mr. Moore a Democratic tendency toward free trade. The House yesterday completed general debate on the District of Columbia appropriation bill and began its consideration under the five-minute rule.

Assistant Secretary of War Crowell and Maj. Gen. Goethals appeared before the appropriations committee to urge speedy action on the bill introduced by Chairman Dent, of the Military Com-

FEDERAL RESERVE BOARD'S WEEKLY BANK STATEMENT

Further increases in the holdings of war paper and 1-year Treasury certificates and substantial gains in members' reserve deposits are indicated in the Federal Reserve Board's weekly bank statement issued as at close of business on December 6, 1918.

Investments.—The week saw a further increase of 54.8 millions in the reserve banks' holdings of war paper, the total, 1,467.3 millions, constituting about 62 per cent of the banks' aggregate earning assets. Other discounts on hand declined 6.3 millions. Bills bought in open market show a reduction of 3.8 millions. The distribution of this paper among the several banks shows considerable change, the New York bank reporting net liquidation of 58.8 millions, while Chicago shows an increase of 60.3 millions under this head. An increase of 12.9 millions in the volume of Government short-term securities is due largely to the purchase by the banks of 1-year Treasury certificates to secure Federal reserve bank notes. Total earning assets show an increase for the week of 57.7 millions.

Deposits.—Government deposits declined 21.8 millions, while members' reserve deposits show an increase of 58.9 millions, or slightly in excess of the increase in total investments. Net deposits show a gain for the week of 36.1 millions.

Reserves.—A further gain of 2.2 millions in gold reserves is shown, while total cash reserves show an increase of about 1 million. The banks' reserve percentage because of the substantial increases in both deposit and note liabilities shows a decline from 50 to 49.5 per cent.

Note circulation.—Owing to the large volume of note redemptions the agents are able to show a decrease of 31.2 millions in the total amount of Federal reserve notes outstanding. The banks report a total of 2,584.5 millions of Federal reserve notes in actual circulation, an increase of 15.8 millions for the week. Their aggregate liability on Federal reserve bank notes in circulation is 92.8 millions, which is an increase of 6.8 millions over the previous weeks' total.

Capital.—During the week the banks' paid-in capital increased \$232,000, largely as the result of payment for Federal reserve bank stock by newly admitted

For promoting after-the-war commerce the Department of Commerce asked Congress for supplemental appropriations amounting to \$474,000, of which \$98,000 is for use in South and Central America and \$87,000 for the Far East.

Through adjustments now under way Alien Property Custodian Palmer yesterday advised Congress enemy-owned property in this country valued at \$505,885,000 will be increased in value to approximately \$800,000,000. He asked for an additional appropriation of \$125,000 for the support of his office. He reported that 32,100 trust estates are being cared for by the custodian.

CHANGES IN NATIONAL BANKS FOR 11 MONTHS ENDED NOV. 30

The Comptroller of the Currency issues the following comparative statement of new national bank charters and capital increases during 11 months ending November 30, 1918 and 1917:

Charters applied for.—During the first 11 months of 1918, this office received 217 applications for charters for new national banks, with capital of \$13,060,000, compared with 273 applications received during the corresponding period in 1917, with capital of \$18,075,000.

Charters granted.—In these 11 months of 1918, 144 charters were granted, capital \$12,575,000, as compared with 174 charters granted during the corresponding period in 1917, with capital of \$11,225,000.

Capital increases.—For this period in 1918, 161 national banks increased their capital stock in the sum of \$18,641,100, against 168 banks increasing their capital by \$22,659,990, during the same period in 1917.

Capital reductions.—Four banks reduced their capital during the first 11 months of 1918 by \$325,000. During the same period last year 12 banks reduced their capital \$700,800.

Liquidations.—Thirty-six national banks went into voluntary liquidation (exclusive of those consolidating with other national banks) during the first 11 months of 1918, their aggregate capital being \$5,670,000, as compared with 67 such banks liquidating during the same period in 1917, with an aggregate capital of \$6,267,500.

Charters refused.—During the first 11 months of 1918, the Comptroller of the Currency refused 21 applications for charters for new national banks. During the same period last year 29 applications were refused.

members in the Philadelphia, Cleveland, and San Francisco districts.

Condition of Member Banks November 29, 1918.

Substantial reduction in the total of United States bonds as against a further increase in the amounts of Treasury certificates held, also liquidation of loans and a corresponding decline in deposits, are indicated by the Federal Reserve Board's weekly statement of condition on November 29 of 753 member banks in leading cities. Holdings of Treasury certificates show an increase for the week of 38.7 millions, largely at the banks outside the three central reserve cities. United States bonds, other than circulation bonds, on hand fell off about 40.5 millions, the banks in the central reserve cities reporting a decrease under this head of 16.3 millions. Loans secured by United States war obligations (war paper) show a decline of 22.8 millions, mainly at the central reserve city banks.

Net withdrawals of Government deposits for the week totaled 13.1 millions. Aggregate net demand deposits decreased 91.5 millions at all reporting banks and 78.6 millions at the central reserve city banks. Time deposits increased 6.3 millions.

For all reporting banks the ratio of deposits to investments shows a decline for the week from 78.2 to 77.8 per cent.

BELGIAN MINISTER REVIEWS RELIEF NEEDS OF HIS PEOPLE

The following statement is authorized by the Belgian Legation:

E. Decartier de Marchienne, the Belgian minister, stated recently that while under the terms of the President's basis of peace Germany must pay for the reconstruction of Belgium, there will, however, be an interregnum before collections can be made from Germany, wherein not only must the Belgian people be fed, but their industries must be started, their railways and canals constructed, destroyed houses must be rebuilt, raw material must be found to start factories, seed and agriculture implements must be furnished, in order that the people of Belgium may be put to employment and self-support at the earliest possible moment. Moreover, the whole population is undernourished and must have enlarged food supplies instantly in order to enable them to go to work.

Appreciated By Belgians.

The President's direction to Mr. Hoover that he should enlarge the activities of the commission for relief in Belgium to embrace the relation of the United States to this reconstruction program and that he should handle all matters in connection with this American relationship is a matter of the most intense satisfaction to every Belgian.

The enlarged shipments of food already started to Belgium to meet the present emergency, the large orders just being given for cloth, the great response of the American people to Mr. Hoover's appeal through the Red Cross for second-hand clothing and the measures under consideration for prompt amelioration in other directions are all in line with the marvelous activity of the Commission throughout the whole of the last four years.

That Mr. Hoover and his associates in the Commission for Relief in Belgium and in the Food Administration are to have charge of this enlarged interest of the American people in Belgium will give a feeling of absolute confidence to the whole of our people, and this evidence of America's continued solicitude will be an encouragement and stimulation to my people, second only to their actual liberation from German oppression.

Actual Conditions Today.

The English and French Governments have already evidenced their solicitude in this matter and their willingness to cooperate and give support to Belgium in her task of rehabilitation. It must always be borne in mind that over 4,000,000 of our 7,000,000 people are destitute and are to-day subsisting in soup lines; that except for the garments provided through the Relief Commission they have had no textiles for over four years; that the whole clock of industry has been stopped and that the Germans have carted away to Germany all the machinery which they did not destroy in Belgium.

They destroyed our railways, our mines and our canals. Never before has a country been reduced to such a plight as ours to-day and never has a country had such friends. We have won the war. We must now bend every effort to restore our country and prepare it for its glorious future.

Medical Facilities Available in Alabama, Alaska, Arkansas, and California to Injured Federal Employees Under Compensation Act

Section 9 of the United States employees' compensation act, approved September 7, 1916, provides that an employee of the United States sustaining an injury while in the performance of his duty shall be furnished medical or hospital treatment needed because of the injury and that this treatment shall be furnished by United States medical officers and hospitals or by private physicians and hospitals designated by the United States Employees' Compensation Commission.

The following is a list of the United States medical officers, dispensaries, and hospitals and of the private physicians and hospitals designated by the commission pursuant to the provisions of the compensation act in the States of Alabama, Alaska, Arkansas, and California. The list of United States medical officers and hospitals includes only those which the commission has been notified are available for the treatment of injured Government employees. It does not include Army or Navy hospitals.

Civilians employed by the United

States in the vicinity of a permanent or fixed Army hospital who sustain personal injuries while in the performance of duty will be admitted thereto, when beds are available, upon the written request of the officers under whom they are employed. Such request will be addressed to the officer in charge of the hospital and will recite the facts of employment and of personal injury while in the performance of duty. Injured civilian employees thus admitted to hospital will be furnished medical and surgical care therein for a reasonable time: *Provided*, That this authority is not applicable to cases to which other United States hospitals are more convenient of access.

An injured employee should be sent to a United States medical officer or hospital if practicable, but if this is not practicable they should be sent to a designated physician or hospital if one is available. When an injured employee is sent to a designated hospital, a United States medical officer or a designated physician should be notified so that he may take charge of the case.

SECRETARY BAKER IN ANNUAL REPORT REVIEWS AMERICA'S COLOSSAL PART IN BRINGING TO A VICTORIOUS CLOSE THE WORLD-FOUGHT WAR FOR UNIVERSAL JUSTICE AND LIBERTY

In opening his annual report to the President, Secretary of War Baker says:

In transmitting to you, as I do herewith, the reports of the several bureaus of the War Department, I am conscious that no summary description of their contents or of the activities of the War Department during the past year can be written which will do justice to the devoted labors of those who have contributed to the mobilization, training, equipment, and use of the Army.

Task for the Historian.

An adequate account of the activities of the department for the year now ending can be written only in the long reaches of historical inquiry when there will be time and opportunity to examine in detail not merely the statistical exhibits which tell in numbers of men and guns what America did, but also to appraise the contributions of patriotic zeal and service which came from field and factory, from civilian and soldier alike and which represent in their aggregate the life of the Nation concentrated upon a single purpose—the devotion of all we have and all we are to the preservation of the ideals which have made us a free people and which we were called upon to

vindicate in the interest both of our own continued freedom and freedom for others.

Expansion of the Army.

The reports which are herewith transmitted tell in some detail of the problems presented to the War Department, and the results attained. A few illustrative figures, however, show the real limits of the story ultimately to be told:

The size of the Army has increased from April 6, 1917, to November 11, 1918, from 190,000 to 3,665,000 men, of whom more than 2,000,000 were in France. The appropriations for the War Department on the executive side alone were increased in that period from \$2,000,000 a year to \$20,000,000, and the civilian employees had increased from about 2,000 to about 25,000. For the year ending June 30, 1918, the appropriations for the support of the military establishment aggregated \$8,000,000,000. For the year ending June 30, 1919, the appropriations aggregate \$15,300,000,000.

The organization to expend these vast sums involved on every hand cooperation from the regularly established departments of the Government in Washington and the special boards exercising powers

given by the Congress to the President and by him apportioned to agencies created for the special emergencies presented by the war. Without this cooperation it would have been impossible to do the things which have been done, and I refrain from referring to particular services rendered to the department by these agencies only because the zeal of this cooperation has been so generous and unflinching that even the mention of special instances would be a recital too long for the necessary limits of this report.

Present Problems in Hand.

Hostilities ceased on the 11th of November, and immediately the vast machinery of the department was turned to the question of demobilizing the Army and returning the soldiers to their homes and occupations. An immediate start was likewise made in the intricate business of closing up contracts for the manufacture of war supplies and materials, and we are now engaged in seeking to release to their normal pursuits the labor of the country and to free for civilian uses the resources of the country which were so exclusively aggregated to create and support our Army in the field.

MILITARY OPERATIONS.

The first units of the American Expeditionary Force reached France in June, 1917. With remarkable foresight the commanding general, John J. Pershing, immediately set about laying the foundations for a big American Army. Docks were built, miles of railroad were laid, machine shops and storage depots were constructed, training areas were laid out. While the force in France and in immediate prospect numbered but few thousands, essential preparations were made for an army mounting into the millions.

Until this groundwork was well under way large shipments of troops could not be handled, but before the end of the year five divisions had reached France—the First and Second Divisions of Regulars, the Twenty-sixth Division from New England, and the Forty-second and Forty-first, known as the Rainbow and Sunset Divisions. By the end of October American units had entered the line in quiet sectors in the Vosges, and in November engineers from the Twenty-sixth Division took part in the British engagement at Cambrai.

During the fall and winter American troops received the intensive training in modern warfare which made them able to lead later at Chateau-Thierry, St. Mihiel, and the Meuse.

American Troops in Action.

On March 21 the storm of the German offensive broke. Under the stress of the situation unity of command was effected, and by the direction of the President, Gen. Pershing immediately placed his forces,

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numbering at that time about 343,000, at the disposal of Marshal Foch.

During the ensuing months American troops were on trial in the eyes of Europe. A huge army, hastily gathered, consisting largely of inexperienced troops, they upheld the finest traditions of the service. To a large extent at first they relieved French and British divisions in quiet sectors, making these experienced divisions available for service at crucial points. Then as the American troops showed their fighting qualities and the emergency became more acute, they were thrown into the hottest of the battle. At Cantigny on May 23, troops of the First Division fought their first real engagement and carried it through successfully. On June 4 the Second Division of Regulars and Marines went into the line on the Marne, where the Germans were driving toward Paris. On June 15, they met the triumphantly advancing enemy in the Belleau Woods, stopped his advance and in an impetuous charge drove his column back more than 900 yards. It was a brilliant demonstration of the quality of our troops, and among the weary French and British soldiers in the trenches the word flew from mouth to mouth that the Americans were first-class fighting men.

Attack on Paris Stayed.

The attack on Paris had been definitely stayed by the fine strategy and desperate resistance of the French and American troops. But on July 15 the enemy resumed the attack from Chateau Thierry eastward to the Argonne. Six American divisions were thrown into the line at Chateau Thierry with several more in reserve. Three days later the drive had been stopped and Marshal Foch launched his offensive.

From that time the story is one of allied attack and German retreat. In blow after blow which the commander in chief of the allied armies struck at the German line, American troops took a conspicuous part. On September 12 the 1st American Army, under the personal direction of Gen. Pershing, launched an attack on St. Mihiel and within 24 hours had pinched off that heavy fortified salient which had withstood attack through four years of war. The elimination of this salient, which had menaced eastern France, relieved the pressure on Verdun and made possible further advances north of that city.

Operations with the British.

Meanwhile the 27th New York Division and the 30th National Guard Division, with troops from South Carolina, North Carolina, and Tennessee, were operating with the British. The 332d Regiment of Infantry, together with aviation and ambulance units operating on the Italian front, had a share in the great Italian victory. Small expeditionary forces were also established at Archangel and Vladivostok.

The Battle of the Meuse.

From the point of view of military strategy, America's greatest contribution to the successful outcome of the war was the hotly-contested battle of the Meuse, which resulted in cutting the main artery

of the German supply system. Up through the middle of September the Germans were able to operate unmolested the Sedan-Mezières railway running parallel to the front and furnishing a base of supply for the whole line from Valenciennes to Metz. To cut this supply line at both ends and force withdrawal or capture on this entire front, the British attacked in the north, and on September 26 Gen. Pershing drove in west of the Meuse with the First American Army. The first few days of fighting yielded considerable gains. Fully conscious of the gravity of the situation, the enemy threw in division after division of fresh troops; and during the ensuing weeks occurred the bitterest fighting in which American troops took part. The second week of October practically all available units—about 28 American divisions—were in the line.

Foe Continuously Hammered.

Progress could be made only a few yards at a time, but the continued hammering finally wore out the resistance of the enemy forces, and November 1 the American troops broke through. Day after day steady gains were made up the west bank of the Meuse, until, on November 7, the United States forces entered the outskirts of Sedan and definitely cut the German supply line. A day later the French forces came up on the left flank.

The meeting of French and American troops on this historic spot signalized the defeat of the German arms, a defeat as decisive and humiliating as that forced upon France 47 years before at the same spot. If there had been questions before as to the acceptance of the armistice terms, the allied advance, culminating in this meeting at Sedan, left no choice in the matter.

In the final campaign of the war American troops thus played a part in a triumph which was beyond all praise and which made them worthy comrades in arms with French and British veterans.

Battle Casualties.

Returns on casualties in the Expeditionary Force up to November 13 are given in Table 1.

These figures include death from disease as well as battle casualties, slightly as well as severely wounded.

Deaths from battle alone would be about 36,000. About half the wounded reported probably suffered very slight injury.

It is interesting to compare these figures with losses in previous wars. In the Civil War the battle fatalities on the Union side were approximately 110,000. In the Russo-Japanese War the Japanese losses were 59,000 killed or died of wounds. In the Franco-Prussian War, German battle deaths were 28,600. In the Spanish-American War we lost less than 1,000 men in battle.

Compared with recently reported British battle deaths of 650,000 for the period of the war our losses were astonishingly light.

While we rejoice that our losses were no heavier we still bear in mind the thousands of homes throughout the country upon which the heavy burden of the war has fallen. To these homes the Nation owes a debt of fullest gratitude. From them has sprung unbounded courage to face hardship, heroic strength in battle, the Nation's power to right the wrongs of selfish despotism.

GROWTH OF THE ARMY.

At the date of the signing of the armistice over 25 per cent of the entire male population of the country between the ages of 18 and 31 were in military service. This represents a growth in the size of the Army in 19 months of nearly twentyfold, namely, from 189,674 in March, 1917, to 3,664,000 in November, 1918. The steps in this amazing growth are shown in Table 2, giving the strength of the forces under arms at different periods.

The growth shown by these figures is remarkable, not simply because of the physical and administrative difficulties involved, but especially because the traditions of the country have all been opposed to large armaments. The principle of the draft had for years been opposed by considerable numbers of the population. Yet in a brief 19 months more than three and a half million men were mobilized, housed, fully equipped with munitions and supplies, and the major part of them given a military training that enabled them to oppose successfully the soldiers of the most warlike of the European nations. This achievement is a tribute to the ability of Army leaders, trained in dealing with small forces, to adapt themselves with wonderful effectiveness to the new and tremendous task. It is a tribute to the hearty cooperation of every Government department. It is a tribute, above all else, to the ability and enthusiastic patriotism of the American people.

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It is a notable tribute to the country's enthusiastic support of the war program that, in spite of previous opposition to the principle of conscription, within a few months after the selective-service law was passed the status of the drafted soldier was fully as honorable in the eyes of his associates and the country at large as that of the enlisted man. It is pertinent to note in this connection that a record of desertions from the Army shows that the total number was much lower than in any of our previous wars, and of these a considerably smaller percentage occurred among drafted men than among those who were recruited through other sources.

The original selective-service law of May 18, 1917, with its subsequent amendments, mobilized the man power of the Nation between the ages of 18 and 45, inclusive. Under the original and later acts approximately 23,709,000 men were registered and slightly over 2,800,000 were inducted into the military service in a manner that was fair to the individual, efficacious in providing the Army with men as quickly as they could be equipped and utilized, and provocative of a minimum of disturbance to the industrial and economic life of the Nation.

On August 7, 1918, the distinguishing appellations "Regular Army," "Reserve Corps," "National Guard," and "National Army" were ordered discontinued; and the military forces of the Nation were consolidated into the "United States Army."

Work of the Draft Boards.

In my report of last year I gave a brief outline of the methods by which local governmental machinery was adapted to put into execution the provisions of the selective service law. Registration was by States. Each State was divided into districts, with registration boards appointed by the governor. Registration was handled by the same machinery that handles voting during elections. The subsequent work of examining and classifying registrants was handled by local and district boards appointed by the President upon the recommendation of the governors of the various States.

The selective draft has proved its worth. It has been accepted as a governmental principle throughout the length and breadth of the United States. That this is true is no small measure due to the work of these local and district boards and to the untiring activity of the registration and examination officials in the various States. Had the Army been placed under the necessity of creating a new set of salaried Federal officials to handle the draft, we should not have a force of over two million men on European soil to-day. The draft secured a large army in record time without unjust discrimination or destruction of industry; and it gained the respect and support of the American people. For all of this the State and local workers who with whole-hearted enthusiasm carried the heavy burden must receive a large share of credit.

TRAINING THE ARMY.

One of the most serious problems confronting the War Department in April, 1917, was the procurement of sufficient

officers to fill the requirements of the divisions that were to be formed for overseas duty. As a first step toward the solution of this problem it was decided to offer a three months' intensive training to qualified civilians at summer training camps modeled after the Plattsburg idea, for which Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood was so largely responsible. In August, 1917, a total of 27,341 candidates were graduated from the first series of these officers' training camps, a number sufficient to meet the immediate needs of the Army. A second series was held during September, October, and November, and a third series from January to April, 1918.

A fourth series of officers' training schools, with an initial enrollment of 13,114, was established May 15, 1918, in 24 National Army and National Guard divisions in the United States.

Success of the Experiment.

It is a source of deep satisfaction to me that the officer's training schools have been so successful. Thousands of our young business men, leaving positions of responsibility and profit, dropped their personal affairs and devoted themselves wholeheartedly to the new business of war. Thanks to a peculiarly close and cordial cooperation between the Regular Army officers and this mass of civilian material, the results have exceeded our warmest hopes.

A very large part of the credit for this success rests also with the French and English officers detailed by their Governments to give practical instruction in modern warfare to our student officers, and to the unique system perfected abroad for training our personnel by brigading units with the British and French armies.

HEALTH OF THE ARMY.

It must be a source of the deepest gratification to the country, as it is to me, that the health of the Army has been so excellent, not only as compared with the Army in other wars, but also as compared with the civilian population.

For the year ending August 30, 1918, the death rate from disease among troops in the United States was 6.4 per thousand; in the American Expeditionary Forces it was 4.7; for the combined forces it was 5.9. The male civilian death rate for the age groups most nearly corresponding to the Army age is substantially the same as the rate in the American Expeditionary Forces. What this low figure means in lives saved is shown by comparing it with the rate of 65 per thousand in the Union Army during the Civil War and the rate of 26 per thousand in the American Army during the Spanish War. Pneumonia, either primary or secondary to measles, caused 56 per cent of all deaths among troops and 63 per cent of the deaths from disease.

Influenza Epidemic.

About the middle of September the influenza epidemic which had been prevalent in Europe gained a foothold in this country. Naturally the camps and cantonments, with their closer concentration of men, provided especially favorable ground for the spread of the epidemic.

In the eight weeks from September 14 to November 8 there were reported among all troops in the United States over 316,000 cases of influenza and over 53,000 cases of pneumonia. Of the 20,500 deaths during this period, probably 19,800 were the result of the epidemic.

Venereal Diseases.

A vigorous campaign has been waged by the War Department for combating the great social evil of venereal disease. The program of attack has included the repression of prostitution and the liquor traffic in zones near cantonments, provision for proper social surroundings and recreation, education of soldiers and civilians in regard to venereal diseases, prophylactic measures against them, and prompt medical care. The Commission on Training Camp Activities has been very active in carrying forward this campaign and has received splendid cooperation from local authorities, and local and national health officials.

During the year ended August 30, 1918, among the troops in the United States the number of venereal admissions to sick report was 126 per thousand men. This figure includes duplicates and does not show the number of men sick at any given time. The great majority of these cases, moreover, were contracted before entering the Army.

Among the troops in France, where there were no recruits fresh from civil life, the record was even better than at home, and conditions improved steadily and rapidly until, in September of the present year, the cases were less than 1 among each thousand men. This is a showing unequaled in the records of any other army of modern times.

The Medical Organization.

Figures as to the health of our soldiers bear eloquent tribute to the efficiency of the Medical Department of the Army. With the invaluable assistance of the American Red Cross, it found itself in a position to render great service from the very beginning. In this connection it is significant to note that the first casualties in the American Expeditionary Force occurred in the Medical Corps, when on September 4, 1917, 1 officer and 3 men were killed and 3 officers and 6 men wounded in a German aeroplane attack on one of our base hospitals.

On November 11, 1918, the Army had 80 fully equipped hospitals in this country with a capacity of 120,000 patients.

There are 104 base hospitals and 31 evacuation hospitals in the American Expeditionary Force and one evacuation hospital in Siberia.

Army hospitals in the United States cared for 1,407,191 patients during the war; those with the American Expeditionary Force cared for 755,374, a total of 2,162,565.

In addition to furnishing its medical personnel for the operation of the above units, the War Department, through the Chief Surgeon, has detailed 431 American officers to serve with the British forces and a further 169 for service in base hospitals that we have turned over to the British. Furthermore, several am-

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balance sections have been operating with the Italian Army.

Up to the end of July about 15 per cent of the entire civilian medical profession of the United States went into active duty as medical officers of the Army. The answer made by the graduate nurses in this country has been no less splendid than that of the doctors. During the period of the war over \$500,000,000 was made available for the uses of the Medical Department.

Inspection and Preparation of Food.

The War Department has believed that preventive as well as curative duties should be performed by its medical personnel. Accordingly, eight "survey parties" have been maintained to inspect all stocks of food and the manner of serving meals to troops in camps or hospitals. Provision has also been made for the education of cooks and bakers in the science of their trades.

During the first 15 months of the war, all matters pertaining to the protection of troops against poison gases were under the charge of the Surgeon General, who devised, contracted for, and produced during this period over one and a half million gas masks. The magnitude of this work became so great, however, that a special "Chemical Warfare Service" was created to handle both the defensive end, formerly under the Medical Corps, and the offensive branch, theretofore under the Engineers.

Reconstruction Work.

One of the most important activities under the direction of the Medical Department has been the reconstruction work planned for soldiers, sailors, and marines. At ports of debarkation, arrangements have been made for the rapid classification and assignment of returned sick and injured to the 19 general hospitals selected for reconstruction work. At each of the hospitals courses of instruction are conducted which are adapted to the physical and educational qualifications of the men.

TRANSPORTATION OF TROOPS AND SUPPLIES.

In the 19 months elapsing from the declaration of war to the signing of the armistice the Army created an embarkation service which succeeded in shipping overseas 2,075,834 men and 5,153,000 tons of cargo. Even these figures do not adequately express the extraordinary nature of the achievement. As time was required for the drafting and training of men and for organizing the production of supplies, most of the stupendous movement occurred in the last half of our active participation in the war. In the last 10 months, that is, from January 1, 1918, to the signing of the armistice, the Army embarked 1,880,339 men and shipped 4,660,000 tons of cargo. Nothing to compare with the movement of this tremendous number of men and tons of supplies across the Atlantic Ocean is known in the military history of the world.

Movement of troops overseas began, at the earnest solicitation of our cobelligerents, very soon after our entrance into the war. May, our first month in the

war, saw the dispatch abroad of selected personnel to the number of 1,718. In June 12,261 troops and 2,798 marines were embarked. By the end of the year, as the former German liners came into service, embarkations increased to a rate of 50,000 a month. By the end of December 187,916 troops and 7,579 marines had been embarked.

At this point negotiations were entered into with the British Government by which three of its big fast liners and four smaller troop ships were definitely assigned to the service of our Army. In March the movement jumped to 83,782 troops and 1,081 marines. It was in this month that the great German spring drive took place in Picardy, with a success that threatened to result in a German victory. Every ship that could be secured was pressed into service, and the aid furnished by the British was greatly increased. It was then that the transport miracle took place. In April 117,205 troops and 1,432 marines were embarked; in May 244,344 troops and 1,606 marines; and in June the numbers were 277,973 and 777. Before the 1st of July 1,000,000 men had been embarked.

Exceeded All Expectations.

The July record exceeded all expectations, the number of troops embarked being 306,185, and before the end of October the second million men had sailed from our shores. During the three months, June, July, and August, 875,753 men were embarked, and if May be added the total for the four months is 1,121,703. When the armistice was signed the total embarkations amounted to 2,045,169 troops and 30,665 marines.

No troop movement such as that of the last summer has ever been contemplated, and no movement of any such number of persons by water such a distance and in such a time has ever occurred. The performance stands unique in the world's history. Furthermore, this performance wrought a decisive effect upon the world's history at one of its great critical junctures.

Credit for this movement must be shared with the allies, and with the British in particular, since approximately half of the troops were carried in their ships.

Cargo Movement.

Altogether from our entrance into the war until the signing of the armistice the Army shipped from this side of the Atlantic 5,153,000 tons of cargo. Unlike the case with regard to the troop movement, the cargo was carried almost entirely in American bottoms, and less than 5 per cent was lifted by allied ships. Of all the cargo shipped, only 79,000 tons were lost at sea.

During the whole period of active hostilities the Army lost at sea only 200,000 deadweight tons of transports. Of this total 142,000 tons were sunk by torpedoes. No American troop transport was lost on its eastward voyage. For this splendid record the Navy, which arranged the convoy system, deserves the highest commendation.

At the cessation of hostilities the Army was using 12 French ports with a permanent assignment of 70 berths, and was

discharging supplies at the rate of 1,000,000 tons a month, a rate exceeding that maintained by the British during the period of their operations in France.

LINEAS OF COMMUNICATION IN FRANCE.

Trans-Atlantic shipping, however, was only one link in the chain of communications that had to be established between our home shores and the fighting front. Before our armies could function in the field, vast piers, docks, and warehouses had to be built at the French ports assigned to our use, and railroads with the necessary rolling stock had to be constructed or secured from the French. This tremendous task was assigned to the Army Engineers who had made such an enviable record for themselves in connection with the building of the Panama Canal.

Under the leadership of Maj. Gen. W. M. Black, Chief of Engineers, a program of construction was prepared, providing for the movement and supply in France of not less than 4,000,000 men, orders were placed for the vast quantities of material required, and immediate steps were taken to commence operations in France.

These operations involved the development of some 16 French ports located from the English Channel to the Mediterranean with such facilities as piers, unloading machinery, warehouses, and railroad yards; the repair, expansion, and maintenance of the standard gauge railroad assigned to our use by the French; the construction of narrow-gauge lines from the main line railheads to points near the trenches, and the provision of cars and locomotives to operate over these railroads to supplement the greatly depleted supply of French rolling stock. The orders placed up to November, 1918, on account of these projects amounted to \$700,000,000, a sum five times as great as all the purchases of material, equipment, and supplies made for the Panama Canal.

Of this huge sum, about \$400,000,000 is for American-built rolling stock, orders for which have been placed.

The Secretary here devotes a large part of his report to the detailed operations of the Ordnance Bureau, the Motor Truck and Air Service, the Production of Munitions Supplies, Quartermaster Department, Signal Corps, etc., all of which are treated in separate articles in THE OFFICIAL U. S. BULLETIN, and concludes his report as follows:

CONCLUSIONS.

Before closing this report I desire again to express regret for its insufficiencies. I am conscious of how far it falls short in the matter of just recognition of the accomplishments of my associates, of exhibiting in adequate measure the heroic achievements of our soldiers abroad, or of our soldiers and civilians at home, who have worked together to make this demonstration of America's purpose and efficiency successful. Perhaps a special word ought to be said in recognition of those who from civil life have come at the country's call to places of exacting toil and have been denied the opportunity to participate abroad in the heroic adventure, but have, nevertheless, worked on, some-

times in uniform and sometimes without even that badge of distinction. Theirs has been in an unusual degree the call to self-sacrifice, but they have been none the less soldiers and have contributed in no small way to whatever success has attended our arms.

Great Civilian Agencies.

The great civilian agencies, notably the Young Men's Christian Association, the Young Women's Christian Association, the Knights of Columbus, the Salvation Army, the American Library Association, the War Camp Community Service, and the Jewish Welfare Board, have served the young manhood of America with a helpfulness which passes all description. They have added the touch of home and affectionate interest. They have given comfort and diversion, they have helped to create and preserve the spirit of manliness and dignity of behavior and thought which have characterized our Army, and they have led our home communities in the formation of an environment in which alone such an Army could have been created. Perhaps one of the great gains of this war to us as a people will be found to be an added sense of community power which, when the war is over, will leave us with knowledge based on experience of the possibility of higher levels of living. America under the inspiration of this war need has demonstrated how much it is possible to do by common effort for the common benefit, and when the valor of our Army is remembered with pride and delight it will be a constant inspiration to us as a people to take the necessary pains to ennoble and strengthen the lives of the young in order that they may be as valiant in the contests of peace as they have been brave and sufficient in the contests of war. I am persuaded that we are bap-

tized with a new spirit, have discovered new energies in ourselves and look to a higher destiny and finer achievements by reason of the whole-heartedness with which we as a people have set ourselves above the thought of self and competition for reward, and devoted ourselves to the vindication of great ideals.

Refrains from Making Recommendations.

I have refrained in this report from making specific recommendations for future legislation for two reasons. In the first place, the signing of the armistice has not formally closed the war. We have at present a great military establishment which can not be immediately dissolved, and the activities of the department for some time at least must be concerned with what we have. In the second place, the peace conference is about to assemble and the military needs of the United States can not be prudently assessed until that conference shall have determined the future international relations of the world. The department will present to the Congress a plan for the maintenance of a Regular Army which shall continue as the nucleus of any future military establishments, pending the time when the experience through which we have gone can be digested and the future needs of the Nation maturely considered. In any case it is clear that the education of officers and a constant study of the science of warfare will be necessary, and it is my hope that the great Military Academy at West Point can be supplemented by an enlargement and broadening of the special schools which are at present organized, but should be made to take on more the character of postgraduate courses and to develop and train research specialists in the several arms. This subject, however, is one upon which casual comment is not

helpful, and I refer to it only because it seems the one clear indication from our experience as to our future policy.

This war has developed the need for new technical services in the Army, notably those dealing with aircraft, chemical warfare, and transportation, and the scale of military operations has led to the establishment of a Division of Statistics and Information, which ought to become a permanent part of our military organization. This will follow as a matter of course. The organization of the General Staff has now given us a staff system which has stood the test of mobilization and war, and in the future the function of the General Staff will be more clearly apprehended and its processes in times of peace more accurately based upon exact knowledge statistically recorded.

Appreciation of the Allies.

In conclusion, I beg permission to refer with grateful appreciation to the services rendered to the War Department and to the American Army by the officers of the Armies of Great Britain, France, and Italy, who were generously sent by their Governments to assist in the training of American troops, and with their expert technical knowledge to assist in the development of war matériel. If I may single out for particular comment one feature of this great enterprise, I desire to express through you the appreciation of the War Department and of the Army to the Navy Department and the Navy. The men of these sister services have braved together the perils of actual war, and the Army is happy to share with the men of the Navy and the Marine Corps the glory of having served together and with success in the cause of the country.

RAILWAY ADJUSTMENT BOARD NO. 3 ORGANIZED FOR BUSINESS

The United States Railroad Administration issues the following:

To all Railroad Companies:

In conformity with General Order No. 53, Railway Board of Adjustment No. 3 met in the city of Washington at its office, room 702-A, Southern Railway Building, Washington, D. C., and have organized and are ready for the transaction of such business as may come before it as provided in General Order No. 53.

The officers and members of this board are as follows: H. A. Kennedy, chairman; T. H. Gerrey, vice chairman; Richard P. Dee, E. A. Gould, S. N. Harrison, F. Hartenstein, G. E. Kipp, W. A. Titus.

Dates for Meetings.

The board has designated the following dates as the beginning of each of its regular monthly meetings during the remaining portion of the year 1918 and for

the year 1919: December 11, 1918, and January 8, February 5, March 5, April 2, May 7, June 4, July 9, August 6, September 4, October 1, and November 5, 1919.

Attention is called to the provisions of the memorandum of understanding annexed to General Order No. 53, as follows:

Rules for Taking up Controversies.

Article 10 provides the manner in which controversies will be submitted to the board through the Division of Labor of the United States Railroad Administration. Every case submitted should be accompanied by evidence that its submission is approved by the chief operating officer of the railroad upon which the controversy has arisen and by the chief executive officer of the organization concerned. Where two or more organizations are jointly concerned the submission should be joint, if practicable.

Article 11 expressly precluded a consideration by the railway board of adjustment No. 3 of any matter unless officially referred to it in the manner prescribed in the memorandum of understanding.

Article 14 requires that in each case an effort should be made to present a joint concrete statement of facts as to any con-

troversy. Statements of fact, whether joint or separate, should be sufficiently comprehensive to give an understanding of the controversy that the board is called upon to decide. Where briefs or additional evidence are to follow notice thereof should accompany the submission. Where additional matter is to follow the submission the case will not be transmitted to the board of adjustment by the Division of Labor until the additional data shall have been received.

Joint Concrete Statement.

It is requested that three copies of the joint concrete statement be filed with the Division of Labor for matter of record and for information of the board. Briefs and documentary evidence need not be furnished in duplicate, but whenever possible should be attached to the three copies of the joint statement.

It will be noted that supplement No. 6 to General Order No. 27, bearing date of August 30, 1918, has modified article 9 of General Order 53 to the extent that interpretations to wage orders will be issued in accordance with the provisions of supplements 6 and 6-A.

Recounting Navy's Unparalleled Achievements in War Secretary Daniels in Annual Report Urges Continued Building of Ships Under 3-Year Policy Adopted in 1916

Strongly urging the continued upbuilding of the Navy, in accordance with the policy adopted in 1916, by the authorization of another three-year program to cost \$600,000,000 and embrace 156 vessels, Secretary Daniels, in his annual report, reviews the growth and achievements of the Navy in the war.

"When the peace terms are signed and the agreement between all nations cements the blood-bought victory for permanent peace, the detailed story of the Navy's participation," says the Secretary, "will afford a new cause for gratification and give a greater thrill of pride when the world fully knows the many instances of splendid courage which could not be fully disclosed during the struggle and must be left for the historian to record."

Expansion Easily Accomplished.

Recalling the steps in preparedness taken before this country entered the war which enabled the Navy to be ready when the call came, and the notable accomplishments of the war period, which the House investigating committee pronounced "a remarkable record of achievement," Secretary Daniels ascribes this largely to the vision shown by Congress in the naval act of 1916, which provided a continuing three-year construction program and laid the broad basis for expansion of ships and personnel; to the efficient organization built up in the Navy Department, and to the teamwork that has characterized the entire service, afloat and ashore. Showing that no reorganization whatever has been required in the departmental machinery, which easily expanded to meet the demands of war, he points out that this system, embracing all the useful features of a general staff without its drawbacks, is a truly democratic system, "made in America," which has proved its worth in war even more clearly than in time of peace.

Record Without Precedent.

The record made abroad by the United States Navy, in cooperation with those of Great Britain, France, Italy, and Japan is, he says, without precedent in allied warfare. He pays a high tribute to the efficiency of Admiral Sims, commander in chief of United States naval forces in European waters; of Rear Admiral Rodman, in command of the American battleships with the British fleet; of Vice Admiral Wilson, in France; Rear Admiral Niblack, in the Mediterranean; of Rear Admiral Dunn, in the Azores; of Rear Admiral Strauss, in charge of mining operation, and other officers in charge of various special activities. Our forces in European waters, he says, now comprise 338 vessels, with 75,000 men and officers—a force larger than the entire Navy was before the war began. The Navy in its operations, he says, has "covered the widest scope in its history. naval men have served on nearly 2,000 craft that plied the waters, on submarines, and in

aviation." While "on land marines and sailors have helped to hold strategic points." "Regiments of marines have shared with the magnificent army their part of the hard-won victory, wonderfully trained gun crews of sailors have manned the monster 14-inch guns which marked a new departure in land warfare," while naval officers and men in all parts of the world did their full part in the operations "which marked the heroic year of accomplishment." While the destroyers have led in the antisubmarine warfare, the 406 submarine chasers, of which 235 were dispatched abroad, are given credit for efficient aid, as are also American submarines sent to foreign waters.

Overseas Transport Service.

The creation of the naval overseas transportation service and its growth in less than a year to a fleet of 321 cargo-carrying ships with 2,800,000 deadweight tonnage is reviewed, and it is pointed out that this service now requires 5,000 officers and 29,000 enlisted men, and is rapidly growing as new ships are completed by the Shipping Board and placed in commission.

The transportation of 2,000,000 American troops 3,000 miles overseas, with the loss of only a few hundred lives and without the loss of a single American troopship on the way to France is considered an unparalleled achievement, and Secretary Daniels gives testimony of the record made by the cruiser and transport force, under the direction of Rear Admiral Gleaves. From a small beginning this fleet expanded to 24 cruisers and 42 transports, manned by 3,000 officers and 41,000 men, these being augmented by 4 French men-of-war and 13 foreign merchant vessels, a grand total of 88 ships. In spite of the constant menace of submarines only three of these troopships were lost—the *Antilles*, *Lincoln*, and *Corington*, all sunk on the homeward voyage. Four naval vessels were lost as a result of submarine activity—the destroyer *Jacob Jones*, the converted yacht *Alcedo*, the Coast Guard cutter *Tampa*, sunk with all on board, and the cruiser *San Diego*, sunk in home waters by striking an enemy mine. The report recalls the loss of the collier *Cyclops*, whose disappearance is one of the unsolved mysteries of the seas.

Estimates for Next Year.

The estimates for the next fiscal year, which were submitted in accordance with the requirements of law, on October 15, before the armistice was signed, totaled \$2,644,307,046. But the Secretary states that the signing of the armistice will, of course, enable radical reductions to be made and that these be submitted later.

In urging a second 3-year program, including 10 battleships and 6 battle cruisers, the other 140 vessels to be of such types as the naval authorities shall determine are best as demonstrated by the experience of war, Secretary Daniels points out that this is merely a continua-

tion of the policy adopted in 1916, of constant and consistent development of the Navy. He reviews the building of destroyers and new records made in construction, the building of hundreds of submarine chasers, and the design and contract for 100 boats of the Eagle type being built in the Ford plant at Detroit.

Work on Capital Ships.

Work on capital ships to some extent necessarily suspended the previous year is now to be pushed, the Secretary states. He pays a high tribute to the ability and distinguished service of Rear Admiral David W. Taylor, Chief of the Bureau of Construction and Repair, and the personnel of the Construction-Corps. The vessels contracted for during the year are 4 battleships, 1 battle cruiser, 2 fuel ships, 1 transport, 1 gunboat, 1 ammunition ship, 223 destroyers, 58 submarines, 112 fabricated patrol vessels (including 12 for the Italian Government), 92 submarine chasers (including 50 for the French Government), 51 mine sweepers, 25 seagoing tugs, 46 harbor tugs, a large number of lighters, barges, and other auxiliary harbor craft, and in addition contracts have been placed for 12 large fuel ships in conjunction with the Emergency Fleet Corporation. Up to October 1, 1918, there had been launched 155 ships; in the first nine months of the year no less than 83 destroyers of 98,281 tons aggregate normal displacement, as contrasted with 62 destroyers of 58,285 tons during the entire nine years preceding 1918. New records have been made in destroyer construction, only 70 days having elapsed from the laying of the keel of the *Ward*, built in the navy yard at Mare Island, Cal., to the placing of the ship in commission, only 17½ days elapsing from the day of the laying of the keel to the launching of the ship. The "dazzle" painting of ships against submarine attacks is commended as superior to the camouflage, while the "battleship gray" is stated to be about the most desirable for all-around purposes. Up to October 1, 1918, not less than 1,127 vessels had been specially painted upon Navy Department designs. Salvage work has been fully organized and many damaged ships cared for.

Achievements in Engineering.

Secretary Daniels says that both on land and sea this has been very largely an engineering war, and he holds that electric propulsion of vessels, applied with complete success to the battleship *New Mexico*, is a great achievement in engineering. Commendation is given to "the vision and the wisdom of Rear Admiral Griffin, Chief of the Bureau of Steam Engineering, and his able assistants." The secretary gives an account of the repairing of German ships taken over, and says that electric welding solved the problem of saving the cylinders deliberately damaged by the Germans, the work done proving a complete success, it being estimated that \$20,000,-

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000 and a year's time was saved by the process.

Dry docks are declared a prime requisite, and it is stated that gratifying progress is being made. Legislation for navy yard development is urged, the Navy's policy being stated to be to construct every type of ship and every character of munition required in its own plants; extensive improvements in navy yards being reported. The work done in naval stations in foreign waters is detailed, as is also the aid given allied shipping.

The report tells of notable achievements in ordnance, especially the notable work of the 14-inch naval guns on railway mounts on the western front, which lurled shells far behind the German lines, these mounts being designed and completed in four months. The land battery of these naval guns was manned exclusively by blue jackets under command of Rear Admiral C. P. Plunkett. The work of the Bureau of Ordnance is praised, and Admiral Earle, the chief of the bureau, is declared "one of the ablest and fittest officers."

Mine Barrage in North Sea.

An account is given of the mine barrage in the North Sea, one of the outstanding antisubmarine offensive projects of the year, thus closing the North Sea; 100,000 mines were manufactured and 85,000 shipped abroad. A special mine-loading plant, with a capacity of more than 1,000 mines a day, was established by the Navy Department. A star shell was developed which when fired in the vicinity of an enemy fleet will light it up, make ships visible, and render it an easy target, without disclosing the position of our own ships at night. The Bureau of Ordnance, under the direction of Rear Admiral Earle, is stated to have met and conquered the critical shortage of high explosives which threatened to greatly prolong the time of preparation necessary for America to smash the German military forces, T. N. X., a high explosive being developed to take the place of T. N. T., this single unit of production being sufficient to increase the available supply of high explosives in this country to some 30,000,000 pounds.

Nonrecoil Aircraft Gun.

The work of the bureau in completing a successful Davis nonrecoil aircraft gun is declared to be "a great milestone in aircraft armament," and there is given an account of a heavy aeroplane bomb developed for antisubmarine warfare, and the protection of merchant ships by increased armament, naval gun production being stated to have kept pace with war needs, while the smokeless powder output was increased. In the future, it is stated, American dreadnaughts and battle cruisers will be armed with a 16-inch gun, making these the heaviest armed vessels in the world. Depth charges are stated to be the most effective antisubmarine weapon, and American vessels were adequately armed with this new weapon; a new type was developed, and a new gun, known as the Y gun, designed and built especially for firing depth charges. Great strides in torpedo production have been made. A new long-range proving ground on the

Potomac, near Machodoc Creek, Va., has been acquired. Training in gunnery and engineering has been carried out with eminent success. Thirty thousand marksmen a month have been trained in Navy small-arms work, and 40,000,000 rounds have been fired without an accident. This training has made sailors competent infantrymen, while the Navy rifle ranges have been opened for use by civilians.

The Navy That Flies.

"The Navy that flies," is given special reference, it being stated that the expansion of naval aviation has been of gratifying proportions and effectiveness, many air stations being established at home and abroad. In this branch of the service the total enlisted and commissioned personnel on July 1, 1918, was about 30,000, with 823 trained naval aviators, some 2,052 student officers, 400 ground officers, 7,300 trained mechanics, and 5,400 mechanics in training. Naval aircraft has been a big factor in the war, and "aircraft has come to stay" says Secretary Daniels, who plans for its permanency and development. The work of women as well as men in aircraft production is commended.

When war was declared the Navy numbered 65,777 men. On the day Germany signed the armistice this had increased to 497,030 men and women. Referring to the excellent work done by the women who enlisted, the Secretary says: "A woman who works as well as a man ought to receive the same pay, and that policy has been carried out by the Navy."

Over 2,000 Vessels in Service.

When war was declared there were 197 ships in commission; now there are 2,008 vessels in service, and they have been furnished with trained officers and men, "and how fit they were all the world attests." In this connection Secretary Daniels says: "Too much credit can not be given to Rear Admiral Leigh C. Palmer, the brilliant Chief of the Bureau of Navigation, for the foresight, executive ability, enthusiastic measuring up to the great demand and the hearty cooperation secured from the naval personnel from top to bottom," both at home and abroad. The value of the Naval Reserve is emphasized and the evolution which brought this into being as an essential part of the Navy is recounted. From a small enrollment when the war broke out, this grew to 85,473 by April, 1918, and now numbers about 290,000. The officer personnel of the Navy is stated to be on a sound basis, appropriate legislation providing for this, the Navy having made ready to secure men and officers before the war was launched. The promotion of enlisted men to officers is declared to have been given careful attention and was provided for by a system of examination and special training.

Health Record Excellent.

For the excellent health record of the Navy due credit is given the Medical Corps and Rear Admiral William C. Braisted, the Surgeon General. The number of surgeons has increased from 327 to 3,074; of dentists, from 30 to 485; woman nurses, from 160 to 1,400; while the Hospital Corps has grown from 1,535 to 14,718 enlisted men. Navy base hospitals were established in England, Scotland, Ireland, and France, and extensive hos-

pitals created with from 300 to 600 beds. Scattered throughout France and Great Britain were numerous naval dispensaries, and on the ships sick bays were maintained. Navy doctors were assigned to all troop ships and rendered valuable service. Navy hospitals, increased from a capacity of 3,000 beds to upward of 17,000, are declared to have done splendid work of the most advanced character.

The Commission on Training Camp Activities and other agencies are highly praised for their efforts for the comfort of men in camps and their moral and material welfare. The constant warfare against vice and the creation of zones of protection are reviewed, and attention is called to the establishment of the inter-departmental social hygiene board in the effort to abate and prevent vice diseases throughout the country.

Declaring that punishment for military offenses in war must be swift and sure, Secretary Daniels says, "But even in war the policy has been to mend, not break, prisoners." Though the number of trials by courts-martial in the first year of war increased from 3,241 to 5,116, this was merely a reflection of the great increase in personnel, there having been a decrease in the percentage of trials in comparison with the number of men in service, the increase in number enlisted being 331 per cent and in trials only 161 per cent. The discipline in prisons is reported as excellent.

Bureau of Supplies.

The conduct of the Bureau of Supplies and Accounts, under Rear Admiral Samuel McGowan, Paymaster General, has, Secretary Daniels says, "won the enthusiastic approval of the most successful business men in America and commanded admiration abroad." "The Navy," he says, "has won new honors as a business institution, the supply system having met every situation with full 100 per cent promptness and efficiency. Purchasing was made on an enormous scale, the greatest total value bought in any prewar year being \$27,000,000, while the greatest one day's purchase was over \$30,000,000. Every safeguard has been employed against imposition, fraud, and profiteering, and prices have been kept down to the lowest possible figure. The high standard of food and clothing has been maintained, and special outfits of clothing designed and furnished for rigorous sea service. During the year the fleet was supplied with over 4,000,000 tons of steaming coal, more than 4,500,000 barrels of fuel oil, and 11,500,000 gallons of gasoline."

Secretary Daniels pays tribute to the patriotic captains of industry, saying that the big naval program for the war could not have been successfully carried out without the hearty cooperation of shipbuilders, munition manufacturers, and the representatives of scores of allied industries. The Navy Department, the Secretary says, is in full appreciation of these men for their wonderful accomplishment, their devotion to their country having given practical demonstration of their patriotism.

Relations with Labor.

The relations between labor and the Navy Department is declared to have been, highly satisfactory during the past

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year, and the Secretary says that much of this satisfactory condition is due to the loyal cooperation of the heads of the American Federation of Labor. He says "the department feels it may take some credit to itself for this condition of affairs on account of the principle it has established during the last five years of frank dealing with men of labor and by the rule that any grievance could be brought, without red tape or formality, directly to the attention of the Secretary of the Navy at any time for investigation and correction." The attitude of the department has been that there are no labor problems incapable of solution, the Secretary declares, and adds:

"The credit for the achievements of the Navy under stress of war is in large measure due to the skilled mechanics and other workers in shipyards and munition plants, and the men in overalls deserve the thanks of America for their service."

The Valiant Marine Corps.

Secretary Daniels pays high tribute to the Marine Corps, declaring that "this efficient fighting, building, and landing force of the Navy has won imperishable glory in the fulfillment of its latest duties upon the battle fields of France, where the Marines, fighting for the time under Gen. Pershing as a part of the victorious American Army, have written a story of valor and sacrifice that will live in the brightest annals of the war." With only 8,000 men engaged in the fiercest battles, the Marine Corps casualties number 69 officers and 1,531 enlisted men dead, and 78 officers and 2,435 enlisted men wounded seriously, but that with a casualty list that numbers nearly one-half the original 8,000 men who entered battle, the official reports account for only 57 United States marines who have been captured by the enemy. May 30, as a Memorial Day will, so says the Secretary, henceforth have a greater and deeper significance for America, for it was on that day of this year that the marines received their call to "the battle in which American troops had the honor of stopping the German drive on Paris, throwing back the Prussian hordes in attack after attack, and beginning the retreat which lasted until Imperial Germany was beaten to its knees and its emissaries appealing for an armistice under the flag of truce."

Exploit at Chateau Thierry.

Chateau Thierry has become a name ever to be remembered in America, for it was there in the battle field of Bois de Belleau, now named the Bois de La Brigade de Marine by official order of the French staff, that the Americans met the Germans and blocked their drive on Paris. The Secretary gives an extended account of the fierce fighting on that memorable field and cites the praise given by the French staff and the congratulations given by Gen. Pershing, and also gives an account of the other battles in which the marines played a glorious part. He states that in Haiti and Santo Domingo the marines are also doing a great service, and that in aviation they have rendered material service along certain lines of the allied western front. "The Marine Corps," he says, "depends mainly for its officers upon men promoted from the ranks," and he refers to the efficiency

of the officers' training camp established at Quantico, Va. In closing his remarks about the Marine Corps, the Secretary says: "The administration of this fine corps under the direction of Gen. George Barnett, major general commandant, the best type of the marine whose service in the field equals his services as an executive, and his able associates, has been worthy of the unstinted commendation given by Europe and America."

Coast and Geodetic Survey:

In his report the Secretary tells of the work done for the Navy by the Coast and Geodetic Survey, the War Industries Board, and various other war boards, the Naval Consulting Board, the Council of National Defense, the American Red Cross, the Bureau of Standards, and the Committee on Public Information.

In conclusion, the Secretary says: "The epoch-making story of the Navy in this heroic year is yet to be written. I have sought only to present the most notable achievements and to pay tribute to the whole-hearted and incomparably efficient performance of duty of the half million men responsible for the record that has been made. No account written before the complete report of accomplish-

ment is at hand can adequately express the service the Navy has rendered.

"The very phrase, 'the Navy of the United States,' has to-day a new significance. It means not only ships and crews, not only material and personnel—it connotes a spirit invisible but potent, a spirit that has enriched our national life, that has vitalized our national thinking, that has widened our contact with national problems, and thus by community of interest has bound us together in a closer and more resolute union. In thousands of American homes to-day where our Navy was a mere word in 1913 it has become a symbol not only of daring but of unselfish endeavor and high constructive purpose. It has entered into the national consciousness as part and parcel of the twin concepts America and Americanism. It had already linked itself inseparably with our past; it now is no less a part of our future. Nations and people, too, that knew of the Navy of the United States only by hearsay or random incidentally know it now as the organized will of a free people prompt to heed the call of right against might, tireless in effort, fertile in resource, happy in cooperation, and unyielding till the ultimate goal be won."

Reports having been made that at some post offices THE OFFICIAL U. S. BULLETIN is not being posted regularly for public reading in accordance with Postmaster General Burleson's orders, postmasters are again reminded of this important duty. It should be remembered that THE BULLETIN is the only publication available to all sections of the country that prints daily the complete and correct casualty lists from our armies overseas exactly as they are issued by the War Department. Many newspapers print only the lists having local interest in their own territory. THE BULLETIN prints every name and address, thus making it a certain means of informing friends and relatives, wherever they may be, of the fate of a soldier or sailor, no matter where his home town or city.

Postmasters are urged, aside from their duty as officials, to make it their patriotic and personal duty to see that the public has the fullest benefit of this privilege.

The Postmaster General's order follows:

All postmasters are directed to post THE OFFICIAL U. S. BULLETIN daily in a conspicuous place in the lobby or other portion of their respective post-office buildings where the public can read it; and, without expense to the Government, each and every postmaster is earnestly urged to see that this BULLETIN is made available to as many people as possible in the manner suggested.
