## REGULATION OF SHIP ROUTES PASSING THROUGH WAR ZONE MODIFIED BY TRADE BOARD

### MAY NOW PROCEED BY ANY COURSE

*Vessels Bound to Certain French and Other Ports, However, Required to Obtain Instructions Regarding the Location of Mines.*

The War Trade Board announces, in a new ruling, W. T. B. R. 539, that rules and regulations heretofore enforced against vessels with respect to routes to be taken when proceeding through the so-called "war zone," have been modified, and hereafter vessels may proceed without restrictions as to route, in so far as the War Trade Board is concerned, except that vessels proceeding to French, Bay of Biscay, or Channel ports must obtain instructions from the district supervisor of Naval Overseas Transportation Service or collectors of customs.

#### Information as to Mines.

For the guidance of vessels, however, the War Trade Board calls attention to the fact that all information regarding dangers to navigation, mine fields discovered and mine fields cleared, also location of temporary light vessels which are designed to aid vessels making port, may be obtained from any branch hydrographic office.

#### Bunker Licenses Required.

This modification of restrictions as to route in no way alters the requirement that all vessels must obtain "bunker" licenses as heretofore.

## INCREASE IN SHIPMENTS FROM PORT OF NEW YORK

With the adjustment of the strike among the boatmen and dockmen at the port of New York the increase in shipment of foodstuffs and other commodities overseas was renewed with greater vigor during the week ended January 18. According to the report of the exports control committee made public by Walker D. Hines, Director General of Railroads, while there has been some increase in the number of cars of commercial export freight on hand, delayed lighterage orders have been filed with the carriers in such volume that some of them had to be returned with request for extension.

Beginning February 1 the committee has been advised that British flag boats will assign 30 per cent of their space for commercial export freight, with the prospect that further space will shortly be released.

## STATE DEPARTMENT REPORTS ON DISTURBANCES IN OPORTO

Assistant Secretary Phillips announced to-day that the State Department advises regarding the situation in Portugal state that a movement was begun at Oporto of a revolutionary character designed to upset the republic in the interests of a monarchy. He said the advices were very brief, referring to the situation up to noon January 20. They did not indicate the extent of the movement, but reported that everything at Lisbon was quiet.

A similar movement, he added, was started about a week ago, but was suppressed by the Government, which was reported to have taken a number of prisoners and some of the revolutionists were reported to have been killed in the disturbance.

#### Rights of Claimants.

Mr. Palmer calls attention to the fact that in case any claim is not settled and discharged before the assets of a company are transferred to the depositary, the claimant still has rights under section (9) of the trading-with-the-enemy act, but it will be easier for him to adjust and settle the claims with the liquidator than through the process of the courts.

## WAR SAVINGS CERTIFICATES PAYABLE ONLY TO FIRST OWNER

### Post-Office Order Intended to Stop Unauthorized Traffic by Speculators and Others.

The Post Office Department issues the following:

The following is quoted from a notice issued by the Secretary of the Treasury:

"My attention has been directed to numerous offers made by unscrupulous persons through advertisements and in other ways to buy war-savings certificate stamps and, as a result of such offense, I am informed that owners of such securities have suffered material losses which could have been avoided by redemption of the war-savings certificate stamps at post offices, as provided by law."

"In order that the interests of owners of war-savings certificate stamps of either series may be safeguarded, I hereby notify all persons to refrain from offers to buy war-savings stamps or accept the same in trade."

In pursuance of the foregoing, postmasters are directed not to pay war-savings certificates on which the names of the owners have not been entered or have been erased or changed, since, under the regulations, they are not transferable and are payable only to the original owners, except in case of death or disability.

Postmasters are further instructed not to pay any war-savings certificates presented by persons or firms known to be buying, or publicly offering to buy, war-savings stamps or certificates from the owners, unless positive evidence is submitted that the certificates were originally issued to the persons or firms presenting them for payment.

When consulted by owners of war-savings stamps in regard to offers to purchase such stamps at less than current value postmasters should invite their attention to the fact that war-savings certificates may be cashed at money-order post offices after 10 days' written notice, and that this is a privilege accorded by law. At the same time it should be pointed out that the need of the Government for the proceeds of the war-savings stamp issue is great, and the holders should be urged to retain their stamps until maturity as a patriotic act unless their necessities are urgent.

## Imports of Commodities Not of Canadian Origin

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 536), supplementing W. T. B. R. 406, issued December 14, 1918, that, as a general policy, they will not consider applications for licenses to import from Canada into the United States commodities shipped to Canada from overseas, which are, or have been at any time, on the restricted list of imports, until 60 days shall have elapsed from the date when the general import restrictions on such commodity were removed.

Employees leaving the service between October 1, 1918, and December 28, 1918, should properly have back pay accruing between those dates adjusted to comply with the requirements of Supplement No. 13.

### FUEL RECORDS CUSTODIAN.

Harold B. Harris has been appointed custodian of records of the United States Fuel Administration.

Mr. Harris has been a member of the Bureau of State Organization of the Fuel Administration and has had charge of retail prices. By the terms of the order issued he has "authority to make such arrangements as shall be necessary and proper for the custody, safe-keeping and disposition of all records and documents of the United States Fuel Administration."

## EXPORTS IN 1918 \$6,150,000,000 AND IMPORTS \$3,031,000,000

Heavy December shipments brought the total exports for 1918 to \$6,150,000,000, a decrease of only \$88,000,000 from the 1917 total, according to an announcement by the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, Department of Commerce. Imports for the year totaled \$3,031,000,000, or not quite half the exports. Imports for the previous year were valued at \$2,952,000,000.

Exports for December, the first full month after the signing of the armistice, reached a total of \$566,000,000, a decided increase over the \$522,000,000 recorded for November, although not up to the high mark of \$600,000,000 for December, 1917.

### Imports Low.

Imports for December, however, were low, being \$211,000,000, against \$251,000,000 for November and \$228,000,000 for December of the previous year.

Imports as well as exports of gold continued to decrease, the imports amounting to \$62,000,000 in the calendar year 1918 against \$552,000,000 in 1917 and the exports to \$41,000,000 and \$372,000,000 in the same year.

### Silver Imports.

Imports of silver increased from \$53,000,000 in the calendar year 1917 to \$71,000,000 in 1918. The exports of silver during December, 1918, amounted to \$48,000,000, a larger amount than in any month during the past three years. For the calendar year exports of silver amounted to \$253,000,000 in 1918 against \$84,000,000 in 1917.

## FURTHER MODIFICATION OF BRITISH EXPORT EMBARGOES

American Ambassador Davis, at London, cables as follows:

The British Board of Trade Journal of January 16 announces a further relaxation of the export restrictions, transferring to class (C) the following articles, which may, therefore, be freely exported to any American country:

"Cobalt chrome and similar alloys, jeweled drawplates for drawing wire, ferrosilicon, ferrotitanium, all goods of flax or linen wholly or partly manufactured, flax cordage and twine, gum arabic, gum tragacanth, gums containing caoutchouc, hammers not otherwise specifically prohibited, hemp of all kinds, maguey fiber and manufactures thereof except tagal braid, manganese and manganese ore, nickel and its ores and alloys, oakum, oil waste, packing cases, platinum and its alloys and manufactures, resinous substances containing caoutchouc, revolution indicators suitable for aircraft, coal, sacks, selenium, silicon, spiegeleisen, tapers, thorium and its alloys, titanium and its alloys and ores, tungsten alloys and ores including ferberite, hubnerite, scheelig, and wolframite, tungsten except tungsten filaments for electric lamps, barbed and galvanized wire, and various chemicals."

The order prohibiting the exportation of notes of the United States Government to all destinations except the United States has been repealed.

## 1,000 MEN WANTED AT ONCE AS MERCHANT MARINE OFFICERS

500 Seamen and 500 Mechanics  
to Be Given Course of  
Training.

Five hundred American seamen of more than two years' experience on deep water and 500 mechanics with engineering experience are wanted at once by the United States Shipping Board, to be trained as deck officers and marine engineers, respectively, for the merchant marine, the board announces.

The seamen will be trained in navigation at 21 free navigation schools maintained by the board, and the mechanics at free courses in technical colleges or at the special marine engineering schools of the board. Stationary and locomotive engineers, machinists who have worked on marine engines, and marine oilers and water tenders will be accepted for the engineering courses.

### Examinations After Training.

When the sailors have completed a six weeks' course of study and the engineers a month's course, they will be examined for licenses as third mates and third assistant engineers, respectively, and sent to sea. Free technical education, with the prospect of high pay and good living conditions afloat, are attracting an ambitious class of men to the service.

The board has in its present classes 1,158 men who are training as officers, and the new call is to fill vacancies in the schools as the present classes graduate.

### Where Schools Are Maintained.

Engineering schools are maintained at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Cambridge, Mass.; Pratt Institute, Brooklyn; Seamen's Church Institute, New York; Dickinson High School Building, Jersey City; The Bourse, Philadelphia; Armour Institute, Chicago; Case School of Applied Science, Cleveland; University of Washington, Seattle; University of California, Berkeley; and Tulane University, New Orleans.

The navigation schools are at the chief coast and lake ports, and their addresses will be furnished applicants by the United States steamboat inspectors or by the Sea Service Bureau agents of the Shipping Board at the various ports. General information about the schools will be furnished by Henry Howard, customhouse, Boston.

### POSTMARKS ON AIR MAIL.

It has been brought to the attention of the department that many postmasters use ordinary rubber hand stamps and various colored inks in postmarking mail received for dispatch by Aeroplane Service. This practice will be discontinued immediately, and all aeroplane mail will be postmarked and the stamps thereon canceled by the use of canceling machines or the regular hand postmarking stamps, and the black canceling ink furnished by the department for such purpose.

## DEMAND FOR FEMALE LABOR SINCE ARMISTICE WAS SIGNED

In a comparative report issued by the United States Employment Service it is shown that, following the armistice and up to December 21, the demand for female labor suffered a marked decrease. Beginning with the week following the latter date, however, both demand and supply showed an upward trend throughout the country. At the close of the week ending December 21 the demand for this class of labor had fallen, approximately, to 33,000 and the supply to 16,000. The tide turned, the figures show, with the beginning of the next week, at the close of which, December 28, the demand was, approximately, 43,000; supply, 22,000.

### Heaviest Demand.

The heaviest demand for female labor in any given week is placed at 58,000 for the week ending November 2, at which time the supply stood at 23,000, and from

about that date up to December 28 the demand exceeded the supply by an average of about 19,000.

There is indicated in the same report a net decrease of 5,739 in the male registrations for the week ending December 21 over those for the week ending November 2, before the armistice was signed. Demand for help in the week ending December 21 indicated a net decrease of 89,784. On this latter date there was a net decrease of 26,556 of men referred and a decrease of 11,098 in those placed in jobs.

### IMPORTATION OF CORN.

The War Trade Board announces, in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 538), that the restrictions heretofore existing upon the importation of maize (corn) have been removed and licenses will now be issued for the importation of this commodity, when the applications are otherwise in order, from any country.

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## COURTESIES EXTENDED U. S. NAVY MEN BY HONDURAN GOVERNMENT

The American minister to Honduras, J. Sambola Jones, in a mail report to the State Department cites the courtesies extended by the Government of Honduras to the officers of the U. S. S. *Marblehead*, under the command of Capt. Charles P. Huff, upon the official visit the officers made to the legation at Tegucigalpa on Christmas Eve.

The Government of Honduras provided a military escort from Amapala to San Lorenzo, and thence to Sabana Grande, where the Government had luncheon prepared. A representative of the foreign office accompanied the party from San Lorenzo to Tegucigalpa.

During the afternoon the American party made an official visit to the members of the cabinet, gathered at the ministry of Government. There were toasts for President Wilson and President Bertrand and for the American Navy. In the evening the national band played the national hymns of the United States and Honduras outside of the legation. A concert was then given at the chamber of commerce in honor of the visiting officers and a dance at the Club Tegucigalpa under the auspices of the municipality.

On the 26th another concert was given by the national band at the legation, followed by an official reception. The minister gave a ball in honor of Capt. Huff and his officers, attended by all Tegucigalpa society. The party returned on the 27th.

## ADDRESS ON FOREIGN TRADE.

"Foreign Trade and the Relation of the State Department to It" was the subject of an address which the Third Assistant Secretary of State, Mr. Breckinridge Long, delivered before the American Manufacturers' and Exporters' Association at New York City. He told of the department's desire to stimulate foreign trade, of the cooperation of the large organization of the Consular Service, and how the department makes possible the conditions in foreign countries which permit of markets there, and to so establish relations with foreign Governments as to make trade possible.

## TOTAL LIVE STOCK ON FARMS IN THE U. S. ON JAN. 1, 1919

The crop-reporting board of the Bureau of Crop Estimates of the United States Department of Agriculture, from reports of its correspondents and agents, makes the following estimates of live stock on farms and ranges of the United States on January 1, 1919:

In numbers, horses have decreased 21,000 from the total for 1918; mules increased 52,000; milch cows increased 157,000; other cattle increased 287,000; sheep increased 1,260,000; swine increased 4,609,000.

In average value per head, horses decreased \$5.76; mules increased \$6.78; milch cows increased \$7.70; other cattle increased \$3.28; sheep decreased \$0.21; swine increased \$2.50.

In total value, horses decreased \$126,261,000; mules increased \$40,088,000; milch cows increased \$191,824,000; other cattle increased \$157,188,000; sheep increased \$4,441,000; and swine increased \$278,726,000.

The total value on January 1, 1919, of all animals enumerated above was \$8,830,204,000, as compared with \$8,284,198,000 on January 1, 1918, an increase of \$546,006,000, or 6.6 per cent.

## Prohibited List Modified On Certain Mail to China

OFFICE SECOND ASSISTANT POSTMASTER GENERAL, Washington, January 18, 1919.

Referring to the notice of this office, dated the 27th of November last, containing a list of articles prohibited importation into China under the parcel-post convention between the United States and Japan, as printed in the Postal Bulletin of the 29th of November last, and on page 2 of the Postal Guide for January, 1919, this department has been advised by the postal administration of Japan that the same articles are likewise prohibited importation in the regular mails for Japanese post offices in China, except southern Manchuria.

Section 101 of the item "Japan" printed on page 130 in the list of special prohibitions in the regular mails is hereby modified accordingly.

Postmasters will please cause due notice of the foregoing to be taken at their offices.

## CONTRACTS FOR 800 SCHOOL HOUSES HELD UP BY THE WAR

The Department of Labor authorizes the following:

Contracts for 800 public-school houses, totaling some \$80,000,000, have been held up as a result of the war, according to but a partial tabulation of building conditions throughout the United States, which has been made by the statistical section of the Division of Public Works and Construction Development, U. S. Department of Labor. It is estimated that the completed tabulation will show that these school projects, now being held in abeyance, aggregate more than \$100,000,000.

### Cost of School Program.

In round numbers this is about \$1 per capita throughout the United States. As school buildings are customarily financed on 20-year serial bonds this means an installment payment of about 5 cents per capita per year by the people of this country if they would have their school program put through at the present time.

Assuming that a decrease of 20 per cent in construction costs might develop during the next four or five years (and this is regarded by many as a maximum decrease), the immediate completion of the Nation's school program would involve an excess of only 1 per cent per capita per year over the per capita cost, even if construction were delayed for several years.

### What Educators Ask.

The educators of the country ask, Shall the country have its schools now at 5 cents per capita per year, or delay having them for four or five years in order to buy them at 4 cents per capita per year?

To interest the Nation in forwarding this particular work is one of the undertakings of this new division of the Department of Labor. In this purpose it has the support not only of educators, but of sociologists. They believe that the Nation-wide lack of public-school accommodations, which is known to all, is one of the earliest problems that must be solved with others that belong to the reconstruction period.

## Technical Books Sent To Men at Base Hospitals

The War Department authorizes the following:

Collections of 200 books on technical subjects have been sent to each Army base hospital by the Library War Service of the American Library Association for use by the soldiers enrolled in various phases of educational activities. Included in the collections are several copies of elementary readers, shorthand textbooks, and books on carpentry, smithing, and other trades. Surg. Gen. M. W. Ireland has directed the officers in charge of curative workshops and other educational work to cooperate with the hospital librarians to the fullest extent.

## PROCEEDINGS OF THE CONGRESS BRIEFLY TOLD

## SENATE.

Further opposition to the bill appropriating \$100,000,000 for relief of famine-stricken countries in Europe outside of Germany was manifested in the Senate yesterday, with the result that a final vote was again postponed. The discussion included further criticism of the Food Administration and opposition to the administration of the fund, if appropriated, by Food Administrator Hoover. An amendment is pending providing that the fund shall be administered through a special commission, to be appointed by the President and confirmed by the Senate. During the debate on the food bill Senator Poindexter, of Washington, made a vigorous criticism of the failure of the President to remove restrictions against the construction of steel vessels for foreign owners in American shipyards, and said this policy was causing loss of work among the shipbuilders of the Pacific coast.

From the Military Committee a new substitute was favorably reported for the House bill intended to validate informal contracts entered into by the War Department. In addition to validating these contracts, the substitute creates a war contracts appeals commission, with authority to settle all disputes arising out of informal contracts that can not be definitely agreed upon by officials of the department and contractors.

In the Senate, Mr. Pomerene, of Ohio, and in the House, Mr. Esch, of Wisconsin, introduced bills dealing with the railroad question which enlarge the powers of the Interstate Commerce Commission. Senator Kenyon, of Iowa, introduced a bill to appropriate \$100,000,000 for expenditures on public works to prevent unemployment.

Various committees yesterday continued their investigation of subjects under inquiry. Thomas F. Logan, of Washington, before the Agricultural Committee, gave details concerning his employment as Washington representative of a number of large corporations, including Swift & Co., one of the packers whose business methods are now under investigation. He also told of his trip to Europe with Chairman Hurley, of the Shipping Board, where he explained to the committee he went in an advisory capacity. The Elections Committee, by a strict party vote and with the addition of the vote of Senator Kenyon, of Iowa, favorably reported the Pomerene resolution in the Ford-Newberry election contest case, providing for an immediate investigation and possession of all ballots cast in the Michigan senatorial election. Consideration of this resolution was blocked by an objection by Senator Lodge. Before the committee investigating German propaganda Police Inspector Thomas J. Tunney, of New York, told of the plots to kill wealthy Americans early in the war and of further bombing and destructive plans of pro-Germans after the United States entered the war.

## HOUSE.

Debate on the consular and diplomatic bill continued. An item reported by the committee appropriating \$3,000,000, with

which to begin putting into effect the policy of the Government of acquiring embassy buildings abroad was struck from the bill on a point of order. Republican Leader Mann warned the House of the shortness of the remaining time of the session and the amount of work still to be done, and asked Democratic leaders if they were trying to force an extra session of Congress. A bill was introduced by Mr. Denton, of Indiana, to grant a Federal charter to "The World War Veterans of America." The charter members would be 11 citizens of Evansville, Ind., who served in various branches of the military service. The Federal board for vocational education asked an appropriation of \$200,000 for use in developing vocational education along various lines.

J. Ogden Armour, of Chicago, was a witness before the Interstate Commerce Committee which is investigating the meat-packing industry in connection with proposed legislation to put these concerns under Federal regulation. Mr. Armour discussed the business methods of the packers in detail. Before the Military Committee now considering the Army appropriation bill, Col. Battison, of the Embarkation Service, said the British Government was to be paid the actual cost of transporting American soldiers overseas, and that the question of what that actual cost was was now being considered by officials who have gone to Europe for that purpose. Before the Immigration Committee Prof. Isaac N. Hourwich, of New York, made an argument opposed to all forms of prohibitory immigration legislation. A bill with that end in view is now being considered by the committee. Secretary Lane appeared before the Public Lands Committee and indorsed the project to establish "The Roosevelt National Park" in the Redwood district of California. The Pensions Committee ordered a favorable report on the bill granting a pension of \$5,000 a year to the widow of former President Roosevelt. Protests from a number of State service commissions were received by the Post Office Committee against the measure extending Government wire control.

## EXPORTS FROM SPAIN TO U. S.

Total for 1918 \$20,280,500 as Against \$35,733,492 in 1917.

The following cablegram was received from Consul General Hurst, at Barcelona, dated January 15:

"For the year 1918 the total declared exports to the United States and its possessions from Spain were valued as follows: \$20,280,500 to the United States against \$35,733,492 in 1917; \$724,458 to Philippine Islands against \$985,330; \$570,807 to Porto Rico against \$887,593; total, \$21,575,765 against \$37,606,415."

### Railroad Administration Not Considering Increase In Present Basis of Rates

Walker D. Hines, Director General of Railroads, authorizes the following:

There is no foundation for the report that the Railroad Administration has given or is giving any consideration to any increase in present basis of rates.

The results of operations for the year will be largely dependent upon the volume of traffic. If the volume of traffic should be as large as last year, it is believed the operating income would be sufficient to pay the rental. As soon as any reasonably satisfactory conclusion as to the probable volume of traffic can be formed the public and Congress will be given the best possible estimate of the prospects for 1919.

## IMPORTATION OF RICE.

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 537) that rice has again been added to the list of restricted imports, and no licenses will be issued for the importation of such commodity except to cover shipments in transit.

# SUMMARY SHOWING RESULTS OBTAINED BY BUREAU OF INDUSTRIAL RESEARCH IN CONSERVING SHIPS AND CARGO SPACE

## REPORT DEALS WITH METHODS OF PACKING

### *How Problems of Overseas Transportation Were Met and Overcome at Acute Stage—Existing Practices Used by Ordinary Shippers Investigated and Revised—Big Saving in Labor and Tonnage.*

The War Department authorizes the following:

A summary of the results obtained by the Bureau of Industrial Research since its establishment is contained in a report submitted by the chief of the bureau to Maj. Gen. George W. Goethals, Director of Purchase, Storage, and Traffic.

#### Conservation of Cargo Space.

The first task accomplished was a conservation of ship and cargo space during the period when shipping facilities had reached an acute stage. The whole question of transportation was subjected to inquiry and the limited cargo capacity available and the Army methods of packing supplies as well as the existing methods used by ordinary shippers were reviewed and considered. The commercial practice was found to be wasteful in space, uneconomical in the use of packing materials, and it also disregarded the hazards incidental to the long distance and frequent handling necessary in the transportation to the fighting front.

#### Delays in Delivery.

Delays in delivery were found due to incorrectly and badly marked packages and supplies and parts of machinery frequently miscarried because of failure to put suitable directions in legible and permanent form on every part of these shipments. As a result of a series of conferences between representatives of each Army bureau, standard specifications were prepared which proved acceptable to the Inland Traffic, Storage, and Embarkation services and the Supply Service overseas. A uniform system of marking was introduced through a general order which has proved effective in meeting requirements of each Army bureau.

#### Conferences by Allies' Agents.

Conferences were held by the representatives of the allied armies and navies and representatives of the Interstate Commerce Commission, to consider regulations in the transportation of explosives. As a result of these meetings it was decided to permit, during the period of the war, shipments of inflammable and similar commodities under the regulations prepared by the War Department. Explosives of all kinds in large quantities

have been handled in accordance with these instructions safely and expeditiously.

The vast quantities of clothing, blankets, textiles, and similar supplies needed overseas, and the wasteful method of packing these commodities followed by the producers, made it necessary to consider and outline plans for conservation of space by compression and new methods of protecting these goods while in transit. Specifications were issued instructing depot quartermasters to bale all these materials and to wrap in burlap and waterproof paper any supplies which would be uninjured by this treatment. This resulted in space economies amounting to approximately 60 per cent of the total shipments and greatly increased the total volume of these goods which could be carried in the available ships.

#### Shipments of Gasoline.

The shortage of gasoline was so great and the number of tank ships available so limited that it was found necessary to inaugurate the carrying of this essential fuel in thousands of empty barrels and containers which were needed for other purposes overseas. Regulations to safeguard these shipments were carefully studied and placed in operation. There has been no report of a single accident having occurred in the shipment of this volatile fuel in cargo ships.

Hay requirements for the remounts in France approximated a million tons a year. This large volume of hay, when purchased in merchant bales, occupied space at about 220 cubic feet per ton. By the installation of baling compresses the space required in railroad cars and in shipment was reduced two-thirds, and the hay went forward in better condition at approximately 80 cubic feet per ton. The saving of transportation space in this one item alone was so large as to justify a continuation of these experiments in many other directions.

#### Motor Truck Transportation.

The large number of motor trucks needed for the Motor Transport Service overseas, the various types produced in this country for special service, and the limited facilities for reassembling compelled the shipment of assembled vehicles on the decks and in the holds of cargo ships, resulting in considerable damage in transit. These vehicles when loaded on wheels occupied a greater area than was warranted by their weight, causing a loss in shipping space so extensive as to make this one of the most important of the space conservation problems. Standard trucks and automobiles each occupying from 1,200 to 1,500 cubic feet were finally condensed and crated in boxes occupying only one-fourth of that space. With the increase of assembling facilities and the training of motor mechanics, it ultimately became possible to ship practically all these automobiles in good condition, and in larger quantity than had been thought possible. Results obtained in the study of the packing and

crating of mobile artillery were almost startling in the space saved in the elimination of wasted packing materials and the certainty of safe carriage.

Savings in cargo space were also effected on shipments of supplies for the Medical Corps where special thought had to be given to improve the methods of packing to accomplish the two-fold purpose of space saving and curtailment of damage in transit. In the packing of camp equipment and similar supplies space had been largely wasted, the single item of camp stoves occupying six or seven times as much room as was found to be necessary. The efforts of the bureau resulted in space economy, and the fact that hundreds of thousands of such articles were shipped makes it easy to understand why the economies effected so amply justified the efforts made.

#### Subsistence Supplies.

Subsistence supplies for the Army and their shipment abroad received much study, and as a result it was found necessary to completely revise the existing specifications for boxes, crates, and other food containers to meet the requirements of the service. The dehydration and evaporation of fruits and vegetables was then given special attention resulting in enhanced security against loss in shipment and bringing additional millions of pounds of edible food within the reach of the troops in Europe. The subject of the transportation of refrigerator products was also studied and resulted in a new manner of trimming carcass beef which saved a great deal of space. To still further increase the saving the complete boning of beef was undertaken, and this proved acceptable to the supply officers in France. It may be of interest to note that as a result of this investigation it was possible to increase the refrigerator capacity of the stations located in France, to reduce the fuel needed for maintaining the low temperatures, to increase the capacity of the existing refrigerator ships, to reduce the number of refrigerator cars needed on the railroads between Chicago and New York, and to reclaim quantities of by-products made from the bone.

#### Use of Soluble Coffee.

The introduction of the use of soluble coffee for trench use was made possible and this became almost indispensable for supplying troops at the front. Great economy in transportation space and in costs was developed from the shipment of the green bean which was roasted in retorts located in France.

The vast quantity of rubber tires and rims necessary for the maintenance of Motor Transport Service abroad warranted the shipment to France of the necessary machinery for retreading American rims for rubber tires made of reclaimed rubber. Exhaustive study was given to the subject of the preservation of leather, whether in harness or shoes, as this was an item of great importance. By the utilization of wool grease a dubbin for this purpose was formulated which has proven its effectiveness in cantonment tests in this country.

#### Baling in Burlap.

The baling of Army goods in burlap replacing wooden cases required vast

The Navy Department has commended Emil Ferdinand Herberg, chief boatswain's mate, United States Navy, attached to U. S. quantities of burlap. Added to this, the demand for sand bags made it necessary to give consideration to some plan for either providing a substitute material or else conserving the material on hand. As a result of the recommendation of the bureau, the burlap used for wrapping materials was cut into such sizes as would readily be reclaimable for sand bags in France. Millions of sand bags which had been purchased in the United States were replaced by those made from the materials sent over as wrapping materials from this country.

General standard specifications were prepared for baling, packing, and crating. A packing service school was established at the Forest Service laboratory in Madison, Wis., for the training of officers and enlisted men. Approximately 400 soldiers were carefully instructed how to inspect and bring to the attention of the bureau violations of the regulations and standard specifications. Recommendations by the industrial research experts for the improved crating of a single shipment of 2,000 horse-drawn ambulances was calculated to effect a saving in shipping space of 300,000 cubic feet, roughly equivalent to the carrying capacity of a 500-ton cargo boat. In the case of an order for 6,500 water carts, improved crating resulted in a saving of 279,000 cubic feet of shipping space. At the valuation of cargo space at \$6 per cubic foot, this represented a saving in money of \$1,674,000. These instances are fairly typical of the results secured by the improved methods of boxing and crating of many classes of Army supplies.

### Shipment of Airplanes.

The studies which were made in reduction of space necessary in which to ship airplanes resulted in the cutting of the size of the boxes needed for a single machine 50 per cent. This would mean that with limited transportation facilities double the number of planes could be shipped in a single trip across the ocean. In one instance alone 50 carloads of freight were so repacked as to require the space of only 15 with its proportionate saving in cargo space.

To the work of the Bureau of Industrial Research of the Purchase, Storage, and Traffic Division is due the conservation of space in thousands of freight cars and at least a million ship tons. Credit is also due the bureau for reduction in losses due to faulty and defective packing. ## RECENT FUEL ADMINISTRATION ORDERS AFFECTING COAL AND COKE SALE RULES

The United States Fuel Administration issues the following:

WASHINGTON, D. C., January 17, 1919.

The United States Fuel Administrator, acting under authority of an Executive order of the President of the United States, dated 23 August, 1917, appointing said administrator, and of subsequent Executive orders, and in furtherance of the purpose of said orders and of the act of Congress therein referred to and approved August 10, 1917,

Hereby orders and directs that that portion of the order of said administrator dated December 24, 1917, entitled "Order of the United States Fuel Administrator regulating the making of contracts by operators, producers, and jobbers of coal and coke," issued as Publication No. 16 of the United States Fuel Administration, not heretofore vacated, be and the same hereby is vacated and set aside as of the effective date of the regulation hereinafter established, and said administrator

Heretofore makes and establishes the following regulation effective January 18, 1919,

REGULATION RELATIVE TO THE MAKING OF CONTRACTS FOR THE SALE OF COAL OR COKE BY OPERATORS, PRODUCERS, JOBBERS, SALES AGENTS, OR PURCHASING AGENTS OF COAL OR COKE.

(1) Every contract for the sale of coal or coke made by an operator, producer, jobber, sales agent, or purchasing agent of coal or coke shall provide that the price of each shipment of coal or coke made thereunder shall not exceed the price at the mine or the place of production, as established by the President, or by the United States Fuel Administrator, for the particular coal or coke to be shipped, and in effect at the date of shipment; provided, however, that every such contract made by a jobber, sales agent, or purchasing agent may provide for the addition to the price aforesaid of a margin or commission which shall not exceed on any shipment the permissible margin or commission allowed, at the date of such shipment, to said jobber, sales agent, or purchasing agent under the orders of the President or of the United States Fuel Administrator then in force.

(2) Every such contract shall provide that the same shall be forthwith canceled and of no further binding effect upon either party thereto, upon receipt of a request or an order from the United States Fuel Administrator for such cancellation, and that in case of

such cancellation neither party to the contract shall be under any further liability to the other thereunder and that neither shall have any claim against the United States by reason of such contract or the cancellation thereof.

(3) Every such contract shall provide that coal or coke deliverable thereunder shall be subject to requisition by the United States Fuel Administrator or his representatives, including under the term "requisition" the right to divert such coal or coke to any other party than the purchaser named in the contract; that such requisition may be made at any time during the continuance of the contract and prior to actual receipt and unloading of the coal or coke so requisitioned, at the point of ultimate destination by the person entitled thereto under the terms of the contract; that such requisition shall be made at the going Government price in effect at the date of shipment, for the particular shipment of coal or coke so requisitioned, or, if on the date of such shipment there is no going Government price for the coal or coke so requisitioned, then at the price at which such shipment has been consigned by the shipper thereof, and without other or further liability of the Government or the requisitioner to either party to the contract than the payment of the price determined as hereinbefore in this paragraph provided, and transportation and other like charges paid or accrued.

(4) All contracts for the sale of coal or coke are subject to cancellation and termination at any time by the President or by the United States Fuel Administrator.

Further orders and directs that all permits heretofore or hereafter obtained from the district representative of the United States Fuel Administration in charge of said docks, under the proviso of said order of January 2, 1919, although granted without the approval of a Federal fuel administrator, be and the same hereby are validated.

This order shall be effective January 16, 1919.

### Smokeless Coal Shipments.

To correct a slight misconception of its order of January 16, regarding the removal of restrictions on shipments of bituminous coal and smokeless coal by way of the docks on Lake Michigan and Lake Superior, the United States Fuel Administration points out that this order still keeps in effect a provision that:

"Low volatile smokeless coal shall not be sold or shipped from docks on Lake Michigan and Lake Superior for use by domestic consumers unless a permit for such sale or shipment shall first have been obtained from the district representative of the United States Fuel Administration in charge of said docks."

The order also declared valid all permits heretofore or hereafter obtained from the district representative in charge of said docks, under the proviso of the order of January 2, 1919, although granted without the approval of the Federal Fuel Administrator.
