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TEXT OF EXECUTIVE ORDER DISSOLVING WAR INDUSTRIES BOARD AND TRANSFERRING CERTAIN OF ITS FUNCTIONS

POWERS INTRUSTED TO THE CHAIRMAN

Activities Whose Continuance May Be Deemed Essential May Proceed for a Limited Period After January 1, 1919, But In No Event Longer Than the Proclamation of Peace.

EXECUTIVE ORDER.

Whereas, by Executive order No. 2868, dated May 28, 1918, I established the War Industries Board, with the functions, duties, and powers outlined in my letter of March 4, 1918, to Bernard N. Baruch, its chairman, and now, by virtue of the armistice and approaching peace, it becomes desirable to provide for the dissolution of said board and for the termination of its activities, in the manner hereinafter set forth.

Now, therefore, I, Woodrow Wilson, President of the United States, by virtue of the authority vested in me as Chief Executive and by virtue of the powers conferred upon me by the act of Congress entitled "An act authorizing the President to coordinate or consolidate executive bureaus, agencies, and offices, and for other purposes, in the interest of economy and the more efficient concentration of the Government," approved May 20, 1918, as well as by virtue of any and all other acts of Congress conferring authority upon me in the premises, do hereby order and direct:

That the War Industries Board and all divisions, sections, committees, and subordinate bodies thereof shall terminate and dissolve on January 1, 1919, save and excepting:

1. That if the chairman finds that the proper performance of any duty duly entrusted to him or to the board requires the continuance in office of either himself, or of any member or members of the board or official or officials connected therewith, for a limited period after January 1, 1919, then the board and any such official or officials thereof may, in the discretion of the chairman, be continued for such limited period after January 1, 1919, as may be necessary for the

NATION-WIDE PROHIBITION NOW IN U. S. CONSTITUTION DECLARES PROCLAMATION BY ACTING SECRETARY POLK

AMENDMENT RATIFIED BY THIRTY-SIX STATES

Certification Given That It Has Now Become "Valid to All Intent and Purposes." Congress Resolution Provides New Law Becomes Effective "After One Year From Ratification."

Acting Secretary of State Frank L. Polk to-day signed the proclamation certifying that the prohibition amendment has become valid as a part of the Constitution of the United States. The proclamation follows:

FRANK L. POLK,
Acting Secretary of State of the United States of America.

To all to whom these presents shall come, greeting:

Know ye, that the Congress of the United States at the second session, Sixty-fifth Congress, begun at Washington on the third day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seventeen, passed a resolution in the words and figures following, to wit:

Joint resolution proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in congress assembled (two-thirds of each House concurring therein), That the following amendment to the Constitution be, and hereby is, proposed to the States, to become valid as a part of the Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of the several States as provided by the Constitution:

"SECTION 1. After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

"SEC. 2. The Congress and the several States shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

"SEC. 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as

an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress."

And, further, that it appears from official documents on file in this department that the amendment to the Constitution of the United States proposed as aforesaid has been ratified by the legislatures of the States of Alabama, Arizona, California, Colorado, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Montana, Nebraska, New Hampshire, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota, South Carolina, Texas, Utah, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia, Wisconsin, and Wyoming.

And, further, that the States whose legislatures have so ratified the said proposed amendment constitute three-fourths of the whole number of States in the United States.

Now therefore, be it known that I, Frank L. Polk, Acting Secretary of State of the United States, by virtue and in pursuance of section 205 of the Revised Statutes of the United States, do hereby certify that the amendment aforesaid has become valid to all intents and purposes as a part of the Constitution of the United States.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the Department of State to be affixed.

Cinematograph Films Exported to Switzerland

MR. DAVIS RETURNS TO LONDON.

U. S. Ambassador Back at Post After Attending Paris Conference.

The American ambassador to Great Britain, Mr. John W. Davis, returned to London yesterday after conference in Paris with the peace commission. Mr. Davis is a member of the committee on reparations, whose appointment, with other committees, was announced by Premier Clemenceau, the president of the commission to negotiate peace. The committees, of which the reparations committee is one, are to conduct inquiries and make reports on particular features of the work to be done by the peace commission.

RULES FOR THE DISCHARGE OF DISABLED U. S. SOLDIERS ISSUED TO ALL HOSPITALS BY THE SURGEON GENERAL

INSTRUCTIONS GIVEN AS TO SPECIFIC CASES

General Policy of War Department to Retain Control of Men Suffering from Certain Chronic or Communicable Diseases Until Cured—Protection to Public as Well as Patients.

The War Department authorizes the following from the Office of the Surgeon General:

The discharge of disabled soldiers and the conditions under which this may be carried out, is the subject of the following circular letter sent by Surgeon General M. W. Ireland to all Army surgeons and hospitals:

Policy of Department.

It is the policy of the War Department to retain, so far as practicable under military control, for the purpose of medical and surgical treatment (a) officers and soldiers suffering from acute diseases or acute exacerbations of chronic diseases or unhealed lesions; (b) officers and soldiers suffering from communicable diseases or who are 'carriers,' whose discharge would be a danger to the civil community; (c) officers and soldiers suffering from disabilities incurred in the line of duty which are correctible within their terms of service or enlistment; (d) officers and soldiers suffering from chronic or permanent disabilities incurred in the line of duty, which are susceptible of improvement by measures for mental or physical reconstruction designed to fit them for return to their homes, for the resumption of their former vocations, or, with their consent, for the industrial opportunities or the training courses provided by the Federal Board for Vocational Education.

"In the accomplishment of this policy, it is the intention to restore officers and soldiers, who are held in service as provided above, to health and function as fully as possible, considering the nature of their disabilities, the limitations of the military service, and the other provisions which the Government has made for the care of the permanently disabled.

Retreats for Disabled Men.

"The National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers provides retreats for former soldiers who have served in time of war and are unable to maintain themselves. The Bureau of War Risk Insurance provides compensation and medical and hospital treatment for disabilities incurred in the line of duty. The Federal Board for Vocational Education provides courses in vocational training and maintenance during the same, for sol-

diers disabled in the line of duty who wish to take them.

"It is not the department's purpose, therefore, to retain disabled officers and soldiers under treatment indefinitely, thus exposing them to the danger of hospitalization, but rather only so long as is necessary to complete that degree of physical restoration indicated in the preceding paragraphs. Such measure of restoration having been taken, discharge for disability should be recommended promptly in the cases of permanently incapacitated drafted or enlisted men. In the case of officers not of the permanent establishment, the procedure prescribed in Circular 73, War Department, November 18, 1918, governs.

Special Rules to Be Observed.

"In applying the foregoing rules, the following special rules will ordinarily be observed:

"(a) Cases of tuberculosis should be kept under treatment in military hospitals until the disease is arrested, or until it is ascertained that they are progressive in-type or incurable.

"(b) Cases of organic heart disease and manifest chronic nephritis should be recommended for discharge.

"(c) Cases of general paresis or of insanity complicated by epilepsy (insane epileptics) should be sent to St. Elizabeths or disposed of as otherwise provided in Army Regulations.

"(d) Other insane who present particularly dangerous tendencies, or in whom all the clinical evidence points to incurable conditions, should be likewise disposed of.

Treatment of the Insane.

"(e) Soldiers showing symptoms of insanity whose cases are not included in paragraphs (c) and (d) should be retained in military hospitals under observation and treatment for a period not exceeding four months. If at the end of four months the symptoms continue, like disposition will be made of these cases also.

"(f) All cases of epilepsy not covered in (c) will be recommended for discharge on certificate of disability.

"(g) Drug addicts will be promptly recommended for discharge.

"(h) The blind or nearly blind should be retained until they are functionally able to care for themselves and are otherwise physically fit for discharge.

"(i) The deaf or nearly deaf may be retained until they have learned lip reading and are otherwise physically fit for discharge.

Cases of Amputation.

"(j) Cases of amputation of the leg or arm, or both, should be retained in hospital until the stumps have healed, suitable provisional artificial limbs provided, and reasonable proficiency in the use of such limbs acquired.

"(k) Soldiers suffering from surgical disabilities incurred in the line of duty which are correctible in whole or in part, within their terms of service should, if consented to by the soldier, be retained for the necessary corrective measures. If the corrective measures are contra-indicated within a reasonable period, discharge will ordinarily be recommended. Cases of disability not incurred in the line of duty, which may be corrected by proper treatment, may be retained for correction or be recommended for discharge as deemed most appropriate."

SURPLUS OF ARMY OFFICERS PREVENTS ADDITIONAL APPOINTMENTS FOR ACTIVE SERVICE, SECRETARY BAKER TELLS SENATE

DISCHARGING 1,000 A DAY

Commissions, However, in Officers Reserve Corps Are Offered to Men Found Qualified, Secretary of War Says in Response to Resolution Asking Why Recommended Appointments and Promotions Are Not Made.

The War Department publishes the following letter from the Secretary of War to the president of the Senate:

JANUARY 18, 1919.

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE:

SIR: In accordance with the provisions of a resolution of the Senate, dated January 8, 1919, which reads as follows:

Whereas prior to the signing of the armistice a large number of enlisted men in the Army had been recommended for commissions and many officers had been recommended for promotion, and such recommendations were pending in the War Department when said armistice was signed; and

Whereas an order was issued by the Secretary of War which resulted in no action being taken upon said recommendations, or either of them; and

Whereas officers and enlisted men who were so recommended are being discharged from the service without said recommendations being acted upon; and

Whereas no good and sufficient reason appears for failure to act upon said recommendations, and justice and good faith would seem to require affirmative action thereon; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Secretary of War be directed to report to the Senate whether a modification or revocation of said order is contemplated, and if not, what reasons exist for failing to act upon said recommendations.

I have the honor to report as follows:

No Vacancies Existing.

Appointments to any commissioned grade in the United States Army have been made, and can properly be made, only when vacancies exist. Immediately upon the conclusion of the armistice, November 11, 1918, the demobilization of the temporary army was begun and has been proceeding with great rapidity. From and after that date, therefore, instead of there being any vacancies in any grade, there has been a surplus of officers in every grade which it has been necessary to reduce by discharge. To increase the surplus by further appointments

would have been unjustifiable, and such appointments were therefore discontinued. As it is necessary to continue the discharge of officers at the rate of more than 1,000 a day, it is not contemplated to resume appointments.

In connection with the suggestion which is frequently made, that commissions be conferred upon those persons who had been recommended for them prior to the signing of the armistice in order that on their discharge they may carry with them into civil life the title of a higher rank, the department has consistently adhered to the views that a military office, like any other, should be conferred only with a view to the performance of the duties pertaining to it, and that when there is no expectation that a person will perform the duties of an office, civil or military, appointment to such office can, with difficulty, be justified. No change in this policy is contemplated.

Reserve Corps Appointments.

There is a certain class of military office, however, to which no present duties are attached, but whose purpose is to place the holder in such a position that under certain circumstances the Government may require his services. I refer to the Officers' Reserve Corps. Appointment in this corps is properly conferred upon those from whom no immediate services are required, and such appointment carries with it office, rank, and title in the United States Army. Immediately after the conclusion of the armistice I directed that a commission in the Officers' Reserve Corps be offered to every enlisted man who had been properly recommended during the war as qualified for such commission. I further directed that in every case where an officer had been duly recommended for promotion he be offered a reserve commission with the rank for which recommended. Under the present law appointments in the Officers' Reserve Corps are restricted to certain grades and certain limitations are imposed as to the age of appointees. I expect to transmit to Congress in the near future my recommendations for amendment of this law, which will make it possible to offer to every officer who has served in the war a reserve commission in the grade for which he has been found qualified.

The matter may briefly be summed up as follows: The demobilization of the Army makes it impossible to employ any additional officers on active duty, but, on the contrary, necessitates the discharge of many already in the service. For officers not on active duty, but held in reserve, the need will always exist in time of peace. The War Department, therefore, discontinued the appointment of officers for active duty, but offers to every man who has been found qualified for it a commission in the United States Army with inactive status.

WAR PROGRAM ON COTTONSEED TO CONTINUE THROUGH SEASON

Food Administration Announces
Decision to Keep Up Price-
Stabilization Plan.

The Food Administration issues the following:

The Food Administration has announced to the various elements of the cottonseed industry that it intends to continue, through the present crop season, the stabilization plan which was put into effect with satisfactory results last September, provided it continues to receive the cooperation of the different parts of the industry.

Undertaken as War-Time Measure.

The stabilization program was undertaken as a war-time measure to maintain cotton production at a time when conditions threatened to cut it to a point below vital needs and also to forestall profiteering, which might easily have arisen from these abnormal conditions. Producers have marketed about three-quarters of their crop under the restrictions of this program and the Food Administration hopes to assist in securing justice to the entire industry by having the program continued for the remaining quarter.

Explained in Circular Letter.

In a circular letter sent out to the licensees of the industry, R. E. Cranston, who is in charge of this branch of the Food Administration's activities, explains the situation as follows:

The United States Food Administration is endeavoring to complete the cottonseed season under the stabilization program that has obtained since last September and which was based on a recommendation of representatives of the producers with reference to price of cotton seed, and agreements with various elements of the industry regarding prices of products manufactured therefrom.

Crop Movements Orderly.

Statistics of the Census Bureau indicate that this crop has moved in an orderly procession in approximately the same quantities from month to month as applied to the crop of the previous year. About three-quarters of the present crop of seed has been purchased by crushing mills, leaving about one-quarter to be sold subsequently to January 1. There was on hand in the possession of the crushing mills—but not yet converted into products—a quantity of seed equivalent to about one-quarter of the total crop, which was about the same statistical situation a year ago. The amount of crude oil in the hands of the crushing mills was less than it was in the previous year and the amount of oil held by the refiners and lard substitute manufacturers was somewhat more. These statistics indicate that the situation as it affects cottonseed and its products appears to be following the normal lines of its procedure.

Program to Be Continued.

It is the intention of the Food Administration to carry out this stabilization plan and we have had numerous requests from all elements of the industry—farmers, seed dealers, crushing mills, oil re-

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SHORTAGE OF HOMES IN U. S. NOW TOTALS NEARLY MILLION

The Department of Labor authorizes the following:

Twenty-five representatives of building and loan associations, from almost every section of the United States, in a recent conference in Washington formulated the following statement on building conditions:

"In normal times, under normal conditions, it required the building of about 600,000 homes per year to supply the normal growth of the country and replace the losses occasioned by fire and other destructive agencies. For the past two years, owing to causes growing out of the world war, this normal construction of homes has been practically suspended. What housing construction has been accomplished has been for the major part, that which was demanded to meet war conditions. Shortage of labor and restrictions on the use of building material stopped the work.

"At this time there is a shortage of homes in America of nearly a million, to which must be added the normal requirements of the year just opening. Most of the present shortage has not been wholly abandoned, but has been merely postponed and delayed, and the pressure to inaugurate and complete this delay construction will shortly be felt, as soon as weather and climatic conditions make such work feasible.

"The demobilization of the military and naval forces now in progress, and the release of workmen from the shipbuilding and munition plants and other war industries furnishes the supply of labor which has hampered building for the past two years, and the removal of restrictions on the use of material and transportation, which so largely contributed to block home construction, all combine to make the resumption of home building now possible."

The Division of Public Works and Construction Development, Information and Education Service, of the Department of Labor, is now working with the building and loan interests endeavoring to work out a way to make liquid the associations' assets to the end that more money may be available for home building loans.

LABOR SURPLUS FAST GROWING OVER WIDE AREA, SAYS REPORT

The Department of Labor authorizes the following:

Telegraphic reports received by the United States Employment Service for the week ending January 25, on conditions of employment and unemployment all over the country indicate that the general trend of the situation is becoming serious. On December 10, 1918, 25 per cent of the cities reporting on shortages and surpluses reported a shortage of labor, 12½ per cent reported a surplus of labor, and 60 per cent reported that the supply about equaled the demand.

Surplus Steadily Increasing.

From that date on until the current week there has been a steady and consistent decrease in the shortages reported and in localities where the supply equaled the demand, while the surpluses have been steadily increasing. For the current week the percentage of cities reporting shortages has dropped to 13 per cent, the percentage reporting surpluses has increased 4½ per cent, while the cities reporting that supply equals demand has dropped to 43 per cent.

The area of unemployment is spreading all over the country. Up to December 21 only six States were reporting and considerable amount of surplus labor. During the current week 20 States reported a surplus. On December 3, 28 cities reported labor shortages and this number has been cut down in the current week to 15.

Total Surplus 210,000.

On December 3 there was reported a total shortage of labor of 34,000 and surpluses totaling only 12,000. During the following eight weeks this shortage was reduced to 12,000 while the surpluses reported reached the figure of 210,000.

New England: In Connecticut the surplus over demand is increasing. Every center except New Britain reports surpluses over demands with increasing unemployment. New Britain continues to report a slight shortage. It is hoped, however, that this condition of unemployment will continue only until the building trades resume, as a large proportion of the builders hardware which is made in this country is made in Connecticut.

New York State: Unemployment conditions throughout the State are steadily increasing. A surplus of labor is reported in every large city in the State.

Pennsylvania: Shortages are still reported in Pittsburgh and Scranton. The shortages in Harrisburg and Philadelphia have been wiped out and both cities report a surplus. Erie reports a heavy surplus.

Ohio: The surplus in Cleveland of 40,000 has jumped to 55,000. Toledo reports a surplus of 10,000 and Dayton a surplus of 7,000. Cincinnati and Youngstown both report surpluses. Surpluses are reported in all centers except in Akron and Columbus where the supply about equals the demand.

Middle West: The surplus in Detroit of 25,000 reported last week has increased to 30,000. Grand Rapids, Jackson, and Flint all report surpluses. There is a demand for woodsmen and a heavy surplus of bookkeepers and clerks. Illinois reports surpluses at almost every point. The expected lay off in the Rock

HISTORY OF WAR FOR SCHOOLS TO BE ISSUED BY GOVERNMENT

In order that boys and girls in American schools may have the latest possible information on how the war was fought and won and what the problems of reconstruction are, the Bureau of Education has just had printed a special bulletin on America's Part in Winning World Peace. The bulletin, which is illustrated throughout with cartoons and pictures of the day, will be distributed at cost by the Government to all schools. "It offers the needed help for schools which would study this most important phase of world history while its events are still fresh in the minds of the people and before interest in it has begun to wane," says Commissioner Claxton.

Some of the Chapters.

Chapters in the book are as follows: I. The war thus comes to an end; II. Entering the world war; III. The invasion of Belgium; IV. Why we entered the war; V. Our actual military participation; VI. Our enlistment and training of men; VII. Food control and distribution; VIII. Fuel control and distribution; IX. Equipping and supplying our fighting forces; X. Our shipbuilding program; XI. War transportation control; XII. Our aircraft program; XIII. Our money raising for Government war services; XIV. Volunteer cooperation; XV. Our war publicity for educating the public; XVI. Latin America in the war; XVII. Problems of peace.

Special emphasis is given to the importance of the problems of reconstruction. The bulletin asserts:

"The war has made the world safe for democracy only in the sense that the door has been opened, that the path has been cleared of all obstacles set up by autocratic Governments. The establishment of just democracy is still to be accomplished.

"What the war has accomplished is to win for the world the opportunity to work out the problems of democracy unhampered by the forces of autocracy. This task is ours and will extend through the years. Patriotic duty to our country and our obligation to the new world demand that we should work at it now and for years to come with redoubled energy, and with unanimity no less complete than that with which we have waged the war."

Island Arsenal will affect both Illinois and Iowa. The Indiana heavy surpluses are reported except in boiler-makers and machinists. Indianapolis reports a surplus of 4,400. Minneapolis, Minn., reports a surplus of 4,000.

Southern: In Alabama there is some demand for miners and agricultural help. In Georgia there is some shortage in Atlanta and Savannah, but taking the State as a whole there is a surplus of all classes of labor.

Pacific Coast: Heavy surpluses are reported in San Francisco, Oakland, and Los Angeles. San Francisco reports a surplus of 8,000. Laborers and returning soldiers seem unwilling to leave the city. The labor situation in Oregon, especially in Portland, is acute. Portland reports a surplus of 7,000. In Washington there is great unrest in the shipyards at Puget Sound with a substantial surplus of workers over demand all over the State.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES BRIEFLY TOLD

SENATE.

The bill to validate informal contracts for war supplies entered into by the War Department has been under consideration for three days. Yesterday it was amended so as to make it clear that in settlements of canceled contracts prospective profits can not be taken into consideration. Another amendment adopted is designed to protect the rights of subcontractors.

Senator Wadsworth, who spent several weeks along the European battle front, addressed the Senate yesterday afternoon, on the general military situation. He praised highly the work of Gen. Pershing, his staff, and the American Army and discussing certain features of the administration of affairs in this country criticised what he declared to be shortcomings.

A supplemental resolution bearing upon the investigation of the election of Senator-elect Newberry, in Michigan, was introduced yesterday by Chairman Pomerehne of the Elections Committee, and intended to extend the power of the committee to include inquiry into charges filed recently by Mr. Newberry against Henry Ford. Adoption of any resolution looking to an investigation by the present Senate of elections of Senators who do not take their seats before March 4 next will be vigorously opposed, Republican leaders have announced in discussion on the floor. Chairman Overman of the judiciary subcommittee investigating German propaganda, read to the Senate yesterday afternoon correspondence to show that Archibald Stevenson, a recent witness before the committee, was called at the instance of the Military Intelligence Service. The Judiciary Committee has held up its report on the reappointment of Judge Charles E. Bunnell and District Attorney R. F. Roth, of Fairbanks, Alaska, at the request of Senator Jones, of Washington, who charges both officials with political activity in attempting to prevent the election and seating of the Republican Delegate from Alaska.

A bill in line with the plans of the administration to provide for the payment of the guaranteed price of \$2.20 a bushel for the 1919 wheat crop was transmitted to the chairman of the agricultural committees of both the Senate and House yesterday afternoon by the Food Administration. It would appropriate \$1,250,000,000. It contains several provisions intended to give the Government control over the wheat. Both Houses yesterday adopted the conference report on the \$100,000,000 European food-relief bill. It now goes to the President for his approval.

Continuing its inquiry into the packing industry, the Senate committee yesterday and to-day heard Louis F. Swift, president of Swift & Co., Chicago packers, and questioned him concerning the conduct of the business and the profits made by the firm during and prior to the war. Before the House committee Edward Morris, president of Morris & Co., was the principal witness. He insisted that any legislation designed to control or regulate the meat-packing industry would "muddle things up."

Inquiry by the Committee on Public Buildings and Grounds into the Chicago

speedway hospital project was resumed yesterday afternoon, with Louis W. Stotesbury, of New York, a former major in the inspector general's office, as the witness. He testified to having inspected the project and made a report recommending the selection of the speedway site. R. C. Fulbright, of Houston, Tex., representing the Southwestern Industrial Tariff League, before the Interstate Commerce Committee, opposed Government ownership and operation of railroads.

HOUSE.

Debate began on the second deficiency bill reported to the House by the Appropriations Committee, and under which many billions of dollars appropriated for war expenditures will be restored to the Treasury. With less than 50 Members of the House voting, a resolution was adopted requesting the President "to inform the House of the result in detail of his administration of the provisions of the so-called Overman Act," which authorized the President to consolidate Government agencies during the war. Representative Gould, of New York, was the author of the resolution which was introduced December 17 and referred to the Judiciary Committee. The action yester-

day followed a motion that was agreed to discharging the Judiciary Committee from further consideration of the resolution.

The conference report was agreed to on the bill increasing the compensation of United States district and circuit judges. Secretary of the Interior Lane asked Congress for a survey to determine the industrial power needs along the Atlantic coast from Washington to Boston.

After protracted discussion in committee the Immigration Committee yesterday ordered a favorable report on a bill shutting off immigration into the United States for a period of four years. Certain exemptions are provided for and immigration from Canada, Newfoundland, Cuba, and Mexico is not included. Chairman Burnett was directed by the committee to apply to the Rules Committee for a rule providing for immediate consideration of the bill.

The Post Office Committee by a vote of 10 to 8 decided to report a bill continuing Government control of the telephone and telegraph systems only until December 31, 1919. Chairman Moon was directed to seek a rule that will compel consideration of the measure at this session.

REGULATIONS FOR TESTING OF EXPERIMENTAL AIRPLANES

The following regulations were authorized by Gen. Kenly, Director of Military Aeronautics, January 14, 1919:

1. The Chief of the Technical Section is charged with the responsibility for all tests of experimental airplanes at Air Service fields.

2. Requests by private enterprise for permission to conduct unofficial tests of experimental airplanes at Air Service fields may be granted under the following conditions:

(a) Such tests will be conducted at McCook Field, Dayton, Ohio, unless otherwise permitted by the Director of Military Aeronautics.

(b) Such tests will be entirely at the owner's risk and expense and he shall supply the pilot therefor. No Air Service pilot will be permitted to engage in these tests.

(c) Flight tests will be permitted only after a technical examination by a representative of the Technical Section. If, in the opinion of this officer, the airplane is unsafe to fly, no flight will be permitted at an Air Service field.

3. Official tests of experimental planes will be authorized only at McCook Field, Dayton, Ohio, and under the following conditions:

(a) The owners of such airplanes must submit two models—one for destruction test and one for performance test.

(b) Tests will be at Government expense and the flight test will be made by an Army pilot detailed by the Chief of the Technical Section.

(c) Flight tests will be permitted only after a technical examination and sandtest by a representative of the Technical Section. If, in the opinion of this officer, the airplane is unsafe to fly, no flight will be permitted at an Air Service field.

4. Pilots inexperienced in flying experimental airplanes will not be permitted to fly such planes until after they have been placed "in production."

5. Commanding officers at flying fields will be held strictly responsible that no flights are made at their fields in violation of the foregoing instructions.

performance of such duty, but in no event longer than the proclamation of peace. The appropriations of the War Industries Board shall be and continue available for any salaries and expenses incident to the performance of any such duty.

2. That the powers and functions of the Division of Planning and Statistics of the War Industries Board shall, on January 1, 1919, be transferred to and thereafter exercised by the War Trade Board. There shall be transferred and assigned to said War Trade Board such officials or employees of the War Industries Board, if any, as in the judgment of the chairman of the said two boards may be necessary for the performance of the duties herein referred to, and also all papers, files, and records appertaining thereto, and the expenses incident to said duties shall be charged against and paid from the appropriations of the War Industries Board. Upon the completion of said duties, the papers, files, and records aforesaid shall be disposed of as may be hereafter directed by me, and the powers and functions hereby transferred shall thereupon cease and be at an end.

3. That the powers and functions of the wool division of the War Industries Board, including particularly those relating to the payment by the dealers or buyers of any sums due by them in accordance with the "Government regulations for handling wool clip of 1918," as established by said board on May 21, 1918, and the disposition of such payments, shall, on January 1, 1919, be transferred to and thereafter exercised by the Bureau of Markets of the Department of Agriculture, until such time as the affairs and duties of said division, uncompleted on said date, shall have been finally completed and wound up. There shall be transferred and assigned to said Bureau of Markets such officials or employees of the War Industries Board, if any, as, in the judgment of the chairman of the said board and the chief of the said bureau, may be necessary for the performance of the duties herein referred to, and also all papers, files, and records appertaining thereto, and the expenses incident to said duties shall be charged against and paid from the appropriations of the War Industries Board. Upon the completion of said duties the papers, files and records aforesaid shall be retransferred by the Bureau of Markets to the liquidating officer of the War Industries Board and the powers and functions hereby transferred shall thereupon cease and be at an end.

4. That the powers and functions of the price fixing committee of the War Industries Board shall continue until such of the prices already fixed by said committee, as will not expire on or before January 1, 1919, shall have expired, and the appropriations of the War Industries Board shall continue available for expenses incident to such continuance. Upon the expiration of all of such prices, the papers, files, and records of said committee shall be delivered to the liquidating officer of the War Industries Board, and the powers and functions of the price

fixing committee shall thereupon cease and the committee shall be and stand dissolved.

5. That if any of the orders, directions, regulations, or functions of the board, or any of its divisions, committees, sections, or subordinate bodies (other than such as have heretofore been provided for in this order) can not, in the judgment of the chairman, be finally abrogated, released, complied with, or fulfilled with due regard to the interests involved, before January 1, 1919, then the chairman shall designate the same to the War Trade Board, and the powers and functions now possessed by the War Industries Board with respect thereto, shall, on January 1, 1919, be transferred to and thereafter exercised by the War Trade Board until such time as such orders, directions, regulations, or functions shall have been finally abrogated, released, complied with, or fulfilled. There shall be transferred and assigned to the War Trade Board such officials or employees of the War Industries Board, if any, as in the judgment of the chairman of the two boards may be necessary for the performance of the duties herein referred to, and also all papers, files, and records appertaining thereto, and the expenses incident to said duties shall be charged against and paid from the appropriations of the War Industries Board. Upon the completion of said duties the papers, files, and records aforesaid shall be retransferred by the War Trade Board to the liquidating officer of the War Industries Board, and the powers and functions hereby transferred shall thereupon cease and be at an end.

6. That, except as hereinbefore provided, the War Industries Board shall continue after January 1, 1919, for the sole and only purpose of winding up its affairs, and of arranging, completing, indexing, and inventorying its papers, files, records, accounts, property, and effects, and of lawfully disposing of the same as soon as practicable and advisable; and for this purpose the chairman may appoint a liquidating officer, who shall have such powers as may be necessary for the proper performance of said work, including the right to submit the papers, files, records, and accounts of the board to inspection by those duly authorized or entitled to inspect them, and with power also, on behalf of the board, to continue and engage and pay such employees and to incur such expenses as may be necessary for the performance of the duties aforesaid; and also, on behalf of the board, through such disbursing officer as he may continue or employ, to draw upon the board's appropriations therefor, and also to draw upon such appropriations for any salaries, expenses, or obligations of the board due and unpaid on January 1, 1919, or thereafter incurred pursuant to this order.

This order shall be effective from its date, the 31st day of December, 1918.

NEWS PRINT PAPER SHORTAGE REPORTED AS ACUTE IN ITALY

The Weekly Bulletin, Canadian Department of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa, says under date of December 30, 1918:

"The Italian ministry of industry, commerce, and labor, in a recent circular letter to all editors of newspapers in Italy, points out that a still further reduction in the consumption of news print is absolutely necessary, and that not more than 15,000-16,000 quintals (1 metric quintal=220.46 pounds) of paper can be distributed monthly, although the average amount apportioned during the last few months has been 17,000 quintals, as compared with 20,000 quintals during the last months of 1917. The conditions, it is stated, which at that time counseled a reduction in supplies, have not bettered but are even more serious, owing to the increasing difficulties in obtaining cellulose and the other raw material used. The minister suggests that the following plans might be adopted for decreasing the quantity of paper now used: (1) That the number of two-page newspapers be increased; (2) that fewer copies be allowed the newspaper vendors; (3) that the supplements be limited or suppressed. In exceptional circumstances, when some news of extraordinary import should be given to the public before the regular issue of the paper itself, a half-size, one-sheet bulletin, it is stated, might be used. It is also hinted in this circular letter that a paper-control commission may be appointed."

finers, and lard-substitute manufacturers—to maintain the stabilization plan as it affects this crop. This plan is based on agreements with the various elements of the industry and requires their continued cooperation for the balance of the season.

We wish to emphasize that while it is our intention to continue this program so long as we have the authority to do so, there are no guarantees that we can make in connection with it. Its continued success depends very largely upon the hearty cooperation of the industry.

License to Import Jute And Products of Jute

On and after February 1, 1919, according to a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 559), licenses will be issued by the War Trade Board where the applications therefor are otherwise in order, for the importation of jute and jute products from all countries. Licenses so issued will not require the indorsement of the bill of lading to the Textile Alliance, Inc.

Studying Industrial Safety Codes With View to Securing Uniformity

The Department of Labor authorizes the following:

Investigations which may require two years or more for their completion have been put under way by the Bureau of Standards, Department of Commerce, and the Working Conditions Service, Department of Labor, in order to establish a series of industrial safety codes for the protection of workmen from injury, and to unify safety work throughout the country.

At present there is little uniformity in the safety codes of the various States, although working conditions for the same industry may be practically identical in all parts of the country. Manufacturers are greatly hampered by the lack of uniformity, and will be benefited no less than the workmen by a unification of safety codes.

A tentative list of codes to be formulated shows no less than 55 lines of work that must be covered. The aim is to include every trade and occupation, in order that everything possible may be done to prevent injury to employees and economic loss to the Nation through industrial accidents.

Some of the subjects to be considered, according to the tentative plan, have many subdivisions. Plant arrangement, for example, calls for consideration of methods of routing material and product, the design of buildings, and the layout of a plant, exit and entrance gates to yards, railways and walkways, roadways, material piles, clearances and illumination. There is also the matter of fire hazards to be dealt with, and this will necessitate consideration of fire fighting equipment, water mains and hydrants, spacing between buildings, and material as related to occupancy of buildings.

A second safety code will deal with construction work, including demolition work, excavation and trenches, retaining walls, construction, frame, masonry, concrete and steel, scaffolds, ladders, stairways, and runways.

Perhaps the suggestions made for a study of elevator safety codes illustrate best for the general public the care that will be taken in the investigation and formulation of a code. Passenger and freight elevators will be studied, and among the appurtenances to which special attention will be given are shaftways and hatchways, shaftway equipment, cables, counterweights, guide rails and bumpers, landings, landing doors and gates, cars, machinery, safety devices, control and signals, and escalators.

Through this work on safety engineering, and through stimulation of State organizations to cooperate, the Working Conditions Service hopes to reduce industrial accidents to a minimum.

Codes already drawn up by States and

private institutions will be examined and compared, and the best features of all will be incorporated with the results of the original investigations undertaken by the service.

The Bureau of Standards will take the initiative in the comparison and formulation of the codes, and the Working Conditions Service will exert its influence in gaining the cooperation of other organizations and in securing the adoption of codes agreed upon. The closest cooperation will be maintained by the two bureaus.

Codes First Taken Up.

The following codes will be first taken up:

Plant arrangement, including routing of material and product, design of buildings and layout of plant; yard entrance and exit gates, roadways and walkways, railroad tracks, material piles, clearances and illuminations; fire hazards, including fire-fighting equipment, water mains and hydrants, spacing between buildings as related to occupancy, and arrangement of yard material as related to occupancy of buildings.

Building equipment, including stairs and exits, skylights, ladders, railings, and toeboards (fixed), platforms and scaffolds (fixed), illumination and window cleaning.

Fire prevention and protection.

Elevators, including shaftways and hatchways, shaftway equipment, cables, counterweights, guide rails and bumpers, landings, landing doors and gates, cars and car construction, machines, machinery and machine rooms, car and machine safety devices, control and signals, and escalators.

Cranes and derricks, including controllers and wiring, hoist mechanism and brakes, clearances, bridge, tower and gantry cranes, locomotive cranes and derricks, and hand power cranes.

Conveyors and conveying machinery.

Steam engines and turbines, including piping and valves, overspeed devices and governors, safety valves and guarding.

Hydraulic machinery, including piping and valves, overspeed devices and governors, safety valves and guarding.

Oil and gas engines, including piping and valves, overspeed devices and governors, safety valves and guarding.

Mechanical transmission of power, including shafting and bearing, shifters, shippers and belt fastenings, gears, clutches, and friction devices, control of power.

Head and eye protection, including protectors for chippers, riveters, caulkers, babbitting and similar operations, sealing, grinding and similar operations, dipping and brush coatings, sandblasting, oxyacetylene welding and furnace work, and electric arc welding and cutting.

Lumber and wood working machinery.

Textile machinery.

General chemicals, including acids, anilines and coal-tar derivatives, caustic alkalis, gases now not used for power production, oxidizing materials, phosphorus and matches and alcohols.

Explosives.

Rubber and composition goods.

ORDER CONCERNING REVENUE TO RAILWAY EXPRESS CARRIERS

The United States Railroad Administration, Division of Public Service and Accounting, issues the following:

P. S. & A. CIRCULAR No. 30-A.

WASHINGTON, D. C., January 4, 1919.

Under the provisions of P. S. & A. Circular No. 30 Federal Auditors were instructed to credit "Express revenue" with an amount representing an estimate of the express revenue earned during the month (which estimate was to be furnished by the American Railway Express Company), concurrently charging an account styled "Estimated express revenue." When the actual amount of revenue was determined by the express company it was required to advise Federal accounting officers the amount thereof and adjustments were to be made in the express revenue and estimated express revenue accounts, and the actual amount of revenue was to be charged to the account "W. G. McAdoo, Director General of Railroads."

Revenue Due Each Carrier.

In view of the difficulties experienced by the express company in ascertaining the actual express revenues due each carrier within a period of 60 days after the close of the month for which the revenues were stated, it has been concluded to discontinue the practice outlined above. In lieu thereof the American Railway Express Company will notify each Federal accounting officer monthly in a single advice of the express revenue accruing to his line, which amount he will credit to "Express revenue," and concurrently charge to the account styled "W. G. McAdoo, Director General of Railroads." The amount so reported will represent an estimate of the current month's revenue, increased or decreased by the amount of the adjustment for the latest month for which actual express revenues have been determined.

Estimated Express Revenue.

The amounts now carried in the account "Estimated express revenue" which were based upon advices from the American Railway Express Company should be closed to the account "W. G. McAdoo, Director General of Railroads." Any amounts carried in the estimated revenue account representing operations subsequent to June 30, 1918, and based upon estimates other than those of the American Railway Express Company shall be adjusted.

The adjustment of the estimated revenue account with respect to results of operation prior to July 1, 1918, will be made the subject of a separate advice.

War Department's Policy Relative To Discharges From Army Outlined In Letter of Gen. March to Mr. Mann

Representative Mann, of Illinois, has received the following letter from Gen. March, Chief of Staff, outlining the policy of the War Department with respect to discharges from the Army:

WAR DEPARTMENT,
OFFICE OF THE CHIEF OF STAFF,
Washington, January 23, 1919.

Hon. JAMES R. MANN,
House of Representatives.

DEAR SIR: I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 8th instant, addressed to The Adjutant General of the Army.

You inclosed therewith a telegram and letter addressed to you relative to discharges from the Army, with reference to which you say:

"The Department of Labor is incurring great expense in obtaining forces to secure employment for discharged soldiers, and meanwhile the War Department is refusing to discharge soldiers who have employment waiting for them, and also such employment as is very much to the interest of the public to have filled."

In order that it may be clearly understood why the War Department has refused to discharge certain soldiers who have employment waiting for them, it will be necessary to consider the War Department's demobilization policy as a whole.

The War Department studied the question of demobilization very carefully before adopting any policy. Two needs of the country were kept constantly in mind: First, the resumption as rapidly as possible of the normal industrial life of the country, and, second, replacement therein of individuals in the military forces and in occupations which ended upon cessation of hostilities. The War Department gave serious consideration to the plan of making the order of discharge depend on the availability of industrial positions to which the individual soldier might return as opposed to plan of disbanding complete organizations in the order of their availability for discharge.

The former plan was deemed impracticable. It would have involved the processes of appraising the case of each soldier as a separate unit, endeavoring to compare his individual rights to discharge with the rights of all others, and marshaling the priorities accordingly. Even if the likelihood of obtaining employment had been considered by classes, such as farmers, metal workers, municipal employees, etc., it would have been necessary to consider further the relative demand for each class in each separate section. The preliminary investigation necessary to an equitable determination of such a schedule, if practicable at all under present conditions in this country, would have delayed all demobilization beyond reason.

On the other hand, disbandment of complete military units could be and was immediately begun. In this way the military situation was safeguarded and at the same time demobilization was accelerated. If a cross section of industrial or agricultural class discharges had been at once cut across all military organizations, the integrity and efficiency of every unit would have been destroyed at the outset, to the confusion of orderly procedure and the retardation of the whole demobilization program.

The determined principle is that all of our soldiers whose services are no longer needed are entitled to discharge. The method adopted, it is believed, will accomplish that result with least delay, and without favor to those who might have influential friends to intercede for them or to take up their cases individually with the War Department.

The military situation and the actual mechanism of demobilization necessitate the retention in the service for the present of a considerable number of men trained or fitted to do the work required. It is doubtless difficult for these individuals to reconcile themselves to being held when their personal interests lie in their being discharged. But from this there is no escape. For them the emergency is not ended, although the stimulation and excitement of active warfare are over.

As a result of the unit demobilization scheme of the War Department, during the past six weeks upward of 800,000 men and approximately 30,000 officers have been dis-

charged from our temporary forces. This constitutes an average for the whole period, since demobilization got fairly under way, of over 20,000 a day for six days a week. Certain large units organized for oversea service were promptly demobilized en bloc, and during that process the daily discharges ran well over 30,000. In this connection, attention is invited to the discontent caused in England by the fact that the demobilization of the United States troops had proceeded so much more expeditiously than the demobilization of the British.

Such results would have been simply impossible had it been attempted to discharge immediately every soldier who made individual application on industrial grounds. There are hundreds of thousands of men now returned to their families, home communities, and industrial employment who might not have been released for months if the War Department had attempted to inaugurate a scheme of demobilization based largely upon individual requests for individual discharge. The absorption of these men into the general life of the country—their return to productive employment—has assisted in the permanent revitalization of industrial life and has expedited the return of the country to its normal peace-time conditions.

While the War Department realized the impracticability of discharging an army of between three and four million men under a scheme based primarily upon individual applications for discharge, yet the need of some elasticity in the scheme of demobilization was always recognized.

On November 21, 1918, War Department Circular No. 77 was issued, containing the following instructions:

"Department commanders within the United States, commanders of ports of embarkation, and commanders of camps not under the jurisdiction of department commanders or of chiefs of bureaus of the War Department are authorized to discharge enlisted men upon their own application when there is sickness or other distress in the soldier's family, or when he is needed to resume employment in an industry or occupation in which there is urgent need of his services, provided that such discharge will not disrupt or cripple an existing organization and that the soldier's services can be spared. Consideration will be given to the fact that the machinery of camps must be utilized in the demobilization of the Army, and due regard must be taken that it is not retarded by the discharge of personnel connected therewith.

The instructions contained herein apply only to individual and exceptional cases and are not intended to release men in large groups or blocks for any general employment or occupation."

Both soldiers and civilians, on learning of these instructions, seem to have assumed that a soldier had merely to submit a request for his discharge, stating that he had definite employment waiting for him and that he should immediately be discharged. This was clearly a mistaken interpretation. Only such soldiers as could show themselves to be within the terms of the order were entitled to be discharged. Favorable action could be taken on only those applications which disclosed cases of exceptional merit.

The War Department is convinced that the best interests of the country as a whole have been safeguarded and fairness and equal treatment to the individuals in the Army have been secured by its system of demobilization.

It is recognized that a certain amount of complaint and discontent is inevitable. The soldier who sees his neighbor leave while he is held is sometimes inclined to overlook the relative reasons therefor and declare himself a victim of negligence and incompetence. Criticism was to be expected because of the conflicting interests of hundreds of thousands of individuals, each naturally intent on his own case alone. The accomplishment of this enormous number of discharges is a task of technical complexity, requiring patience and broad vision.

The War Department is keenly interested not only in the formulation of general policies for demobilization but in following up the detailed operation of the machinery of discharge. While, as explained above, it was not at first to the best interest of efficient demobilization to attempt to discharge a comparatively small number of individuals on their pleas for individual discharges, the War Department was on the alert to modify its instructions when

changing conditions should justify modifications of policy. Now that most of the large units in this country, whose discharge en bloc had been ordered, have been discharged, the time is arriving when the War Department is able to emphasize the increased application of Circular 77 to individuals. It has now an adequate machine for discharging men, in which the personnel has acquired experience and expertness. It is therefore now able to issue instructions, the effect of which will be to release men to a larger extent than formerly on their individual applications for discharge in cases where definite employment awaits them and it is to the general interests of the country that they should be released. Accordingly the following instructions were published to the Army on January 4:

"Applications for immediate discharge under the provisions of Circular 77, War Department, 1918, will be acted upon as expeditiously as possible and the applicants will be informed of the action taken without unnecessary delay. Deserving cases should be investigated, and where the applicants have not correctly or fully stated their reasons for asking immediate discharge officers should render such assistance as may be necessary to correct them, so that applications may be properly presented and acted upon."

And on January 6 the commanding generals, Eighth to Twentieth Divisions, inclusive, were authorized to discharge enlisted personnel of their divisions eligible for discharge under provisions of Circular 77, War Department, 1918, up to 50 per cent of the strength thereof.

Demobilization is divided into two parts—the demobilization of men from camps in this country and the demobilization of men being sent back from overseas. Gen. Pershing has designated units to return from overseas service, and when these units return all men in the unit are promptly discharged. It would be most unfair discrimination to delay the discharge of any men arriving from overseas in those units while individual request of certain men in the unit for discharge is being considered. It is not practicable to cull out and send back from overseas individuals who desire their discharge on industrial grounds from various units overseas. If there exists a necessity for the unit to remain overseas, it should be maintained in a state of efficiency. If a unit is not needed to be kept up in a state of efficiency overseas, it should be sent home for discharge as promptly as transportation can be secured. To send back individuals from overseas on industrial grounds would effect such a levy from units existing overseas as would disrupt military administration, would honeycomb the units and reduce their efficiency to so low a state that they could not be relied upon to perform the services for which they are maintained overseas.

The War Department, however, recognized that there must be some elasticity and way of securing discharges in exceptional cases even for the units overseas, and the War Department has authorized Gen. Pershing to send to the United States for the purpose of immediate discharge individual drafted or enlisted men upon presentation of convincing testimony to the effect that there exists sickness or other distress in the soldier's family. Further, Gen. Pershing is authorized to discharge in Europe any officer or enlisted or drafted man who entered the service since April 1, 1917, and who submits good and sufficient reasons for requesting such discharge in Europe.

In this connection attention is respectfully invited to the fact that we have practically no troops to relieve the soldiers who are in the service for the emergency only in performing the necessary military duty at home and abroad. The Secretary of War has brought to the attention of Congress the importance of securing at once the legislation requested, authorizing the resumption of voluntary enlistments and reenlistments in the Army. As you know, it is now impossible to enlist men for the regular service, all definite period enlistments having been suspended by the act of May 18, 1918, and only emergency enlistments authorized. We find a number of men at all camps who would like to stay in the regular service if they could enlist at once, but the uncertainty of legislation is likely to induce them to look for employment in civil life, and, therefore, to take the first chance to secure discharges. A considerable force will for some time be necessary at ports of debarkation, supply depots, demobilization and convalescent centers, as well as to garrison posts along the Mexican border and in our insular possessions. The Navy and Marine Corps are now accepting enlistments. If it were possible to accept Regular Army enlistments at once, some of the men desiring im-

mediate discharge and now held on administrative or other duty could be released. This would help to alleviate discontent and restlessness manifesting itself among drafted men who at present have to be held for necessary military service in this country.

The statement has just been made on the floor of the House of Representatives that the orders for demobilization of the Army were not being carried out in good faith, and that officers failed to grant applications for discharge, because by reducing the force under them, they would lose their commissions, and that some of these officers wish to keep a large number of men in the service in order to make their jobs more important and more permanent. It is the purpose of the War Department to release all members of our temporary forces in this country except those whose services are essential to the administration of our demobilization and convalescent centers, ports of debarkation, supply depots, garrisoned posts, and stations along the Mexican border, and in our insular possessions.

The only question is how this demobilization can be done in the promptest, fairest, and most efficient manner. Where individual requests for discharges have not been granted in the past, such refusals have been based upon considerations of the greatest good for the greatest number. If facts supporting the charges of denying meritorious applications for reasons of personal advantage are submitted to the War Department prompt action will be taken against the offenders. The War Department is perfectly aware that in any operation of magnitude of our demobilization, there will be certain individuals who might have received a larger amount of special favor if some other plan had been adopted. It also recognizes that here and there a few cases of real injustice to individuals have occurred, and that individuals who apparently had exceptionally good reasons for immediate discharge were refused discharge by camp commanders. In a machine which has so many parts as there is in the Army there are unquestionably some commanding officers who lack judgment and energy and who have not discharged all individuals on individual request who should have been discharged. This source of discontent can and should be removed, and every effort is being made to that end. Information is welcomed in all cases, and concrete examples of failure to follow out War Department instructions and of abuse of authority to hold men whose services are necessary will be investigated and corrected.

It is believed that under the present instructions all applications for immediate individual discharge which possess merit will be approved, and that from now on the men in this country still remaining in units not yet ordered discharged by units will be discharged largely as individuals to enable them to resume employment where positions are waiting for them.

Just as an illustration of the injustice that may be done to others and the hardships and injury that may be worked to the service as a whole by premature discharge of individuals in the Army, the following extracts are quoted for your information from a letter from the camp supply officer at one of the demobilization centers with reference to the discharge of an enlisted man in the Quartermaster Corps for whom a great deal of pressure has been brought to bear and whose discharge was finally ordered upon a paper showing that seemed to warrant it. The camp supply officer stated:

"* * * You are advised that Sergt. _____ was discharged from the service on December 26, 1918.

"It has always been the policy of this office to obey orders promptly and cheerfully. However, in this case, after having obeyed in order, attention is invited to the fact that the issue of orders directing the discharge of a certain individual, without consulting the needs of the office to which the soldier has been assigned for duty, works a great hardship upon the office, as well as a seeming injustice to the other men who are retained in the service in order to carry on the work of demobilizing the Army.

"Numerous instructions have been issued by the Adjutant General of the Army and the commanding general of the camp to use every effort to discharge as many men as possible in order to expedite the demobilization of the Army. This office has built up an organization in the Finance Division whereby it can handle from 1,000 to 2,000 men per day, but in order to maintain this organization it is necessary that all the men now on duty be held until such time as the demobilization has progressed sufficient to warrant the discharge of some of the office force.

"The commanding general has informed this office that he has no soldiers available for transfer to this office who are qualified to do clerical work, and that in cases where discharge is recommended it must be understood that such men will not be replaced by the transfer from other organizations.

"The case of Sergt. _____ has no valid claim for discharge. As far as this office can ascertain, his only reason is that he does not care to serve longer. He is a well-to-do planter, without any dependents, and is in good health. His discharge will have a serious effect on the morale of the office, as undoubtedly all the men who have more valid claim for discharge will feel that an injustice has been done them, which sentiment it is believed is fully justified under the circumstances. Practically every enlisted man under the direction of the camp supply officer desires to be discharged at the earliest possible date, but most of them are sufficiently patriotic to serve during the present emergency and while the Army is being demobilized, and in many cases this means a great financial loss, as well as loss of business opportunities.

"Sergt. _____ was in charge of requisitions, and after he was discharged a new man had to be placed on his desk, without giving this office a moment's notice to teach the new man the duties he was to assume. During the past month numerous telephone calls as well as personal calls have been received from the governor of this State with the view to obtaining the discharge of certain favored men. Similarly, telegrams have been received from Washington, sent by Senators from this State."

I have written at this length because I wish to make it clear that demobilization is not proceeding haphazardly, but in accordance with a very definite and considered policy, and the War Department feels certain that as time passes and the matter is more thoroughly understood and the facts become completely known the country will become convinced that the demobilization was conducted in an efficient and well-planned manner.
