AGREEMENT TO SEND FOOD REQUIRED BY SWITZERLAND MADE BY REPRESENTATIVES OF ALLIED GOVERNMENTS

DISTRIBUTION UNDER HOOVER'S DIRECTION

*People Said to Have Ample
Money to Pay for Supplies.
Action of Supreme Council a Guarantee to Furnish Transportation More Than an Arrangement for Financial Help.*

Arrangements for provisioning the people of the Swiss Confederation, who are on exceedingly short rations, were completed in an agreement signed by representatives of the War Trade Board, the Swiss Confederation, the Government of France, and the Government of Great Britain.

In connection with existing arrangements, it is expected that the Swiss will be enabled to obtain a total supply of approximately 800,000 tons of foodstuffs, feedstuffs, and essential commodities during the ensuing year.

Under Supreme Council Control.

Purchase of the supplies will be under the direction of the Supreme Council of Supply and Relief, the allied relief organization, of which Herbert Hoover is president, although this agreement is not an integral part of the Supreme Council's relief program.

The Swiss it was pointed out, are not to be considered as among those nations requiring financial assistance. They have plenty of money and the essence of the present agreement is that they are guaranteed by Great Britain, France, and the United States a supply of bottoms, in which to transport the necessities which they are, and have been, most anxious to buy. This tonnage is now made available to them at reasonable rates.

Licenses for Export.

Specifically the agreement specifies that the board will grant licenses for export from the United States to the Swiss Confederation of the following commodities, up to the amounts indicated:

1. Breadstuff cereals, amounting to 300,000 metric tons in the following proportions: Wheat, 220,853; rye, 34,333; barley, 44,814.

SECRETARY OF WAR GRANTS CLEMENCY TO CONSCIENTIOUS OBJECTORS HELD AS PRISONERS AT FORT LEAVENWORTH

DISPOSAL OF SURPLUS MATERIAL BY U. S. HOUSING CORPORATION

The United States Housing Corporation is now engaged in the liquidation of a large volume of furniture and cafeteria equipment which was purchased for the munition towns which it is engaged in building and which have been discontinued since the armistice.

In order to facilitate the disposal of this material, it has opened a sample and display room in New York City, in the Printerscraft Building, 461 Eighth Avenue, corner Thirty-fourth Street.

CIVIL SERVICE JOBS PLANNED FOR SOLDIERS AND SAILORS

The United States Civil Service Commission is perfecting arrangements whereby men who are about to be discharged from the Army or Navy may receive first-hand information concerning opportunities for employment in the Federal civil service.

The commission has received authority from the Secretary of War and the Secretary of the Navy to appoint its representatives at all establishments where enlisted men are assembled in considerable numbers. These representatives are now being appointed. They will be prepared to inform the men fully concerning positions which are open, to supply them with application blanks, to assist them, if necessary, with the execution of their applications, and to advise them relative to civil-service matters generally.

It is the plan of the Civil Service Commission to entrust this work to educational directors of welfare organizations already operating at the camps, cantonments, etc. The representatives of the commission who are appointed from the personnel of these welfare organizations will have the benefit of the advice and assistance of the commission's local boards of examiners at near-by cities, in addition to the instructions received from the commission.

ORDERS DISCHARGE FROM THE ARMY

*Changed Conditions Since
Signing of the Armistice
Given as Reason—Action
Follows Report Submitted
By Board of Inquiry—List
Of Two Groups to Whom
Remission is Extended.*

The War Department publishes the following memorandum from the Secretary of War to the Chief of Staff, dated January 16:

"Pursuant to the request made in my memorandum to you of December 9, Judge Mack and Dean Stone have personally examined and reported to me regarding certain of the conscientious objectors now serving court-martial sentences. Group 1 of these men have heretofore been recommended by the board of inquiry for furlough, but because of the pressure of other work and the resulting delay in making the plan for farm furlough thoroughly effective throughout the country, the men in this group missed the opportunity to apply for and to receive the furlough. Group 2 are men whom the board of inquiry now find to be sincere and who, in their judgment, would have been recommended for furloughs if they had had the opportunity of being examined by the board of inquiry before the court-martial proceedings.

Results of the Plan.

"It will be recalled that this device of granting farm or other furloughs to such men as might be adjudged sincere was adopted in order that the country might have the benefit of such labor as they could conscientiously perform, instead of having to pay for their care and subsistence, with no corresponding benefit. On the whole, its adoption has been justified by experience, and if we were still actively engaged in warfare, I should give my attention to the problem of ascertaining whether some plan could not be adopted for insuring the same treatment to these prisoners.

The signing of the armistice, however, which took place while these cases were under consideration by my military associates, has changed the entire situation, and the War Department has since adopted and announced the policy of re-

turning to civil life at the earliest practicable moment such conscientious objectors as are not serving court-martial sentences. (War Department Circular No. 97.)

To Exercise Power of Clemency.

"In view of this fact, and believing that essential justice will be rendered by so doing, for reasons stated in the above-mentioned memorandum to you, I have decided to exercise the power of clemency intrusted to me by the President.

"I desire that the conscientious objectors, general prisoners, United States Disciplinary Barracks, Fort Leavenworth, Kans., below enumerated, be extended clemency in the form of remission of the unexecuted portions of the sentences of the offenders, honorable restoration to duty, and their immediate discharge from the United States Army.

"This is in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 7, section 2, of the act approved March 4, 1915, as published in War Department Bulletin No. 12, 1915.

"It is noted that in the case of a general prisoner who has been discharged, his reenlistment may be authorized, or upon the written application from the prisoner for restoration to duty, an order to that end may be promulgated.

"It is desired that Form No. 526, A. G. O., be used for their discharge, as provided in paragraph 4, War Department Circular No. 97, 1918, the following remark being placed thereon: 'This is a conscientious objector, who has done no military duty whatsoever, and who refused to wear the uniform.'

Approval of Plan.

The conference was called to order by its chairman, Mr. Richard L. Humphrey, Director of Building Materials, War Industries Board, who announced the various industries had signified their approval of the plan of procedure that had been outlined at the conference on January 8.

The disposal of the Government surplus stocks of building materials were further considered and the essential features of proposed form of contract was outlined, by which lumber producers representing the industry would purchase this surplus stock in various parts of the United States at market prices less a reasonable percentage to cover the cost of marketing; this contract to apply to lumber at any given point in amounts of 2,000,000 feet and upwards and the purchase to be completed on or before August 1, 1919; with a further option to purchase lumber as offered by the Government in amounts less than 2,000,000 feet at any given point on or before May 1, 1919.

Further Consideration of Details.

A committee representing the lumber industry was appointed to confer with the chairman of the conference for further consideration of the details of this plan.

The conference developed the fact that the preliminary figures of the Government inventory of its surplus stock of building materials seem to indicate that the amount of lumber of the several species owned by it in various parts of the United States in excess of its requirements would probably not exceed 150,000,000 million feet.

tious in their objections, both to combatant and noncombatant service in the Army. Thereafter these men were placed on trial by court-martial and sentenced for terms of imprisonment in Disciplinary Barracks. They have never had opportunity to apply for the farm furlough in accordance with the recommendations of the Board of Inquiry. The undersigned have examined the court-martial records in the case of each of these men and in the opinion of the undersigned, clemency should be promptly exercised in their cases.

Group two includes those men who claim to be conscientious objectors who were not brought before the Board of Inquiry for examination prior to their court-martial conviction and sentence to Disciplinary Barracks. The undersigned having now examined them report that in their opinion these men are conscientious in their objections, both to combatant and noncombatant service in the Army, and that they would have been so classified by the Board of Inquiry had they been examined by the board. The undersigned have examined the court-martial records in the case of each of these men, and in the opinion of the undersigned, clemency should be promptly exercised in their cases.

FUEL BUREAU OF LABOR.

The Bureau of Labor of the United States Fuel Administration will continue to function until the proclamation of peace, it is announced.

Under an agreement published July 23, 1918, all labor questions pertaining to the coal mining industry were placed definitely under the jurisdiction of the Fuel Administrator, this arrangement having the sanction of the Secretary of Labor and of the United Mine Workers of America. The agreement included the provision that any dispute failing of settlement between the parties at interest must be submitted to the Fuel Administration for final disposition without stoppage of work.

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DESIGNATION FOR ENTRY UNDER THE ENLARGED HOMESTEAD ACT

The Department of the Interior, General Land Office issues the following:

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 17, 1919.

CIRCULAR No. 632.

REGISTERS AND RECEIVERS,
United States Land Offices.

Sirs: You are advised that on July 17, 1918, the Secretary of the Interior issued the following instructions:

"The concluding paragraph of section 43, Circular No. 541, approved April 6, 1917, entitled 'Suggestions to homesteaders and persons desiring to make homestead entries,' is hereby modified in order to describe the character of land property subject to entry under the enlarged homestead act in the following terms:

"Lands containing merchantable timber, or valuable minerals other than coal, phosphate, nitrate, potash, oil, gas, or asphaltic minerals, and lands within a reclamation project, or lands which may be irrigated at a reasonable cost from any known source of water supply may not be entered under these acts. Entry may be allowed for the surface only of lands containing any of the minerals named. A legal subdivision will not be regarded as irrigable and excluded from designation under these acts because a minor portion of it is susceptible of irrigation, unless said portion is at least one-eighth thereof. Where there is an application for additional entry after submission of final proof on the original land covered by the original will not be regarded as irrigable and excluded from designation upon the ground that more than one-eighth of any subdivision is irrigable, unless said original embraces the equivalent of 20 or more acres of land in a reasonably compact body that can be thoroughly irrigated and reclaimed."

These instructions will also govern the classification of lands as nonirrigable under the stock-raising homestead act.

STATEMENT ON RAILROAD "REVOLVING FUND" OF HALF- BILLION DOLLARS IS ISSUED BY THE DIRECTOR GENERAL

\$340,000,000 ABSORBED IN TAKING OVER LINES

Mr. Hines Explains Uses to Which Cash Appropriated by Congress Is Being Put. Large Part of Permanent Improvements Now Being Made and Yet to Be Made Must Be Financed Temporarily by Government.

Walker D. Hines, Director General of Railroads, authorizes the following statement:

In view of the constant discussion of the railroad problem which naturally is now going on because of the pendency of the issue before the Congress, and since a great deal of stress is being laid upon the financial condition of the carriers under Federal control, it should be helpful to comprehend some outstanding facts regarding the so-called "revolving fund" of \$500,000,000 appropriated by Congress in the Federal control act for certain specified purposes.

It is important to understand that the mere fact of taking over the railroads as going concerns involved the temporary absorption of about \$340,000,000 of the Government's money, and that if the operation of the railroads for the year 1918 had not involved any loss whatever, it would still be true that about \$350,000,000 of the revolving fund would be thus absorbed all during the period of Federal control.

Cash In Hands of Agents.

On any given date a large amount of cash is in the hands of railroad conductors and railroad freight and ticket agents throughout the country. On the date the Government took possession of the railroads this amount was about \$140,000,000. This was, of course, credited to the railroad corporations and in settlement with them for the first year the Government has to pay that amount in addition to the rental. Of course, at the end of Government control the railroad companies will pay back to the Government whatever amount (probably the same or more) may then likewise be in the hands of conductors and agents.

It is also true that approximately \$200,000,000 of working cash capital has to be kept on hand at all times in the hands of the Federal treasuries of the United States Railroad Administration and in the hands of the central administration. Since the operating expenses average perhaps \$325,000,000 per month, this working cash capital of \$200,000,000 is relatively small. Nevertheless, it absorbs for the time being that much of the

COAL SHORTAGE IN GERMANY REPORTED AS CAUSING ALARM

Commercial Attaché Paul L. Edwards, at The Hague, Netherlands, reports:

The coal situation in Germany appears to be causing some alarm. Owing to sickness among mine laborers and the sudden departure of the many prisoners who were working in the mines, the production in all districts has fallen far below normal. One report just received from Essen is to the effect that the output of the mines in that vicinity is only about half the normal figure. A report from the same district, in the Norddeutsche Allgemeine Zeitung of November 25, states that about 20,000 prisoners and other foreigners employed in the mines there have left since the signing of the armistice; and there has not yet been time to fill their places with demobilized troops. To a certain extent railway traffic also is disorganized.

These conditions have caused such an acute shortage of coal in Berlin, for instance, that special measures are being taken to keep the consumption as low as possible.

resources of the Railroad Administration. At the end of Federal control this cash will be released and will come back to the Government; for the time being it is tied up in the conduct of the business in exactly the same way that the working cash capital is tied up in any other business.

Temporary Absorption of Cash.

The result is that in making the first year's settlement with the railroad companies the Railroad Administration will have to use \$340,000,000 which in the last analysis must come out of the revolving fund and to that extent the use of the revolving fund represents no suggestion of loss, but purely an inevitable absorption of cash for the time being.

It must also be remembered that it has been the policy of the Government that the Railroad Administration shall finance temporarily a large part of the permanent improvements which have been made and which still must be made by the railroads during Federal control. The amount required for these purposes promises to be several hundred million dollars, which likewise will ultimately be returned to the Government. It is evident, therefore, that the absorption of the original \$500,000,000 appropriation and the making of a very large additional appropriation will be needed for these essential purposes entirely apart from any question of losses which were incurred in operation during the war conditions which confronted the railroads in the first year of Government control.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE CONGRESS BRIEFLY TOLD

SENATE.

Debate continued throughout the day on the \$100,000,000 European food relief bill. The Penrose amendment to create a commission to expend the fund was rejected without a roll call, as was also an amendment by Senator Ashurst to allow each officer and enlisted man honorably discharged two months' extra pay. In the course of the day Senator Jones of Washington spoke in criticism of the failure of the administration to remove restrictions against the construction in American shipyards of vessels for foreign owners. Senator King, Democrat, of Utah, introduced a resolution directing the Shipping Board to revoke all orders that would prevent shipbuilding in American yards on foreign account.

Conferees on the war-revenue bill revised their previous action and retained the 10 per cent tax on theater tickets and other places of amusement. The tax on cabarets was fixed at 15 per cent and the tax rate on club dues increased 50 per cent.

Nominations sent in yesterday included the following: Hugh M. Morris, of Wilmington, Del., to be district judge for the district of Delaware, to succeed the late Judge Bradford. To be United States attorneys—Erie Pettus, Birmingham, for the northern district of Alabama; John F. A. Merrill, Portland, for the district of Maine; Samuel K. Dennis, of Baltimore, for the district of Maryland; Thomas D. Warren, of Newbern, for the eastern district of North Carolina; Hiram M. Smith, of Richmond, for the eastern district of Virginia. To be United States marshals—John H. Kirkpatrick, of Shreveport, for the western district of Louisiana; William W. Stockman, of Baltimore, for the district of Maryland.

Before the Agricultural Committee Thomas F. Logan continued his testimony concerning his activities as Washington representative of Swift & Co., meat packers, and other large corporations. The committee investigating German propaganda heard Archibald Stevenson, of New York, representing the military-intelligence service, who stated among other things that a large number of professors in American colleges and universities held and advocated radical and pacifist views. The committee in executive session decided to make their names public later. To the Foreign Relations Committee acting Secretary of State Polk sent confidential data concerning conditions in Russia in connection with pending resolutions dealing with that subject.

Conferees on the bill authorizing the Bureau of Mines to make an investigation of the practicability of using lignite coal and peat as fuel reached an agreement. Before the Naval Committee investigating the Ford Eagle boat contract, William B. Mayo, of Detroit, chief construction engineer of the company, submitted a statement defending the boats against charges that have been made against their efficiency.

HOUSE.

The diplomatic and consular appropriation bill was finally passed and the Indian

appropriation measure taken up for consideration. During debate yesterday afternoon, Speaker Clark defended Ambassador Francis, to Russia, against charges that were made in debate. He also expressed the view that all American soldiers should be recalled from Russia and the rest of Europe at the earliest practicable moment.

Representative McKinley, of Illinois, introduced a resolution providing for an investigation of the necessity of the Government assuming control of the telephone and telegraph lines; and before the Post Office Committee, Edward Reynolds, of New York, opposed extension of the period of Government wire control.

The Naval Committee adopted 225,000 as the temporary personnel of the Navy, exclusive of officers.

J. Ogden Armour, of Chicago, continued his testimony before the committee considering legislation for placing the meat-packing industry under Federal control. R. J. Thorne, assistant director of purchase and storage of the Quartermaster Department, explained the character and amount of the surplus stocks of military supplies held by the War Department and the method by which the Government expects to dispose of them. Secretary Baker asked Congress for legislation that would permit retired Regular Army soldiers serving as field clerks to retain their retired pay in addition to their compensation as clerks. Continuing its inquiries into the activities of the National Security League, the committee yesterday afternoon heard Edwin Harvey, the league's publicity director, who told of the methods by which the organization supplied the press with matter.

MEXICAN TARIFF MEASURES.

New Decrees Relative to Import and Export Duties Signed.

American Ambassador Fletcher has telegraphed the State Department that six decrees relative to import and export duties have been signed by the President on the previous day. One of these extends through the current year, the exemption already allowed for automobiles, motor trucks, and accessories, as well as for agricultural, industrial, and mining machinery; another reduces the import duty on caustic soda from 0.15 peso to 0.05 peso per kilo; while a third fixes the import duty on newsprint paper in rolls at 0.12 peso per kilo, the rate specified in the decree of May 24, 1918. In the matter of export duties a reduction from 0.40 peso to 0.20 peso per kilo is made in the duty on tobacco and the duty on cotton is increased from 0.03 to 0.08 peso per kilo. Exportation of scrap iron is to be permitted in the future, subject to an export duty of 3 pesos per ton. (Peso, normally=\$0.498, kilo=2.2046 pounds.)

INDUSTRIAL HYGIENE LIBRARY.

A library of industrial hygiene is being prepared by the Department of Labor. It is planned to collect all the information available which bears on questions of health in industry, industrial safety, and employment management, and to have this information readily accessible at all times.

2. Other feed and feeding stuffs, metric tons, as follows: Oats, 112,600; corn, 137,000; sugar, 96,000; edible fats, 8,000. This allotment is for the year ending September 30, 1919.

Protection Against Reexport.

Protection against reexportation to the Central Powers is vested in the control of the Societe Swiss de Surveillance Economique.

The agreement sets forth shipping rates, transportation provisions, and methods of payment. It replaces an agreement for the shipment of limited supplies which expired several months ago, but which has been allowed to continue in operation pending readjustment.

GENERAL LICENSE FOR IMPORT OF COMMODITIES IN TRANSIT

War Trade Board Announces
New Ruling Covering Ship-
ments After January 21.

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 540) that a general import license, to be known as PBF No. 31, has been issued, covering all shipments of unrestricted commodities in transit through the United States where shipment from abroad is made after January 21, 1919. The removal of the restrictions on commodities now restricted will automatically bring such commodities under the effect of this general license.

Shipments After January 21.

As to shipments made after January 21, PBF No. 31 will supersede General Import License PBF No. 12 and PBF No. 25, in so far as it may conflict with such other general licenses.

It is to be noted that this general import license PBF No. 31 does not relieve shippers of commodities in transit of the necessity of complying with whatever regulations covering such shipments the Bureau of Exports may have in operation at the time. As to such export regulations see W. T. B. R. 465; issued January 2, 1919, and which will shortly be reissued in amended form.

LOST BAGGAGE SERVICE FOR MEN IN EXPEDITIONARY FORCES

The War Department authorizes the following from the office of the director of purchase, storage, and traffic:

A "lost-baggage section" has been established in the Embarkation Service, with the main office at Washington and a branch office at the port of embarkation, Hoboken, N. J.

The function of the new section will be to handle all matters pertaining to lost or stray baggage belonging to members of the American Expeditionary Forces, particularly such baggage as may be returned to the United States from overseas, to record and take prompt care of all such baggage, and to take the necessary steps to restore it to the owners.

All Held at Hoboken.

The port of embarkation, Hoboken, has been designated as the only point to which lost baggage should be shipped from overseas. All such baggage will be held at Hoboken until finally disposed of. The "lost-baggage section" will deal with baggage pertaining to the American Expeditionary Forces and not with baggage lost in ordinary movements in the United States.

Any person interested in the recovery of baggage belonging to members of the American Expeditionary Forces should communicate the facts to the baggage officer, port of embarkation, Hoboken, N. J.

Exhibit of Army Personnel Work Will Be Continued

A feature of this exhibit is the showing of how the Army finds out what men can do best and how it uses that ability. Trade tests are demonstrated and illustrated by photographs and models, and the results of Army personnel work in the present war are shown. The illustration of how officers' ratings are summarized and used is graphic and full of interest.

EPIDEMIC IN SAMOA SUBSIDES.

A State Department dispatch from Apia, in the Samoan Islands in the Pacific, states that the epidemic of influenza, which had caused over 8,000 deaths among the natives, has practically subsided. The deaths among the white population were very few.

RED CROSS WORKERS ON TRAIN FIGHTING TYPHUS IN SIBERIA

The American Red Cross authorizes the following:

An allied antityphus train, the control of which is under the American Red Cross Commission and to be operated by the American Red Cross, is one of the late important features of relief work in Siberia, according to a report which is just at hand from Vladivostok, under date of December 2. The train, reports state, was to be sent out through Siberia to fight the typhus situation, which has been very grave. The plan was decided upon by the Allied Sanitary Commission, as a result of recommendations made by the Red Cross.

Funds Supplied by Allied Powers.

The funds for this relief enterprise are primarily to be supplied by the various allied powers, though it is conceivable, says the report, that a certain amount later may have to be supplied by the American Red Cross. Dr. Joshua Rosett, of Baltimore, who handled the typhus situation at Nikolok, has been placed by the Red Cross in charge of the train, and will be the medical director. Mr. Bukeley, formerly of the First National Bank of Honolulu, will be the financial representative and handle all the funds furnished by the allied powers.

Train of 14 Cars.

The train itself is composed of 14 cars, including cars with bathing facilities, cars for clothing, drugs, and for personnel. The train is painted the usual gray of the Russian sanitary train and will bear in Russian the name "Allied Anti-Typhus Train, Operated by the American Red Cross." It will be the general purpose of the train to act as a sort of standard bearer. On coming to a town where typhus is prevalent, for instance, the cooperation of the local authorities, hospitals, and doctors will be obtained, and the work done through the Russian people themselves, so far as possible. No military force of any kind is to be used, but the train is to be sent out in a spirit of helpfulness to the Russian people.

Circulars Advising People.

Circulars will be printed in Russian and distributed along the line, telling the people of the necessity for bathing and keeping clean, and stating the general precautions against typhus. While the whole scheme is largely experimental, the opinion is expressed in the report that it will prove one of the best things taken up by the Red Cross so far as its wide-reaching effect is concerned. The men who have volunteered to go out on the train not only have the question of disease ahead of them, but also the uncertainty of Russian politics, and thus are taking a long chance.

COAL AND COKE ORDERS REVOKED.

All orders for the requisition of coal or coke, whether they are now outstanding, or issued prior to the present time, have been canceled and annulled, to take effect on January 31, it was announced to-day by the United States Fuel Administration.

Italy Worst Sufferer from Fuel Shortage Among Allied Nations

Italy, whose population as a whole was without coal for heating and in large part without gas for cooking, for many months of the war period, was the worst sufferer from fuel shortage among the allied nations, according to the report of the commission sent to Europe by United States Fuel Administrator H. A. Garfield.

Switzerland, which now faces a severe shortage, managed throughout the conflict to obtain a considerable supply of coal from Germany, although under an agreement forced on her "upon disadvantageous terms," the report says. France is continuing to furnish to Switzerland the tonnage Germany had allotted from Alsatian fields. Germany was Switzerland's chief source of supply before the war.

Belgium, the commission found, should be able to produce immediately more coal than needed for its own consumption since its industries were so thoroughly ruined during German occupation.

Needs 12,000,000 Tons Annually.

Representatives of the Italian Government, the commission reports, urge an annual national supply of 12,000,000 tons to meet actual requirements, drawing attention to the fact that "while the people may suffer privation without protest in war time," with the coming of peace a refusal to supply fuel "may give rise to serious disturbances."

The whole of this quantity would of necessity be imported, since Italy's only domestic fuel is a very poor grade of lignite. Under the spur of war needs, how-

ever, the production of this lignite was forced up to 2,500,000 tons in 1918 as against 700,000 tons before the war.

Italy was receiving but 7,000,000 tons of coal during the last years of the war, the report says, as against minimum necessities of 10,000,000.

During the first three months of 1917 a total of 120 out of 128 gas plants in Italy were shut down, leaving only those in the larger cities in operation, the commission found. From April 1, 1917, to November 1, 1918, consumers were allowed gas during an aggregate of only four hours a day for cooking purposes. During 1917 and a part of 1918 textile industries, paper mills, glass factories, and other nonwar industries were cut down to less than 10 per cent of their normal requirements.

The report expresses some doubt as to whether Great Britain will be able, "in view of conditions at home and the heavy demand at home and elsewhere," to resume the annual exports of some 8,500,000 tons to Italy maintained in pre-war years.

Under date of November 18, 1918, and while the Fuel Administration commission was in Rome, the Government established a monopoly over coal and several other commodities, including petroleum, sugar, coffee, and tea. It was said that the necessary approval by the Chamber of Deputies was anticipated. The creation of this monopoly, the commission points out, will "greatly change the conditions surrounding any prospective coal trade of the United States with Italy, as well as existing trades in such commodities as petroleum."

Exports from United States to Italy.

Discussing exports from the United States to Italy, the report says that "due in part to war conditions and in part to a coal strike in Great Britain, they rose from 82,000 tons in 1913 to 287,000 in 1914, to 1,714,000 in 1915, and to 1,040,000 tons in 1916." These figures, the report states, are from Italian governmental sources, and are smaller than those of United States records.

After 1916 imports from the United States slumped until, for the first nine months of 1918, they amounted to but 9,700 tons. This was due, says the report, to prohibitive freight rates and shortage of ships, adding:

"The subject of importation of American coal is here, as elsewhere in Europe, almost entirely a question of shipping and freight rates."

CHANGE "HEALTH SUNDAY" DATE.

Because the committee having charge of the Theodore Roosevelt memorial services has designated Sunday, February 9, as the day on which this memorial should be nationally observed, it has been necessary for Surg. Gen. Rupert Blue, of the United States Public Health Service to ask that the date for "Health Sunday" be changed to the last Sunday in February—the 23d. Sunday, the 16th of February, is to be devoted by the leading churches of the country to raising a fund of several millions of dollars for social reconstruction work.

WASHINGTON, D. C., January 4, 1919.

1. Freight charges on prepaid shipments are frequently collected both by the forwarding and receiving agents. To bring to an end this annoyance to shippers the following instructions are made effective at once.

2. The prepaid charges collected when shipments are received shall be indicated on the bill of lading in the space provided, and the agent's signature appear, separate and distinct from the bill of lading signature, in acknowledgment of the receipt of such charges.

3. When the shipper has been granted the 24 or 48 hour privilege provided for by General Order No. 25, and charges are to be collected from shipper after shipment has gone forward, the following information shall be written or stamped on bill of lading, and agent's signature appear, separate and distinct from bill of lading signature:

The charges on this shipment will be collected from the shipper and should therefore be considered to be fully prepaid.

_____, Agent.

4. When revision of way bills changes the freight charges and prepaid charges are therefore incorrectly stated, destination agent shall take action as follows:

(a) If prepaid charges are excessive, correction or prepaid only waybill shall be issued crediting the forwarding agent.

(b) If prepaid charges are insufficient and amount collected appears on bill of lading as indicated by paragraph 2, the

CANADIAN COAL AND METAL PRODUCTION FOR YEAR 1918

Vice Consul Claude R. Michels, at Calgary, Alberta, reports:

The department of mines estimates that the production of coal during 1918 is about 15,180,000 short tons, as compared with 14,046,759 short tons during 1917.

The production of the more important metals during 1918 is estimated as follows: Gold, \$14,750,000 in value; silver, 20,800,000 ounces; copper, 117,000,000 pounds; nickel, 91,500,000 pounds; zinc, 36,000,000 pounds; pig iron, 1,180,000 short tons; steel ingots and castings, 1,190,000 short tons.

The production of these metals in 1917 was: Gold, \$15,279,292 in value; silver, 22,221,276 ounces; copper, 109,227,352 pounds; nickel, 82,330,230 pounds; zinc, 29,668,764 pounds; lead, 32,676,281 pounds; pig iron, 1,170,480 short tons; steel ingots and castings, 1,745,734 short tons.

The total value of the mineral production in Canada during 1918 was probably not less than \$220,000,000. The total value in 1917 was \$189,646,820.

II.—The following opinion of the Judge Advocate General of the Army, which has been approved by the Secretary of War, is published for the information and guidance of all concerned:

[3d indorsement.]

War Department, J. A. G. O., November 25, 1918—To The Adjutant General:

1. The question is whether a dental surgeon ordered to change station accompanied by his assistant, an enlisted man, is entitled to mileage as having performed the travel without troops within the provision of paragraph 1281, Army Regulations. The particular case submitted is that of First Lieut. Joseph A. Campagna, Dental Corps, who was duly ordered, September 13, 1918, to proceed from Camp Greenleaf, Chickamauga Park, Ga., to Fort Howard, Maryland, "accompanied by Pvt. William C. McRedmond, Medical Department, his authorized enlisted dental assistant," to report upon arrival at Fort Howard to the commanding officer at that place for duty.

2. The settled construction of the last sentence of paragraph 1281, Army Regulations, is that an officer ordered to perform travel with less than 10 enlisted men who accompany him for the performance of duty is not regarded as traveling with troops within the meaning of the mileage law. In the opinion of this office a dental surgeon ordered to change station accompanied by his assistant, an enlisted man, comes within this classification and is not, therefore, to be regarded as traveling with troops. Accordingly, it is the view of this office that Lieut. Campagna is entitled to mileage for the travel indicated. In this connection see similar report of this office this date in the case of First Lieut. Ralph L. Faulkner, Dental Corps.

ORDERS REPORTS ON INFLUENZA FROM ALL HOSPITALS OF ARMY

The War Department authorizes the following:

Reports regarding the clinical aspects of influenza from all base and general hospitals of the Army were ordered by Surg. Gen. M. W. Ireland in a circular letter just issued. Up to this time, reports regarding the recent epidemic have been largely about the epidemiology and the bacteriology of the disease.

A questionnaire is inclosed with the letter inquiring into the symptoms noted in the early stages of the illness, those which develop later, the effect on the various organs, and the conditions noticeable during convalescence.

Because of the reliable data which can be obtained through military channels and the wide field which the reports will cover, it is hoped that the results will be of interest to the medical profession in future efforts to combat epidemics of influenza.
