



WARNS PHILADELPHIA MAYOR VICE CONDITIONS ARE MENACE TO U. S. SOLDIERS AND SAILORS

VIOLATION OF PROMISE CHARGED

*Secretary Daniels, After Conference
With Secretary Baker, Demands
Immediate Improvement—Federal
Action to Follow Failure.*

The Secretary of War and the Secretary of the Navy had a conference on Wednesday with reference to the situation existing in Philadelphia. They previously had a conference with Col. Hatch, who has been making a thorough investigation of the vice situation in Philadelphia. The Secretaries of War and the Navy say they hope the authorities at Philadelphia will cooperate with Col. Hatch in such a way that they will not be called upon to act, but in default of the preservation of good conditions in Philadelphia for the soldiers and sailors they will take such action as may be required.

Letter to Mayor Smith.

Secretary Daniels sent the following letter to Mayor Smith:

Much against my inclination, I found it necessary last spring to write you a letter calling attention to the open and flagrant vice conditions in Philadelphia which were having a serious effect upon the discipline and morale of the Navy and Army personnel stationed in or visiting in your city.

At that time, in response to the request of this department, you assured Lieut. Col. Chas. B. Hatch, the representative of the Navy Department, that you would take action. This you did and it resulted in immediate improvement of conditions. This improvement continued until recently, when, I am now informed, the conditions in Philadelphia have reverted, so far as the protection as to soldiers and sailors is concerned, to the old conditions which prevailed prior to my communication to you last spring, and that the change of your policy was made in violation of the promise which you made to Col. Hatch, the representative of the Navy Department.

If these conditions, which have already grown materially worse, continue to be maintained it will be extremely difficult, if not impossible for the War Department and the Navy Department to fulfill the solemn obligations made to the parents and communities from which these boys have come, and to return them to their homes, in the words of the President, "with no wounds except those borne in honorable conflict."

JAPANESE PEACE DELEGATION HAS LEFT NEW YORK FOR FRANCE

The Japanese mission en route to the peace conference at Versailles has sailed from New York. Baron Nobuaki Mikano, the head of the delegation, wireless to-day a message to Acting Secretary of State Polk expressing appreciation "of the many and great courtesies extended to me and to the members of this mission throughout our stay in the United States en route to Europe."

Baron Mikano added:

"I am overwhelmed by the great consideration and kindness on the part of the Government and people of the United States at all points of our journey across the continent and during the period of rest in New York. Permit me to renew assurances of sentiments reciprocating those so graciously expressed in your telegram of farewell and to extend wishes for much happiness for yourself and your countrymen in this and future years."

BEEF PRODUCTS AND OILS OPENED TO FREER EXPORT TO THE NEUTRAL NATIONS BY TRADE BOARD ORDERS

CONSERVATION LIST CHANGES ANNOUNCED

*Countries of Northern Europe to Be Especially Benefited by Board's Action.
Supervision of Hide and Skin Imports by the Tanners' Council Also Discontinued—Other Rules Off.*

The storehouses of America's abundance were opened more widely to less-favored nations of the world in notable orders issued January 8 by the War Trade Board, removing many restrictions heretofore existing on exports and imports. The board's policy of encouraging the resumption of normal trade relations as rapidly as possible and an increase in the supply of foodstuffs and some other articles brought about through the economy of the American people were largely determinative circumstances impelling the board's action.

Notable Removals from List.

The most notable removals from the Export Conservation List were a list of beef products and a list of vegetable oils and products. The beef-product list includes fresh or frozen beef, beef loaf, canned and dried beef, ox tongue, pickled and barreled beef, corned-beef hash, and completes removals of all commodities originally included in the conservation list under the general heading of beef and beef products.

Aid to Neutral Countries.

The relaxation of restrictions on vegetable oils and products will be of particular aid to the neutral countries of northern Europe, which already have received marked manifestations of friendship felt toward them by the United States Government in previous authorization of shipments of pork, pork products, sugar, fats, and other foodstuffs of which they are reported to be urgently in need. Production of vegetable oils in the United States has increased notably during the war, it was stated.

The removals from the Export Conservation List include the following: Coconut oil, copra oil, cottonseed oil (excepting hydrogenated cottonseed oil), palm

oil, peanut oil, soya-bean oil, vegetable stearin, coconut butter, butter substitutes, oleomargarine, palm-kernel oil, vegetable olein, and inedible vegetable greases.

Cattle Supply Increased.

The cattle supply of the Nation also has increased notably. The board also announced that the supervision heretofore exercised through the Tanners' Council of the United States of America (Inc.), over the importation of nearly all hides and skins, tanning materials, and finished leathers has been discontinued, and that all regulations on the importation of castor beans and castor oil have been lifted, as have restrictions upon importations of flaxseed and linseed. Applications for licenses to import chrome ore, it was announced, will be given consideration, provided the shipments to be licensed were actually in transit to the United States on November 11, 1918.

Relaxations by Great Britain.

Information that Great Britain had withdrawn import license requirements on wood and metal working machines of a great variety of types and on leather gloves, coffee, and tobacco, manufactured and unmanufactured, was given out by the board. These relaxations are officially effective only until March 1, 1919, but it is expected that they will then be further extended. Shipping recommendations from the Priority Board at Cairo are no longer required in connection with transshipments in the United Kingdom of goods destined to Egypt.

War Trade Board Orders Lifting Import Rules On Various Commodities

The War Trade Board announces, in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 491), that all regulations restricting and controlling the importation of castor beans and castor oil have been lifted. Licenses for the importation of castor beans and castor oil will now be issued without provision that the bill of lading be indorsed to the Textile Alliance. All outstanding Government options on imported castor beans and castor oil have been canceled.

Release of Control Over Hides.

The War Trade Board announces, in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 492), that the supervision heretofore exercised by the War Trade Board through the Tanners' Council of the United States of America (Inc.), over the importation of all hides and skins except woolled or haired sheepskins and woolled or haired lambskins; all materials for tanning or dressing leather and all substances from which tanning materials can be extracted, and all imported finished leathers, has been discontinued. Import licenses will now be issued without the provision that the bill of lading be indorsed to the Tanners' Council.

Flaxseed or Linseed Rules Lifted.

The War Trade Board announces, in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 493), that the restriction upon the importation of flaxseed or linseed has been removed, and that import licenses will now be issued

Order Removing All Beef Products From the Export Conservation List

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 489) the following removals from the Export Conservation List:

Beef products, as follows: Beef loaf, canned, corned beef hash (canned), dried, fresh or frozen beef, ox tongues, pickled and barreled.

(The above, in addition to those already announced in previous notices, take from the conservation list all commodities

originally included under the general heading of beef and beef products.)

Coconut oil, copra oil, corn oil, cottonseed oil (except hydrogenated cottonseed oil), palm oil, peanut oil, soya-bean oil, stearin (vegetable), coconut butter, butter substitutes, oleomargarine.

The War Trade Board also announces that plam-kernel oil, vegetable olein, inedible vegetable greases are no longer considered as upon the conservation list.

3,000 DISCHARGED SOLDIERS ENLIST IN MERCHANT MARINE

That the sea is calling many soldiers on their demobilization is indicated by a statement issued by the Shipping Board, to the effect that more than 3,000 men in uniform have recently signed cards at the camps, stating that they wished to enter the merchant marine on quitting the Army.

Agents at Camps.

By order of the War Department the Shipping Board Recruiting Service has been permitted to place an agent at each of the 30 camps where men are now being demobilized. The soldiers are allowed to file cards with these agents, expressing their desire to go to sea.

Under the order no actual recruiting is done at camp, but as soon as the demobilized soldier reaches home he receives a communication from the Shipping Board recruiting service telling him where he may be signed on for sea duty.

Many Experienced Men.

About 600 of the soldiers thus far listed by this means have had previous seagoing experience and can be placed at once in the crews of new cargo vessels and other American shipping. The others are "green," and will be given a course of training by the Shipping Board before being sent to sea.

A considerable number of these ex-soldiers are now reporting daily at the base of the Shipping Board Atlantic training squadron at Boston and are being placed on the training ships.

BUSINESS FOR U. S. FORESEEN IN THE REBUILDING OF EUROPE

Labor Department Information Indicates a Large Demand Coming for American Material.

Rebuilding northern France and Belgium will mean in the latter part of this year a great volume of business for the United States, according to preliminary information which has reached officials of the Department of Labor, provided industry in this country is in a position to accept the orders.

Immediate revival of business activity is essential, however, in the opinion of these officials, if this country is to profit to the greatest extent from the demand for machinery and supplies abroad. Factories are now being transformed from a war basis to peace production, and most of them will probably be available for full-time peace production in the fall of this year.

Roads and Public Works.

In the meantime, however, the building of roads and public works can be undertaken to advantage in order that they may be available for the betterment of industry as a whole in the future. Many cities also have housing problems that are becoming serious, owing to the practical cessation of building during the war.

Figures already obtained by the division of public works and construction development of the Department of Labor give some idea of the seriousness of this problem. Building fell off 29 per cent in 101 large cities of this country in 1917, as compared with 1916, and for some years before that time it had been subnormal.

Figures for November, 1918, show for 151 of the principal cities of the country an average loss in the amount of building under way of 85 per cent, as compared with November, 1917, which was itself a poor month.

Improved housing and better roads have been brought into rank as among America's chief needs, as a result of the cessation of building activity during the war, and although the condition is much less serious than in England, the efficient conduct of industry requires remedial action. In many parts of the country the demand has arisen for better roads, particularly surfaced roads.

MACHINERY IMPORT RULES TO ENGLAND ARE RELAXED; SHIPMENTS NOW PERMITTED WITHOUT SPECIAL LICENSE

LIST ANNOUNCED BY WAR TRADE BOARD

New Order to Continue Until March 1, 1919—Expected to Be Extended After That Date—New Ruling on the Transshipment in United Kingdom of Merchandise for Egypt.

For the information of exporters in the United States who are interested in the relaxations of import restrictions in countries abroad, the War Trade Board announces, in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 490), that they have received advice that the following commodities may be imported into Great Britain without the necessity of obtaining an individual import license therefor:

Wood Working and Other Machinery.

All machinery driven by power and suitable for use in cutting, working, or operating on wood including sawing machines of all descriptions, general joiners, mortise, tenon and boring machines, lathes and rounding machines, box and cask making machines, and all machinery accessory thereto, scraping and sand-papering machines, wheelwright machinery, firewood making and bundling machinery, wood, wool, fiber and pulp machinery, saw sharpening and setting machines, saw stretchers and brazing apparatus, all machines for grinding, planing or molding irons, all machine tools and machinery driven by power and suitable for use in cutting, stamping or working metal, including lathes, milling machines, drilling machines, planers, shapers, screw machines, chucking machines, boring machines, slotting machines, grinding machines, boring and turning mills, power presses, punching and shearing machines, forging machines, cutting-off machines, gear-cutting machines, centering machines, leather gloves, coffee and tobacco, manufactured and unmanufactured including cigars and cigarettes.

Limited to March 1, 1919.

This list, together with the list contained in W. T. B. R. 390, December 9, 1918, contains all the commodities as to which the War Trade Board has had notice of import relaxations by Great Britain up to the present time. It is stated that these relaxations are to continue only until March 1, 1919, but it is anticipated that at that time they will be again extended.

The War Trade Board is also informed that shipping recommendations from the Priority Board at Cairo are no longer required in connection with transshipments

FAILURE TO ACKNOWLEDGE ORDERS BY AMERICAN FIRMS

Consul Wilbur T. Gracey, at Monterey, Mexico, reports:

The attention of the consulate has been called to the difficulty that local firms are experiencing in securing acknowledgments of orders sent by them to the United States. This is a condition which was prevalent prior to the war, but with the added difficulties of trade incident to present conditions, the situation has been very much intensified. It appears that firms here send orders to the United States and get no replies for several weeks or months, and in some cases numerous telegrams are sent without any replies being received.

The failure to acknowledge receipt of orders causes a great deal of quite unnecessary trouble and anxiety, and it is believed that if American manufacturers could be brought to realize how important it is for buyers in foreign countries to know as soon as possible that their orders have been received and are receiving attention, and if possible the approximate date when goods might be shipped, it is probable that greater care would be taken in this matter.

In view of the seriousness of the situation, fraught as it is with grave consequences, we must insist that during the period of demobilization the authorities at Philadelphia will suppress prostitution and other vicious conditions and intrust this duty to those who are able to cope adequately with the situation. The necessity of such action is quite if not even more important in the period of demobilization than in the period of mobilization.

I have had a conference with the Secretary of War with reference to the conditions at Philadelphia, and I am writing to you to say that we are both in accord, and unless necessary action is taken to give adequate and full protection to the soldiers and sailors in Philadelphia, steps will be taken as will give the needed protection to the thousands of young men in uniform who must either visit Philadelphia or be denied by the war and naval authorities the liberty which ought to be given them. It is our duty to see that they have the same wholesome surroundings in Philadelphia that are afforded them in other cities and this duty will not be evaded.

Awaiting your early response and assurances that the city authorities will make it unnecessary for action by the Federal authorities, I am,

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TAX AND BOND PAYMENTS IN TREASURY CERTIFICATES

The Treasury Department authorizes the following:

The Treasury is announcing two series of Treasury certificates of indebtedness, one acceptable in payment on bond subscriptions and one acceptable in payment of taxes. Of course, both series are absolutely payable in cash if the owner does not elect to make use of them in payment for bonds or taxes. The Treasury's cash requirements are at their maximum. Ordinary disbursements for Monday, January 6, were more than \$125,900,000, which is the largest amount of ordinary disbursements for any one day in our history.

To Meet Cash Requirements.

In reducing the minimum amount of bond certificates offered from \$750,000,000 to \$600,000,000, and offering at the same time a limited amount of tax certificates, the Treasury hopes to meet its cash requirements and at the same time to reduce the amount of certificates sold directly to the banks. While the offering of bond certificates will close on January 21, no date is set for closing the issue of tax certificates. Tax certificates should make a broad appeal to those who have income and profits taxes to pay. Under the existing law income and profits taxes are payable on June 15. An installment of such taxes is payable on June 15 under the pending revenue bill as passed by the Senate, and it is believed that the action of the Senate in this respect will be acquiesced in.

Taxes Payable May 15.

Under the pending revenue bill as passed by the House an installment of income and profits taxes is payable on May 15, and the certificates now offered would be available on that date if that date were adhered to in the law as finally enacted, so that in any event this issue of certificates should be conveniently available for the use of taxpayers. It is hoped that banks and trust companies will use their best efforts to further the sale of these certificates, thus enabling their customers to prepare in advance for the heavy tax payments and assisting the Government to meet its current requirements.

8,280 Sick and Wounded Landed in U. S. During the Week Ended January 3

The War Department authorizes the following statement:

During the week ended January 3 the total number of sick and wounded soldiers landed in the United States from the American Expeditionary Force was 8,280, the largest number ever landed in a single week. Of these 5,446 were received in the clearing hospitals at Newport News, while the remainder of 2,834 arrived at New York. Of this number 1,734 were removed from the grounded transport *Northern Pacific*. The men are now being sent to Army general hospitals and convalescent camps.

RESULTS OF FUEL SAVING BY RESTRICTED INDUSTRIES

What results have been obtained in fuel conservation by American industries is being illustrated as the United States Fuel Administration gathers together definite records of what has been accomplished through restrictive orders and voluntary cooperation.

Authentic statistics have now been tabulated from reports made by 4,000 clay-products companies, representing practically the entire industry, of what each one actually saved during the first six months of 1918. Here is the table of actual six months' saving as compiled by the Fuel Administration's statistical bureau:

According to letters received by the Fuel Administration, the lessons of economy through more efficient methods learned by cooperation with the Fuel Administration's engineers resulted in actual profit to both the industry in general and the labor bodies connected with it, and will be continued in most cases, although the restrictions have been lifted.

THRIFT STAMPS GOOD IN 1919.

The attention of postmasters is invited to sections 9 and 13 of the circular issued December 18 in regard to the recall of the 1918 war-savings stamps and the issuance of the 1919 series, stating that thrift stamps will continue in use and that a thrift card with 16 stamps affixed may be exchanged for a 1919 war-savings stamp on payment in cash of the difference between \$4 and the current price of the war-savings stamp.

2. In view of this provision, the sentence printed on the thrift cards reading, "Such payment and exchange must be made during the year 1918" is inoperative.

WORK OF CONGRESS BRIEFLY TOLD

SENATE.

Conferees on the war-revenue bill held their first session yesterday and agreed upon the rates of surtaxes and normal taxes on individual incomes as adopted by the Senate. The House conferees also accepted the Senate's exemption of State and municipal bonds from Federal taxation. Announcement was made that as conclusions are reached by the conferees the result would be made public and the decision would be final and conclusive so far as the conferees are concerned.

Before the Interstate Commerce Committee Interstate Commerce Commissioner Edgar E. Clark expressed it as the view of the majority of the commission that Congress and not the President should determine when the railroads should be turned back to private management.

Pro-German propaganda was further inquired into yesterday by the subcommittee of the judiciary committee. Prof. Ellery C. Stowell, formerly of Columbia University, a witness, testified that his anti-German writings were the indirect cause of his retirement from the faculty of that institution.

The nomination of Huston Thompson, of Colorado, as a member of the Federal Trade Commission, to succeed Senator-elect Harris, of Georgia, was confirmed.

Senator Smith, of Georgia, introduced a resolution proposing the repeal of the President's war power to lay an embargo on exports.

HOUSE.

Chairman Colver, of the Federal Trade Commission, told the Interstate Commerce Committee that the successful efforts of the five big packing establishments to gain control of stockyards have enabled them to completely control the country's meat business.

Before the Committee on Public Buildings Secretary Baker urged the completion of the housing project on Union Station Plaza in Washington. He described housing conditions in Washington for Government war workers as deplorable and insisted that the completion of this project was essential to the proper transaction of the public business. Secretary Baker said he anticipated no appreciable decrease in the number of employees in this city for another year. Delegations from Bridgeport, Philadelphia, and Norfolk also appeared before the committee to protest against any stoppage of work on housing projects in those cities.

The House spent the day without reaching a conclusion on the bill to legalize the informal contracts entered into by the War Department for military supplies. During the discussion a speech was made by Representative Campbell, of Kansas, in which he criticized the War Department. The House took a two hours' recess out of respect to former president Roosevelt, whose funeral was held yesterday afternoon.

COTTON PRODUCTION IN 1917; EXPORTS AND CONSUMPTION

A bulletin soon to be issued by the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce, shows, for the American crop of 1917, a production of 11,248,242 running bales of cotton, counting round as half bales (equivalent to 11,302,375 bales of 500 pounds each, gross weight), worth \$1,532,690,000 to the growers, and of 5,040,000 tons of cotton seed, worth \$333,550,000; and for the "cotton year" ended July 31, 1918, a consumption of 6,566,489 bales (excluding linters), exports of 4,288,420 bales, net imports of 217,381 bales, stocks on hand at the beginning of the year of 2,720,173 bales and at the end of the year of 3,450,188 bales, and cotton spindles active at some time during the year to the number of 34,542,665. For the entire world the production of lint cotton destined for factory use was 17,410,000 and the mill consumption 17,701,000 bales of 500 pounds net weight.

The American crop of 1917 fell below that of 1916 by 147,555 equivalent 500-pound bales, or 1.3 per cent, but exceeded that of 1915 by 110,555 bales, or 1 per cent. Each of these three crops was smaller than that of any year from 1910 to 1914, inclusive.

Texas alone produced 3,125,378 equivalent 500-pound bales, or nearly 28 per cent of the total crop of 1917; and three States—Georgia, South Carolina, and Texas, each with an output of more than 1,000,000 bales—produced 55 per cent.

According to the revised estimates of the Department of Agriculture, the acreage from which the crop of 1917 was harvested amounted to 33,841,000—the smallest, with the exception of that for 1915, shown for any year since 1910. The outbreak of the European war brought about a demoralized condition in the market, which had the effect of cutting down cotton planting in 1915, the acreage harvested that year being only 31,412,000, as against 36,832,000 for the preceding year.

Consumption and Exports.

During the year ended July 31, 1918, the mills of the United States consumed 6,566,489 running bales of cotton. This consumption comprised 6,296,756 bales of domestic upland cotton, 85,939 bales of sea-island cotton, and 183,794 bales of foreign cotton. In addition, 1,118,840 bales of linters were consumed. The stocks held in the country on July 31, 1918, aggregated 3,450,188 bales of lint cotton and 489,917 bales of linters.

The exports during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1918, 4,641,023 equivalent 500-pound bales, were less than for any preceding year since 1893, and fell below those of 1917 (6,176,162 bales) by nearly 25 per cent. The greatest amount of cotton exported during any fiscal year in the history of the industry is shown for 1912—11,070,251 bales. For the following year the exports fell to 9,124,591 bales, and during the fiscal year 1914, which ended just prior to the outbreak of the European war, 9,521,881 bales were exported. Since that year the exports have declined, although 1917 showed a slight increase as compared with 1916. Less than half as much cotton was exported in the fiscal year 1918 as in the fiscal year 1914.

SUPREME COURT PROCEEDINGS

SUPREME COURT OF THE UNITED STATES.
WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 8, 1919

Present: The Chief Justice, Mr. Justice McKenna, Mr. Justice Holmes, Mr. Justice Day, Mr. Justice Van Devanter, Mr. Justice Pitney, Mr. Justice Brandeis, and Mr. Justice Clarke.

The Chief Justice said:

"Gentlemen of the bar, the funeral of Mr. Roosevelt takes place to-day. The two Houses of Congress have adjourned and, following an order of the President, the departments of the Government will be closed. With these things in mind, the court feels that it can not transact public business to-day. It has, therefore, determined to adjourn until to-morrow morning, not only as an additional manifestation of its sense of the loss which the country has suffered, but also as an indication that, at least in spirit, its members will, in unison with all his countrymen, sorrowfully follow his remains to their last resting place."

Adjourned until to-morrow at 12 o'clock. The day call for Thursday, January 9, will be as follows: Nos. 130 (and 404), 217, 345, 437 (and 438), 715 (and 739) 598, 62 (and 63), 119, 120, and 123 (to 129).

REGULATIONS AND RULES FOR IMPORT LICENSES TO BELGIUM

Present regulations in Belgium as to the issuance of import licenses have been announced, according to a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 488), by the War Trade Board in response to many requests from exporters.

Licenses for the importation of foodstuffs, clothing, textiles, and tobacco are issued by the ministry of industry, labor, and re-education.

Licenses for the importation of all other commodities are issued by the minister of economic affairs.

When the consignees are Belgians applications for import licenses will only be received after a favorable recommendation of the chamber of commerce of their district.

When the consignees are foreigners they should make their applications for import licenses to their respective legations at Brussels, who will present same to the competent Belgian ministry.

The Commission for Relief in Belgium state that they have been informed that Belgian import licenses are no longer required for the following foodstuffs: Fish, fresh, dried, salt, and preserved; oysters, mussels, shrimp, and other shellfish; fresh vegetables; fruits, fresh and dried; milk; butter; margarine; cheese; eggs; edible oils; meat, fresh, salted, smoked, preserved, and frozen; coffee; rice; alimentary pastes; spices; condiments; edible fats; soap.

STRIKE AT BUENOS AIRES.

Four Killed and Twenty Wounded in Port Labor Disturbance.

Advices to the State Department from Buenos Aires state that a general strike of port laborers and stevedores has been declared by the United Workmen's organization, with the result that all shipping is tied up.

A pitched battle between the strikers and workmen hired to replace them broke out at Vasena & Co.'s foundries and the police were called upon to maintain order. Twenty were wounded and four killed as a result of the disturbances.

Tax Exemptions and Other Conditions Set Forth in Announcement by Secretary Glass—Payments by Credit Allowed Qualified Depositories for Them- selves and Customers to Limited Amount.

The Secretary of the Treasury under the authority of the act approved September 24, 1917, as amended by the act approved April 4, 1918, offers for subscription, at par and accrued interest, through the Federal reserve banks, \$600,000,000 or more Treasury certificates of indebtedness, Series V D, dated and bearing interest from January 16, 1919, payable June 17, 1919, with interest at the rate of 4½ per cent per annum. The interest on an amount of bonds and certificates authorized by said act approved September 24, 1917, and amendments thereto, the principal of which does not exceed in the aggregate \$5,000, owned by any individual, partnership, association, or corporation, shall be exempt from the taxes provided for in clause (b) above.

Notice of Redemption.

Upon 10 days' public notice, given in such manner as may be determined by the Secretary of the Treasury, the certificates of this series may be redeemed as a whole at par and accrued interest on or after any date, occurring before the maturity of such certificates, set for the payment of the first installment of the subscription price of any bonds offered for subscription by the United States after the offering and before the maturity of such certificates. PLAN FOR DISSOLUTION OF THE AMERICAN PROTECTIVE LEAGUE ON FEBRUARY 1, 1919

WASHINGTON, D. C.,
December 19, 1918.

To all Chiefs of the American Protective League:

By authority of the Attorney General of the United States, the national directors present herewith the plan for the dissolution of the American Protective League on February 1, 1919.

The American Protective League was organized to serve the Government of the United States in the emergency of the great war. Through the Department of Justice it has been privileged to render service of great value to the Government in the investigation and report of enemy activities and disloyalties in all sections; in aiding all local and district draft boards in the enforcement of the selective-service law, and the apprehension of delinquents and deserters; in cooperating with the Military Intelligence Division of the General Staff in the gathering of information of military importance and the investigation of the character and loyalty of applicants for Army commissions, for passports and for civilian service overseas; and in making investigations of various kinds for other departments, boards, and agencies of the Government. Its work has been essentially war work.

With the cessation of hostilities the service of the league was by no means concluded. A large number of investigations were still pending. It was necessary that these investigations be completed in order that the Government might determine whether or not prosecutions should be instituted against the individuals charged with infractions or evasions of the war statutes. Furthermore, as the war statutes remained in full force, the necessity for certain investigations under these statutes immediately arose.

With the disposal of these matters, however, the need for the service of the American Protective League as a war agency is at an end. Decision must therefore be made whether or not the league shall be continued as an auxiliary to the Department of Justice for the purpose of investigating and reporting upon infractions and evasions of laws of the United States other than those contained in the war statutes, or whether the league shall be dissolved. In determining this question, the national directors have conferred repeatedly and at length with the officials of the Department of Justice, and the conclusion has now been reached that the league should be dissolved. Several considerations have impelled this decision.

It is recognized that important service might still be rendered by the organization in many ways. Alien enemy applicants for naturalization should be investigated; fraudulent allotments should be uncovered; delinquents and deserters not yet apprehended should be brought to justice; individuals and organizations advocating the overthrow of government and the destruction of social order by force should be reported. Other opportunities for service are at hand. But this work can and should be done by existing departments of the Government. The aggregate of the work would be in-

considerable as compared with the enormous volume of work carried on by the league during the months of the war, and would not alone justify the maintenance of a great citizen organization in aid of the Government. Nor would the work of the league be likely to prove as efficient as in time of war. During that period no sacrifice of time or effort was too great for the members. Men of the highest business and professional ability made their work for the league their first consideration, without regard to personal sacrifice. Their first desire was to help win the war. Now that the war has been gloriously won, they feel that their present duty is to take their place in the constructive work of peace. The result has been, and will be in increasing degree, to deprive the league in large part of its most responsible and stable officers and members. For similar reasons the problem of finance will soon become acute, and local divisions will become embarrassed or will cease to operate for lack of financial support.

Important as are the above considerations, there are deeper reasons for the dissolution of the league. The members have been trained and have rendered their service as investigators. They have acted under the direction of a department of the Government, and under their oath of office have reported infractions of the laws of the country without fear or favor wherever they were found. The warrant for their inquiry into the interests and activities of their fellow citizens was the existence of the national emergency. But the war is ended and the country will soon be at peace, confronted only by those enemies internal and external who wage their war in time of peace. In such time there is no place for organized citizen espionage. It is contrary to the spirit of democracy. It is dangerous in its tendencies and so might well be disastrous in its results. So far as the American Protective League is concerned, many of its members would quite naturally turn themselves to combating those radical movements which they consider hostile to the best interests of their country. Certain of these movements involve political doctrines, some of which are undoubtedly violative of our law, but others of which infringe no law. Other radical movements involve disputes between labor and capital, and the members of the league in certain sections would find themselves arrayed upon one side or the other of controversies of this character.

The Department of Justice pursues its course free from political controversy or industrial dispute. Its officials serve only the Government and so are able to hold themselves aloof. But the officers and members of the league are active in every industry, trade, and profession. As citizens they should, and do, take part in the affairs of their respective States and of the Nation. They could not, if they would, separate themselves from active participation in such affairs. Under these circumstances it would be inevitable that through individual activities local divisions would be drawn into political and industrial controversy and would find themselves in the position of

ALLOWS CHARTER OF NEUTRAL SHIPS TO PRIVATE CITIZENS

The United States Shipping Board announces that neutral vessels will hereafter be allowed to charter to the various time charterers as in prewar times. This action was the result of the rescinding of a resolution passed by the Shipping Board on April 18, as follows:

"Resolved, That it is the sense of this board that hereafter no charters of neutral vessels shall be approved excepting to the board."

As a result of this resolution the board exercised complete control over many neutral vessels. A number of Norwegian, Danish, and Swedish steamers were affected.

Since the armistice the Army has relinquished many steamers together with the release of several of our new American steamers from the New England coal business; considerable tonnage has thus been thrown on the market. Vessels averaging 3,500 dead-weight tonnage capacity were mostly affected.

At the last meeting of the board (Tuesday) it was determined to no longer prohibit the chartering committee of the United States Shipping Board from approving charters of neutral vessels to private citizens.

The board is informed that by this action owners of Norwegian steamers now offering in the New York market will find business for these vessels from private citizens.

combating that which they might consider political heresy or industrial menace, but which would nevertheless be lawful agitation which the Department of Justice could not well oppose.

Under these circumstances the usefulness of the league as an auxiliary of the Department of Justice would quickly become impaired and would sooner or later come to an end.

The national directors deeply appreciate the spirit which has prompted many officers and members to express the hope that the league be continued as a patriotic body in the future. They realize that these expressions are born of a fine desire to serve the country in peace as well as in war. But after the dissolution of the league its members as citizens of the United States will continue to render the best of service to the country. Their experience and training will splendidly equip them for that service, and in the years to come as individual citizens of their respective communities they will not only afford stability in times of agitation or unrest, but they will exert a powerful force in opposition to dangerous movements and tendencies wherever they may arise. The service of the league will not end; the league will not die. Though formally dissolved, it will remain a potent force.

These are the considerations which in the main have prompted the decision.

We inclose herewith the prescribed plan which must be diligently followed by all local chiefs in order that the league may be dissolved in regular order, in a manner worthy of its history and accomplishment.

FUEL ADMINISTRATION ORDER INTENDED TO PREVENT WASTE IN THE USE OF NATURAL GAS

NECESSARY BECAUSE OF GENERAL SHORTAGE

Burning of Flambeaux or Other Outside Lights in Daytime Prohibited—Li- censees Directed to Report All Cases where Consum- ers Persist in Wasteful- ness—Text of Order and Explanatory Statement.

The United States Fuel Administration issues the following:

WASHINGTON, D. C., January 4, 1919.

It appearing to the United States Fuel Administrator that the supply of natural gas throughout the United States is rapidly diminishing, and that a general shortage therein exists, and that it is necessary, therefore, in order to secure an adequate supply and equitable distribution, that all wasteful practices in the consumption of natural gas shall be eliminated,

The United States Fuel Administrator, acting under authority of an Executive order of the President of the United States, dated August 23, 1917, appointing said administrator, and of subsequent Executive orders, and in furtherance of the purpose of said orders and of the act of Congress therein referred to and approved August 10, 1917,

Text of Regulation.

Hereby makes and establishes the following regulation, effective January 8, 1919, and until further or other order, and subject to general or specific modification from time to time, and at any time:

REGULATION.

The use of natural gas in any wasteful manner is hereby prohibited. It shall be deemed wasteful to burn natural gas by means of flambeaux or open lights; to burn natural gas for the purpose of outside lighting during daylight hours; to burn natural gas in inefficient appliances; to burn more natural gas than is reasonably necessary for the purpose which it is intended to serve; or to consume natural gas in any other manner which is not reasonably efficient and economical. Licensees are hereby directed to report to the United States Fuel Administration all cases where consumers persist in the wasteful use of natural gas.

STATEMENT REGARDING ORDER PROHIBITING
THE USE OF NATURAL GAS IN ANY WASTE-
FUL MANNER.

The marketed production of natural gas in the United States amounts to

about 800 billion cubic feet a year, serving about 10 per cent of the population. This product takes the place of over 30,000,000 tons of coal. It is estimated that the wastage of natural gas is equal to the consumption, and that a conspicuous proportion of this loss results from practices which may readily be eradicated.

Owing to the magnitude of the service rendered by natural gas and the significance of the preventable losses taking place in its consumption, the conservation of this product is one of great importance, especially during the coming winter. The efforts of the Fuel Administration toward the conservation of natural gas have already effected a considerable saving translatable in terms of coal.

The natural gas situation has become steadily worse during the last few years. In many parts of the country at the present moment it is critical; in many communities the consequences during the coming winter will be serious. The supply is beginning to run short, and only by the greatest vigilance and care can due service be obtained from the quantity available. The losses in connection with the use of natural gas are greater relatively than those of any other commodity, and many of these losses are subject to immediate improvement through enforcement of proper regulations.

Prior to June 30, 1916, the production of natural gas in West Virginia for a number of years had been supporting the decline in output of Ohio, Indiana, and Pennsylvania, where the seriousness of the situation is somewhat hidden by the supply imported from the neighboring State. But, according to figures compiled by the public utilities commission of West Virginia, the output in this State during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1917, declined to the extent of about 12 per cent, thus withdrawing this measure of its support from the States of Indiana, Ohio, and Pennsylvania.

In view of such interrelation of consumption and production and the fact that a decline in available supply in a given community is usually hidden for a period through an overdraft upon more distant fields, the situation in the aggregate is capable of developing critical aspects with disastrous suddenness. The coincidence of national emergency with what would have ordinarily been a natural gas shortage has aggravated the situation and makes more essential a continuation of conservation measures.

The need for natural gas conservation is no better exemplified than in the case of Louisville, Ky. When, last winter, its supply of natural gas failed, it was found that 1.9 per cent of the consumers were using 30.7 per cent of the natural gas.

This was due in part to the consumption of natural gas in converted coal furnaces, wholly improper appliance for burning natural gas. Public utilities commissions are now prohibiting the use of natural gas in appliances not primarily constructed for such use.

Investigations by the Fuel Adminis-

tration show that the wastage due to leakage in distributing systems has been enormous. In many cases, where meters were installed, it was found that the leakage ran as high as 50 per cent of the total. The leakage in the consumers' house pipes is much larger than ordinarily appreciated. In houses where leakage has been checked, it has been found that the leakage averaged 19,000 cubic feet of gas per annum for each house. There are many distributing plants that waste more than one-third of the gas delivered at the gates of the town, and there are many main transmission lines where the percentage of leakage is very high.

A large number of open flame torches, or flambeaux, are still in use. This is not only an inefficient and wasteful method of securing illumination at night, but in many instances the torches are not shut off during the day and this practice is especially reprehensible at the present time.

Where wells are blown into the atmosphere for water-freeing purposes, the gas, of necessity, is lost. However, in many cases the wells are blown longer than necessary, and in others it would be feasible to install special pumps for the removal of the water so as to curtail this form of waste. A large proportion of waste is due to the fact that in many communities cheap gas, or even free gas, is supplied for manufacturing. Where either is done, efficient devices are ordinarily not in use and a considerable improvement can be effected.

The so-called free gas feature has been especially troublesome and has resulted in depriving many domestic consumers of an adequate supply of the best fuel available for household use. In an extensive investigation of the amount of gas consumed by domestic consumers in West Virginia having this so-called free gas service privilege (on account of having gas wells or gas lines on their farms), it was found that the average consumption per free consumer a year was 480,000 cubic feet. This is a waste of at least 350,000 cubic feet for each free consumer a year. There are at least 4,400 free consumers in West Virginia, and at this rate of waste this item alone amounts to 1,540,000,000 cubic feet a year.

The following further emphasizes this form of waste:

Average annual consumption for each free domestic natural gas consumer in West Virginia, 480,000.

Average annual consumption for each domestic natural gas consumer in the United States, 100,000.

These few examples, which might be multiplied many times, will serve to show that the wastage in natural gas is notoriously high. Many points of wastage have been corrected and should continue to be held under a corrective influence.

Therefore, it is felt that the unique circumstances surrounding the matter of natural gas justify the enforcement of an order prohibiting the continuation of wasteful practices in the consumption of natural gas.

Interpretation of Railroad Wage Order Concerning Ticket Agent's Pay Claim

The United States Railroad Administration issues the following:

INTERPRETATION NO. 7 TO GENERAL ORDER 27.

CLAIM OF EMPLOYEE.

Prior to March 1, 1918, the claimant was employed as assistant passenger and ticket agent at a salary of \$80 per month. His duties consisted of selling tickets, soliciting passenger business, and acting as telegraph operator.

On March 1, 1918, the position of assistant being closed, the employee claims that he was officially checked in as city passenger and ticket agent by the company's traveling auditor, increasing his duties, due to the fact that he had to handle both positions.

The employee claims that he understood from telephone conversation with the assistant passenger agent that he would be checked in temporarily, as it had not been definitely decided who

would be appointed to the position. The employee served in this capacity from March 1, 1918, until May 1, 1918, at which time consolidation of certain ticket offices made it necessary for him to go to the consolidated ticket offices.

The claim of the employee is that he did not receive the salary of the city passenger ticket agent, which was \$120 per month, which rate under General Order No. 27 would have been advanced to \$131.75, and that he was only paid his salary that he was receiving as assistant.

He further claims that if he had been paid the salary of the city passenger ticket agent for the time served in that capacity he would have been transferred to the consolidated ticket office at the same rate, as this was the practice followed in transferring other employees to the consolidated ticket offices.

In other words, the employee claims that his present rate of pay should be \$131.75 per month instead of \$112.70, which rate was applied in accordance

with General Order No. 27 to the position which formerly paid \$80 per month.

CLAIM OF COMPANY.

The railroad company claims that the employee was assigned to the position of city passenger and ticket agent temporarily, and that they did not consider that he was entitled to an increase based upon the rate formerly paid this position.

The question for interpretation is:

In view of the fact that the employee was performing the work of city passenger and ticket agent and not receiving the rate applied to this position, should his rate under the provisions of General Order No. 27 be based on the rate formerly paid to the position he was filling?

DECISION.

The claimant was from March 1, 1918, until the date of the consolidation of ticket offices, May 1, 1918, in charge of the office and performed the duties of city ticket agent, and is therefore entitled to the rate paid that position plus increase in accordance with the provisions of General Order No. 27.
