



Explanation of Rehabilitation Plans Given to Each Disabled Soldier Upon His Return to U. S.

COMPENSATION FOR ALL

Statement by Surgeon General Ireland of Army Is Placed in Hands of All Ill and Wounded—Will Receive Warm Welcome, But Is Soldier Still and Should Continue to Act as One.

The War Department makes public the following statement by the Surgeon General of the Army, which is being put into the hands of every returned disabled soldier:

1. Upon your arrival at the port you will be sent to a debarkation hospital for a very brief stay. From there you will be sent to the general hospital, base hospital, or convalescent center, the nearest to your own home. Of course, when special treatment is required it may be necessary to have you sent to the hospital where there are facilities for this treatment. If your condition is such that you do not need hospital treatment, you will be sent to a convalescent center in an Army camp nearest your home until entirely recovered and ready for discharge.

Cure of Sick and Wounded.

2. In the cure of the sick and wounded soldier, not only the ordinary measure of medicine and surgery will be used, but also physical measures, such as are employed under physiotherapy; active exercises; indoor and outdoor games; massages and curative occupation in the hospital wards, curative workshops, and gardens. This treatment is for the purpose of correcting, as far as possible, the defects and disabilities of the soldiers.

3. The curative workshops are established to restore the use of injured parts of the body through useful work. The ankle joint, for instance, that has become stiffened through injury, is made to function again by exercise on a foot power machine such as a band saw, jig saw, printing press, etc. The patient while getting the curative exercises, has something to do which keeps his hands and head busy, takes his mind off his disability, and may be of educational value to him in his occupation.

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CONDITIONS AT BREST OUTLINED IN REPORT FROM GEN. HARBORD

"Were Very Bad But Are Improving Daily," Says Cablegram to Secretary Baker.

Press interview with the Secretary of War, January 3, 1919:

I have received from Gen. Harbord the following cable in regard to conditions at Brest:

"Climatic conditions at Brest due to daily rain are the worst of any port at our disposal in France, but the lack of deep water at other ports force certain ships to come to Brest, the one port they can enter. The policy of beginning the evacuation of our troops immediately after the armistice and the order to fill all available shipping forced the evacuation of troops through Brest before any construction works suitable to an embarkation camp could be completed.

"Work on this embarkation camp and on the necessary port facilities to convert a small port into a live embarkation port has been going on steadily for some time night and day. Conditions were very bad and are far from what we plan at the present time, but they are improving daily and the Inspector General, American Expeditionary Forces, within the past week reported that progress was good and conditions were satisfactory when the original conditions and the physical and climatic difficulties were considered.

"Work at Brest and St. Nazaire on these embarkation features have long had priority over practically all other work in France and this will continue until the embarkation features at both places have reached a satisfactory stage. The embarkation of troops in large numbers began through these ports at the same time as the construction of the embarkation and, therefore, the troops passing through in the early period could not have advantage of what we plan to give troops passing through these places in future."

All deep-draught vessels, such as the great British troop ships, the larger Navy ships such as the *Leviathan*, *George Washington*, *Mount Vernon*, necessarily must use the port of Brest, but smaller ships are calling at Bordeaux and St. Nazaire.

DISCHARGE OF MEN BEGUN FROM COMBATANT RANKS; TOTAL NOW DESIGNATED IN THE U. S. OVER A MILLION

LIST IS ANNOUNCED BY GENERAL MARCH

Nearly 300,000 Additional Men in France Assigned for Early Convoy—Status of Emergency Army Officers Desiring Commissions in the Regular Army Awaiting Congress Action. Casualties Among American Troops at Archangel. Questions and Answers.

Statement to the press by Gen. March, January 4, 1919:

The designation of men for release from the Army has reached a point now where we have come to the combatant divisions, and during the week I have authorized orders to be issued to begin the discharge of men from combatant divisions, and to proceed through them gradually. The number of men designated for discharge in the United States is now 1,004,000. The list follows:

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BILLION AND A HALF PAID IN SALARIES TO SOLDIERS BY ARMY FINANCE DIRECTOR; ANOTHER BILLION TO COME

DISBURSED IN CASH ALL OVER THE WORLD

How Vast Difficulties Encountered, Especially at Battle Front, Have Been Met and Overcome, Reviewed by Chief of Finance Division—Pay Cards and Pay Books Found Helpful to Men in Action. System in Cantonments and Hospitals.

The following statement is authorized by the Director of Finance of the Army:

Since April 6, 1917, there has been paid to the officers and enlisted men of the United States Army \$1,577,331,669.70. To this should be added \$116,782,994.81 paid in family allowances by the Treasury Department, making a total of \$1,694,114,664.51 paid to officers and soldiers and to soldiers' families up to date. It is estimated that it will require \$1,257,941,001.52 to pay officers and soldiers for the balance of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1919, and if the Dent bill providing an extra month's pay for discharged officers and men becomes a law, there will be added \$153,000,000 to the grand total, making the sum of \$3,105,055,666.03 paid out to officers, soldiers, and soldiers' families since April 6, 1917, without taking into account the amount for family allowances which will be paid to enlisted men's dependents between now and June 30, 1919.

Paid in Cash All Over World.

This money for the most part has been paid in cash to individuals, and has been disbursed in the United States, France, England, Italy, Porto Rico, the Canal Zone, Alaska, Hawaii, the Philippine Islands, China, Siberia, Archangel, and at the capital of every country in the world except enemy countries, and we possibly will soon be paying troops there.

The statement that pay of the Army has been disbursed at the capitals of all these countries is due to the fact that every military attache is an acting quartermaster, and as such pays all United States Army personnel connected with his office. During the Spanish-American War troops were paid every two months, while during the present war payments have been made monthly to forces scattered in a far-flung battle line around the world.

Paying at Cantonments.

In this country the cantonments, with inexperienced officers and men, made a somewhat trying pay problem that was soon solved, however, and during the past

year the big camps and cantonments have been paid in full at an average of the 5th of the month. In several of the cantonments, some of them containing from 40,000 to 60,000 men, payments were completed on the last day of the month in which the pay accrued, and in many others full settlement has been made on the 1st day of the succeeding month.

From December 1 to December 21, 1918, 500,000 enlisted men were discharged from the Army, and were paid in full without delay. This operation comprehended such factors as clothing money due, longevity pay, foreign-service pay, allotments to the Bureau of War-Risk Insurance, and allotments through the War Department system, all of which must be prorated, travel allowances, charges against the soldier for lost property, and many other matters requiring consideration under law and regulations. The final pay roll of a soldier, because of the requirements of law, Treasury Department decisions and regulations, is an intricate financial problem.

Problems Met Overseas.

The payment of troops overseas presented entirely new difficulties, the restrictions of law and regulations being further complicated by war conditions that relegated the matter of pay to the rear. It was impossible to pay troops in action, and the troops were not thinking of pay. When American troops arrived overseas they were hurried to the front and their baggage containing their records followed them when transportation was available. Then began rapid movements and consequently frequent separation at every point. In some cases organization commanders and their commands had records and baggage. In one or two cases trains proceeding toward the front were destroyed by aerial bombs, causing the destruction of baggage and records of troops.

To meet this condition an attempt was made to provide enlisted men with pay cards and pay books, so that if wounded or separated from their commands they would be able to establish their identity and secure their pay. The pay cards were available in July and the pay books were issued in November, but few of the casuals, wounded and sick, who have heretofore arrived from overseas, have either pay cards or pay books. In some cases without doubt the soldier when going into actual conflict, as is the American soldier's custom, stripped himself of everything that did not contribute directly to the task before him, and left his papers with the rest of the discard.

Records Forgotten in Battle.

Another phase of the situation that affected many of the casuals who have arrived in this country without records of any kind was the brigading of American troops with Belgian, French, British, and Italian organizations. Many hundreds of thousands of troops were moved between darkness and dawn, as it was vitally necessary to have a concentration of men at a given point, and in the teeth of a furious attack records were forgotten. When a man was wounded he was evacuated through Belgian, British, French, or Italian hospitals, and from there to the sea-board, and from there, as soon as he could be moved, to a transport and back home, while his records might be back near the front line, under control of officers and

BUNKER LICENSES FOR PLEASURE BOATS TO CRUISE BETWEEN UNITED STATES, BERMUDA, WEST INDIES

NOT PERMITTED TO CARRY CARGO

War Trade Board Makes New Ruling Setting Forth Conditions Under Which Permits Will Be Granted—Monthly Report Waived.

The War Trade Board announces, in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 478), that it is now prepared to issue bunker licenses to pleasure boats, not carrying cargo, valid for a period of three months, to cruise between ports of the United States, Bermuda, and the West Indies.

The licenses will be issued on the regular forms used for trip licenses, with such changes in phraseology as may be necessary. Bunker Form B-3, Master's Report on Voyage, and Bunker Form B-7, Affidavit and Agreement of Master of Vessel Governing Disposition of Cargo, will not be required.

The monthly report of fuel and supplies taken out of the country and the report of fuel consumed, heretofore required for all time licenses, will also be waived as a general rule, but applicants should place themselves in a position to furnish these reports if called upon to do so.

In presenting applications to agents of the Bureau of Transportation or collectors of customs on the regular application form (Bunker Form B-1-a) care should be exercised to outline fully the cruising radius of the vessel for which bunker license is applied for

men who were marching all night and fighting all day.

In the Argonne Forest one shell killed a noncommissioned officer and wounded 30 men belonging to a Field Artillery regiment. In the fighting at this point one battalion of this regiment lost five officers in one day's fighting. The wounded were immediately sent through the various hospitals, and many to the port of debarkation and on to the United States without at any time coming within hailing distance of the records of the regiment, which in this case were well up to the front. In the rapid advance made the regiment was ignorant of what had happened to those who were wounded. They knew that they were wounded or had disappeared from the line.

Orders to Bring Papers.

Orders were issued overseas that no wounded or sick soldier should be allowed to go aboard a transport for transportation back to the States unless he was provided with all his papers, so that he could be paid on his arrival here, and if it was found necessary to discharge him that he could be given his final pay in full, including his travel allowances. It evidently was found impossible to hold these casuals for an indefinite time at the port of embarkation in France when the men themselves were eager to reach home, and military policy dictated that they should be returned to the United States as soon

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SPECIAL EXPORT LICENSES FOR SHIPMENTS TO CONSULS GIVEN TO CUSTOMS SERVICE BY THE WAR TRADE BOARD

**INCLUDES ARTICLES
FOR PERSONAL USE**

**May Be Consigned to Any
Diplomatic Employee of
U. S. Stationed Abroad
but Not to Members of
Expeditionary Forces.
Applies Also to Parcels
Sent Through Post Office.
Import Rules of Coun-
try of Destination Re-
quired to Be Observed.**

The War Trade Board announces, in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 468), that special export license No. RAC-64 has been issued to the Customs Service and to the Post Office Department authorizing the exportation without individual export license of shipments of any commodity when consigned to and for the personal use of diplomatic, consular, or other officials, or employees of the United States stationed abroad.

Shipments to Soldiers.

This license does not, however, authorize the exportation of shipments to members of the American Expeditionary Forces or of organizations affiliated therewith. Such shipments must continue as heretofore to be made under special export license No. RAC-43 and in accordance with the regulations of the War Department. Information concerning license No. RAC-43 may be obtained from any post office.

Shippers should note that it is unnecessary to apply to the War Trade Board for permission to ship under special export license No. RAC-64 and no special document issued by the War Trade Board is necessary in connection with such shipments. It is only necessary to note on the package, if the shipment is made through the mails, or on the export declaration, if the shipment is made by express or freight, the following:

1. Shipped under special export license RAC-64.
2. Name and address of shipper.
3. The name and address of consignee (stating his title or the nature of his occupation).
4. A statement of contents.

Must Observe Import Rules.

Attention is called to the fact that special export license number RAC-64 does not relieve the shipper of the responsibility of complying with the import restrictions of the country of destination. In order that the importance of obtaining information concerning such restrictions may be realized it should be

TYPHUS SPREADING IN RUSSIA, THE STATE DEPARTMENT HEARS

Advices reaching the State Department state that typhus is spreading in Russia. Two hundred and sixty cases are reported from Ekaterinburg, 700 at Chibabinsk, and 200 deaths in Tomsk during December. Irkutsk reports 450 cases. The disease is prevalent among the civilian as well as military population.

The disease is very prevalent in the Bolshevik prison camps, a lesser number in the Austro-German camps, and 30 among the Czech soldiers at Ekaterinburg are reported.

A report from Tumen says that Miss McBride, an American Red Cross nurse, died of the disease there last week.

REMOVING INVALID SOLDIERS FROM GROUNDED U. S. TRANSPORT

The War Department on Friday authorizes the following statements from the office of the Surgeon General:

A message from the port surgeon of New York received at 4.45 p. m. states that at that time a total of 259 litter and 900 ambulatory cases had been removed from the transport *Northern Pacific*, aground off Fire Island. The sea was smooth, and the medical authorities are confident that the remaining 575 wounded men will be removed from the ship to-night.

Surg. Gen. Ireland and Col. W. H. Smith, head of the hospital division of the Surgeon General's Office, have been closely following the efforts being made to remove the sick and wounded soldiers from the transport *Northern Pacific*, now aground off Fire Island. At 3.00 o'clock this (Friday) afternoon they were informed over the long-distance telephone by the port surgeon that 47 patients had been landed on Long Island and sent to the debarkation hospital in the Greenhut Building, New York City, and 330 patients were then coming up the river on a destroyer. A total of 1,734 patients were on board the *Northern Pacific*.

It was further reported that barring accidents every one of the sick and wounded men on board the *Northern Pacific* will be safely removed and be in hospitals within a very short time. The medical department is using all its resources to see that the men on the *Northern Pacific* receive the best attention on their trip to New York and after they get there.

noted that at present the customs restrictions of the United Kingdom forbid the entry into that country of silver, gold, and of more than 1 pound of sugar or 10 pounds of tea. CASH OUTGO FROM TREASURY 10 BILLIONS IN 6 MONTHS TO MEET THE WAR EXPENSES

STATEMENT BY SECRETARY GLASS

*Calls Upon Nation's Bankers To
Back Up the Government's Credit
By Liberal Subscriptions to Cur-
rent Issues of Treasury Certificates*

The following is a copy of a telegram sent today by Secretary Glass to the Governors of the Federal Reserve Banks:

The actual cash outgo from the Treasury during the six months ended December 31, excluding transactions in the principal of the public debt, was \$10,632,000,000. In the month of December alone such actual cash outgo was \$2,060,000,000. This is the highest figure ever reached during the period of the war.

Bills Now Coming In.

America had almost reached the peak of production of war materials and supplies at the moment when the armistice was signed. Her unstinted effort in men and material undoubtedly had decisive effect in bringing the war to an early conclusion. The bills are now pouring in which require the Government to pay the price of this great effort. The money paid to the Government creditors will find its way promptly back into the channels of commerce and trade and peaceful enterprise and back into the deposits of the banks. The welfare of the people depends no less in peace than in war upon the maintenance of the Government's credit. We shall not shame ourselves in the eyes of our brave soldiers as they return from the battlefields of France by failure to support the credit of the country for which they were willing and ready to die.

Call to Take Treasury Certificates.

The war is won; the war bills must be paid. The welfare and prosperity of this fair land of ours can only be preserved if the war expenditures of the Government, now at their maximum, are promptly and ungrudgingly provided. With entire confidence I call upon the bankers of America to subscribe and oversubscribe the current issue of Treasury certificates and future issues which must be made biweekly in accordance with the plan outlined in Secretary McAdoo's letter of November 27.

Cruiser to Fire Salute In Honor of Joan of Arc

Secretary Daniels to-day announced that a cruiser had been detailed to fire a salute from anchorage at the foot of Ninety-third Street, New York, on January 6, the five hundred and seventh anniversary of the birthday of Joan of Arc, and assist in whatever other ways the committee requested in the celebration that is being arranged. Vice Admiral Gleaves, United States Navy, in command of the cruiser force at Hoboken, N. J., will arrange details of the naval participation in the ceremony.

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Export of Nonconserved Commodities to Siberia

The War Trade Board announces, in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 470), that export licenses will be issued to approved consignees for the shipment of all nonconserved commodities to Siberia.

It is no longer necessary to consign shipments to that country to the War Trade Board representative at Vladivostok.

Applications should be submitted on Form X, to which should be attached such supplemental information sheets as are required by the rules and regulations of the War Trade Board for the exportation of certain commodities.

No other supplemental information sheets are required and no import licenses need accompany the application.

Europe Needs All Pork America Can Furnish

The following cable message has been received from Mr. Hoover in London:

"Every pound of pork products we can export before next July Europe will need, and as soon as the initial chaos of the sudden economic change from war to armistice can be overcome there will be overdemands. For another month we will be unable to determine what the volume of this task is."

131,500 REGISTERED FOR WORK.

Employment Service Record for Week Ending December 21.

Federal directors of the United States Employment Service from 41 States report that for the week ending December 21, 131,500 persons registered for employment as against 132,798 registering on the previous week. Of the 131,500 registered, 122,632 were referred and 90,747 placed in positions.

Of the total registrations, 117,288 were men, 14,212 women. The number of men placed during the week is 77,372, women 13,375. Transfers are 2,803 men and 225 women.

Applications for help wanted in that week amounted to 228,234, of which 198,119 were men, 30,165 women.

DIAMOND COMMITTEE TO CEASE SUPERVISION OVER IMPORTS

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 475) that the supervision heretofore exercised by the War Trade Board through the American diamond committee of New York over the importation of polished and rough diamonds, diamond dies, and diamond tools will be discontinued on January 10, 1919. The control of these commodities by license from the War Trade Board will still continue.

The board also announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 477) that applicants for export licenses will no longer be required to attach to their application Supplemental Information Sheet X-2 except in the case of applications for the exportation of arms, ammunition, or explosives.

Commutation Allowance For Noncommissioned Officers of the Army

Bulletin No. 61.

I. Noncommissioned officers above the grade of color sergeant are entitled to commutation of quarters, as provided in paragraph 1044, Army Regulations (changed by C. A. R., No. 81), from July 31, 1918, the date of C. A. R., No. 76, which changed the grades of rank of officers and noncommissioned officers in paragraph 9, Army Regulations.

MILWAUKEE FIRMS PENALIZED.

Licenses Revoked and Suspended by the Food Administration.

The Food Administration issues the following:

The Blommer Co., distributors of green coffee, and the Blommer Ice Cream Co., both of North Avenue and Fifteenth Street, Milwaukee, Wis., have recently been penalized by orders issued by the Food Administration.

The Blommer Co. showed general disregard to the Food Administration rules and regulations and a lack of cooperation.

The Blommer Ice Cream Co. failed to observe the sugar regulations. After the Food Administration made a request for curtailing the output of ice cream the company made 6,000 more gallons in August, 1918, than in the same period of 1917, thus ignoring the order to reduce. July and September also showed an increase over the previous year. The firm practically admitted that they were not living up to the Food Administration's instructions.

An unlimited revocation order was issued against the Blommer Co., and licensed dealers are further ordered not to deal in licensed commodities with the Blommer Ice Cream Co. until February 24.

GENERAL LICENSE TO IMPORT CERTAIN GOODS INTO ENGLAND

Consul General Skinner, at London, reports:

General license, valid until March 1, 1919, has been issued to permit the importation of any quantity of the following articles: All machinery driven by power and suitable for use in cutting, working, or operating on wood, including sawing machines of all descriptions, general joiners', mortise, tenon, and boring machines; lathes and rounding machines; box and cask making machines, and all machines accessory thereto; scraping and sandpapering machines; wheelwright machinery; firewood making and bundling machinery; wood, wool, fiber, and pulp machinery; saw sharpening and setting machines; saw stretchers and brazing apparatus; all machines for grinding, planing, or molding irons; all machine tools and machinery driven by power and suitable for use in cutting, stamping, or working metal, including lathes, milling machines, drilling machines, planers, shapers, screw machines, chucking machines, boring machines, slotting machines, grinding machines, boring and turning mills, power presses, punching and shearing machines, forging machines, cutting-off machines, gear-cutting machines, and centering machines.

Since March, 1918, it has been necessary for importers of American goods to procure a "permit to purchase" before entering upon negotiations for goods in the United States. The controller of import restrictions announces that this system has now been abandoned. Goods that are still on the list of prohibited imports, and not admitted under general license, require this permit before shipment is made.

General Import License Of Canadian Furs

The War Trade Board announces, in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 481), that a general import license, to be known as PBF No. 30, has been issued covering the importation from Canada of raw furs of Canadian origin when consigned to Funston Bros. & Co., George B. Herzig Co. (Inc.), Joseph Ullman (Inc.), or to such other firms as may enter into an appropriate agreement with the War Trade Board. This agreement is substantially that, in consideration of the issuance of the general license, the licensee firm agrees to report the receipt of shipments of furs under such general license which may not be of Canadian origin and to hold the same subject to the disposition of the War Trade Board.

Naval Casualties

The Navy Department reports the following casualties:

PROCEEDINGS OF THE CONGRESS BRIEFLY TOLD

SENATE.

Through much of yesterday afternoon there was further discussion of the peace terms of President Wilson and some criticism of the War Department. The proposals of the President were defended by Senators Lewis, of Illinois, and Thomas, of Colorado, Democrats, while Senator Lodge, minority leader, denied that he or other Republican leaders were attempting to embarrass the President abroad by recommending that consideration of a league of nations and certain other proposals should be deferred until after the peace conference. Senator McCumber, of North Dakota, Republican, gave notice that on Monday, to which day the Senate adjourned, he would speak in support of the proposal for a league of nations. Senator Sherman, of Illinois, Republican, in a brief speech criticized the use of the cables so extensively for reports of what the President is doing while it was, he said, impossible for parents of soldiers to obtain any information by cable concerning their sons on duty overseas.

Among resolutions adopted yesterday were the following: By Mr. Spencer, of Missouri, calling upon the Secretary of the Treasury, for information concerning payment of allotments made by soldiers to dependents. By Mr. King, of Utah, asking the Secretary of War whether he contemplated a modification of a recent order prohibiting promotions in the Army. Senator New's resolution for an investigation by the military committee of conditions at the American camp at the port of Brest, France, was referred to the Military Affairs Committee. Senator Lodge introduced a resolution which was referred to the naval committee directing that committee to investigate the awarding of contracts for the construction of the so-called Eagle boats to the Ford Motor Co. and also into the character and construction of these boats. Senator King was unsuccessful in obtaining consideration of his resolution asking the Secretary of State what steps, if any, have been taken relative to the settlement of claims of Americans against the Mexican Government growing out of depredations committed in Mexico. It went to the Foreign Relations Committee.

President Wilson yesterday sent to the Senate the nomination of R. L. Williams, of Durant, Okla., to be United States district judge for the eastern district of Oklahoma.

With the approval of Secretary Baker, Chairman Chamberlain, of the Military Committee, introduced a bill to make permanent the present rank of Gens. Pershing, March, and Bliss and Lieut. Gens. Liggett and Bullard. In a letter to Senator Chamberlain commending the legislation, the Secretary said: "These officers have performed tremendous tasks involving the greatest responsibility in a manner which reflects credit upon themselves and upon the country and entitles them to recognition. I believe that the sentiment of the country is strongly in favor of such recognition." Under the terms of the bill the rank to be bestowed would lapse when the officer vacates the position or at his death.

The Military Committee ordered a favorable report on the House bill permitting soldiers, sailors, and marines to retain their uniforms and personal equipment after being honorably discharged from the service. The committee also disapproved of the bill authorizing the validating of informal contracts and giving the War Department authority to adjust such contracts. The Hitchcock bill was substituted and its report ordered by a unanimous vote. This bill validates these informal contracts, but provides for their adjustment through a noninterested commission to be selected.

Director General of Railroads McAdoo appeared before the Interstate Commerce Committee and submitted an argument in favor of the proposal for an extension for a period of five years of Government control and operation of the railroads. He also submitted a report of what has been accomplished since the roads came under Federal and unified direction.

Hearings began yesterday afternoon before the Committee on Education and Labor on the Kenyon resolution under which general labor and social conditions are to be inquired into with a view to submitting legislation to bring about their betterment. President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor was the first witness.

HOUSE.

Before the Committee on Military Affairs Secretary Baker indicated that a permanent military policy for the United States would not be formulated until peace has been concluded. He suggested the creation of a volunteer army of 500,000 men to temporarily take the place of the force organized for the period of the war, the establishment of 3 permanent artillery training camps and maneuvering grounds, acquisition of the 16 National Army cantonments and probably some of the National Guard camp sites. He told the committee no decision has yet been reached on the subject of universal military training.

Rear Admiral Rodman, who commanded the American fleet in the North Sea during the war, was a witness before the Naval Committee yesterday, the naval appropriation bill and the proposed 3-year construction program being under discussion. Admiral Rodman advocated the destruction of the battleships of the German Navy that have been surrendered, but said all the other types of warships should be retained. So far as the capital ships are concerned he explained that their armament and the ammunition used was of a character entirely different from that used by the allied powers and that the ships would cost more than they were worth to rebuild and would be obsolete anyhow before they could ever be used again in any war.

Before the Interstate Commerce Committee Chairman Colver, of the Federal Trade Commission, continued his testimony on the pending bill for the control of the packing industry. He dealt yesterday particularly with the high cost of meats in small community butcher shops.

\$689,034,759 Advanced to Railroads By the U. S. Railroad Administration Up to and Including December 31, 1918

Director General of Railroads Meadoc issues the following:

The total sum advanced to December 31, 1918, by the United States Railroad Administration to all railroad and other transportation properties under Government control, including loans made to railroad corporations for current needs and payments on account of compensation, advances made for operating requirements, and the payments made on account of the new standardized cars and locomotives aggregate \$689,034,759.

Draft on Revolving Fund.

In making these payments the Director General drew on the \$500,000,000 revolving fund to the extent of \$453,454,810.

The balance of the money thus advanced, amounting to \$235,579,949, was obtained from the surplus operating receipts of certain railroads and from receipts from the express companies.

The total amount deposited with the Director General up to December 31, 1918, from the surplus receipts of all railroads and transportation companies under Federal control amounted to \$270,524,961, which included \$46,916,416 received from express companies.

Deposits by Railroads.

The only railroad properties which have made deposits with the Director General of sums aggregating as much as \$1,000,000 in excess of the amounts returned to these depositing roads and the corporations by the Director General were the following:

FUEL REGULATION REVOKED CONCERNING COAL CONTRACTS

U. S. FUEL ADMINISTRATION,
Washington, D. C., December 31, 1918.

The United States Fuel Administrator, acting under authority of an Executive order of the President of the United States, dated August 23, 1917, appointing said administrator, and of subsequent Executive orders, and in furtherance of the purpose of said orders and of the act of Congress therein referred to and approved August 10, 1917,

Hereby orders and directs that paragraph (1) of the order of said administrator, dated December 24, 1917, entitled "Order of the United States Fuel Administrator regulating the making of contracts by operators, producers, and jobbers of coal and coke," as amended by order dated July 26, 1918, which said paragraph (1) as amended prohibits the making, without the approval of the United States Fuel Administrator, of any contract providing for the delivery or supply of coal or coke for a period of more than one year, and provides that such period of one year shall terminate not later than 18 months from the date of the execution of the contract be, and the same hereby is, canceled and revoked as to all contracts executed after the effective date of this order.

This order shall be effective December 31, 1918.

as possible. Few soldiers arrive here who have not been given partial pay before leaving France. Immediately on their arrival in this country they are given a partial payment on the soldier's own statement as to the status of his account. Most soldiers have insurance premiums due and allotments on the Treasury Department that support family allowances, and in making partial payments without supporting papers great risk is necessarily run, but the finance officers are making these payments all over the country and cheerfully shouldering the financial risk and accountability, so that the men from over there, who have faced the discomforts of the trenches and the perils of the front, shall have some money for their use.

System at Walter Reed Hospital.

At Walter Reed Hospital, Washington, D. C., for some months past the casuals, nearly 400 in number, have been paid on rolls certified to by the Director of Finance, the only supporting papers being the affidavits of the soldiers. The finance officers who pay these casuals correspond to the cashier of a bank. They have no control of the soldier's papers and are not responsible for their execution and care. The soldier without papers corresponds to the applicant for funds at the cashier's window. He has no checkbook, no evidence of deposit, and no identification papers. Under these conditions the cashier refuses the applicant. The finance officer, however, does not refuse the soldier, but accepts his statement and makes him an advance on account, and the finance officer has no protection under the law for payments made under these conditions.

In the case of soldiers discharged, who are without papers, a graver situation is confronted. The final payment marks the actual separation of the men from the service, and for an overpayment there is no recourse. The soldier has due him accrued pay perhaps for several prior months, less partial payments made during those prior months. He is entitled to 3½ cents per mile to the place of his induction into the service, he has possibly deposits and

Including the amount of these loans thus collected, the total balance remaining in the revolving fund, plus the sum total of balances remaining on hand with the Director General from the surplus receipts turned over by certain roads, aggregates the total sum of \$102,856,762.

The aggregate amount of loans made by the Director General to railroads and other transportation companies and still outstanding is \$171,606,073. This is exclusive of the amount advanced by the Director General for the benefit of various roads on account of standardized equipment,

interest due him, while from this total must be deducted his insurance premium, the pro rata share of his allotment on the Treasury Department to support his family allowance, the settlement of his allotment through the War Department for his Liberty bond subscription or for other purposes, while there are other allowances and possibly other charges which enter into his complicated account.

Risk by Officers.

The officer who certifies to the correctness of such an account, trusting to the accuracy of the soldier's memory and his honesty, and the finance officer (cashier), who pays many such accounts, face early bankruptcy. The urgency of the case, however, dictated decisive action and instructions were issued by the director of finance, with the approval of the Chief of Staff, to commanding officers of all hospitals to prepare final statements from the unsupported affidavit of the soldier, and finance officers are making settlement of such final papers all over the country. There is no authority of law for

either the partial payments nor these final payments on the statement of the enlisted men, and Congress has been asked by the Secretary of War to sanction this procedure by necessary legislation. Many of the casuals now arriving are provided with pay books which contain in some cases enough of the soldier's military history to enable payment to be made. Whenever report is received in Washington that casuals have arrived at a hospital who have pay due them for any prior period, a finance officer is immediately ordered there to make a settlement of the account. At each of the ports of debarkation in this country finance officers with sufficient force await the arrivals of casuals in order to pay them something on account. Occasionally the condition of patients is such that payment can not be made, but in the majority of cases payment is made, and no casual or other enlisted men from overseas who has a legitimate claim for pay need go without funds.

Officers at Every Port.

Finance officers are available at every port of debarkation, at every cantonment, camp, and headquarters and at every hospital, and the instructions issued are explicit and comprehensive, that if a soldier has no papers he is to be given a partial payment on his own statement and final payment on his affidavit. In some of the earlier cases men without papers were given their travel allowances on their discharge, so that they might reach their homes, and were given instructions as to how to proceed to secure what balance of pay was due them. In other cases commanding officers of hospitals have hesitated to certify a soldier's final statement without supporting papers, but it is thought these cases are rare; but in all cases, so far as the record shows, all discharged men are given their travel allowances which, with the reduction in railroad fares secured by the War Department, insure a comfortable journey to their homes, while in most cases discharged men receive every penny which they claim is due them.

Casualties in Russia.

There has been some talk during the week of the condition of our troops at Archangel, and statements have been

made by the War Department that the men up there were especially equipped with winter clothing and had plenty of food, and that the military situation is entirely in hand. We have a report from the military attache with Ambassador Francis at Murmansk, giving the total casualties in the American Expeditionary Force in Russia up to and including November 25. The total deaths from all causes are as follows:

Officers in Regular Army.

The matter comes up in the form of a question as to the possibility of using in the future Army officers who are in the United States emergency army. I have previously given out a statement that officers when discharged will be offered a commission in the Reserve Corps, or retention in the United States emergency army for induction in the Regular Army, and we proposed in the bill for the reorganization of the Army, which will be submitted to Congress within the next few days, to include provisions which will allow the officers who have made good in the United States emergency army to be brought into the Regular Army. We are going to utilize that reservoir of trained officers to the fullest extent possible. Officers who now indicate that they want to apply for the Regular Army are being retained at the camps instead of being discharged, and Gen. Pershing has been authorized to attach such officers to the army of occupation until Congress acts upon the proposition of the War Department with reference to the reorganization of the Army. There are at present no vacancies in the Regular Army, but should the Congress give us what we are going to ask for, there will be enough vacancies to take care of all the officers who have made good, and who wish to continue in the Army as a life profession.

We have had during the last week a number of comments upon the War Risk Insurance Bureau by men in public life and in newspapers, which seem to indicate that there is a great deal of confusion as to who runs the War Risk Insurance Bureau. It belongs to the Treasury Department, and not the War Department. My personal mail is becoming enormously large from people who are asking me to get their war risk insurance. They do not understand that it is a Treasury function and not a War Department function. I think it would simplify the situation if this were given newspaper publicity as well as official publicity.

Gen. March replied to the following questions:

Q. Will Gen. March be willing to comment on the following letter: "I am writing on behalf of about 150 anxious mothers begging for information of our boys with Batteries B and D, 150th Field Artillery, 42d (Rainbow) Division. We have had no word since before the armistice was signed, and as there is a rumor current that they were almost completely wiped out in the last battles, we are almost beside ourselves with worry. So if you can find out where they are and a little of how they are we will be truly grateful."

A. The commanding general of the Rainbow Division, Maj. Gen. Charles T. Menoher, arrived here a few days ago and has taken over charge of the Air Service. His office has informed us that up to the time he left, which was a few days preceding, there was no such thing as here reported. The batteries were not wiped out.

Q. Will Gen. March comment on the fact (if it was a fact) that casualties in the American Army were much greater than had been estimated?

A. I do not know whose estimate is referred to. A statement carried in the papers, alleged to have emanated from War Department sources, was to the effect that the casualties would be about

100,000, which, of course, was perfectly preposterous, and no responsible military man fathered it. The question was not asked of me at that time, but the prediction I made to the Secretary of War followed very closely what turned out to be the fact. Anyone following the accounts of the heavy fighting would know that the casualties would correspond, and that the report of 100,000 was entirely without warrant and without judgment.

Q. Will Gen. March comment on the scheme pursued by Gen. Pershing in breaking up line divisions in order to make replacements?

A. When I came back from France I found that the troops being sent over as replacements were obtained by taking them from the trained divisions in America. There was no replacement system here at all. I immediately started large replacement camps in the United States where replacements would be trained, allowing divisions to go over with their officers and men intact, the men being under the officers who trained them, which is the only practical system. At the time Gen. Pershing utilized two or three divisions for replacements the country was in the grip of the influenza epidemic, and we practically cut off all shipments of replacements. It happened that the replacement camps in the United States suffered more severely than the ordinary camps, and no replacements were sent from them. This is the reason why Gen. Pershing used line divisions for replacement purposes.

Q. How many men are there around Archange?

A. A regiment of infantry at war strength, a battalion of engineers, the necessary hospital and Quartermaster Corps, and such like, somewhere between five and six thousand men.

TROOPS ABOARD THE ULUA.

The War Department authorizes the following additional information regarding the troops aboard the transport *Ulua* which is due in New York January 11:

The Trench Mortar Battery aboard is the 109th, consisting of 5 officers and 118 men. After debarkation 50 per cent will be sent to Camp Dodge, 22 per cent to Camp Travis, and 28 per cent to Camp Cody.

Casual Company No. 322, consisting of 2 officers and 149 men, will be distributed as follows: 21 per cent to Camp Hancock, 20 per cent to Camp Lee, 38 per cent miscellaneous, 12 per cent to Regular Army, 9 per cent to Camp Meade.

New York Wholesale Firms Lose Their Food Licenses

The Food Administration issues the following:

The Maddaloni Olive Co., 496 Broome Street, New York City, and Romolo Fanara, 464 West Broadway, New York City, both wholesalers and jobbers in cottonseed oil, cheese, and canned tomatoes, will be unable to deal in licensed foodstuffs for an unlimited period. Unjustifiably refusing to handle 250 on the part of the Maddaloni company and 600 cases of tomatoes on the part of the Fanara company, unfair practices, and failure to perform contracts led to the revocation of these licenses.

Interpretation of Railroad Wage Order As To Station Agents' "Special Service"

The United States Railroad Administration issues the following:

INTERPRETATION No. 6 TO GENERAL ORDER No. 27.

POSITION OF EMPLOYEE.

A station agent on a certain railroad has been paid a salary of \$20 per month, and it is claimed by this employee that article 2, section F, paragraph 12, of General Order No. 27 does not apply to his case, in that the service he renders is not special service, as he is performing all work of an agent and is subject to call the entire day, performing work as it transpires.

POSITION OF THE COMPANY.

The company claims that the employee in question devotes only a portion of his time to the service of the company in the capacity of station agent without telegraph service, and that he is engaged in business in the town in which employed, and that he is not entitled to an increase in wages under article 2, section F, paragraph 12, of General Order No. 27.

The question for interpretation is:

In view of the fact that the claimant performs all of the work required at the station employed and is only paid \$20 per

month, is he entitled to an increase under General Order No. 27?

DECISION.

The claimant is performing special service, and is excluded from increase in wages by article 2, paragraph 12, section F, of General Order No. 27, and paragraph (a), article 4, Supplement 11 of General Order No. 27, which reads as follows:

"The provisions of this order will not apply in cases where amounts less than \$30 per month are paid to individuals for special service, which only takes a portion of their time from outside employment or business."

tional service. This provides for each patient according to his needs: (a) Bed-side occupation to divert his mind from his sickness or injury, and to give him something worth while to do while still confined to the bed and ward. (b) A curative occupation in the ward, shops, or gardens. (c) Opportunities for study and instruction in bed, in the wards, in the class rooms, or in shops in subjects that will help him in civil life after his discharge. (d) Preliminary work in re-education for a new occupation if his injury is such that he can not return to his old occupation. (e) Advice in regard to vocational reeducation and occupation for discharge. Also in regard to compensation to which he may be entitled from the War Risk Insurance Bureau.

Not Compelled to Accept.

5. Whether you take advantage of the opportunities offered you by the Educational Service depends upon yourself. You are not required to do so. It will not affect the length of time that you will remain in the hospital. The opportunities are offered to you to assist your recovery in the shortest length of time possible, so that you may spend the time that you are in the hospital undergoing treatment for your own best personal advantage.

6. All men who have been disabled so that they can not follow their old occupation, or can not follow it successfully, are provided by the Government with an opportunity for reeducation for new occupation after cured and discharged from the Army. This reeducation is under the direction of the Federal Board for

Vocational Education. It may be in a college, technical trade, commercial or agricultural school near his home or in an industrial plant or on a farm. The Government pays the entire expense, including the cost of instruction and living expenses. If any man has dependents, the Government pays for them the same allowances that it paid while he was a soldier.

Compensation Provided.

7. The Government has provided compensation for all men who unfortunately have become permanently disabled in whole or in part. The compensation depends upon the nature of the injury, and is not effected by reeducation course that he may take advantage of. Full information in regard to vocational reeducation and compensation will be given you by the members of the hospital educational staff, if you will ask them. Printed bulletins, giving information, are available in the hospitals.

8. The soldier from overseas will receive a warm welcome when he arrives in the United States. But in accepting this welcome and the benefits which the Government accords him if disabled, he must not forget his obligations to himself, his relatives, and his country. He is a soldier still, and if he has been a good one he will continue to act like one. He will cheerfully follow Army regulations as to the uniform for domestic service, will show respect to his superior officers, and will treat his fellow soldiers as he would be treated, including those who, less fortunate than he, were unable to play the war game overseas.

Information for Soldiers' and Sailors' Families, Issued by Department of Civilian Relief.

Danger of Confusing Compensation with Insurance Payments.

It appears that some discharged men to whom compensation has been granted for injuries received in line of duty have discontinued payments of their insurance premiums. In some instances they have discontinued such premium payments owing to a mistaken belief that the sums they are receiving monthly from the Government were insurance payments, and therefore that it was unnecessary to make further payments of insurance premiums. The discontinuance of payments of insurance premiums under such circumstances is peculiarly unfortunate for several reasons: (1) Because if the insurance payments are more than 62 days overdue, there can be no reinstatement of the insurance under the regulations of the Bureau of War-Risk Insurance without the insured procuring a medical certificate of insurability signed by two reputable physicians and satisfactory to the bureau. The disability for which he is receiving compensation prevents his procuring such certificate. (2) Because such disability prevents the procurement of insurance in private companies for the same reason that it makes it impossible for him to procure a certificate of insurability in order to have his Government insurance reinstated. (3) An injured man needs the protection which insurance gives to him and to his family, if he has a family, more than a sound and healthy man who is able to do a man's work and who may expect to live for many years.

Only in those cases where the disability from which the disabled man is suffering is total and permanent does the discontinuance of insurance payments by the disabled man who is receiving compensation involve no risk and cause no harm. This is because in cases of total and permanent disability there is a right to recover Government insurance payments as well as compensation, which right to Government insurance payments became vested and made further premium payments unnecessary as soon as the disability was in fact total and permanent. Even though the disabled man receiving compensation thinks that his injury is total and permanent, still he should continue his payment of insurance premiums until the Bureau of War-Risk Insurance has decided that his injury is total and permanent and that, therefore, he is entitled to insurance payments. It is unsafe to discontinue his insurance payments until that question has been settled, because although the bureau might decide that his injury was at that time total, still they might decide that it was not permanent or they might hold that although permanent and total at that time yet it might cease to be total at some subsequent time by improvement in the man's physical condition.

Any man who is receiving what he believes to be insurance payments should carefully verify that the payments he is so receiving are in fact insurance pay-

ments rather than compensation payments, and should not cease making insurance payments until he has definitely determined that the payments he is receiving are Government insurance payments rather than compensation payments.

Application for Compensation or for Insurance Payments.

Form 526 of the Bureau of War-Risk Insurance is used to cover either one of the following cases:

(1) Application of discharged officer or enlisted man for compensation, whether his disability be total or partial. Such application may be filed either at the time of discharge or subsequent thereto, but within the five years' limitation fixed in section 309 of the act.

(2) Application of officer or enlisted man, if insured, for insurance payments on the ground of permanent and total disability.

Form 526 is furnished to every disabled officer and enlisted man and every officer and enlisted man claiming disability at the time of his separation from the service. At that time, assistance is given him by competent officials in filling out the application, and complete information as to the proof required in support of his claim is supplied. Form 526, after it has been properly filled out and executed, is then forwarded by the camp personnel adjutant to the compensation claim section of the Bureau of War-Risk Insurance with a copy of the report of the physical examination of the officer or enlisted man, which is given him at the time of his discharge, attached thereto. If the officer or enlisted man does not desire to execute an application for compensation, the note "Officer (soldier) did not desire to execute Form 526 BWRI" will be written or stamped on the copy of the report of his physical examination, which will then be forwarded by the personnel adjutant without letter of transmittal directly to the compensation section of the Bureau of War-Risk Insurance.

Where Form 526 is executed at camp at the time of the officer's or enlisted man's discharge, it may be difficult for him to procure the proof called for by the instructions on the first page of the form as to the fact that the applicant has a wife and children living, or that he and his wife have not been divorced, or the ages of his children, etc.

Whatever proof it is impossible to supply at that time should be obtained upon the officer's or man's return to his home and be forwarded immediately to the compensation-claim section of the Bureau of War-Risk Insurance with a statement giving his full name, Army serial number, if an enlisted man, grade and organization in the service, and date of discharge or separation therefrom. The advice and assistance of the camp war-risk judge advocate should be fully utilized in the application for compensation.

Where Form 526 was not filled out at the time of the man's discharge, home-

service sections may render valuable service in assisting in the preparation of Form 526 and supporting evidence. Where Form 526 has been filled out already at camp, home-service sections may render service in assisting in preparation of the supporting evidence which the discharged man may have been unable to procure at the time of his discharge.

Care in Establishing Proof of Relationship and Dependency.

Great care must be exercised to make a complete and absolutely accurate statement of the facts relating to dependency called for by paragraph 7 of the instructions on page 1 of Form 526. The allegations or relationship between the dependent parent and the disabled person may be included or may be shown by a certified copy of a public record of the claimant's birth or the church record of his baptism.

The affidavit as to dependency should be made by two persons, one of whom should be one of the dependent parents for whom compensation is asked. The affidavit might be in the following form:

PLANNING FOR THE EFFECTIVE CONSERVATION OF NATURAL GAS

The annual saving of 26,000,000,000 cubic feet of natural gas, the equivalent of one-eighth of the entire domestic natural gas consumption of the United States, can be effected in a single industry in West Virginia by State regulation, which will be proposed to the Legislature of West Virginia at its coming session beginning January 10 at Charleston, according to an announcement made by the United States Fuel Administration.

Conservation Movement Under Way.

A movement is under way for West Virginia to continue the activities for natural gas conservation which have been started by the United States Fuel Administration. All the plants in the vicinity of Grantsville, W. Va., which manufacture carbon black, otherwise known as lampblack, from natural gas have voluntarily agreed to close down immediately. This agreement, which has just been effected, will stop the wasteful consumption of 15,000,000 cubic feet per day, which will be made available for immediate use this winter for domestic and public utility purposes.

The operators of these plants have agreed to manufacture their product hereafter in either Wyoming or Louisiana from wells too remote from populous centers to be available for other uses. The Fuel Administration has also effected arrangements for the manufacture from this gas which will be saved 5,000 gallons of gasoline daily which has heretofore gone to waste.

Appeals have been made to the Fuel Administration by representatives of numerous communities which obtain their supply of natural gas from the West Virginia fields to curtail the use of natural gas in certain lines of industry. The demands for natural gas throughout the country are greater than the available supply. The use of natural gas is a privilege enjoyed by about 10 per cent of our population. When present supplies are exhausted the users of natural gas must return to the more expensive manufactured gas.

The Fuel Administration takes the position that where natural gas is available for domestic and industrial purposes its unrestricted use in the manufacture of carbon black is a wasteful practice.

Cause of "Carbon Black."

"Carbon black" is a term applied to a material deposited by the actual contact of a flame upon a metallic surface. Carbon black is now made by the wasteful process of incomplete combustion of natural gas—that is, the gas is simply burned in the open, the flame impinging against a metal plate, making the deposit known as carbon black. From 1½ to 1½ pounds of carbon black are made from each thousand cubic feet of gas burned. The heat contained in the gas is wasted, and only a small portion of the carbon content of the gas is utilized.

In the State of Ohio alone there are about 400,000 consumers of natural gas from West Virginia; Pennsylvania gets 43 per cent of the natural gas it uses from West Virginia, which also supplies 85 per cent of the natural gas used in Indiana, and all of the natural gas used in Maryland.

If proof of relationship of the dependent parent to the claimant is made by independent documents, then the allegation as to relationship at the commencement of the above affidavit should be omitted.

Incorporate Facts in as Few Affidavits as is Possible.

All of the various matters which it is necessary to prove in order to comply with the various instructions on page 1 of Form 526 should be incorporated in as few affidavits as possible, preferably se-

curing persons to make these affidavits who have knowledge of the variety of facts covered by the different affidavits. The blank form used on the last page of Form 526 should be used as far as possible. If additional affidavits are necessary beyond the one form supplied on the last page of Form 526, then such additional affidavit or affidavits should be securely attached to Form 526.

Where Form 526 is filled out at home subsequent to discharge, greater care will be necessary than where it is filled out at camp at time of discharge under the supervision of the camp insurance officer. When sent in after discharge, care must be exercised to have Form 504, showing medical examination, accompany it. Form 504, the physician's certificate after medical examination, should be filled out by the physician himself.

Health Conditions at Army Camps Within the United States As Reported to the Surgeon General for Week Ending Dec. 27

The War Department authorizes the following:

Herewith is a detailed report on the health conditions of troops in the United States for the week ended December 27. The report of the Division of Sanitation to the Surgeon General of the Army for that week is as follows:

1. General.—Both influenza and pneumonia show a continued decline. The port of embarkation, Hoboken, is the only station re-

porting more than 100 cases of influenza for the week. Camp Lewis leads all camps in the number of new cases of pneumonia (117). Camp Funston continues to report a few cases of scarlet fever (17) and meningitis (5). Eleven new cases of beri beri are reported from Camp Las Casas, making a total of 63 cases of this disease reported since December 13. There has been a net loss in numerical strength of command of approximately 100,000 during the week. As a result, a higher non-effective rate is noted, as well as a relatively higher death rate. The admission rate is decidedly lower than last week. The absolute

number of deaths from all causes for the week was 260 as compared with 323 for the preceding week, giving a death rate of 12.1 against 13.7 last week. Special diseases were reported as follows:

¹ First figure in this column for each camp gives the total number of new cases during the week; the figure in parentheses is the number of other cases which were contracted during the week by men in that camp's command at the time of contracting the disease. The difference, therefore, is the number of cases first reported during the week which were either (a) cases brought from civilian life by recruits, or (b) cases brought by men transferred from other camps to the camp under which the case is reported, or (c) old cases which have previously evaded detection. An interrogation point signifies that the report from that camp did not segregate cases contracted at the camp from other cases.

2. Divisional camps.—This group, with an average strength of command of approximately 187,000, reports only 26 deaths from all causes, having the lowest death rate for the week (6.6) of all groups. Only 150 new cases of influenza were reported from all camps of this group, Camp Logan leading in the number of new cases (41). There were 103 new cases of pneumonia reported, 32 of which are charged to a single camp (McClellan).

3. Cantonments.—There were 456 new cases of influenza reported from camps of this group, against 821 of last week. Four of the large camps report no new cases for the week. A few cases of pneumonia are reported from all camps. The total number (308) is less than last week (462).

4. Departmental and other troops.—The highest sick and death rates are charged to this group. The explanation of the relatively high death rate was given in last week's summary.
