



DEATH OF COL. ROOSEVELT, EX-PRESIDENT, ANNOUNCED; BOTH HOUSES OF CONGRESS ADJOURN OUT OF RESPECT

END COMES SUDDENLY AT OYSTER BAY HOME

*Passes Away Early To-day of
Pulmonary Embolism—
Tributes to His Memory
Paid by Acting Secretary
of State Polk, Secretary
Baker, Secretary Daniels,
and Assistant Secretary of
State Phillips—Commit-
tees to Attend Funeral.*

The death of former President Theodore Roosevelt was announced in both houses of Congress shortly after they convened this morning. In the Senate, Majority Leader Martin made announcement of the death of the former President and former presiding officer of that body, where he served when Vice President during the McKinley administration. After a few well-chosen words Mr. Martin submitted a resolution expressing the regret of the Senate and providing for the appointment by the Vice President of a committee of 15 Senators to represent the Senate at the funeral. The Senate then adjourned as a further mark of respect.

Official announcement of the death of this distinguished citizen was made in the House by Representative Rainey, of Illinois, ranking majority member of the Ways and Means Committee. He also submitted a resolution expressing the regret of the House and requesting Speaker Clark to appoint a committee to represent the House of Representatives at the funeral. Mr. Hicks, who represents the congressional district in which Col. Roosevelt lived, also made a few brief remarks by way of tribute to the character of the former President and the House then adjourned as a mark of respect to the memory of the former President.

PRESIDENT WILSON HONORED WITH CITIZENSHIP OF ROME; KING PRESENT AT CEREMONY

BOLSHEVIKS AT PETROGRAD MOBILIZE ALL OFFICERS UP TO FIFTY-FIVE YEARS OF AGE

Swedish press reports from Petrograd state that the Bolsheviki in that city have mobilized all officers up to 55 years of age—the generals up to 60—all being compelled to do duty under the penalty of death.

All the bridges and railway stations in the vicinity of Petrograd, according to these reports, have been mined and the Bolsheviki in the event they abandon Petrograd will destroy all implements of supply.

GERMAN DIPLOMATS AT BERNE APPEAR IN CIVILIAN ATTIRE AT THE NEW YEAR RECEPTION

A Berne report states that at the New Year's reception in Berne the Austrian and German legation officials discarded their gold uniforms and imperial eagles, appearing in silk hats and dress suits as more appropriate under a republican form of government.

The German legation was headed by the counselor, and the Austrian legation by the chancellor, neither of the ministers being present.

Seven Fatal Accidents On U. S. Aviation Fields In Week Ending Dec. 21

The War Department authorizes the following:

During the week ending December 21, 1918, there were seven fatal accidents on the training fields in this country where instruction is given in flying, one at Dorr Field, Arcadia, Fla.; one at March Field, Riverside, Cal.; four at Payne Field, West Point, Miss.; one at Scott Field, Belleville, Ill. Because of the lack of authorization to continue training at these fields, reports are ceasing to come in as the activities of the fields cease. Therefore, it is impossible to give either the number of miles flown per fatality or the number of hours in the air for the figures of the week ending December 21.

MAKES ADDRESS ON THE CAPITOLINE HILL

“Impressed by Contrast Between Temporary and Permanent Things”—Spirit of Rome and the Italian People Steadfast for Liberty Amid Changes of the Ages—Tribute to Italians in America—Addresses at State Dinner.

In the municipal palace on the Capitoline Hill at Rome, Italy, President Wilson, on Friday night, January 3, became “civis Romanus.” Assisting in the ceremony were the King and Queen of Italy, members of the Italian cabinet and allied and neutral embassies, including Ambassador and Mrs. Page, the Prince Colonna who is mayor of the city, as well as other municipal and military authorities. President and Mrs. Wilson, accompanied by the King and Queen, proceeded to the capitol after 10 o'clock in the evening following the dinner at the Quirinal.

Following is the address of President Wilson at the capitol:

“You have done me a very great honor. Perhaps you can imagine what a feeling it is for a citizen of one of the newest of the great nations to be made a citizen of this ancient city. It is a distinction which I am sure you are conferring upon me as a representative of the great people for whom I speak. One who has been a student of history can not accept an honor of the sort without having his memory run back to the extraordinary series of events which have centered in this place. But as I have thought to-day, I have been impressed by the contrast between the temporary and permanent things.

Caught the Spirit of the Ages.

“Many political changes have centered about Rome, from the time when from a little city she grew to be mistress of a great empire, and change after change has swept away many things, altering the very form

PRESIDENT ASKS CONGRESS FOR \$100,000,000 TO FEED STARVING AND BANKRUPTED PEOPLES OF WEST EUROPE

SAYS SITUATION IS OF EXTREME URGENCY

*Appeals, in Cablegram, to
"Great Sense of Charity
and Good Will of American
People Toward the Suffer-
ing"—Immediate Help Is
Needed for Liberated Mil-
lions of Austria, Turkey,
Poland, and West Russia.*

The following cablegram from the President to the Secretary of the Treasury, transmitted through the Secretary of State, has been sent to the House of Representatives:

"Extended investigation and consideration of the food situation in certain parts of Europe disclose that especially the urban populations in certain areas are not only facing absolute starvation during the coming winter, but that many of these populations are unable to find immediate resources with which to purchase their food. These regions have been so subjected to destruction by war, not only of their foodstuffs but of their financial resources and their power of production and export, that they are utterly incapable of finding any resources that can be converted into international exchange for food purchases. While the Secretary of the Treasury can accept obligations of certain governments and through these measures their situations can be cared for temporarily, there are still other areas through eastern and southern Europe where such arrangements can not be made. This applies more particularly to the liberated peoples of Austria, Turkey, Poland, and western Russia. In these countries freedom and government will slowly emerge from the chaos and require our every assistance.

"The total shipments of foodstuffs from the United States to all parts of Europe during the next seven months will be likely to exceed one and one-half billion dollars, and from our abundance we can surely afford to offer succor to those countries destitute of resources or credit. The minimum sums upon which this work can be carried on for the next six months in the countries above mentioned will amount to at least \$100,000,000 for such services and supplies as we can render, and even this sum contemplates the finding of resources by so much of the population as can do so and as much assistance as can be given by the allied governments. The high mission of the American people to find a remedy for starvation and absolute anarchy, renders it necessary that we should undertake the most liberal assistance to these destitute regions.

Clothing To Be Retained By Discharged Soldiers

The War Department publishes the following circular:

1. Under the provisions of paragraph 1165, Army Regulations, an enlisted man honorably discharged is permitted to wear one suit of uniform outer clothing from the place of termination of his active service to his home, which clothing will be returned within four months after termination of his active service, by mail, under a franked label, which shall be furnished him for the purpose.

2. "One suit of uniform outer clothing" will be interpreted to include the following articles:

a. 1 hat and hat cord (except for enlisted men having returned from service overseas, who, under the provisions of section 1, Bulletin No. 63, War Department, 1918, will wear the overseas cap until discharged and will retain them for their headgear after discharge).

b. 1 shirt, flannel.

c. 1 coat, service, and ornaments.

d. 1 pair breeches.

e. 1 pair shoes.

f. 1 pair leggins.

g. 1 belt, waist.

h. 1 slicker.

i. 1 overcoat (when required by climatic conditions).

While the sum of money is in itself large, it is so small compared with the expenditures we have undertaken in the hope of bettering the world, that it becomes a mere pittance compared to the results that will be obtained from it, and the lasting effect that will re-

SALVAGE SERVICE TAKEN OVER BY COMMERCE DEPARTMENT

The War Industries Board authorizes the following:

As a result of the showing made by the War Prison Labor and National Waste Reclamation Section, Labor Division of the War Industries Board, in the salvaging of materials needed by the Government in the prosecution of the war, the activities of this section are to be taken over at once by the Department of Commerce and expanded into a permanent waste reclamation service. It will be directed to the end of saving the wastes of material in the industries of the country in time of peace.

Vast Saving Accomplished.

The War Prison Labor and National Waste Reclamation Section of the Labor Division was organized September 26, 1917, by Mr. Hugh Frayne, member of the War Industries Board and chairman of the Labor Division, at a time when it was apparent that, in order to meet the unprecedented demands for raw materials, unusual economies would have to be put into effect and extraordinary measures taken to salvage materials which, previous to that time, had been allowed to go to waste.

The importance of the task may be judged from the results attained. At the time the armistice was signed the waste reclamation work had been organized by this department to such an extent throughout the country that the total value of the waste material then being reclaimed amounted to \$1,500,000,000 a year. With the expansion in the work that is expected to come under the plans which Mr. Frayne has laid before Secretary Redfield, of the Department of Commerce, for more complete organization, it is estimated that an additional \$300,000,000 a year may be added to the annual value of the waste materials salvaged.

Pledged to Cooperate.

For the purposes of nation-wide organization, the following national organizations are pledged through their chief executives as cooperating bodies and guaranteed the cooperation of their local chapters and branches throughout the United States: Council of National Defense, American Federation of Labor, American Red Cross, National Y. M. C. A., National Catholic War Council, Jewish Welfare Board, Federal Board of Farm Organization, Farmers' National Headquarters, National Council of Women, National Committee on Prisons and Prison Labor.

At the time the armistice was signed local reclamation councils had been formed in 86 cities of the country, and 200 others were in process of formation, destined to make an endless chain involving the assistance of civic and fraternal organizations as well as school children. Many cities went to the extent of organizing, and many are planning to organize permanent municipal bureaus to collect and reclaim all waste materials just as garbage and ashes are collected.

PANAMA CANAL KEPT SAFE ALL THROUGH WAR PERIOD BY CLOSE WATCH ON ALIENS, SAYS GOVERNOR IN REPORT

NOT ONE INSTANCE OF DAMAGE IS RECORDED

Civil Authorities Cooperated In Guarding the Locks, Tunnels, Spillways, Etc. Spirit of Patriotism Permeated Ranks of Employees And There Were No Labor Troubles—No Mishaps or Delays to Vessels Passing Through Them.

The War Department authorizes the following statement:

In a special report to the Secretary of War, Col. Chester Harding, United States Army, Governor of the Panama Canal Zone, tells of the measures taken to safeguard the canal during the period of hostilities.

The vigorous measures taken at the time of the breaking off of diplomatic relations with Germany is believed to have prevented enemy agents from effecting injury to the canal.

All Aliens Closely Watched.

A list of all aliens was compiled and with the assistance of the Panama authorities these were closely watched until they were interned. Passengers and members of crews of ships transiting the canal who were of German citizenship were removed from the vessels before entering the canal and transported under guard over the railroad to reboard the vessels after their transit of the canal. The operating tunnels of the locks and spillways, the electrical generating stations at Gatun and Miraflores, the radio stations, dry docks, and shops, bridges, piers, dynamite magazines, water reservoirs, and, in general, essential canal properties liable to damage, were guarded by the Canal Zone police and details of enlisted men of the Army. By prompt action on the breaking off of diplomatic relations, the crews of four interned German ships were prevented from doing any damage to the machinery with the result that upon the declaration of war these boats were available for Army service and later were used as Army transports.

Aided by Civil Authorities.

In all measures taken to safeguard the Canal, active cooperation was extended to the Canal authorities by the Panama civil authorities. As the result Col. Harding is able to report that the Canal was operated and maintained during the period of the war without mishap or delay to vessels using its facilities; that no acts of injury or destruction were committed against the Canal or any of

its structures; that there has been no strikes or other significant labor troubles and that throughout the period of the war the Canal and Panama Railroad employes in general maintained a highly patriotic attitude and showed by every means within their power their willingness and desire to support the Nation. Their contributions to Red Cross funds and to other organizations under Government auspices for welfare work for the benefit of troops, and in particular the generous subscriptions to the various Liberty Bond issues, were highly commendable.

More than three and one-half million tons of war materials, such as nitrates, explosives, tungsten, wolfram, iodine, and borax, were carried through the canal and many allied and United States ships were refueled and passed through the canal.

Helped With Repair Work.

Due to the congested condition of the shipping yards in the United States, considerable response was made to the suggestion that the facilities of the canal dry-dock and shops were available for repair work, with a probable saving of time and cost. The force of men organized for normal conditions was small

for the increased volume of work, and recruitment of additional men from the States was difficult on account of the demand for men in the shipbuilding trades. In many instances overtime work was necessary and the employees responded without complaint. Extensive repairs on the cruiser squadron of the Pacific fleet was completed and repair work and alterations were performed from time to time on 55 vessels of the United States Navy and 50 vessels of the Shipping Board. Damaged interned German ships from other ports were brought to Panama and repaired and hundreds of steel castings and anchors were made for the Navy. Hundreds of railroad cars and 100 locomotives were overhauled and shipped away from the canal.

Native Lumber Developed.

On account of the high prices of lumber from the States and difficulty of arranging transportation, a native lumber field was developed and approximately 4,000,000 feet of lumber obtained from the jungles and sawn into serviceable lumber. As the result of special efforts to obtain food from nearby countries, thus preventing a drain on the food supplies of the United States, important food sources have been opened. It is estimated that in beef alone during the period of the war operations at the canal resulted in a saving of about \$2,000,000.

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NOTICE CONCERNING FEBRUARY SUBSISTENCE REQUIREMENTS

The following information with respect to the February requirements for domestic consumption of the Subsistence Division of the Quartermaster Department of the Army has been made public: Bids will be opened July 10, 1919.

The Washington office of the Subsistence Division will approve or disapprove bids not later than January 18, 1919, but all bids should be submitted with the understanding that they are subject to acceptance or rejection by the Army until midnight, January 18, 1919.

Prospective bidders are notified that in all probability quantities will be reduced at the time the awards are made, due to the general, gradual reduction in the strength of the Army in the United States.

RECRUITING AMONG SOLDIERS FOR NEW MERCHANT MARINE

Acting Chairman Donald, of the Shipping Board, has received a cable from Chairman Edward N. Hurley, now in Europe, stating that he had found considerable interest among officers and enlisted men of the American Expeditionary Forces in the possibilities of future service in the merchant marine, and asking for the latest estimate of men needed by the board to man the ships planned under the revised peace building schedule.

A cable was sent Mr. Hurley by Commissioner Donald stating that the recruiting service of the Shipping Board henceforth will train all men entering the merchant marine, an understanding having been reached with the Navy to that effect, and that it plans to train on its training ships 3,000 a month, exclusive of officers, in each of the next two years. The chairman was also informed that the board's training schools for officers will be continued.

Chairman Hurley was further informed that a consignment of 150,000 copies of a pamphlet entitled "Now for the Seven Seas," describing the Shipping Board's training service, is now on its way to France for distribution through social service centers at the front.

VALIDITY OF INTRASTATE RATES FIXED BY RAILROAD ADMINISTRATION UPHELD BY THE DIRECTOR GENERAL

REGRETS THAT ISSUE SHOULD BE RAISED

Mr. McAdoo Expresses Belief That Act of Congress Clearly Confers Right to Initiate Both Interstate And Intrastate Tariffs During Period of Federal Control—Any State or Citizen can Make Complaint to Interstate Commerce Commission.

Director General McAdoo, when his attention was called to-day to the fact that several States have begun litigation drawing in question the validity of rates initiated by him under the Federal control act so far as they apply to intrastate traffic, said he regretted that the issue should be raised and a contest precipitated between State and Federal authority, but that he was acting under the law of Congress as the President's representative and could not subject himself, in that capacity, to the jurisdiction of courts or commissions beyond the provisions of the law.

Intent of the Law.

Considering the purpose for which the statute was enacted, and the extent to which it would be defeated by a division of authority, as well as the terms of the statute itself, there can, in his opinion, be no reasonable doubt that the intention is that during the period of Federal control rates may be initiated to apply to both intrastate and interstate business, and that complaints of such rates are exclusively within the jurisdiction of the Interstate Commerce Commission, which can be relied upon to do justice to all interests. Any other construction of the statute might have been fatal to the prosecution of the war, and would now result in creating an indefensible discrimination between interstate transportation charges and State charges, and serious curtailment of the revenue which the Railroad Administration must have in order to perform the duties placed upon it by Congress.

Conceded in Many States.

The Director General pointed to the fact that the correctness of this position seems to be conceded in many of the States where no question is made as to the power vested in the President to initiate rates applicable to intrastate business and as to those rates being beyond the jurisdiction of the State authorities.

He expressed the hope that the States which have brought suits based upon the opposing contention may for the present

SALVAGE OF ARMY CLOTHING AND EQUIPMENT IN NOVEMBER

The War Department authorizes the following from the office of the Director of Purchase and Storage:

More than five and a quarter million articles of clothing and equipment were reclaimed and returned to stock for reissue by the Salvage Division at the various camps and cantonments in the United States during the month of November, 1918. Included in this list were 127,927 hats, 523,058 pairs of shoes, 4,040,462 articles of clothing, 86,353 cots, and 25,793 tents.

During the month of November the Salvage Division realized from the disposition of waste materials, including garbage, dead animals, condemned hay and straw, the sum of \$329,662.43. Waste materials amounting to \$219,939.92 were turned over to various Army organizations for further use, making a net total of \$549,602.35 resulting from the disposition of waste materials for one month.

at least hold them in abeyance. If such suits are pressed, he said, the Government, although it desires to give the most respectful consideration to the views of the State authorities, has no alternative except to proceed upon the theory that the action of the President's representative in establishing rates is not within the jurisdiction of either State commissions or court, and that orders prescribing rates instead of those which have been initiated, and injunctions forbidding the application of the initiated rates to State shipments can not be observed as to railroads under Federal control.

Only Position Government Can Take.

If the Government is compelled to engage in a legal contest no other position can be taken, and there is no other course that will protect the general public interest.

Aside from the provisions of the statute which empower the President to initiate rates without distinction as to interstate and intrastate traffic, he said that he could not conceive that any State would be placed at a practical disadvantage inasmuch as if any such rates are deemed unreasonable or unjust, the State itself, or the commission of the State or any citizen of the State is free to file a complaint before the Interstate Commerce Commission and have it determined in the light of all of the facts. He reiterated that his concern is not because of any misgiving as to the power of the President under the Federal control act, but because of his aversion to the United States Government being forced into a contest with any of the States about these matters.

KILLED IN SEAPLANE ACCIDENT.

WORK OF CONGRESS BRIEFLY TOLD

SENATE.

The Committee on Interstate Commerce to-day continued its hearing on the proposal of Director General of Railroads McAdoo to extend Government control and operation for a period of five years. Members of the Interstate Commerce Commission were heard to-day, and the committee plans to-morrow to hear counsel for the Association of Railway Executives. Saturday Director General McAdoo concluded his arguments before the committee and gave further reasons why, in his judgment, the period of railway control should be extended.

Before the Committee on Education and Labor President Samuel Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor, concluded his discussion of reconstruction problems. The Foreign Relations Committee ordered the hearings closed on the resolution of Senator Moses, of New Hampshire, calling for the recognition of the present Government of Costa Rica. Chairman Overman, of the Senate subcommittee on the judiciary investigating German propaganda and other activities announced that the hearings would be resumed next Friday. Correspondence was placed in the record Saturday afternoon disclosing how the German-American Alliance tried to have Dr. Charles William Dabney, president of the University of Cincinnati, deposed for attacking German militarism and denouncing the invasion of Belgium.

HOUSE.

Chairmen of the various committees having charge of appropriations held a conference at the suggestion of Speaker Clark and Majority Leader Kitchin to make plans to push all such measures to as speedy a conclusion as possible. Efforts are being made by Democratic leaders to avoid the necessity of an extra session of the incoming Congress, and it was decided that if sufficient progress is not made the hour of meeting shall be earlier than at present and night sessions held if necessary.

Minority Leader Mann refused unanimous consent to a motion to return to the elections committee its report favoring the unseating of Charles A. Sulzer, Democrat, as Delegate from Alaska. The committee report held that James Wickersham, Republican, was elected.

Assistant Secretary of War Crowell, in a communication to the Military Committee, recommended the expenditure of more than \$9,000,000 for the purchase of 14 of the 16 Army cantonments used in training the National Army, and also urged the adoption of Secretary Baker's plan for the establishment of three additional training camps in the South.

Responding to a letter of inquiry by Representative Young asking if a more liberal policy with regard to granting furloughs abroad could not be adopted, Secretary Baker stated that soldiers overseas will be given opportunity to see something of Europe before their return, dependent, of course, upon their personal means.

On Board Cruiser Seattle.

The War Department authorizes the following cabled correction:

The cruiser *Seattle*, which will arrive in New York January 10, in addition to other troops which have been announced, is carrying the 309th Trench Mortar Battery, 5 officers, and 177 men, instead of the 147th Trench Mortar Battery. Eighty-five per cent of these men will be sent to Camp Taylor, while the balance will be sent to miscellaneous posts.

PRESIDENT WILSON IS MADE A CITIZEN OF ROME

(Continued from page 1.)

of her affairs, but the thing that has remained permanent has been the spirit of Rome and the Italian people. That spirit seems to have caught with each age the characteristic purpose of the age. This imperial people now gladly represents the freedom of nations. This people which at one time seemed to conceive the purpose of governing the world now takes part in the liberal enterprise of offering the world its own government. Can there be a finer or more impressive illustration of the indestructible human spirit, and of the unconquerable spirit of liberty?

Germany's Colossal Blunder.

"I have been reflecting in these recent days about a colossal blunder which has been made—the blunder of force by the central empires. If Germany had waited a single generation, she would have had a commercial empire of the world. She was not willing to conquer by skill, by enterprise, by commercial success. She must needs attempt to conquer by arms, and the world will always acclaim the fact that it is impossible to conquer it by arms; that the only thing that conquers it is the sort of service which can be rendered in trade, in intercourse, in friendship, and that there is no conquering power which can suppress the freedom of the human spirit. I have rejoiced personally in the partnership of the Italian and American people, because it is a new partnership in an old enterprise, an enterprise predestined to succeed however it is undertaken—the enterprise which has always borne that handsome name which we call 'Liberty.' Men have pursued it sometimes like a mirage that seemed to elude them, that seemed to run before them as they advanced, but never have they flagged in their purpose to achieve it, and I believe that I am not deceived in supposing that in this age of ours they are nearer to it than they ever were before. The light that shone upon the summit now seems to shine almost at our feet, and if we lose it, it will only be because we have lost faith and courage, for we have the power to attain it.

"So it seems to me that there never was a time when a greater breath of hope and of confidence has come into the minds and the hearts of men like the present. I would not have felt at liberty to come away from America if I had not felt that the time had arrived when, forgetting local interests and local ties and local purposes, men should unite in this great enterprise which will ever tie free men together as a body of brethren and a body of free spirits. I am honored, sir, to be taken into this ancient comradeship of the citizenship of Rome."

King's Speech at State Dinner.

At state dinner given by the King of Italy to President Wilson the King spoke as follows:

"You, yourself, Mr. President, are become our welcome and pleasing

guest only today, but in the conscience of our people your personality already for a long time has marked an ineffable way. It is that which in itself gathers all the powers which go to stimulate a will bent on liberty and justice and is inspired and gives inspiration toward the highest conception of destinies of humanity. The enthusiastic salutations which have accompanied your passage through the ways of Rome today, are attestations of the sentiments of admiration and recognition that your own name and labor and the name and labor of the United States stir in the Italian people. The principles in which you in magnificent synthesis have summed up the ideal reasons of the war of the liberty find atop resonance in Italian hearts. The best traditions of Italian culture, the liveliest currents of our national thoughts, have constantly aimed as at an ideal goal, toward the establishment of an international peace for which you with tenacious faith have affirmed an indeclinable necessity.

Echo of Italy's Second Patria.

"Already before the vicissitudes of war and the fraternity of armies had established to-day's admirable communion of intentions and purposes between our two countries a legion of workers had emigrated to the great Republic. They had knitted America and Italy together with strong cords of relationships, and these became reinforced by the spiritual affinity of both peoples who had a common faith in the virtue of free political government. When Italy entered into the war a breath, a precursor of the American soul penetrated into the rank and file of our Army through the means of our workers, who returned to the fatherland from America and brought into Italy the echo of their second Patria. So, correspondingly, the Italian soul vibrates in the hearts of our emigrants, enrolled under your banners, when the American Nation under your guidance threw itself into the fight against the common enemy. It was natural that your visit should now give form and an expression almost tangible to this fervid agreement of spirit to this happy communion of intentions and ideals, forming themselves between the two peoples, and which are employed in a union always more intimate and a cooperation always more cordial in face of the grave duties imposed by the common victory. Italy, having now gathered to her own bosom those brothers having so long sorrowed under foreign oppression, and having reconquered the confines which alone can give her security and true independence, is preparing herself to cooperate with you in the most cordial manner to reach the most practical means for drawing into a single circle the civilized nations, with the end of creating in a supreme form of a league of nations the conditions most fitted to safeguard with the protection of each one's rights the essentials of a fruitful and active peace.

"Italy and America entered into the great war through a rare act of will; they were moved by a purpose to reaffirm in the scale of human values the principles of liberty and justice. They entered into the war to conquer the powers of war. Their accomplishment is unfinished and the common work must still be developed with firm faith and with tenacious constancy for the purpose of effecting the security of peace. Lift up the glass, Mr. President, and in our honor and in the honor of Mrs. Wilson, whose gentle presence adds charm to your visit, I drink to the prosperity and to the continued prestige of the great American Nation."

President Wilson's Reply.

In reply President Wilson spoke as follows:

"Your majesty; I have been very much touched by the terms of the address which you have just read. I feel it would be difficult for me to make a worthy reply, and yet if I could speak simply the things that are in my heart I am sure they would constitute an adequate reply. I had occasion at the Parliament this afternoon to speak of the strong sympathy that had sprung up between the United States and Italy during the terrible years of the war, but perhaps here I could speak more intimately and say how sincerely the people of the United States had admired your own course and your own constant association with the armies of Italy and the gracious and generous and serving association of her majesty the Queen. It has been a matter of pride with us that so many Italians, so many men of Italian origin, were in our own armies and associated with their brethren of Italy itself in the great enterprise of freedom. These are no small matters, and they complete that process of welding together of the sympathies of nations which have been going on so long between our peoples. The Italians in the United States have excited a particular degree of admiration. They, I believe, are the only people of a given nationality who have been careful to organize themselves to see that their compatriots coming to America were for months and months and year to year guided to the places of the industries most suitable to their previous habits. No other nationality has taken such pains as that, and in serving their fellow countrymen they have served the United States, because these people have found places where they would be most useful and would most immediately earn their own living and add to the prosperity of the country itself. In every way we have been happy in the association at home and abroad with the people of this great State. I was saying playfully to Mr. Orlando and Baron Sonnino this afternoon that in trying to put the people of the world under their proper sovereignties we would not be willing to part with the Italians, because we too much value the contributions they have made, not only to the industries

of the United States, but to the thought and its many elements of life.

Feeling that Goes Deep.

"This is, therefore, a very welcome occasion upon which to express a feeling that goes very deep. I was touched the other day to have an Italian, a very plain man, say to me that we had helped to feed Italy during the war, and it went to my heart, because we had been able to do so little. It was necessary for us to use our tonnage so exclusively for the handling of troops and supplies that had to follow them from the United States, that we could not do half as much as it was our desire to do, to supply grain to this country, or coal, or any of the supplies that it so much needed during the progress of the war. And knowing, as we did in this indirect way, the needs of the country, you will not wonder that we were moved by its steadfastness. My heart goes out to the little poor families all over this great kingdom who stood the brunt and the strain of the war and gave their men gladly to make other men free and other women and children free. These are the people, and many like them, to whom, after all, we owe the glory of this great achievement, and I want to join with you in expressing my profound sympathy not only but my very profound admiration as well. It is my privilege and honor to propose the health of His Majesty the King and of Her Majesty the Queen, and long prosperity to Italy."

WASTE OF NATURAL GAS IN MID-WESTERN STATES

Natural gas, valued conservatively at \$9,000,000, was wasted in a year in a group of Kansas and Missouri cities and towns, according to figures just gathered by the United States Fuel Administration. These figures show wastes varying from 27 to 73 per cent of the gas delivered to the gates of the cities and towns.

To prevent further waste and to determine whether the fault lies with the wholesale or the distributing companies, arrangements have been made to have all wholesale meters in the affected district checked by the division of weights and measures of the Bureau of Standards.

In the entire district affected in the 12 months from September, 1917, to August, 1918, a grand total of 9,537,143,000 cubic feet of gas was delivered and sales of 5,679,256,000 were reported, showing a loss of 3,977,887,000 cubic feet, or 40.58 per cent.

The cause of this great wastage is laid to poor construction of lines, so that the gas leaked out of the pipes.

The figures of the Fuel Administration were obtained from the statistics of the wholesale companies as to the number of cubic feet of gas delivered to gates of the cities and from the figures shown by the meters of the domestic consumers, the difference being the waste.

For years gas in these cities has been purchased on a percentage basis—two-

FEDERAL CONTROL OF RAILROADS FOR PERIOD OF FIVE YEARS URGED BY MR. McADOO AT SENATE HEARING

Following is an extract of a statement of W. G. McAdoo, Director General of Railroads, before the Interstate Commerce Committee of the Senate, January 4, 1919:

My judgment of the railroad situation is that the American people are entitled to a fair test of Federal control under peace or normal conditions. We have spent large sums of money to win the war, and part of that money has been used to gain some experience in the unified operation of the railroads of the United States, an experience necessitated by the war and by the incompetency and inefficiency of private control under existing laws and conditions. I am not suggesting that anybody should be blamed because the laws are as they are or because competitive conditions under private control were as they were. I am speaking only of the inefficiencies and deficiencies of the system and not of individuals.

Money Spent on Improvements.

We have expended a great deal of Government money on improvements for the railroads and for equipment during the war period. We may have to carry for some time a part of the cost of these improvements and this equipment before we can liquidate this cost and secure repayment from the carriers.

As I said in my testimony before this committee one year ago, I felt sure that the Government would have to expend large sums of money for the improvement and betterment of railroad properties during the period of Federal control and that I was sure that the Government would have a better chance to secure the payment of its advances to the railroads while in possession of their properties than when out of possession. Having expended so much money on the railroads and having carried forward this experiment in unified operation to a point where I now think we can enter upon its last stages with obvious benefit to the public interest, it seems to me a pity to throw away all that we have gained and to attempt a hasty solution which may not be a permanent solution at all, but a mere makeshift, and which may injure the best interests of the American people

thirds of the retail price—by the distributing companies from the wholesale companies. In the present cases, each lays the blame for the wastage on the other.

One result of the wastage is shown by the fact that Kansas City, Kans., is planning to resume the use of manufactured gas at \$1.25 a thousand cubic feet, which is equivalent to natural gas at \$2.50.

Officials of the Fuel Administration say that with the conservation which should have been practiced these cities could have had natural gas at 50 cents a thousand feet for 20 years, but that they apparently considered gas at that price so cheap that it was not worth saving.

irreparably at a time when we are facing a new world condition which demands that America shall be on the alert and not only look forward but go forward without hesitation or delay.

Another important element in the situation is the fact that more than a billion dollars of money belonging to the people of the United States have been spent in the building of a great merchant fleet. Under the provisions of the Shipping Bill, this merchant fleet is to be controlled by the Government for five years after the return of peace. We must not permit the money expended on this fleet to be wasted. We must conserve that investment. Why are we building a great merchant marine—for fun? Not at all. We are building it for the purpose of operating it and carrying the American flag to all parts of the world so that we may secure for American producers and American labor the fair rewards of toil and enterprise by getting our share of the world's markets for our products.

Not Right to Take Risks.

Not content with spending already more than a billion dollars of the people's money on a merchant fleet, we are spending hundreds of millions more to increase that fleet by turning out the most modern types in order that they may be operated successfully in friendly rivalry with the other great powers of the earth. After doing all this, it seems to me that if we deliberately surrender the advantages we now have in the unified control of our railroads, so that we can not make them function with our great merchant fleet, then we will be deliberately taking risks we are not justified in taking, risks for which the American people would condemn us hereafter, if we took them with our eyes open to the facts. Of course, if we did it without knowledge of the facts, that would be another thing, but here are the facts facing us—an unexampled opportunity for world leadership in moral and financial influence and in commerce and trade. It seems to me that it is our plain duty to preserve the mobilized energies and industries of America in the form of railroad control for a five-year period and use our unified railroads during the great time ahead of us and coordinate and synchronize their operation with our great merchant fleet, giving to all the ports on the Atlantic, Gulf, and Pacific coasts adequate rail facilities to meet adequate shipping in those ports, so that the development of our country may be carried forward homogeneously and symmetrically and every part of our people be permitted to share in the great prosperity which is now opening up to us.

If we control the railroads and the ships, we can develop all the ports advantageously, distribute the traffic of the country over all the facilities so as to avoid needless congestion and loss and have a unified system of rail transportation on land and ship transportation on the high seas that will bring a new and greater era of prosperity and happiness to the American people than they have ever before enjoyed.

suddenly at 4.15 a. m. to-day at his home at Oyster Bay, N. Y. According to the announcement by the attending physician death was probably due to "a pulmonary embolism."

The following tributes to his memory were paid by officials of the Government:

Acting Secretary of State Polk.

The Acting Secretary of State, Mr. Frank L. Polk, paid this tribute to Col. Roosevelt:

"I am distressed, indeed, to hear of the death of Mr. Roosevelt. He was one of the most striking figures in the history of this country, and, in fact, of his time. It is impossible to measure to-day what he did to arouse the political conscience of the American people. No one could come in personal contact with him without falling under the spell of his winning personality and his marvelous vitality. His courage and dash endeared him to the people, and his death will come as a personal loss to many homes in many lands."

Secretary of War Baker.

"I did not know that Col. Roosevelt's illness was so grave, and am greatly shocked at his sudden death. During his long and brilliant career he touched the public life of America in more ways than any other of our public men. His relations to the Navy and to the Army are of course a part of the history of those two services, and during his terms as President he brought his powerful personality and great energy to bear upon economic problems of the greatest moment.

"I do not know of any career which combines so many diversified and intensively pursued activities—frontiersman, explorer, naturalist, seaman, soldier, executive, and publicist—in each of these relations he was conspicuous and left his mark. Taken all in all, it is the close of a great career, typically American and marked at every point by loyalty to American ideals as well as by resistless energy and determination."

Secretary of the Navy Daniels.

"The death of ex-President Roosevelt removes one of the ablest of the dynamic forces this country has produced. He has blazed new paths

and refused to be fettered by conventions that other distinguished men recognized. Original, forceful, courageous he was the monitor of millions of his fellow countrymen who will miss his inspiring leadership. I knew him first when he was Chairman of the Civil Service Commission in Cleveland's last administration. Always he was a virile leader, inviting contests and dealing heavy blows to those with whom he did not agree. His personality was dominant and compelling. He was interested in everything that concerned his country and the world. He was ready with his remedy for every ill and supremely confident that his remedy was the best. Believing in himself and the cause he espoused, he threw himself into every conflict with every power of mind and body. His last days were saddened by the death of his brave son who gave his life for his country. But his devotion to the cause for which the young man died gave him ability to rejoice in his courage and in the supreme sacrifice."

Secretary Daniels had the following order sent to United States ships and stations this morning in all parts of the world:

"Ex-President Roosevelt died this morning. Colors are to be half-masted until sunset this evening."

Assistant Secretary of State Phillips.

"Rarely is it given for one man to have such a personal and immediate influence on the lives of other men. He represented American manhood in the ideal—courage, forcefulness, ruggedness, honesty of purpose, simplicity, and, above all, the power of preserving vital friendship. To me he was never the politician but always the man eager to do his part in the world for the good of his country and stimulating every one whom he touched with ardent patriotism. At a time when men thought little of the welfare of the Nation and more of their own satisfaction and comfort, he rose to the height of his power and gave to the country a new conception of what the United States stood for and of the responsibility involved upon citizenship. He lived to see his ideal triumph, and young America respond as a unit to the call of the Nation. His influence will live forever and will be realized in the words, 'service to the State.'"

The United States Fuel Administration issues the following orders:

WASHINGTON, D. C., January 2, 1919.

The United States Fuel Administrator, acting under authority of an Executive order of the President of the United States dated August 23, 1917, appointing said administrator, and of subsequent Executive orders, and in furtherance of the purpose of said orders and of the act of Congress therein referred to and approved August 10, 1917,

Hereby orders and directs, that the order of said administrator dated May 16, 1918, prohibiting the shipment by way of the Great Lakes, and the sale and distribution for use as domestic fuel by consumers in Illinois of bituminous coal produced in the States of Pennsylvania, Ohio, Maryland, West Virginia, Virginia, Eastern Kentucky, and Tennessee; the order of said administrator dated May 16, 1918, prohibiting the shipment by way of the Great Lakes and the sale and distribu-

tion for use as domestic fuel by consumers in the States of Wisconsin, Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, and Iowa, of smokeless coal produced in the Pocahontas, Tug River, and New River districts in the States of West Virginia and Virginia; and the order of said administrator dated July 16, 1918, prohibiting the sale, shipment or distribution by any owner, operator, or manager of a dock on Lake Michigan or Lake Superior of smokeless coal except for use in the manufacture of illuminating gas, by-product coke, or coal briquettes, or for other special purpose designated in a permit issued by the district representative of the United States Fuel Administration in charge of such docks, be, and each of said orders is, vacated and set aside as of the effective date of this order, provided that low volatile smokeless coal shall not be sold or shipped from docks on Lake Michigan and Lake Superior for use by domestic consumers unless a permit for such sale or shipment shall first have been obtained from the district representative of the United States Fuel Administrator in charge of said docks; and no such permit shall be granted unless the application therefor shall have been approved by the Federal Fuel Administrator for the State in which the retail dealer or consumer desiring such sale or shipment is located.

This order shall be effective January 2, 1919.

Smith Coal Co., Adair Mining Co., Baileys Creek Coal Co., High Split Coal Co., Wilson Berger Coal Co., and Black Mountain Coal Corporation, after 7 a. m. October 28, 1918, in Harlan County, in the State of Kentucky, may be sold at prices f. o. b. cars at the mine not to exceed \$2.15 per net ton for run of mine, \$2.40 per net ton for prepared sizes, and \$1.85 per net ton for slack or screenings. To these prices may be added the 45 cent allowance for wage increase if said producing companies are entitled to add such allowance under the President's order of October 27, 1917.

NATIONAL BANK CHARTERS AND CAPITAL INCREASES IN 1918

Comparative statement of new national bank charters and capital increases for the years ended December 31, 1918 and 1917.

Charters granted.—In the year ended December 31, 1918, 156 charters were granted to new national banks, with capital of \$13,775,000, as compared with 194 charters, with capital of \$12,085,000, granted during the preceding year.

Charters refused.—In 1918 the Comptroller of the Currency refused 21 applications for charters for new national banks. Thirty-one applications were rejected during the year 1917.

Charters applied for.—For the year 1918 this office received 237 applications for charters for new national banks, with capital of \$14,415,000, which compares with 291 applications received during the year 1917, with capital of \$19,895,000.

Capital increases.—In 1918, 164 national banks increased their capital stock by the sum of \$18,866,000. The previous year 175 banks increased their capital by \$22,934,990.

Capital reductions.—Four national banks reduced their capital during the past year by \$325,000. The preceding year 13 banks reduced their capital by \$750,800.

Liquidations.—Forty-two national banks during the past year went into voluntary liquidation (exclusive of those consolidating with other national banks), their aggregate capital being \$6,620,000, as compared with 74 such banks liquidating during the year 1917, with an aggregate capital of \$6,522,500.

On December 31, 1918, there were 7,781 active national banks. On December 31, 1917, the number was 7,688. Net increase during the year, 93.

The capital, surplus, and undivided profits of all active national banks December 31, 1918, was \$2,317,648,411.

Articles Prohibited In the Mails to Japan

OFFICE OF SECOND ASSISTANT
POSTMASTER GENERAL,
Washington, January 2, 1919.

Quina (quinine), quinine chloride, and quinine sulphate, except such as may be imported with the permission of the minister for home affairs, are prohibited in the regular mails and in the parcel-post mails for Japan.

This prohibition is not applicable to these articles which it may be desired to import into Taiwan (Formosa) and Karafuto (Japanese Saghalin).

Changes Made In Export Conservation List

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 476) that eggs and egg products have been added to the Export Conservation List, effective January 6, 1919.

The War Trade Board also announce the removal of the following commodities

REMOVING GUNS AND GUN PLATFORMS FROM AMERICAN MERCHANT VESSELS

The United States Shipping Board issues the following:

Guns and gun platforms are being removed from American merchant ships in overseas trade as rapidly as they arrive at home ports, the United States Shipping Board announces.

On vessels operated by the board the gun emplacements, usually heavy steel platforms on high supports at bow and stern, are being cut away and dumped on the dock without ceremony.

With the removal of guns the gun crews carried during the submarine war go back to their naval duties.

Changes Considered Important.

The changes thus effected are considered by the Shipping Board an important factor in the work of manning the merchant marine on a basis demanded by peace conditions. During the progress of the war living conditions on merchant vessels were abnormal, owing to congestion. Vessels carrying 12 merchant sailors in their deck force often had naval gun crews of 15 men. These occupied the regular crews' quarters, which the merchant sailors cheerfully gave up, accepting such emergency quarters as could be provided for them.

The Shipping Board is now returning the crews on its vessels to the kind of quarters they were accustomed to occupy before the war, although the forecabin is now toward the stern instead of at the bow of the ship. Danger from mines prompted the change originally, and the arrangement was found so satisfactory that it will be retained.

With proper berth space again available, the Shipping Board plans to use the merchant ships in a broad program for the training of the additional personnel that will be required for new vessels now coming out.

Spare room in the quarters now being vacated by gun crews and elsewhere will be set aside by the Shipping Board, on each of the vessels which it operates, for the accommodation of apprentices, and for four junior deck officers and four junior engineer officers. The latter will be carried in addition to the usual number of officers on the ship, for purposes of special training, following technical instruction ashore at the board's free engineering and navigation schools. It is expected that the new arrangement will absorb a present surplus of junior officers that has resulted from the work of these schools, which have graduated 6,799 navigating officers and engineers since this country entered the war.

Three Months' Sea Training.

Three months' training at sea will be the maximum given a junior officer before he receives his license, and is shipped on another vessel as a regular officer. He will not be a "green hand" when he begins his training, as only experienced men are trained at the board's schools.

Apprentices for the merchant ships will be taken from the board's training ships, and will be trained as part of crews on merchant vessels, in the duties of ordinary seamen, firemen, messmen, or cooks.

Indemnity Applications For Mail Loss or Damage

The attention of all postmasters and postal employees is directed to the revised edition of Form 3812 (Application for Indemnity for Loss or Damage of Insured or C. O. D. Mail) which has been placed in general use. Claims for indemnity must not hereafter be presented on forms of previous editions (which were printed on green paper), and all unused copies of such forms on hand should be destroyed.

Postmasters must not cause duplicate applications for indemnity to be executed until it has been established by inquiry that the original application has been lost (except as set forth in Notice 47, pages 10 and 11, of October, 1918, Postal Guide.)
