## HOW DRAFT BOARDS CAN HELP IN RETURNING THE SOLDIERS TO INDUSTRIAL EMPLOYMENT

STATEMENT BY SECRETARY OF WAR

*Department Hopeful That Boards  
Will Retain Voluntary Organiza-  
tion and Cooperate with Depart-  
ment of Labor and Other Activities.*

The War Department authorizes publication of the following:

Press interviewed by the Secretary of War.

"I am very anxious to have the policy of the War Department understood with regard to the relations between the draft boards and the return of soldiers to labor opportunities.

### Field for Draft Boards.

"The department is hopeful that the draft boards throughout the country will remain voluntarily organized and associated, and as such continue their interest in the returning soldiers, affiliating themselves with the employment representative of the Department of Labor so that he can bring together in each community all the agencies which have interest in the soldier and have opportunities for bringing them into contact with places of employment, and not have competing agencies. I am particularly anxious to have the draft boards assume that function of bringing themselves into contact with the proper labor representatives so that they can continue their interest in the soldiers and help them to return to places of profitable occupation.

### General Plan Suggested.

"The War Department has not asked the draft boards to assume this duty officially because it would have created a competing agency. This work should be under the jurisdiction of the Department of Labor. The Labor Department has in every community of the country a field representative, and there are also in every community agencies like industrial committees, chambers of commerce, rotary clubs, labor unions, all of which have facilities for getting into communication with labor and industrial opportunities and also have special interests in the soldier. It would seem better to have the Department of Labor representative acting as a kind of president of these various groups, bringing them all into cooperation so that a soldier would not be passed from one to another, but each soldier have that agency aiding him which is best adapted to his particular case, and the distribution systematically done by the Department of Labor representative."

## TREASURY REQUIREMENTS AND NEW LOAN DISCUSSED IN STATEMENT BY MR. GLASS; CONTINUED THIRFT URGED UPON PUBLIC

### All Remaining Priority Restrictions are Lifted Effective on January 1

### Credit of \$250,000,000 for Great Britain Under Plan To Supply Needs of A. E. F.

The Treasury announces an additional credit to Great Britain of \$250,000,000, making the total advanced to that country \$4,195,000,000, and the grand total to the allies, \$8,464,542,702.

The latest credit to Great Britain is made under an agreement that the latter will furnish the United States Treasury the equivalent in sterling to meet the requirements of the American Expeditionary Forces.

### Called to Paris as Advisors To the Peace Commission

Vance G. McCormick, chairman of the War Trade Board, and Bernard M. Baruch, chairman of the War Industries Board, have been called to Paris as advisers of the Peace Commission. They will advise on questions as to raw materials, blockade, and trade restriction matters, etc.

### TASKS REMAINING TO BE FULFILLED

*Government Needs Make It  
Imperative That There Be  
No Relaxation Into Waste-  
ful Habits Because of Im-  
pending Peace — None  
Should Part With Bonds  
Already Held—New Issue  
Before End of Fiscal Year.*

The Treasury Department issues the following statement by Secretary Glass:

In assuming the office of Secretary of the Treasury, I desire to say a few words to the American people, and particularly to the splendid organizations of men and women whose unselfish labors, under the leadership of my great predecessor, have made the story of our war finance one of the most glorious chapters in the history of America's part in the war.

Millions of Americans have contributed in the most vital, tangible, and necessary way to the winning of the war. They have loaned their dollars to their country with no small sacrifice of personal comfort and enjoyment, and have given largely of personal effort and service.

#### Billion Dollars a Month.

For all time we have disproved the slander that Americans are a money-loving people, incapable of rising above materialistic things. In the 18 short months of the war the American people subscribed for \$18,000,000,000 of Liberty bonds and war-savings certificates. The banking institutions and the people of the country financed the requirements of the war in anticipation of the Liberty loans, and of the taxes for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1918, by the purchase of a total of \$12,500,000,000 of Treasury certificates of indebtedness, all of which had been retired or provided for out of taxes or bond issues at the time the armistice was signed.

#### Obligations to Be Met.

The expenditures of the Government, excluding transactions in the principal of the public debt, during the current fiscal year, beginning July 1, 1918, to and including December 16, 1918, exceeded \$9,600,000,000. Expenditures in the month of November nearly equalled \$2,000,000,000, and in the current month of Decem-

ber, to and including December 16, exceeded \$1,000,000,000. The proceeds of the fourth Liberty loan so far received have all been spent, and the remaining installments payable on subscriptions to that loan will be needed to meet maturing Treasury certificates of indebtedness issued in anticipation of that loan, and as yet unpaid. Since the armistice was signed, Secretary McAdoo has estimated that the cash outgo from the Treasury during the current fiscal year ending June 30, 1919, will amount to \$18,000,000,000, and much more than half of that amount has already been expended in the five and one-half months which have elapsed. The treaty of peace has not yet been signed, nor any important part of our Army demobilized. Production of war materials and supplies had reached the peak at the time the armistice was signed, and the bills incurred during that period of maximum production must be paid.

#### Another Short Term Loan.

The Treasury must issue another large loan before the end of the fiscal year, and I am entirely in accord with the policy already outlined—that this loan should take the form of bonds of short maturities.

It is vitally important that the Treasury should continue in a most energetic way the sale of War Savings Stamps and Certificates. Among the valuable and much-needed lessons we have partly learned from the war is that of thrift and intelligent expenditure. Thrift helped to win the war and will help us to take full advantage of a victorious peace. It is therefore imperative that we do not relax into old habits of wasteful expenditure and imperative that the habit of reasonable living (on the part of those of both large and small means) so easily acquired during the war period, be continued.

#### Owners Should Retain.

Millions of our people have become holders of bonds of their Government, but some of them seem to feel that they are under no further obligation to retain these bonds and they are selling them and using the money for unnecessary purposes or exchanging them for other securities of very doubtful value. So long as the United States needs to sell bonds those who hold the present issues should not dispose of them except under the spur of urgent necessity. They have invested in the best security in the world, and it is both to their own interest and to that of their Government that these securities be retained.

Organizations of patriotic men and women numbering probably well over 2,000,000 have been created and have given their time and services to the sale of Liberty Bonds and War Savings Certificates. These great bodies of earnest and patriotic people, called together almost at the outset of the war and augmented continually by new recruits, have accomplished a task which seems almost superhuman. My admiration is great not only for the work accomplished, but for the spirit in which it was accomplished. It is my earnest wish to retain and continue these great organizations until the work has been completed.

We face this work at a time when we are handicapped in many ways. There is no doubt that there is throughout the

Gentlemen: It is probable that in the course of the next few months the work of many of the diplomatic missions will materially decrease and that the members of the respective staffs who are not in the permanent service will return to their previous work or seek new careers. When the time comes for such members of your staff to sever their connections, the Department desires you to express in the name of the Secretary of State his cordial appreciation of the services rendered to the Government during the critical period of the war and his best wishes to them for success in their new careers. At the same time the Secretary of State wishes you to convey to them the hope that their interest and cooperation in the development and improvement of the foreign service will not be decreased by reason of the fact that they are no longer personally connected with it.

country a feeling of relaxation—a feeling of self-satisfaction at the work already performed and a strong and not unreasonable call to take up once more individual and business interests and activities. The organizations were prepared for the task which would have confronted them had the war continued throughout the year 1919, or longer, and I am confident that despite these handicaps they will not now relax their efforts and leave the task unfinished. Victory has come to us earlier than we might reasonably have expected, but victory will not cause us to neglect the completion of that work which made victory possible. Our men on the other side still have their work before them and so have we. They will not leave until the task is fully accomplished, nor shall we.

I am sure then that the Treasury Department can, with confidence, offer another Liberty loan, and continue the sale of War Savings Certificates, knowing that the organizations will respond once more to the call for service and will at once prepare the ground and sow the seed so that the harvest may be abundantly fruitful.

#### PERSIAN PEACE DELEGATION.

The Persian delegation to the peace conference as announced in State Department advices comprises Moshaverol Memelemp, the minister for foreign affairs, accompanied by Entazamolmolk, chef de cabinet; the secretary to the minister, Mirza Hussein Khan, who formerly held the portfolio of agriculture and commerce; and Zoka Olmolk, who was formerly in charge of the ministry of justice.

## REDUCTION IN FOOD WASTAGE AT CAMPS DURING NOVEMBER

The War Department authorizes the following from the Office of the Director of Purchase and Storage:

A reduction in food waste of 4 pounds per man was made at Camp Dix, N. J., during the month of November. The same reduction was found at Camp Merritt, N. J., while the November report shows that at Fort Slocum a reduction from the previous month of approximately 7½ pounds per man was made. This means a total saving in mess waste of 217,000 pounds for the above-mentioned camps, and is due to the efforts which the salvage division has been making to cut down or eliminate waste.

At Camp Upton there was a decrease in mess waste for November over the previous month of approximately 5 pounds per man; and at Rockwell Field, San Diego, Cal., approximately 12 pounds per man; and at Fort Crook approximately 2 pounds per man. In three months the bread waste at Camp Crook has been brought down from 8 per cent to 1½ per cent. At Camp Sheridan, although the increase in strength was only 5 per cent, the increase in revenue from garbage sales was 43 per cent. Mess waste was reduced approximately ½ pound per man, a total saving of 23,000 pounds for the month. At Fort Logan, Colo., there was a decrease of 9½ pounds per man in mess waste over the report for the preceding month. Other camps have been showing proportionate decreases.

## LETTISH PEOPLE ASK ALLIES FOR AID AGAINST BOLSHEVIKI

### Left Unarmed by Retiring Germans and at the Mercy of Pillaging Bands.

Allied assistance for the Lettish Republic in fighting the Bolsheviki is applied for in a request which the local representatives of the Lettish Government have made to the United States through the American Legation at Stockholm.

During the German occupation, the Germans refused to allow the Letts to organize their own army or even their own police or militia and the Germans in retiring now are carrying on the movement in such a way that small bands of Bolsheviki troops advance immediately behind them along the road. The Lettish people, having no arms and ammunition, in the short time after German retirement, find it difficult to organize a defense so that the Bolsheviki, meeting no opposition, strengthen their positions in various centers without resistance.

#### Pillage as They Advance.

The Bolsheviki in their advance are taking hostages, pillaging the country, and levying contributions on the wealthier people, and are performing the terroristic acts for which they are so well known. They have now reached about 60 miles east of Riga, and unless checked can soon overrun Finland and Courland.

The Lettish representatives contend that the Germans purposely hand over this territory to the Bolsheviki with a view to having the people of those territories, unless allied assistance is given to drive out the Bolsheviki, apply to the Germans for help, with resulting German hold on that region.

#### Say Germans Violate Armistice.

The Lettish representatives state that they did not anticipate this situation, as the Germans, according to the terms of the armistice, were to leave their troops in these territories until the allies requested them to withdraw them, and the Germans, they say, are not observing this clause of the armistice.

## REPORTS GERMAN PROPAGANDA AIMED AT U. S. STILL ACTIVE

State Department advices indicate that the German propoganda, at the head of which is Prof. Brinckmann, is still carrying on work aimed against America. Information reaching the department is to the effect that he is being liberally supplied with money and that a very vicious anti-American document is being put out by Brinckmann's bureau, together with numerous other anti-American publications. The propoganda is the same as was being carried on from The Hague during the war, and it is being kept up as vigorously as before, the money to pay the expenses of the propoganda office being expended through German official channels.

## MODIFICATION OR REMOVAL OF IMPORT RESTRICTIONS ON VARIOUS COMMODITIES

The War Trade Board announces, in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 434), that W. T. B. R. 237, issued September 21, 1918, to the effect that all licenses for the importation of silk noils, silk-noil yarns, garnetted stock, and silk waste (tariff pars. 311, 312, and 599) would contain the provision that the bill of lading be indorsed to the Silk Association of America, has been rescinded. Licenses may now be issued freely for the importation of these commodities without such provision.

#### Hides, Skins, Leather, Tanned Skins, and Manufactures of Leather.

The War Trade Board announces, in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 435), that all restrictions upon the importation of all grades of hides, skins, leather, tanned skins, and manufactures of leather have been removed, and that licenses will hereafter be issued freely for the importation of these commodities. The control exercised by the War Trade Board over these commodities through the tanners' council is continued.

#### Shellac, Button Lac, Seed Lac, Garnet Lac, and Keerie.

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 438) that the restriction placed upon the importation of shellac, button lac, seed lac, garnet lac and Keerie or refuse lac, announced in W. T. B. R. 202, issued August 15, 1918, has been removed and licenses may hereafter be issued freely when applications are otherwise in order. This does not affect War Trade Board regulations governing the distribution of the above commodities in this country.

### Extent of Discrepancies In Casualties Reports

The War Department authorizes the following statement:

During the week ending at noon December 18 the discrepancies between Gen. Pershing's report of casualties and those published by the War Department have been reduced to the following:

Major casualties (including killed in action, died of wounds, died of disease and died of other causes), 1,680.  
Wounded, 64,862.  
Missing and prisoners, 350.

A large proportion of the 64,862 names listed as wounded are cases of slight wounds, and many patients have long since recovered and been returned to duty.

The above discrepancies are further reduced by the fact, just ascertained upon inquiry from France, that Gen. Pershing's figures included the casualties to members of the Marine Corps. These numbered 1,202 men killed in action and more than 4,000 wounded.

#### Varnish Gums.

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 439) that the restriction placed upon the importation of varnish gums announced in W. T. B. R. 254, issued October 9, 1918, has been removed and that licenses may now be issued freely, where applications are otherwise in order, to import varnish gums (Kauri, Copal, Damar, Zanzibar, Manila, Congo, Pontianak, Bengurilla, Sandarac, and East India or Borneo gum).

#### Copper Ore.

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 428) that the regulations governing the importation of copper ore and copper concentrates, announced in W. T. B. R. 249, October 4, 1918, have been modified and that henceforth they will consider applications for license to import copper ore and copper concentrates as follows:

1. For copper ore originating in and coming from Korea, Newfoundland, the West Indies, France, England, the west coast of South America, Cuba, Canada, and Mexico, irrespective of the content of copper.
2. For copper ore originating in and coming from Spain only when containing more than 2 per cent of copper.
3. For copper concentrates from Cuba, Canada, and Mexico, irrespective of the content of copper.
4. For copper concentrates from any nonenemy country other than Cuba, Canada, and Mexico, only when containing 50 per cent or over of copper.

There is no restriction upon the importation of copper matte or blister copper.

#### Mahogany.

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 429) that the limitations placed upon the importation of mahogany logs and mahogany lumber, announced in W. T. B. R. 222 of September 12, 1918, have been removed and licenses may now be issued freely.

#### New Zealand Fiber.

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 430) that the restriction upon the importation of New Zealand fiber, announced in W. T. B. R. 337, issued November 30, 1918, has been removed and licenses may henceforth be issued freely without limitation as to quantity or character of vessel upon which the shipment is made.

#### Cocoa Beans.

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 431) that the restriction placed upon the importation of cacao or cocoa beans, announced in W. T. B. R. 163, issued July 11, 1918, has been removed and that licenses may henceforth be issued freely, provided applications are otherwise in order.

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## KING OF GREECE DECORATES AMERICAN CHIEF OF STAFF

His Majesty, the King of Greece, has conferred upon Gen. Peyton C. March, Chief of Staff, the Great Cross of George the First, the honor coming through M. Georges Roussos, Minister of Greece, at Washington, in the following letter:

"I have the honor and pleasure to inform you, on receipt of instructions from our Government, that His Majesty, the King of Greece, in recognition of your eminent services that you have rendered with such distinction, not only to your country but also to the common cause of the allies, in preparing and organizing the wonderful American Army, which has so greatly contributed to the final victory over our enemies, has graciously been pleased to confer upon you the Great Cross of George the First.

"The insignia and diplomas have not yet reached the legation, but I am reserving myself the pleasure to express to you my admiration and congratulations when handing you the above, which I hope will be in a short time."

At the same time notification was received of the decoration of Col. Constant Cordier, Army General Staff, as Grand Commander of the Order of George the First, and Col. Edward Davis, United States Army, formerly military attache at Greece, as officer of the same order.

It is understood that Gen. Pershing is to be personally decorated with the Grand Cross of a high Greek order by Premier Venizelos, who is now in Paris.

In the letters of notification it was stated that the honors were given in consideration of distinguished services in the war against a common enemy.

### LOVING CUP FOR MARK L. REQUA.

The personnel of the Oil Division of the United States Fuel Administration presented Mark L. Requa, general director of the division, with a silver loving cup yesterday afternoon. The presentation speech was made by Frank J. Silsbee, director of the Statistical Bureau. Mr. Requa in accepting the cup, thanked his coworkers for their steadfast cooperation and close attention to their duties during his directorship.

## Distinguished-Service Medals Are Awarded to Four Army Officers

WAR DEPARTMENT,  
Washington, October 26, 1918.

General Orders No. 96:

I. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved July 9, 1918 (Bul. No. 43, W. D., 1918), the distinguished-service medal was awarded on October 10, 1918, to Col. Sedgwick Rice, Cavalry, for especially meritorious service in action against hostile Indians near the Catholic Mission on White Clay Creek, S. Dak., December 30, 1890, while serving as second lieutenant, 7th Cavalry.

II. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved July 9, 1918 (Bul. No. 43, W. D., 1918), the distinguished-service medal was awarded on October 11, 1918, to Col. Louis M. Maus, Medical Corps, retired (then first lieutenant and assistant surgeon), for specially meritorious service

on the Belle Fourche River, N. Dak., on November 5, 1877, in that while serving with a detachment suddenly surrounded by an overwhelming force of hostile Sioux Indians he succeeded in extricating the party from a most perilous position.

III. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved July 9, 1918 (Bul. No. 43, W. D., 1918), a distinguished-service medal was awarded September 30, 1918, to Maj. James B. Ord, Infantry, the United States Army, for exceptionally meritorious service to the Government in a duty of great responsibility as follows:

While serving as second lieutenant, 6th Infantry, attached to the 13th Cavalry, in action at Parral, Mexico, April 12, 1916, after being himself wounded, he dismounted from his horse under heavy fire, placed a wounded man on a horse, and assisted him from the field. [201, A. G. O.]

IV. By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved July 9, 1918 (Bul. No. 43, W. D., 1918), the distinguished-service medal was awarded September 30, 1918, to Col. Frank Tompkins, Infantry, United States Army, for exceptionally meritorious service to the Government in a duty of great responsibility, as follows:

Col. Tompkins (then major, 13th Cavalry, at Columbus, N. Mex., Mar. 9, 1916), having requested and received authority to pursue a superior force of bandits into Mexico, carried on, after being wounded, a running fight with said bandits for several miles, inflicting heavy losses upon the bandits and only stopping the pursuit when men and horses were exhausted and ammunition reduced to a few rounds per man. ## Thinks Peace Will Add To Work of Red Cross

Provost Marshal General Crowder is of the opinion that the work of the American Red Cross will be increased rather than diminished by the arrival of peace. Discussing the Christmas roll call of the Red Cross recently he made the following statement regarding the necessity of the organization continuing its work abroad and at home:

"The need for the Red Cross does not terminate with the cessation of hostilities—rather are its usefulness and its scope increased. With the war at an end the Red Cross must turn its hand to the rehabilitation of devastated Europe, not only in the late theaters of operation, but in all those fields just delivered from hostile occupation and among all those people who, for more than four years, have felt the heel of German oppression. To embarrass its activities at this time is to add misery to suffering."

## PROCEEDINGS OF THE CONGRESS BRIEFLY TOLD

### SENATE.

When the Senate adjourned yesterday Chairman Simmons, in charge of the war revenue bill, expressed confidence that the bill would be finally passed by Monday evening. By a vote of 54 to 22 the Senate late yesterday afternoon adopted the amendment providing for the repeal of the existing zone system of rates for second class mail matter. The committee's substitute provides for a rate of 1 cent a pound within 150 miles, and 1½ cents beyond that distance. The committee's proposed new rates on casualty, fire, marine, and other insurance companies other than life insurance also were adopted. All of the important provisions of the pending measure have now been disposed of, but the sections relating to income, war-excess profits, inheritance, and luxury taxes. Senator La Follette just before adjournment submitted his substitute bill, and addressed the Senate upon its provisions to-day.

Senator Lodge, ranking Republican Member of the Foreign Relations Committee, yesterday introduced the following resolution: "That the Secretary of State be directed to inform the Senate whether the report that the peace delegates of the United States at Paris are advocating the destruction of the ships surrendered to the allies and to the United States is correct, and, if so, by what authority the delegates to the peace conference are demanding the destruction of enemy property in part surrendered to the United States." It was ordered to lie on the table, Senator Lodge announcing his intention of addressing the Senate upon the subject.

The nomination of Joseph B. Eastman, of Massachusetts, to be a member of the Interstate Commerce Commission to succeed George W. Anderson, resigned, was sent to the Senate.

The commerce committee yesterday resumed its inquiry into conditions at the Hog Island shipbuilding plant. General Manager Piez, of the Emergency Fleet Building Corporation, was the principal witness, and told the committee of conditions at the yard.

The subcommittee of the Judiciary Committee investigating German propaganda work in this country continued its hearing yesterday with deputy attorney general of New York, Alfred L. Becker, on the stand. He resumed his testimony to-day.

Late yesterday afternoon the Senate ratified the trade treaty with Guatemala, which is similar to that recently ratified with Uruguay. It is designed to strengthen and develop commerce between the United States and this South American State.

With a view to recommending railroad legislation the committee on Interstate Commerce yesterday decided to begin hearings on January 2. Director General McAdoo will be the first witness heard and he will be followed by other officials of the Railroad Administration, officials of various State railway commissions, shippers organizations, chambers of commerce, and other associations interested in the subject. Each of these organizations will be asked to select a spokesman so that the work of the committee may be

expedited and legislation submitted to the Senate at as early a day as possible.

### HOUSE.

Before the Interstate Commerce Committee, W. B. Colver, chairman of the Federal Trade Commission, urged a stricter governmental control of the beef-packing industry of the country, but without Governmental acquisition of the properties. He denied that the packing industries had not had a fair hearing before the commission. Mr. Colver continued his discussion of the subject before the committee to-day.

Notice was given by Majority Leader Kitchen that on January 3 he would call up for consideration the Elections Committee report holding that James Wickersham, Republican, had been duly elected as a delegate from Alaska over Charles A. Sulzer, Democrat.

The Immigration Committee began consideration of pending bills to restrict immigration, but further consideration was postponed until January 9. Before the Naval Committee Maj. Gen. Barnett, of the Marine Corps, told of the work of that organization in the fighting in France. He said that only a small reduction in the size of the corps is planned during the coming year. The estimates call for 70,000 men, which is 5,500 less than the present strength.

The special committee appointed for that purpose yesterday began its investigation into the activities of the National Security League.

## DISCHARGED SOLDIERS APPLY TO ENTER MERCHANT MARINE

Three hundred applications a day from soldiers of the selective army wishing to enter the merchant marine on getting their discharge are being received by United States Shipping Board recruiting agents at Army camps, the board reports:

By authority of the War Department the board last week sent a representative of its Merchant Marine Recruiting Service to each of 30 cantonments to present to the soldiers there waiting release from military service official facts about opportunities for a career in the merchant marine.

### Majority Young Men.

Many of the responses are from men who followed the sea before being selected for military duty. A majority, however, are from youths who have never been to sea, but are drawn to a seafaring life by a spirit of adventure and a desire to embark on a career promising substantial rewards.

No actual recruiting of these men is done at the camps on behalf of the Shipping Board, but each applicant for sea service signs a card giving his qualifications and age. After his discharge he will be directed to a Shipping Board agency for actual enrollment as a sailor.

The board expects to secure by this means a large number of Simon-pure American sailors for the new merchant marine, as well as youths who may make seagoing a stepping stone to life work as steamship agents or trade representatives.

## Executive Order Allotting \$6,000,000 for The Purchase of Swedish Iron Ore Amended

### EXECUTIVE ORDER.

Amending the Executive order of June 29, 1918, allotting \$6,000,000 for the purchase of Swedish iron ore:

By virtue of the authority vested in me by "An act making appropriations to supply deficiencies in appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1917, and prior fiscal years, and for other purposes," approved April 17, 1917, appropriating the sum of \$100,000,000 "for the national security and defense, and for each and every purpose connected therewith" (and which appropriation was by act of Congress approved December 15, 1917, "continued and made available until June 30, 1918"), I do hereby amend the Executive order of June 29, 1918, allotting out of the sum appropriated as aforesaid, \$6,000,000 to be expended by the Secretary of Commerce for the payment of one-third of the purchase price of 2,000,000 tons of Swedish iron ore, so that said order shall read as follows:

"By virtue of the authority vested in me by 'An act making appropriations to supply deficiencies in appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1917, and prior fiscal years, and for other purposes,' approved April 17, 1917, appropriating the sum of \$100,000,000 'for the national security and defense, and for each and every purpose connected therewith' (and which appropriation was by act of Congress approved December 15, 1917, 'continued and made available until June 30, 1918'), I hereby order that out of said sum so appropriated there be allotted

"All moneys accruing to the United States on account of the sale or resale or other disposition of the Swedish iron ore hereinabove referred to shall be held subject to the order of the President and disposed of in such manner as he shall direct; and the Secretary of Commerce is hereby authorized to pay or to direct the payment to the proper authorities of the British Government or the proper authorities of the French Government, as the case may be, of such part of said moneys as shall be necessary to defray one-half of the purchase price of not exceeding 245 tons of molybdenum concentrates, heretofore purchased or contracted to be purchased by the British Government in Norway during the present war, and one-third of the purchase price of not exceeding 42,000 tons of low phosphorous iron ore purchased by the French Government in Sweden during the present war, and, further, to pay or to direct the payment to said authorities of such part of said moneys as shall by the War Trade Board be determined to be the share properly payable by the United States of the purchase price of any other commodity or commodities which, in the opinion of the War Trade Board, have been purchased by said Governments, or either of them, during the present war for purposes connected with the blockade of Germany and her allies, and the expense of which should therefore, in the opinion of the War Trade Board, be shared by the United States."

## Fire Prevention Section Submits Final Report to Industries Board Reviewing Its Activities in Detail

B. M. Baruch, chairman of the War Industries Board, authorizes the following:

The Fire Prevention Section of the War Industries Board, of which W. H. Merrill is chief, has filed its final report with the board and has ceased to function. The section, which was created by direction of the President on recommendation of the Secretary of the Treasury, was charged with investigation of conditions existing in respect to fire hazard in privately owned property where material, machinery, or supplies used for war purposes were manufactured, handled, or stored.

During the 7 months of its activities, experts of the Fire Prevention Section inspected 2,444 munition plants having important Government contracts, each plant consisting of from 1 to 50 buildings, in which fire hazard conditions were summarized: Good, 1,840; fair, 258; poor, 237; bad, 109. Improvements were made in 347 plants, and are under way or recommended in 642 others.

In its work the Fire Prevention Section had the assistance of volunteer experts representing the leading stock and mutual fire insurance companies of the country, and the records and machinery of these companies were utilized. Henry Evans, New York, was chairman of this committee, other members being R. M. Bissell, Hartford, Conn.; F. C. Buswell, New York; John R. Freeman, Providence; John Marshall, Jr., Chicago; C. A. McCotter, Indianapolis; C. G. Smith, New York; S. Y. Tupper, Atlanta; and L. R. Welch, Fitchburg, Mass.

#### Departmental Committee Cooperation.

There was also a cooperating committee to the section with representatives from the Treasury, War, Navy, and Justice Departments, Shipping Board, Food Administration, United States Housing Corporation, and Railroad Administration.

The section rendered expert service on requests received from over 50 departments, bureaus, and divisions of the Government, covering such subjects as waterfront fire protection, fire prevention clauses in Government contracts, definition of Government policy in respect to financing improvements, lag in routing reports, certificates of information covering insurance inspectors, etc.

The Fire Prevention Section cooperated

with other sections and divisions of the War Industries Board in carrying forward a conservation and standardization program on a large number of fire appliances, and made recommendations on applications for priority certificates, clearances, and capital issues.

## STANDARDS FOR EMPLOYMENT OF WOMEN IN INDUSTRIES

The Department of Labor authorizes the following:

In peace or in war women's work is essential to the Nation. During the war the experience of all countries has shown that women were ready and able to take the places of men withdrawn for military service. So important did their work become that in Great Britain it was actually the War Department which declared that "efforts must be devoted to amplify and extend the scope of usefulness by which alone our country can hope to emerge victorious from a struggle without parallel in her long and glorious history."

The experience to which the war has drawn public attention was true before the war and will be equally true when peace is restored. Before the war the number of women gainfully employed increased in the decade before 1910 from five to eight million, of whom 2,500,000 were in manufacturing, trade, transportation, or public service. Since then the indications are that in numbers and proportions women have become increasingly important in industry.

### Greater Necessity for Control.

The greater necessity for control of the standards of women's employment is due to the fact that women have been in a weaker position economically than men. Reconstruction will give an opportunity for a new upbuilding of safeguards to conserve alike the industrial efficiency and the health of women, and to make it impossible for selfish interests to exploit them as unwilling competitors in lowering standards of wages, hours, working conditions, and industrial relations which are for the best interests of the workers, the industries, and the citizenship of the country.

During the war, by vote of the War Labor Policies Board, all contracts of the Federal departments have contained a clause requiring full compliance with State labor laws, and in each State an official of the State labor department has been deputized by the head of the contracting departments of the Federal Government to cooperate with Federal agencies in enforcing these provisions of the contract. This affords a basis and a precedent for continued relations between State and Federal agencies in the upbuilding of standards for women's labor.

### Importance of Standards.

As the number of contracts grows fewer with the coming of peace, the responsibility of the States increases. But the recognition of the national and international importance of standards of labor conditions will still be paramount, since in peace, no less than in war, the Nation will depend for its prosperity upon the productive efficiency of its workers. No other foundation for commercial success will be so sure as the conservation of those practices in industry which make for the free and effective cooperation of the workers. Protection of the health of women workers is vital as an economic as well as a social measure of reconstruction.

Therefore at this time, in recognition of the national importance of women's

## Tells How the Red Cross is Helping The American Soldiers in England

Gen. John Biddle, commander of the American Army in Great Britain, speaking recently of the Christmas roll call of the American Red Cross, said that everyone was taking it for granted now that the Red Cross could provide any kind of aid in the shortest possible time. In a message to the War Council he paid the following tribute to the organization:

### Great Help in England.

"I really do not know what the American Army would have done in England without the American Red Cross. Everywhere the Red Cross is giving the best that can be given or asked for. Our men are being cared for as well as they can be and are helped by the Red Cross in every way. The large hospitals in London, at Paignton and Salisbury, and the one at Mossley Hill, Liverpool, are some of the largest gifts. At all our camps throughout the British Isles it has given us many things which we either could not get from the Government or could not get without much delay.

"This work has been so well done that

nowadays everyone applies first to Red Cross whenever they want anything very particularly or very quickly. It seems to me that every time I leave London to go anywhere I see something new that the Red Cross has been doing. In the *Otranto* disaster the first thing we did was to go to the Red Cross for materials and supplies of various kinds, and when we sent a boat to look after survivors on the bleak island of Islay many provisions for the expedition came from the Red Cross. When we sent a large number of men to northern Russia a short time ago the Red Cross sent I don't know how many hundred tons of supplies.

### Gratitude of the Army.

"We in the Army all feel a gratitude to the Red Cross which it is hard for me to express in words. Without the Red Cross it would be impossible to have given the camps the comforts, conveniences, and happiness they have received in England. You have our hearty thanks for all you've done, are doing, and intend doing as long as there is an American soldier in England."
