## PARADES BY THE HOME-COMING DIVISIONS IN THE LARGER CITIES ADVOCATED BY SECRETARY BAKER

### NO FIXED POLICY IS ANNOUNCED

*Hopes That It Will be Possible to Have Black Hawk Division Parade at Chicago, Rainbow in Washington and 27th at New York.*

Press statement by the Secretary of War January 23, 1919:

"There is some interest in the question of parades by home-coming troops. We are getting to a place where divisions are being ordered home from France. We want to bring these divisions to the port nearest to their place of origin and then as soon as the division can be shaken down and gotten together we want to give it an opportunity to parade and be seen in the nearest large city from which the men come. For instance, the Black Hawk (86th) Division comes largely from Chicago. I am hoping to be able to work out a plan by which a substantial part of that division can parade in Chicago. I notice that the statement has been printed that I wanted the Rainbow Division to come to Washington; I hope that will be possible. The 27th Division, I understand, is on priority orders to come home. It will go to Camp Upton and then, no doubt, it will be brought into New York and allowed to parade there.

#### Conditions Different.

"I am not trying to announce a fixed policy, because the physical conditions are very different. With regard to the Black Hawk Division, which will go to Camp Grant, the camp is a considerable distance from Chicago and the train arrangements for getting the whole division to Chicago will be very complicated and, perhaps, impossible. One plan may be to have the troops sent through the city first, allowed to detrain, parade, and then entrain again for the camp, thus breaking the railroad journey.

"I want the people of the country to know that we are working on the matter, and that just as far as is possible we want the parades to be held. In the case of the 27th, of course it will be near New York and it may be possible to parade the whole division, and so far as is possible have men who have been in that division and are now in this country to go to New York to parade with it."

#### CHANGE IN EXPORT LIST.

## RESTRICTIONS ON FLYING BY CIVILIAN AVIATORS REMOVED

The War Department authorizes the following:

The Joint Army and Navy Board on Aeronautic Cognizance has removed restrictions on civilian flying, and will grant permits to all qualified civilians who apply under the President's proclamation of February 28, 1918.

Until the action of the Joint Army and Navy Board on Aeronautic Cognizance, civilians were only permitted to fly experimental machines, and then only under permits from the board.

## DISPOSAL OF SURPLUS WOOL STOCKS BY WAR DEPARTMENT

### Not the Intention of the Government to Compete with the Domestic Producers.

The War Department authorizes the following statement from the office of the director of purchase, storage, and traffic:

Many inquiries have been received from wool dealers, woolgrowers, and wool manufacturers in regard to the policy of the Government in disposing of the stocks of wool held by the War Department. In answer to these inquiries the War Department states as follows:

First. It is the intention of the War Department to continue to sell at public auction such wools as manufacturers may require with a minimum reserve price the equivalent of the British civil issue price. This basis of the British civil issue price will be maintained as the minimum reserve price until July 1, 1919.

Second. It is not the intention of the War Department in the sale of wool now owned by the Government to compete with the domestic producers of wool. It is the intention of the War Department on July 1, 1919, when the domestic clip will probably be arriving in the markets in sufficient volume to supply the wants of manufacturers, to discontinue offering at auction or otherwise until such a time as the domestic producer shall have had ample opportunity to market his 1919 clip, November 1, 1919, those grades of wool remaining in the hands of the Government that would compete with the product of domestic woolgrowers.

## \$600,000,000 OR MORE TREASURY CERTIFICATES OF INDEBTEDNESS ARE OFFERED FOR SUBSCRIPTION

### BEAR INTEREST FROM JANUARY 30

*Rate Will Be Four and One-Half Per Cent—Applications Will Be Received at Federal Reserve Banks. Books to Close February 6.*

The Secretary of the Treasury, under the authority of the act approved September 24, 1917, as amended by the act approved April 4, 1918, offers for subscription at par and accrued interest, through the Federal reserve banks, \$600,000,000 or more Treasury certificates of indebtedness, series V E, dated, and bearing interest from January 30, 1919, payable July 1, 1919, with interest at the rate of 4½ per cent per annum. Applications will be received at the Federal reserve banks. Subscription books will close at the close of business February 6, 1919.

#### Taxation.

Certificates will be issued in denominations of \$500, \$1,000, \$5,000, \$10,000, and \$100,000. Said certificates shall be exempt, both as to principal and interest, from all taxation now or hereafter imposed by the United States, any State, or any of the possessions of the United States, or by any local taxing authority, except (a) estate or inheritance taxes, and (b) graduated additional income taxes, commonly known as surtaxes, and excess-profits and war-profits taxes, now or hereafter imposed by the United States upon the income or profits of individuals, partnerships, associations, or corporations. The interest on an amount of bonds and certificates authorized by said act approved September 24, 1917, and amendments thereto, the principal of which does not exceed in the aggregate \$5,000, owned by any individual, partnership, association, or corporation, shall be exempt from the taxes provided for in clause (b) above.

#### Redemption Privilege.

Upon 10 days' public notice, given in such manner as may be determined by the Secretary of the Treasury, the certificates of this series may be redeemed as a whole at par and accrued interest on or after any date, occurring before the maturity of such certificates, set for the payment of the first installment of the subscription price of any bonds offered for subscription by the United States after the offering and before the maturity of such certificates.

The certificates of this series, whether or not called for redemption, will be accepted at par, with adjustment of accrued interest, if tendered on such in-

stallment date in payment on the subscription price then payable of any such bonds subscribed for by and allotted to holders of such certificates. The certificates of this series do not bear the circulation privilege and will not be accepted in payment of taxes. The right is reserved to reject any subscription and to allot less than the amount of certificates applied for and to close the subscriptions at any time without notice. Payment at par and accrued interest for certificates allotted must be made on and after January 30, 1919, and on or before February 6, 1919.

#### Interim Receipts.

After allotment and upon payment Federal reserve banks will issue interim receipts pending delivery of the definitive certificates. Qualified depositaries will be permitted to make payment by credit for certificates allotted to them for themselves and their customers up to an amount for which each shall have qualified in excess of existing deposits when so notified by Federal reserve banks. As fiscal agents of the United States, Federal reserve banks are authorized and requested to receive subscriptions and to make allotment in full in the order of the receipt of applications up to amounts indicated by the Secretary of the Treasury to the Federal reserve banks of the respective districts.

### Fourth Biweekly Issue Is Oversubscribed

Secretary Glass yesterday announced that the fourth biweekly offering of Treasury certificates of indebtedness, in pursuance of the program for financing the current necessities of the Government set forth in the letter of November 27 to all banks and trust companies, had been oversubscribed. The minimum amount offered was \$600,000,000, and the total subscriptions aggregate \$600,101,500.

### Villa Seizes Americans, Lectures Them on Labor, Then Releases Them

The State Department has been advised from Chihuahua, Mexico, that Villa, after seizing three Americans early Wednesday morning at Santa Eulalia, about 15 miles east of Chihuahua, subsequently released them, together with other persons whom he had taken prisoners. Before releasing them he obtained a supply of powder and instructed the prisoners on the need of better pay, working hours, and betterment of other conditions for miners.

The names of the American prisoners who were subsequently released are Holmes, Mathewson, and Deavitt.

### EXPECTS REVIVAL OF DEMAND FOR LABOR IN THE SPRING

The Department of Labor authorizes the following:

All signs point to a revival of manufacturing demand in the spring, according to Director Charles T. Clayton, of the Training Service, Department of Labor, who believes that the proportions of this revival will not only recall all the labor now being laid off, but make still further demands for help. He estimates that there are 300,000 manufacturing establishments in this country, employing 10,000,000 hands. There were at the time of the last census report, in 1914, wage-workers in factories to the number of 7,936,367, but the enormous expansion of industry since that time has added greatly to the total.

Only about 6 or 7 per cent of the war workers have been thrown out of jobs by the suspension of hostilities, according to estimates prepared for the service.

## OPEN WINTER IN U. S. RELEASES FODDER STUFFS FOR EUROPE

The open winter in this country will mean 200,000 tons of fodder stuffs for European neutrals.

That amount of oil cake and oil-cake meal is to be shipped immediately by us to the neutrals who have been needing fodder, it was stated by the War Trade Board to-day, after consultation with the Food Administration. Further supplies are likely to be forthcoming.

Hitherto our own fodder needs in this country have had the effect of preventing shipments of fodder overseas. Fortunately the open winter thus far has been instrumental in relieving the situation in this country. Consequently the neutral nations in Europe will profit thereby.

The board also announced that licenses will be freely granted for the export of oil cake and oil-cake meal to Canada, Central America, South America, Mexico, Cuba, and the West Indies.

### Formal Announcement.

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 543), after consultation with the United States Food Administration, that they will now consider applications for licenses to export oil cake and oil-cake meal to Canada, Central America, South America, Mexico, Cuba, and the West Indies.

Exporters should acquaint themselves thoroughly with the import requirements of the countries of destination before consummation of their business, as in some of these countries the regulations which were in force prior to the signing of the armistice are still in effect.

## NO POTASH FROM ALSACE MINES BEFORE APRIL, FRANCE ADVISES

France will be unable, at least until April, to ship potash from the potash mines of Alsace. The War Trade Board announced yesterday that it has received authentic and official information to that effect from the French High Commission in the United States. These advices further indicate that for the next few months practically the entire potash output of the Alsatian mines will be urgently required for agricultural purposes in France.

It is the view of the War Trade Board, based upon this information, that even under the most favorable circumstances, no potash from Alsace could be available in the United States for agricultural uses before June, 1919, and that, therefore, it will be necessary that the United States rely entirely upon its domestic potash production for the coming spring season.

### BATTLESHIP CHANGES COURSE.

The War Department publishes the following cabled correction:

The battleship *Connecticut*, which sailed from Brest January 20 and was scheduled to arrive at Newport News February 1, has changed its course and is due to arrive at New York February 2.

# OFFICIAL COMMUNIQUE ON PEACE CONFERENCE

The following official communique was issued at Paris on January 22:

"The President of the United States, the prime ministers and the foreign ministers of the allied and associated powers, and the Japanese representatives met at the Quai d'Orsay between 3 o'clock and 5:30 o'clock this afternoon and approved the proposal of President Wilson, which reads as follows:

"The single object the representatives of the associated powers have had in mind in their discussions of the course they should pursue with regards to Russia has been to help the Russian people, not to hinder them or to interfere in any manner with their right to settle their own affairs in their own way. They regard the Russian people as their friends, not their enemies, and are willing to help them in any way they are willing to be helped. It is clear to them that troubles and distrust of the Russian people will steadily increase, hunger and privation of every kind become more and more acute, more and more widespread, and more and more impossible to relieve, unless order is restored and normal conditions of labour, trade, and transportation once more created; and they are seeking some way in which to assist the Russian people to establish order.

"They recognize the absolute right of the Russian people to direct their own affairs without dictation or direction of any kind from outside. They do not wish to exploit or make use of Russia in any way. They recognize the revolution without reservation, and will in no way and in no circumstances aid or give countenance to any attempt at a counter revolution. It is not their wish or purpose to favor or assist any one of the organized groups now contending for the leadership and guidance of Russia as against the others. Their sole and sincere purpose is to do what they can to bring Russia peace and an opportunity to find her way out of her present troubles.

The associated powers are now engaged in the solemn and responsible work of establishing the peace of Europe and of the world and they are keenly alive to the fact that Europe and the world can not be at peace if Russia is not. They recognize and accept it as generously, as unselfishly, as thoughtfully, and ungrudgingly as they would serve every other friend and ally and they are ready to render this service in the way that is most acceptable to the Russian people.

"In this spirit and with this purpose they have taken the following action:

"They invite every organized group that it now exercising or attempting to exercise political authority or military control anywhere in Siberia or within the boundaries of European Russia as they stood before the

war just concluded, except in Finland, to send representatives, not exceeding three representatives for each group, to Princes Islands, Sea of Marmora, where they will be met by representatives of the associated powers, provided, in the meantime, there is a truce of arms amongst the parties invited and that all armed forces, anywhere sent or directed against any people or territory inside the boundaries of European Russia as they stood before the war or against Finland or against any people or territory whose autonomous action is in contemplation in the 14 articles upon which the present negotiations are based, shall be meanwhile withdrawn and aggressive military action cease. These representatives are invited to confer with the representatives of the associated powers in the freest and frankest way with a view to ascertaining the wishes of all sections of the Russian people and bringing about, if possible, some understanding and agreement by which Russia may work out her own purposes and happy cooperative relations be established between her people and the other peoples of the world. A prompt reply to this invitation is requested. Every facility for the journey of the representatives, including transportation across the Black Sea, will be given by the allies and all the parties concerned are expected to give the same facilities. The representatives will be expected at the place appointed by the 15th of February, 1919.

"The proposal will be sent to-night by wireless to the interested parties.

"The meeting then decided to call a plenary session of the conference for 3 o'clock on Saturday, January 25, 1919, to discuss the subject of the league of nations on the basis of the proposals made by Mr. Lloyd George, as well as other subjects which were examined this afternoon."

## Three Billion Meals Eaten By U. S. Soldiers During War

The War Department authorizes the following from the office of the Director of Purchase and Storage:

Food stores for the Army on hand in the United States, its possessions, France, and in transit to France on January 1, 1919, were valued at \$300,000,000. At the time of the signing of the armistice approximately 10,000,000 pounds of food were being consumed by our troops in France each day, and there were on hand in France at that time 1,000,000,000 pounds of food in reserve. All this food had been transported on an average of 5,000 miles.

It is estimated by the Subsistence Division that 3,000,000,000 meals were served to the Army during the 19 months of warfare with Germany.

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## PRESIDENT SENDS CONDOLENCE TO THE BRAZILIAN GOVERNMENT

President Wilson has cabled the following message of condolence to the Brazilian Government:

"I have learned with deep regret of the loss sustained by the Government and people of Brazil in the death of their distinguished late President Señor Rodrigues Alves whose friendship for the United States had given assurance of a still further strengthening of the cordial relationship between the two countries, so much desired by both peoples. I offer to the Brazilian Government and people my sincere condolence and ask you to be so good as to extend to the bereaved family my heartfelt sympathy.

## FRENCH ADMIRAL THANKS U. S. NAVAL COMMANDER FOR AID

Secretary Daniels yesterday made public the following letter from Vice Admiral Aubrey, French commander in chief at Lorient, which is one of the bases on the Atlantic coast of France, to Capt. T. P. Magruder, United States Navy, district commander of the American forces at Lorient, which has just been received from Admiral Sims:

"With the signing of the armistice which completes the period of effective military collaboration of the naval forces placed under your orders with that of the Third Arrondissement in the struggle against the common enemy, I wish to address to you my very sincere and hearty thanks for the efficient aid which your surface vessels and air forces have given to the divisions of the patrols of the Loire for the protection of merchant vessels, and for the work, so often dangerous and laborious, of removing mines in that part of the coast which has been intrusted to our care. ## NAVAL OFFICER IS COMMENDED FOR GALLANTRY IN RESCUING TWO BRITISH AVIATORS AT SEA

Secretary Daniels has commended Lieut. A. L. Gates, United States Naval Reserve Force, for his gallant conduct in rescuing two men of the crew of a wrecked British Handley-Page machine on August 22, 1918, about 8 miles from Ostend, after they had been in the water for nine hours.

In his report to the department, Admiral Sims includes inclosures received from the British Air Ministry, giving the details of the exploit. One of these stated that Lieut. Gates carried out an act requiring skill and bravery of the highest degree in the face of the enemy. It is further stated that Lieut. Gates had on several occasions rendered very valuable assistance to the British machines. In his report Admiral Sims recommends that Lieut. Gates be given a medal of honor.

## PROCEEDINGS OF THE CONGRESS BRIEFLY TOLD

## SENATE.

When the Senate adjourned last evening after another day of discussion of the \$100,000,000 food relief bill the leaders were confident the final vote would be had before adjournment this evening. Speeches in support of the bill were made yesterday by Senator Hitchcock, chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, who defended Food Administrator Hoover against attacks that have been made upon him, and by Senators Smoot and Kellogg, Republicans. The chief speakers against the measure were Senators Sherman, of Illinois, and Cummins, of Iowa, Republicans.

President Wilson yesterday sent to the Senate the following nominations: D. M. Kelliher, of Fort Dodge, Iowa, to be Solicitor of the Bureau of Internal Revenue; Grosvenor M. Jones, of Ohio, to be first assistant chief, and Roy S. MacElwee, of New York, to be second assistant chief of the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce; Henry James Holmes, to be receiver of public moneys at Glenwood Springs, Colo.

The commerce committee continuing its inquiry into the Hog Island shipbuilding plant heard General Manager Piez, of the Emergency Fleet Corporation, who told of the steadily decreasing cost of ship construction and general conditions at that plant. Senator Simmons appeared before the committee to urge a continuance of the housing project for workers at the Wilmington, N. C., shipyard. General Manager Piez told the committee the project could be completed for about \$500,000. Senator Harding, of Ohio, opposed completion of the project on the ground of economy. Before the Interstate Commerce Committee Chairman Julius Kruttschnitt, of the Southern Pacific, said there had been a change not only in public opinion but among railroad operators themselves toward carriers sharing their facilities with competitors. He said it was impractical to standardize railway equipment.

Labor problems connected with the period of readjustment were discussed with the labor committee by A. L. Filene, a Boston merchant. He said he feared that unless business men learned and profited by the lessons of the war a great deal of unrest would result. He expressed the belief that capital and labor would get together on the majority of the reforms that seemed to be desirable. The committee investigating German propaganda continued its hearings, with Archibald Stevenson, of the Military Intelligence Service, as the witness yesterday. He told the committee that bolshevist propaganda was being circulated in this country to-day and gave the committee the names of the leaders in the movement. He said soviets have been organized in industrial centers in the United States, where the doctrines of the bolshevik are taught and practiced, with the end in view of being able at some time to overthrow the existing Government.

Conferees on the war-revenue bill continued their conference on that measure, but reached no conclusions on the sections relating to war-excess profits taxes on corporations, on estates, and inheritances.

## HOUSE.

The side of the packers in the inquiry under way before the Interstate Commerce Committee was continued yesterday, with Levy Mayer, counsel for Armour & Co., and L. F. Swift, president of Swift & Co., as the chief witnesses. Mr. Mayer attacked the constitutionality of the pending measure for Federal regulation of the packing industry and the methods employed by the Federal Trade Commission in conducting its recent inquiry into the packing industry. Mr. Swift said if the pending bill were enacted into law it would cripple the packing industry and result in an increased cost of foodstuffs.

Before the Post Office Committee further protests were heard against continued Federal control of telegraphs and telephones. Protests were made by the public service commissions of Vermont, New Mexico, and Montana. Gen. John W. Heavey, acting chief of the Bureau of Militia Affairs, asked the Military Committee to include in the annual supply bill a provision that would turn over to the National Guard from the surplus supplies of the Regular Army military equipment valued at \$135,000,000. The War Department also has asked the committee to add to the Army appropriation bill a rider authorizing the President to organize a standing army of 500,000 men. This is intended as a substitute for the original measure which remains in the committee unacted upon. Before the Immigration Committee Representative Johnson, of South Dakota, recently returned from military service abroad, stated that unless the bars are put up against immigration thousands of former German soldiers will rush to this country as soon as they can leave their country.

Establishment in France of a "Field of Honor" to hold the bodies of American soldiers killed in the war, was proposed to the House by Representative Fess, of Ohio. He advocated buying a chateau and 500 acres of ground by specially incorporated associations which would raise funds by popular subscription. He suggested the maintaining in France of a company of soldiers to act as a guard. Mr. Randall, of California, introduced a bill to define the term "intoxicating liquor" as used in Federal laws to mean liquors that contain "alcohol in any degree whatever."

The Immigration Committee has been informed by the Department of Justice that 4,020 alien enemies were interned by the United States.

## DENIES CONTROVERSY BETWEEN RAILROAD DIRECTOR GENERAL AND COMMERCE COMMISSION

Walker D. Hines, Director General of Railroads, on Tuesday made the following statement:

"It is distinctly unfortunate that several evening newspapers, in reporting this morning the decision of the Interstate Commerce Commission in the Pacific Lumber Co. case, have drawn the conclusion that there exists a controversy over the relative jurisdictions of the Director General and the Interstate Commerce Commission. It appears to be assumed in these stories that the Director General has denied or sought to contest the right of the Interstate Commerce Commission to review rates initiated by him on behalf of the President. As a matter of fact, nothing could be further from the truth. The Federal-control act places such power of review specifically in the hands of the Interstate Commerce Commission, and the Director General time and time again has recognized this authority by being represented before the commission by counsel, who have argued as to the merits of contested rates.

### Outline of Situation.

"In this particular case there was involved a situation which had its origin prior to Federal control, and the proceeding was commenced prior to the assumption of Federal control over railroads. It hinged upon the relationship between the rates complained of and other rates, not upon the reasonableness of the contested rates in or of themselves. The rate order of the Director General of last June put into effect a percentage increase as to lumber, and therefore did not change the relationship between the rates complained of and the rates with which they were compared in the consideration of this case.

"In appearing in this case before the Interstate Commerce Commission, the Assistant General Counsel of the Railroad Administration, representing the Director General, stated specifically that the position of the Director General was 'that the Commission has jurisdiction to determine the justness and reasonableness of any rate under attack, not only with reference to its measure, but with reference to its relationship. We have not denied that for one minute.'

### No Conflict in Jurisdiction.

"At no time since the Government took possession and control of the railroads has there been the faintest suggestion of any conflict in jurisdiction between the Commission and the Director General. The most satisfactory understanding has existed as to the functions of each. At all times the Director General has enjoyed the cooperation and assistance of the Commission, and assurances to this effect have been most cordially given to the new Director General. He is in entire accord with the statements which the Commission has made in this case relative to the extent of its jurisdiction and there is no basis for assumption of any controversy on this subject. As indicative of his reliance on the Commission there is quoted herewith a letter sent by

## PERPETUATION OF COMMUNITY COUNCILS OF DEFENSE URGED BY NATIONAL ORGANIZATION

The following statement is made by Grosvenor B. Clarkson, Director of the United States Council of National Defense:

The Council of National Defense, comprised of the Secretaries of War, Navy, Interior, Agriculture, Commerce, and Labor, has just taken an action vitally affecting community life and organization in the United States. Through the Director of the Council, Grosvenor B. Clarkson, the 48 State councils of defense and that of Alaska, and the State divisions of the Woman's Committee of the Council are being asked to take immediate steps to secure legislation in their respective States to provide for the development of community organization and for permanent State leadership in all organized communities on a wholly nonpartisan and nonsectarian basis.

### State Bureaus Suggested.

The council has recommended to each State that in securing the necessary legislation the proper functions be vested in a bureau or commission composed of representatives of State departments, such as those dealing with agriculture, labor, and education, which come in most intimate contact with the small communities. By this means the organized community will be made of most assistance to the State executive departments, and those State departments made of most assistance to the individual communities. When such a bureau has been established it is contemplated that the State council of defense should arrange that the community councils now reporting to it are transferred with the goodwill of the State council to the permanent bureau or commission.

The State of New York has already taken the lead in this matter by Gov. Smith's appointment of a reconstruction commission which may very well act as a head center for community council activities in the State. Representations to that end were made to Gov. Smith by William N. Cohen, ex-judge of the New York State Supreme Court, field representative in New York of the Council of National Defense.

The foregoing action is taken by the council not only to meet the many emergencies of the readjustment and demobilization period, but to establish wholesome community organization on a permanent basis throughout the Nation. It is plain that one of the great lessons of the war to America has been the interdependency of social effort. It is equally plain that permanent dividends for the future should be drawn from this wartime cooperation.

### Aid To National Life.

The Council of National Defense believes that community organization will bring into our national life a much needed element of cooperative endeavor and civic orderliness which will make for more democratic and efficient public service. It will provide for the drawing together and articulation of the various voluntary agencies at work in the community so that without in any way stifling or interfering with the individual integ-

ity of any, they will present a united front to community problems and be supported in their work by the cooperation of every member of the community. December 15, 1918.

34876. With the Americans on the march to the Rhine. In an age of gasoline this contrast comes about; a squadron of Liberty trucks of the American army of occupation is aligned in Mayen, Germany, in front of old Genovava-Burg castle. The tower dates from the Middle Ages.

34877. President Wilson's Christmas Day in France. A Christmas Day close-up of President Wilson, attired to spend a day among the troops in the field.

34878. President Wilson's Christmas Day in France. President Wilson addresses the troops assembled for the Christmas Day review upon a plain near Langres. This was the first time an American President had ever reviewed an American Army on foreign soil.

34879. President Wilson's Christmas Day in France. Ten thousand veteran United States troops marching in company front upon a plain near Langres, pass in review on Christmas Day before President Wilson. The snapshot above is of the march past of men of the 26th (the Yankee) Division.

34880. President Wilson's Christmas Day in France. A Christmas gift from the soldiers of the 77th American Division is presented to Mrs. Wilson after the review of troops. Christmas Day near Langres. The gift is a shoulder patch of the Liberty Division, a design in blue and gold of the famous Liberty Statue. President Wilson and Gen. Pershing are interested spectators while Mrs. Wilson opens the package.

34881. President Wilson's Christmas day in France. After the Christmas day review of 10,000 troops upon a plain near Langres, President Wilson and Gen. Pershing leave the stand and depart for Montigny-le-Roi for Christmas dinner.

34882. President Wilson's Christmas day in France. On duckboards part of the presidential party crosses the muddy field near Langres to the reviewing stand from which the President is to witness the Christmas day review. This snapshot shows M. ## Interpretation No. 1 to Supplement No. 7 to General Order No. 27, Concerning Railroad Wage Schedule

The United States Railroad Administration issues the following:

WASHINGTON, D. C.,  
November 23, 1918.

INTERPRETATION NO. 1 TO SUPPLEMENT NO.  
7 TO GENERAL ORDER NO. 27.

OVERTIME MONTHLY, WEEKLY, OR DAILY  
PAID EMPLOYEES.

### ARTICLE I.

Eight consecutive hours, exclusive of the meal period, constituting a day's work from the effective date of Supplement No. 7 to General Order No. 27, the increases provided for therein and applicable to monthly, weekly, and daily paid employees specified in Articles I, II, and VI of Supplement No. 7, are based upon the recognized number of working days constituting a calendar year (including Sundays and (or) holidays where they have been considered a part of the employees' assignment), and the rate of pay in effect January 1, 1918, prior to the application of General Order No. 27, exclusive of overtime. The following examples illustrate the method to be used in establishing the straight time hourly rate as the basis of payment for overtime service.

**Example (a).**—Employees working 30 days per month at a wage amounting to \$60 per month on January 1, 1918, prior to the application of General Order No. 27, would on September 1, 1918, under Supplement No. 7, Article I—(a) automatically advance to the basic rate of \$62.50 per month, plus \$25 increase, establishing the rate of \$87.50, or \$1,050 per year. In computing the pro rata rate per hour for overtime pay for monthly, weekly, or daily paid employees, take the number of working days constituting a calendar year, multiply by eight, and divide the annual salary by the total hours, exclusive of overtime and disregarding time absent on vacations, sick leave, holidays, or for any other causes. In determining the hourly rate, fractions less than one-fourth of 1 cent shall be as one-fourth of 1 cent; over one-fourth and under one-half, as one-half cent; over one-half and under three-fourths, as three-fourths; over three-fourths, as 1 cent.

**Example (b).**—Yearly wage, \$1,050 ÷ 2,880 hours = 36.45, or 36.5 cents per hour.

**Example (c).**—Yearly wage, \$1,200 ÷ 2,880 hours = 41.66, or 41.75 cents per hour.

**Example (d).**—Yearly wage, \$1,300 ÷ 2,880 hours = 45.14, or 45.25 cents per hour.

**Example (e).**—Yearly wage, \$1,500 ÷ 2,880 hours = 52.1, or 52.25 cents per hour.

**Example (f).**—Yearly wage, \$1,800 ÷ 2,880 hours = 62.5 cents per hour.

Note.—It is to be understood that 2,880 hours is illustrative only; the hours per year will vary, as the assigned work days per year vary.

### ARTICLE II.

On February 21, 1918, the Director General issued General Order No. 8, paragraph 3 thereof reading as follows:

"The broad question of wages and hours will be passed upon and reported to the Director General as promptly as possible by the present Railroad Wage Commission. Pending a disposition of these matters by the Director General, all requests of employees involving revisions of schedules or general changes in condi-

tions affecting wages and hours will be held in abeyance by both the managers and employees. Wages, when determined upon, will be made retroactive to January 1, 1918, and adjusted accordingly. Matters of controversy arising under interpretations of existing wage agreements and other matters not relating to wages and hours will take their usual course, and in the event of inability to reach a settlement, will be referred to the Director General."

If employees coming within the scope of Supplement No. 7 to General Order No. 27 were paid a punitive rate for overtime after the regular day's work, Sundays, and holidays prior to February 21, 1918, the same conditions should apply on the eight-hour basis. Any punitive overtime rate established for employees under this interpretation since February 21, 1918, except as established by the Director General, is unauthorized and can not be recognized.

**Example (a).**—Employees working 10 hours per day January 1, 1918, prior to the application of General Order No. 27, and who were, prior to February 21, 1918, paid at the rate of time and one-half for overtime, should be paid as follows:

8 a. m. to 12 noon, 4 hours' work; 12 noon to 1 p. m., 1 hour for meal excluded; 1 p. m. to 5 p. m., 4 hours' work; 5 p. m. to 7 p. m., 2 hours at rate of time and one-half time; elapsed time, 11. Time for meal, 1 hour deducted; overtime, 2 hours. Total time to be paid for, 11 hours.

**Example (b).**—Overtime commences immediately following the eighth consecutive hour of continuous service, after deducting the meal period.

On the basis of pro rata time for the ninth and tenth hours:

8 a. m. to 12 noon, 4 hours; 12 noon to 1 p. m., 1 hour for meal excluded; 1 p. m. to 5 p. m., 4 hours' work; 5 p. m. to 7 p. m., 2 hours overtime, pro rata rate; 7 p. m. to 9 p. m., 2 hours overtime, one and one-half time pro rata rate; elapsed time, 13 hours. Time for meal, 1 hour deducted; continuous service, 12 hours; total time to be paid for, 13 hours.

**Example (c).**—Employees working straight through eight consecutive hours.

6 a. m. to 2 p. m., 8 hours' work; 2 p. m. to 4 p. m., 2 hours overtime, pro rata rate; 4 p. m. to 6 p. m., 2 hours overtime, one and one-half time pro rata rate; elapsed time, 12 hours. Continuous service, 12 hours; total time to be paid for, 13 hours.

### Hourly Rates.

#### ARTICLE III.

The employees coming under the provisions of Articles III, IV, and V of Supplement No. 7 to General Order No. 27 who were on January 1, 1918, prior to the application of General Order No. 27, paid on a basis of 10 hours or more to constitute a day, for whom hourly rates have been established as per the above specified articles, shall on and after September 1, 1918, the effective date of Supplement No. 7, receive one-eighth of the wages received for 10 hours on January 1, 1918, prior to the application of General Order No. 27, as their basic hourly rate, to which shall be added 12 cents per hour, provided the hourly rate thus obtained shall not exceed the maximum rate specified in the respective articles.

**Example (a).**—Employees coming under the provisions of Articles III, IV, and

V of Supplement No. 7 to General Order No. 27, on a 10-hour basis, rate \$2.50 per day; one-eighth of \$2.50 equals 31.25 cents per hour, adding the increase of 12 cents produces a rate of 43.25 cents, under Articles III and IV. Under Article V (a) the rate would revert to the maximum of 43 cents; under Article V (b) the rate would revert to the maximum of 40 cents.

**NOTE.**—To determine the hourly rate to be paid employees on the hourly basis, and for whom 10 hours or more were the established hours of service, use the method and example (a) of above Article III; for classes specified in Supplement No. 7, Articles III, IV, and V, working less than 10 hours and over 8 hours, one-eighth of the wage received for the number of hours recognized as a day's work.

### Pay for Calls.

#### ARTICLE IV.

Employees who are notified or called to work outside the eight consecutive hours, exclusive of the meal period and continuous service, constituting their regular assignment, shall be paid a minimum allowance of three hours for two hours' work or less; if held over two hours, time and one-half will be paid, computed on the minute basis.

**Example (a).**—

8 a. m. to 12 noon, 4 hours' work; 12 noon to 1 p. m., 1 hour for meal excluded; 1 p. m. to 5 p. m., 4 hours' work; 5 p. m. to 7.30 p. m., 1½ hours' overtime, 1½ times pro rata rate; elapsed time, 10½ hours; time for meal, 1 hour; break in continuous service, 1 hour; time for call, 3 hours, minimum guarantee; total time to be paid for, 11 hours.

#### ARTICLE V.

Exclusive of employees whose regular assignment includes Sundays and (or) holidays, employees notified or called to work on Sundays and (or) holidays, will be paid not less than the minimum allowance of three hours, and where no existing agreement or practice is more favorable, such employees will be paid as per examples (b) and (c) of Article II.

#### ARTICLE VI.

Payment of overtime at a rate in excess of pro rata will be computed from and added to the pro rata rate.

#### ARTICLE VII.

Unless acceptable to a majority of employees in a department or subdivision thereof, the meal period shall not be less than 30 minutes or more than 1 hour.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

Where unjustifiable inequalities develop or exist in the rates of pay for relatively the same service and responsibility, as between employees of the same class within the respective groups, as specified in Supplement No. 7 to General Order No. 27, the regional directors are hereby authorized to establish uniform rates of pay by zones or districts throughout their respective regions, under the following conditions:

(a) The maximum rates established by Supplement No. 7 to General Order No. 27 must not be exceeded.

(b) Rates established by Supplement No. 7 to General Order No. 27 must not be reduced.

(c) The specified differentials in the established maximum rates for hourly workers to be preserved.

(d) All rates herein provided for shall be filed by the regional directors with the Board of Railroad Wages and Working Conditions.

## RULES FOR RAILROAD ACCOUNTANTS ON THE COLLECTION OF UNDERCHARGES AND THE DISPOSAL OF OVERCHARGES

The United States Railroad Administration issues the following:

General Order No. 55. Collection of transportation charges and disposition of overcharges, undercharges, and agency relief claims.—The following regulations shall govern the assessment and collection of transportation and other charges for all services performed by carriers under Federal control; the refund of overcharges, and the collection of undercharges, and also the disposition in the accounts of such carriers of uncollectible undercharges and agency relief claims:

(1) Officers and agents of carriers under Federal control are required and expected to collect the correct amount due for each service performed, determined or determinable by the application of the lawfully published rate or rates applicable to such services, plus charges for intermediate or terminal service not included in and made a part of such rate or rates, and war taxes applicable to the foregoing.

(2) They shall continue, or if not already established, institute such methods as may be necessary to insure, as accurately as possible, the correctness of such charges before the collection thereof.

### Refund of Overcharges.

(3) When the amount of overcharge is determined after collection of charges, refund shall be made on presentation of original freight receipt, and the amount of such refund shall be indorsed on such receipt.

(4) Formal claims for overcharge presented by claimants shall be prepared on the standard form approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission. They shall be supported by the original paid freight receipt, and if claim is based on weight, misrouting, valuation, etc., by all other obtainable documents or particulars. If the original paid freight receipt can not be presented, claimant's indemnity bond may be required. If overcharge is based on the rate clear, reference shall be shown to the tariff or base in which the rate claimed is published. Such formal claims shall be presented to, and adjusted by, either the initial or the destination carrier. If claims are presented to intermediate carriers, they shall be immediately transmitted to one of those named.

(5) Claims paid by carriers other than the carrier which collected the freight charges shall, in the discretion of the accounting officer, be sent to such collecting carrier to be registered, in order that duplicate payments may be avoided.

### Apportionment Among Carriers.

(6) No apportionment shall be made among carriers of overcharge claims paid, or of agency relief claims covering charges absorbed, such as switching, elevation, transfer charges, terminal delivery charges, icing, cost of grain doors, or other analogous items. This rule does not apply to claims for charges on freight destroyed or confiscated.

(7) Claims for overcharges which can not be refunded by agents shall be

promptly forwarded to the proper officer having jurisdiction. Such officer, upon receipt of such claims, properly supported, shall take immediate steps, consistent with accuracy, to determine the correct charge applicable. If the amount claimed be found correct, or if an overcharge in any amount be found, such amount shall be promptly refunded, and any difference between the amount claimed and the amount refunded clearly explained to the claimant. If the claim be wholly invalid, the claimant shall be notified promptly.

(8) In the event an undercharge be developed after collection of transportation charges, or in the investigation of a claim or otherwise, the officer or agent having jurisdiction shall promptly prepare a freight bill for such undercharge, upon which bill shall be shown all facts incident to the transaction; and such freight bill shall be promptly presented for collection.

(9) The duty of collecting such undercharge shall rest with the officer or agent whose duty it is to collect transportation charges, and he shall exhaust every reasonable effort to collect such amounts.

### Failure to Make Collection.

(10) In the event of failure to make collection of an undercharge, after every reasonable effort has been made to do so, the officer or agent charged with the duty of collecting the undercharge shall promptly transmit the bill therefor, with a statement of all facts incident to his efforts and failure to collect, to the accounting officer having jurisdiction. Appropriate adjustment of the agent's accounts shall be made by station claim or otherwise, according to the established practice of the carrier.

(11) If the facts presented with such undercharge indicate that every reasonable effort has been made to collect it, appropriate action shall be taken as follows:

(a) If a bill for an undercharge be for \$5 or less in any one case, and in the exercise of his business judgment he concludes that further efforts to collect would be futile, the chief accounting officer shall direct that it be charged off.

(b) If a bill for an undercharge be for more than \$5, in any one case, it shall be promptly transmitted by the accounting officer to the chief counsel of the carrier interested, and his recommendations as to its disposition shall be followed.

(c) If the party liable for the undercharge can not be located, or service can not be had, or where, upon investigation by counsel in good faith, it is found that legal process would be futile and ineffectual, counsel shall direct the claim to be charged off, and it shall be so disposed of; otherwise, suit shall be entered for its collection.

(12) All undercharges determined to be uncollectible as prescribed in subparagraphs (a), (b), and (c), of paragraph (11) hereof, shall be borne by the carrier which originally settled the freight

## NEW FORM OF APPLICATION FOR EXPORT LICENSE ISSUED

The War Trade Board announces, in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 532), that they have authorized the use of a new and simplified form of application, Form X-A, which may be used in applying for export licenses to ship to any country in place of Form X hitherto in use.

Copies of this new form may be obtained upon application to the War Trade Board, Washington, D. C., or any of its branch offices. In order, however, that exporters may make use of such copies of Application Form X as they may have on hand, applications will be accepted if filed on Form X. In filling out Form X, however, exporters will not be required to give any further information than is required on Form X-A.

When Form X-A is used, it will no longer be necessary to use Supplemental Information Sheet X-119 for shipments to Denmark, Holland, Norway, or Sweden, as blank spaces are provided on the back of Form X-A for giving the information desired. The only supplemental information sheets which are now required to be attached to the application are Form X-20, for the exportation of moving picture films to certain destinations, and Form X-29, for the exportation of manufactures of gold.

## NEW YORK RECONSTRUCTION BOARD.

Secretary of Labor Wilson has been informed by Gov. Smith, of New York, that a reconstruction commission has been appointed for that State, and that the commission will hold its first meeting Friday evening, January 24. The commission will be assisted by the Department of Labor in every way practicable.

charges on the erroneous basis, regardless of the responsibility for such error in settlement.

### Cost of Suits.

(13) In the event that suit be instituted to collect an undercharge, the cost of such suit shall be borne by the suing carrier. If the undercharge be not collected under suit, the amount thereof shall be disposed of as provided in paragraph (12) hereof.

(14) In the event freight be destroyed or confiscated in transit, so as to preclude the possibility of delivery of the freight or collection of the charges, no part of the freight charges accruing thereon to any participating carrier shall be included in interline accounts. If waybills have been audited and settled before information concerning the destruction or confiscation of the property is available, such way bills shall be made void, and resettled with participating carriers by correction account or through claim channels.

(15) The provisions of this order shall apply to overcharges, uncollectible undercharges, and to other charges herein referred to, which accrued or which may accrue on and subsequent to January 1, 1918. Settlements which have already been completed on the basis of rules heretofore in effect, shall not be readjusted.
