



## NEW FORM OF BUNKER LICENSE ISSUED BY WAR TRADE BOARD

**More Simple Than Those Superseded, Being a Combined Application and License.**

The War Trade Board announces, in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 563) that it has adopted a new and very much simplified form for use in connection with the issuance of bunker licenses. The new form is a combined application and license (No. B-1 c), and supersedes Bunker Forms B-1 a and B-1 b.

### Operation of New Form.

When Bunker Form B-1 c has been completely filled out and signed by the applicant and approved and countersigned by the agent of the Bureau of Transportation or collector of customs, as the case may be, it will constitute a bunker license for all bunker fuel and ship's stores aboard the vessel and those desired to be taken on at the port where the application is submitted, as well as at any subsequent port in the United States or its possessions at which the vessel calls on the voyage for which license is issued, it no longer being necessary to obtain supplementary license at subsequent American ports when additional fuel or stores are desired.

### Present Bunker Forms.

A complete list of bunker forms at present in use follows: Bunker Form B-1 c, Bunker Form B-3, Bunker Form B-4, Bunker Form B-5 a or B-5 b, Bunker Form B-7.

Bunker Forms B-1 c, B-3, and B-7 are required on all vessels. Bunker Forms B-4, B-5 a, and B-5 b are not required of certain classes of vessels.

For further information, those interested should confer with agents of the Bureau of Transportation, War Trade Board, or collectors of customs at ports where there are no agents.

## NEW RAILROAD SCRIP BOOK.

**Convenience for Travelers Will Contain Coupons Worth \$90.**

The United States Railroad Administration issues the following:

On February 10 the Railroad Administration will place on sale a large denomination scrip book containing \$90 worth of coupons at a total cost including war tax of \$97.20. The books will be good over all railroads under Federal control and will be accepted for passage on trains and for payment of baggage charges, the contract conditions being the same as the \$30 and \$15 books on sale for a number of months past. The books will not afford a discount from normal fares, but will be a convenience to those who have occa-

## U. S. PORK AND PORK PRODUCTS TO BE SUPPLIED SWITZERLAND

A supply of pork and pork products from this country for the people of the Swiss Confederation has been definitely arranged for.

Supplementing its announcement of the allotment of sugar, breadstuffs, and feed stuffs for which export licenses to Swiss destinations will be granted, the War Trade Board announces that 40,000 tons of pork and pork products are to be included in this list. This allotment is for the year ending September 30, 1919.

Arrangements for the determination of this allotment were completed by representatives of the Governments of France and Great Britain and the War Trade Board and the Swiss Confederation.

## KEEP WAR SAVINGS STAMPS, POST OFFICE PLEA TO OWNERS

**National Treasury Still Needs the Money, Mr. Dockery Tells Postmasters.**

POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT,

To all postmasters:

Regulations of the Postmaster General and instructions of this office heretofore issued have clearly defined your duties in respect to the sale of war-savings certificate stamps and the procedure necessary for their payment. They are not transferable, but the original owners of these stamps, when properly affixed to a war-savings certificate, are entitled to payment after 10 days' notice in writing, unregistered war-savings certificates at any money-order post office and registered war-savings certificates only at the office of registration.

Many owners of stamps are presenting them for payment, seemingly on the assumption that the Government no longer needs the money received for them. While it is true the war is practically at an end, it is equally true that a large part of the expenditures of the war must still be met by the sale of war-savings stamps and Liberty loan bonds. The sudden termination of the war left the Gov-

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sion to travel constantly, obviating delay incident to purchase of single-trip tickets at ticket offices.

On account of the limited demand for such a large book, sales will be confined to the larger cities having consolidated ticket offices and union stations, but on application ticket agents in the smaller cities will obtain books for purchasers.

## GEN. PERSHING AUTHORIZED TO PROMOTE LINE OFFICERS GIVING THEM RANK EQUAL TO COMMANDS EXERCISED

**SAME RULE FOR ARMY  
IN THE UNITED STATES**

*Promotions Not Intended Merely as Reward for Past Services, Secretary Baker's Order Says—Reserve Commissions at Recommended Grade—Policy Stated in Memorandum to Chief of Staff.*

The Secretary of War authorizes the publication of the following statement in regard to promotions in the Army:

WAR DEPARTMENT,  
Washington, January 25, 1919.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE CHIEF OF STAFF.

1. Please cable Gen. Pershing that he is authorized to make such promotions among officers of the line, up to and including the grade of colonel, as will give the officers who in his judgment deserve it, rank equal to the command exercised by them. Under this authority, Gen. Pershing will make those promotions which are appropriate in an organized army, to fill vacancies existing or arising. Surplus officers in the various grades will be returned to the United States.

### Not Intended as Reward.

It is not intended hereby to authorize promotions merely as a reward for past service, the policy of the department being that recommendations for such promotions should be carefully noted, in order that reserve commissions at the recommended grade may be issued on discharge, in accordance with the policy previously announced.

The authority here granted will authorize Gen. Pershing to fill vacancies in organizations by promotion rather than by transfer, where in his judgment that course is wise.

Gen. Pershing is also authorized to make such promotions in the medical, chaplain, and other corps of the Army, as are within the tables of organizations and are necessary to confer rank commensurate, with authority exercised or work to be done under such tables.

2. With regard to the Army in the United States, the same policy will be

observed; promotions will be made where necessary to give men rank appropriate to the command exercised by them, and in the staff corps of the Army where appropriate to the work remaining to be done by such corps.

3. I especially desire it to be understood by Gen. Pershing as to the American Expeditionary Force, and by the personnel officers with regard to the Army in the United States, that this relaxation of the rule with regard to promotion does not invite a departure from the principle hitherto established that promotion can not be made merely as a reward for past service, however meritorious. The rule is relaxed only to permit the Army which remains undemobilized to be treated as a living organization, with such promotions as would be normal in times of peace to fill vacancies existing or as they may arise.

## FILMS USED INSTEAD OF PLATES FOR ARMY X-RAY PHOTOGRAPHS

The War Department authorizes the following from the office of the Surgeon General:

The use of films instead of plates for taking the X-ray photographs which have done so much to assist military surgery, has developed on a large scale during the war.

### Easier to Handle.

In the prewar use of the X-ray, where probability of breakage was small and weight of shipments was not considered an important factor, plates were used almost exclusively. But when it became necessary to ship X-ray supplies to France, and carry on the X-ray photography under field conditions, the lighter weight, decreased cargo space, ease of handling, and freedom of breakage made films the favorite. Its use, together with the automobile X-ray units, made it possible to X-ray a wound soon after it was received.

### Ordered Use in Hospitals.

The signing of the armistice left the medical supply depot with large quantities of these films coming in on contracts previously placed. The Surgeon General has, therefore, directed that Army hospitals in this country adopt the film instead of the X-ray plate, as has already been done overseas.

## ITALIAN IMPORT RESTRICTIONS PLACED ON LEATHER AND SHOES

The War Trade Board announces in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 564) that it has been requested by the high commissioner for Italy to inform the American exporting public of the following restrictions which have been imposed upon the importation of leather and shoes into Italy:

1. Imports of leather of any kind and shoes from any foreign country and for account of private concerns have been prohibited.
2. The above restrictions are consequently extended also to the placing of any private contract abroad for the purchase of the above commodities.
3. No authorization will be given for the transportation of leather or shoes from countries of origin.

## HOME LOAN BANKS ARE PLANNED SIMILAR TO FARM LOAN BANKS

The United States Department of Labor, Division of Public Works and Construction Development, authorizes the following:

More than half a million new dwelling houses now are needed in the United States. Two billion dollars, available for loans to home builders, would go far in providing the necessary capital for the building of these dwellings. Securities of a value approximating \$2,000,000 are held by the constituent organizations in the United States League of Building and Loan Associations.

### Loan Association Conference.

Labor conditions, manufacturing and social needs clearly indicate the desirability of an immediate acceleration of building activities throughout the country. By making available capital necessary to building, people are provided homes, industry a market, and labor employment. In the hope of finding a way to be helpful in furthering this trinity of benefits, the Division of Public Works and Construction Development of the Department of Labor recently invited to Washington the officials and representatives of the country's building and loan associations. A series of conferences on ways and means to render negotiable the associations' assets, resulted in a tentative plan which may materialize in a national system of "home loan banks." The tentative plan contemplates the creation of a bank in each Federal reserve district, similar to the land banks created under the Federal farm loan act, with which a local building and loan association could deposit collateral, receiving in exchange home loan bonds. The precedent of the land bank law of New York State has been followed.

### The Department's Interest.

The Department of Labor's interest is in the possibility of accelerating building and construction work throughout the country so labor conditions during the present period of transition may not become distressing. Building is a basic industry and accelerated activities in this field will be reflected in all correlated industries. The benefits from a building program are distributed over a vast industrial and social area.

The Division of Public Works and Construction Development of the Department of Labor has organized to render encouragement and assistance to such interests as will now undertake construction work.

The division's information on market, labor, and finance conditions is available and, where it is possible for them to be helpful, the division's field men are available for such survey work as may be essential to forming sound conclusions as to the desirability of proposed improvements or buildings.

### The Home Loan Bank Plan.

In its efforts to be helpful in all building projects called to its attention, the division interested itself in the building and loan associations' representations that more than two billion dollars in assets could be released for building activities if a way is devised to render these assets negotiable during the reconstruction period. ## RAILROAD ADMINISTRATION CALL FOR SERVICES OF ACCOUNTANTS

The United States Railroad Administration, Division of Public Service and Accounting, issues the following:

PUBLIC SERVICE AND ACCOUNTING CIRCULAR No. 65.

WASHINGTON, D. C.,

Under date of July 10, 1918, I requested the chief accounting officers of class 1 carriers to submit the names of any male employees under their jurisdiction that could be spared and were qualified to clearly interpret and apply the provisions of General Order No. 17. Owing to the lack of progress that had at that time been made in separating the accounts of Federal auditors were unable to satisfactorily comply with the provisions of that circular.

As the separation of accounts should now be completed and the accounting forces of the various lines have since been increased, I am renewing my request that Federal auditors promptly advise me of the names, positions occupied, and salaries of employees that they believe can profitably aid in our accounting work, whether in the field, or at headquarters in Washington, D. C. Please give this matter your earnest consideration and submit at the earliest possible date the names of such employees that in your judgment are well qualified in general, disbursement or freight accounting.

In order that conclusion with respect to the extension of credit for the payment of freight charges may be promptly reached, the following arrangement will immediately become effective at points where more than one railroad is involved:

Application for 48-hour credit under bond may be made to agent of any carrier. The agent will secure the approval or disapproval of the agent of each other carrier named in the application, and submit the papers to the Federal treasurer of his line. The Federal treasurer shall grant the credit or decline to do so in accordance with general instructions and the exercise of his best judgment. He may ask for the advice of the Federal treasurers of other carriers, but must himself assume responsibility for the final decision, which will be binding upon all interested lines.

## FRENCH ORDER LIFTS EMBARGO ON CERTAIN GOODS FOR EXPORT

Consul General Thackara, at Paris, cables under date of January 23, 1919, as follows:

A ministerial notice to exporters, published January 12, removes the prohibition against the exportation of the following articles when the destination is an allied or neutral country other than Switzerland:

Carbon brushes for dynamos, bicycles and parts thereof, floss silk, cocoon silk, and silk noils, combed or uncombed; felt hats in any stage of manufacture, hair, copper, compasses, linen articles, preserved goose liver, mushrooms and truffles; cylinders, disks, and rolls for gramophones and phonographs; silk waste, spirits and liqueurs, cotton haberdashery, silk thread of all kinds for sewing, embroidery, etc.; flower seeds, aluminum articles; india rubber articles except capes, tires or outer tubes, drain tubes, and gloves for surgery; celluloid articles; art works and ornaments of copper, bronze, or imitations thereof; prepared skins not made into garments, photographic paper or plates, artificial stones cut or uncut, copper gauze for paper making, basket and cane work, and saffron.

For the following articles the prohibition against exportation has been removed as regards all allied and neutral countries: Brushes of all kinds, fancy leather goods, shrubs and other nursery products.

## VROOMAN RESIGNS AS ASSISTANT SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE

Carl Vrooman, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture, who accompanied the Agricultural Commission sent by the department to Europe, has tendered his resignation, which has been accepted by the President. Mr. Vrooman has not been in very good health for some time and desired to be relieved of his duties, so that he might remain abroad until he has fully recovered.

Before the entrance of the United States into the war there was only one Assistant Secretary of Agriculture. The food production act of August 10, 1917, authorized the appointment of two additional assistant secretaries during the emergency. It is probable that provision will be made in the regular appropriation bill for 1920, which is now under consideration by the Congress, for not more than two assistant secretaries. As the department now has two assistant secretaries and as the emergency has passed, the existing vacancy will not be filled.

## AMERICAN SCHOONER STRANDED.

The *Andrew Nebinger*, an American schooner hailing from Boston, is stranded at Point Porto Rico, in Banas Bay, on the Cuban coast. The vessel, in charge of Eugene Menu as master, was bound light from Banas to Mobile. She lies in a foot of water in a place difficult to reach because of a reef. A tug is waiting near by and the crew is still aboard. Efforts so far to float the schooner have failed, but Consul Clum, at Santiago, reports she may be saved.

# OFFICIAL COMMUNIQUE ON PEACE CONFERENCE

The following official communique was issued at Paris on January 28:

The President of the United States, the prime ministers and foreign ministers of the United States, the British Empire, France, and Italy, and the representatives of Japan held two meetings to-day, the first from 11 until 12.30 and the second from 4 to 6.30.

An exchange of views took place on the German colonies in the Far East and the Pacific and on those in Africa.

The representatives of the Domin-

ions were present at these two sessions; the representatives of China at that in the morning, and the Marquis Salvago at that in the afternoon.

In the morning the delegates of Australia, New Zealand, Japan, and China were heard.

In the afternoon Mr. Henri Simon, French minister of the colonies, explained the views of his department on colonial questions.

In addition, the fundamental principles of the league of nations and their application were considered.

The next meeting will take place to-morrow at 11 o'clock.

ernment involved in expenses that might in part have been avoided if it had been known when the war was to end, but, of course, it was not possible to anticipate this event. The financial obligations of the war must therefore continue for many, many months, and the National Treasury needs the money received from the sale of war-savings stamps to aid in meeting them. The expenses of demobilizing the Army and Navy, the return of our boys from France, the care of our sick and wounded soldiers, and other liabilities incident to the war, all call for a continuance of the same patriotic effort that the owners of war-savings stamps made during the tragic struggle.

Nevertheless the original owners of war-savings certificates with stamps affixed must be paid if payment is demanded, but I urgently request every postmaster to appeal to them courteously to refrain from demanding payment unless their financial condition absolutely requires it. 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## PRICE CONDITIONS FOR EXPORT OF PORK TO CERTAIN COUNTRIES

The War Trade Board announces, in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 566), supplementing W. T. B. R. 473, issued January 3, 1919, announcing the list of commodities for the exportation of which to Denmark, Norway, Sweden, and European Holland licenses will be issued freely, that, at the request of the United States Food Administration, it will hereafter be a condition of the issuance of licenses to export pork and pork products to the above-named countries that the application for export license must have attached thereto, before being filed with the War Trade Board, a certificate from the United States Food Administration to the effect that the commodity described in such application has been sold for export at a price approved by said Food Administration.

## Order on the Award of Distinguished-Service Medal to General March

WAR DEPARTMENT,  
Washington, January 2, 1919.

### GENERAL ORDERS, No. 4:

By direction of the President, under the provisions of the act of Congress approved July 9, 1918 (Bul. 43, W. D., 1918), the distinguished-service medal was awarded December 13, 1918, to Gen. Peyton C. March, the United States Army, for exceptionally meritorious and conspicuous service as follows:

Gen. March (then major general, U. S. Army), as commanding general of the Army Artillery of the first army from October 4, 1917, to January 31, 1918, initiated and prepared the plans for the organization of the artillery of the American Army in France; as Acting Chief of Staff of the United States Army from March 2, 1918, to May 20, 1918, and as Chief of Staff of the United States Army (general, U. S. Army) after May 20, 1918, he performed with intelligence, zeal, and patriotic devotion duties of inestimable value in the development, the direction, and the carrying into effect of the military program of the United States.

Effective with the closing of the accounts for the month of January, 1919, Federal auditors shall monthly prepare and forward to the undersigned a statement on letter-sized sheets showing the amount of back pay applicable to prior months' expenses included in operating expenses for the month for which the report is made.

In reporting such back pay there shall be shown the name of the month, or months, in which the amount was properly included and the amount applicable to each such month.

Class I roads shall forward these reports not later than the 26th of the month following that for which the report is made, other lines under Federal control shall submit their reports not later than the last day of such month.

## PROCEEDINGS OF THE CONGRESS BRIEFLY TOLD

## SENATE.

Changed only in a few minor respects from the form in which it passed the House, the Senate yesterday afternoon passed and sent to conference the bill to validate informal contracts of the War Department. Consideration of the post-office appropriation bill then was resumed. The action of the committee in providing general increases in salaries was agreed to although the Senate bill makes these increases available only for the fiscal year while the House made them permanent. The more important amendments reported by the committee, appropriating \$200,000,000 for the construction of roads, etc., were temporarily passed over. The President pro tempore, Senator Saulsbury, of Delaware, affixed his signature to the \$100,000,000 European food relief bill. Legislative action on the bill increasing the salaries of Federal judges was completed with the adoption of the conference report. This bill increases the pay of Federal district judges to \$7,500 and of circuit judges, to \$8,500 a year. The Commerce Committee made a favorable report on a bill amending the act creating the Shipping Board and defining its powers, by removing certain restrictions and giving the board authority to build steel ships for foreign account without special permits.

In a brief speech, Senator Borah, of Idaho, opposed plans reported from Paris for the internationalization of the former German colonies. Senator Pollock, of South Carolina, addressed the Senate in a prepared speech answering those persons who have criticized the President recently.

Many committee investigations and hearings on pending legislation were continued yesterday afternoon. Before the Interstate Commerce Committee, Charles E. Elmquist, of Minnesota, urged prompt legislation for the protection of the public in the matter of railroad legislation before this session adjourns. Laurence B. Finn, chairman of the Kentucky State railroad commission, opposed private ownership of the carriers, but urged withdrawal of the power now lodged in the Executive to initiate rates. Before the Buildings Committee investigating the Chicago Speedway Hospital site, Edward Hines, of Chicago, testified that in October last he personally reported to Secretary Baker and other officials the charge that Milton T. Trainer, a civilian employee of the War Department, had attempted to obtain a commission of \$100,000. A subcommittee of the Committee on Foreign Relations reported to the full committee favorable to the recognition of the Government of President Tinoco, of Costa Rica. The report will be referred to the State Department.

Secretary of Labor Wilson discussed the labor situation at length before a joint session of the Senate and House Committees on Labor. He expressed the belief there was considerable "hysteria" in the country over reconstruction, but insisted that all these problems would be worked out successfully. He urged immediate enactment of legislation to provide "buffer" employment so as to prevent the "philosophy of force" from

even getting a foothold in the United States during the period of reconstruction. Louis F. Swift, of the Chicago packing concern, during his testimony before the Senate committee yesterday afternoon formally waived any claim to immunity from prosecution which might be acquired through his testimony in the hearings now being conducted on legislation intended to regulate the meat-packing industry.

## HOUSE.

Debate continued throughout the day on the Agricultural appropriation bill. Members of the Immigration Committee opposed to the conclusions reached with respect to the immigration bill recently reported announced yesterday they would submit a minority report. Representatives Siegel, of New York, and Sabbath, of Chicago, are preparing the report for those who dissent from the committee's action to approve.

Admiral Mayo, before the Naval Committee, urged legislation in support of the building plan of the department and advocated prompt expansion of the Navy. He said that no matter what the peace conference does there never was a time when it was so necessary for the United States to be thoroughly prepared. Commander Pye recommended a superdestroyer larger and more heavily armed than those now building, which could keep up fast speed in heavy seas. Admiral Mayo said the battle cruisers should be nothing short of being fast battleships. Before the military committee, Secretary Baker and Assistant Secretary Crowell, recommended abandonment of 14 of the 16 National Guard camps and purchase by the Government of the sites of all National Army cantonments. The Interstate Commerce Committee which has been investigating conditions in the meat packing industry and the pending bill for Federal regulation of that industry, agreed yesterday tentatively to demand from the Federal Trade Commission that it submit the names of the witnesses upon whose statements the charges of collusion among the packers was based.

### Tea Samples by Mail To the United Kingdom

Notice has been received that packages of bona fide trade samples of tea not exceeding 8 ounces in weight may now be admitted through the regular mails into the United Kingdom (England, Ireland, Scotland, and Wales), provided the packages conform to the conditions for samples of merchandise, and that each package is marked as containing tea. Each package over 2 ounces in weight will be subject in the United Kingdom to a charge of 3 pence customs duty.

Packages of samples of tea not marked as containing tea are liable to forfeiture.

## State Department as a Promoter of U. S. Foreign Trade Discussed in Analytical Review by Breckinridge Long

Third Assistant Secretary of State Breckinridge Long in an address at the luncheon of the American Manufacturers' Association, at New York City, said of "foreign trade and the relation of the State Department to it":

I welcome the opportunity because the Department of State has a very definite policy, based upon its conception of its duties and responsibilities toward the commercial relations of the United States abroad, and I am very glad to present them for the consideration of such influential organizations as yours.

### Department's Sincere Desire.

The Department of State has a very sincere and wholesome desire to encourage and stimulate our foreign trade, and in pursuance of its policy it applies every legitimate means to accomplish its object. Foreign trade is a very desirable thing from several points of view. Not only does it increase the general wealth of the country and provide employment to a great number of people, but it acts as a stabilizer to the business of the country in time of trouble. A firm which has a foreign business is not entirely dependent upon home markets, and when there come periods of depression at home, when interest is high, money scarce, and confidence subnormal, when people are not investing and are not spending their money as freely as they do at other times, it still has a nucleus upon which to work, a trade in which it looks to banks of other countries for payment, for which it looks to credits in other lands. It provides the firm with an opportunity to continue its manufacture of goods for foreign delivery and to keep its machinery running, and makes it possible for it to continue in its employ the many people who are dependent upon it and upon the factory for support.

### Welcomes Opportunity.

So the department has a very deep and sincere interest in foreign trade, in upbuilding it and stimulating it, and it sincerely welcomes the opportunity to come into personal contact with the gentlemen who are interested in it, with their organizations, and with the officers and executive heads of those organizations.

There are four elements which enter into, which underlie, and which make possible a foreign trade of any sort: First, there must be goods to sell; second, there must be markets in which to dispose of them; third, there must be ships in which to carry them; and fourth, there must be banks to carry out the transactions and to return to the manufacturer the money which his goods has brought.

Taking these four in order, I will touch upon each lightly.

As to the manufacture of the goods, you will readily understand the Department of State has little or no function in that field except in so far as it can, in a general way, by its policy and by encouraging the manufacturers and the business interests of the country, stimulate them to production for foreign markets.

With the other elements which go to make up a condition which will permit them a foreign trade, the department has a considerable active interest. We can not create markets abroad, but we can discover new markets and can develop those which already exist. And we can use the large organization of the consular service, and the good will, the weight and the influence of the American Government, for the amount of foreign trade and its healthy condition is not to be dissociated from the political weight and influence which a government has, and which is exercised through that department which attends to its foreign affairs.

Foreign trade has a political significance, and when all is said and done, that is a great significance, because without political relations with States, you can not have trade or any other intercourse with the peoples of other lands. To have intercourse, one must have means of communication. Communication is followed by knowledge, knowledge by friendship, and friendship by trade.

Out of it all comes trade, but it is all dependent upon communication. No matter what kind of communication a people may have with another people, whether it be by personal contact, by the wireless, by the mails, or by cable, there must be communication as a precursor of trade. Consequently, our foreign trade and our political relations with foreign governments go hand in hand, and are interdependent.

### Economic and Industrial Advantages.

Besides its economic and industrial advantages, foreign trade performs a very great service to the people and to the Government of the United States in cementing and making more firm the political relations which this Government has with each of the other Governments of the world, except those few with which we are still at war. You are dependent upon the Government, acting through the Department of State, to make possible conditions in foreign countries which will permit of markets there, and to so establish relations with foreign Governments as to make trade possible. The Government is reciprocally partly dependent upon you to continue and to increase the friendly relations once they are established. The value of communication is well exemplified by some of the knowledge that has come to us out of this great conflict, the last chapters of which we are now writing.

### War a Great Educator.

The war has been a great educator, and the knowledge which it has brought to us has been made possible by the volume and facility of our communications. A year ago, or little more, Estonia, Lithuania, Bessarabia, and the Ukraine were words which meant nothing to us. They were names with which the ethnologist was wont to conjure, and which were dealt in by the scientists who traced the origin and consanguinity of races or the history and development of languages. To-day they are household words, along with many others.

They now have a significance which is not entirely scientific or geographic in its nature. We know something of their peoples, of their customs, of their history, of their modes and manner of living; something of their needs, not only of a political nature, but of an economic and industrial character. Their affairs have been cast as upon a screen and we have visualized them through our communications.

### World Grown Smaller.

The world to-day has grown smaller than it was. It has been knit together by countless strands of copper wire, by wakes of thousands of ships which, under the impelling influence of steam and electricity have reduced the time of voyages between distant ports. Time has been annihilated and space reduced to a degree which would have seemed incredible a hundred years ago. To-day we sit at our breakfast table and read what has happened in Paris, London, Tokyo, or Buenos Aires. The everyday life of these peoples unfolds before our eyes. The far distant corners of the world are brought into close contact with us, and from the midst of any of the seven seas we can hold communication and exchange thoughts with persons on the bosom of the trackless deep.

All this is significant and has a direct bearing upon our foreign trade. It means that it will increase both in extent and volume; that it will spread to a yet unknown field and to places yet untouched by American products. It is the province of the Department of State to encourage and stimulate these activities in whatever fields they may be found.

### Third Element in Development.

The third element in the development of foreign trade is that there be the physical means whereby we may transport and deliver at foreign ports goods manufactured in America. Stimulated by a wholesome desire, which may be expressed in the words I have just used, this administration, has created an agency which has most successfully built and operated a large and growing merchant marine which will fly the flag of America and which will carry it into every clime and into every port. When these ships drop anchor in foreign waters they come directly under the supervision of the agents of the Department of State. Their crews are the wards, their masters the cooperators, their cargoes the objects of careful attention of our consular agents. Clearance papers, invoices, and bills of sale, and manifests are among those things the agents and servants of America abroad are charged to administer, so that even with ships, with those arteries of trade, the Department of State has close and intimate contact.

The fourth element of a healthy foreign trade is banking facilities. To successfully attend to an extensive foreign trade there must be international banking establishments. Branch houses of American banks abroad have been few and far between. When an American firm has made a sale it has usually turned in its draft and bill of lading to its home

bank, which has sent it to its foreign correspondent in London, or in Rio de Janeiro, or in Calcutta, and the foreign correspondent has attended to the matters of collecting the money and remitting it to the United States.

## Ships the Arteries of Trade.

Ships are the arteries of foreign trade and banks are its nerve fibers. Realizing this fact, the Department of State is disposed to encourage the establishment abroad of branch banks which are American, which are moved by the same impulses as are the firms for which the banking is done, which coordinate with the businesses of America, and which pay allegiance to the same flag.

The United States has always had a very large foreign trade. Not so many years ago its exports were chiefly raw materials and semimanufactured goods. Of late years, and particularly since the outbreak of the war, our export of finished products has enormously increased. That is a good thing for us because, obviously, it is more profitable to the country to export a bolt of sheeting than the same weight of raw cotton, or a ton of machine tools than a ton of steel billets. While we still are, and always shall be, large exporters of raw materials, we must look after foreign markets for our finished products.

## Need for American Capital.

There is tremendous need for American capital in the war-torn countries. Investment opportunities abound now and will increase in number. We not only need to but we ought to invest our surplus cash abroad and we should not lose sight of the fact that the supplying of capital is frequently accompanied by the supplying of material as well. We need our own banks to take care of this business for us.

The United States is facing a financial problem of the first magnitude. The world owes us a great deal of money. Are we going to take it in cash or in goods? If we take it in goods, are we going to take cash or more goods in exchange for current exports? Some kind of an adjustment must be found.

We can not choke ourselves either with gold or with goods. We need our banks abroad to help us maintain a financial equilibrium. We may want to leave a great deal of our money abroad and find investments for it. Our financial experts ought to be on the ground.

Merely the pay and expenses of the American foreign service will furnish an exchange business of several millions of dollars yearly to American banks abroad. Their presence would be of the utmost benefit to American consuls. It is easy to imagine how much it would help the work of an American consular officer to be able to consult a bank of his own nationality and to discuss with it, much more freely and frankly than he does with foreigners, the multifarious problems connected with trade extension, the correct interpretation of which is so important to American interests. The Government can not do much more than express its views on this subject. Any action taken must originate with the banking community. I think it would be helpful if organizations such as your

own would take the matter under consideration and give it the benefit of your support.

## Fundamental Principle is Barter.

The fundamental principle of international commerce is barter. If our exports increase, our imports will do the same. Since 1915 we have had a terrific trade balance every year in our favor, the peak having been reached in 1917, when our total foreign trade amounted to \$8,900,000,000, 70 per cent of which we exported and 30 per cent of which we imported. In 1914 we exported 55 per cent of our total foreign trade and imported 45 per cent, and that more nearly approximates a normal condition. We can not expect to maintain the high trade balances which have been in our favor during the past four years, but we can and we should protect our industrial development by securing foreign outlets for a substantial percentage of it. We might very well be able to buy all the foreign products we need with our agricultural products and our raw materials, but our industry would then be limited by the consuming power of our own country and at the mercy of business conditions at home.

## Industry Can Not Stand Still.

Industry in the United States can not stand still. It must either expand or contract, and its influence upon the life of the entire country is so powerful that we must secure for it a normal rate of development and, to that end, provide it with the indispensable room for expansion which only foreign trade can furnish.

I have now dwelt more or less extensively upon the general subject of foreign trade and the elements which make it possible, and I would now like to say a few words about the Department of State and the organization which it maintains, in order that you may become a little better acquainted with it and may understand something of it. I think I may truthfully say to the business men of the country that the Department of State has taken steps to represent as truthfully and as adequately the business interests of America abroad as it does the political interests. The organization of the State Department has in the past been designed to secure and to give due weight to economic considerations, and even during the war increased its facilities in this respect.

## The Consular Service.

The chief agency of the Department of State in the extension of American trade abroad is the Consular Service. At the present time there are maintained about 265 consulates and some 150 consular agencies, including several thousand persons in the establishment. Prior to the war there were about 300 consulates, but all those in enemy countries have, of course, been closed. In due time most of them will be reopened.

That means that you, collectively and individually, have 415 agencies scattered over the surface of the earth who will furnish you from time to time with information concerning trade conditions in their respective districts, and to whom you may write for any detailed facts of which you are in need.

The promotion of American trade interests is one of the most important func-

tions of a consul. He is called upon by the Department of State to submit special reports on industrial and commercial conditions in his district; American business houses write to him for detailed information; he sends in voluntary reports on subjects of trade interest; he maintains a catalogue file which is accessible to the public and in which every exporter in the United States may be represented if he chooses. In the past the American business man has not always taken advantage of his opportunities to establish an export trade. He has taken only a spasmodic interest in foreign markets, turning toward them, perhaps, when trade was dull at home and when it revived at home he would cut off supplies to export clients who may have learned to depend upon him. During the last four years American manufacturers and merchants who never before gave a thought to overseas markets have made their acquaintance.

The task of expanding our foreign trade will be made much less difficult by the widespread interest that the business public in America now takes in it. Five years ago international trade was running in well-defined channels. The war broke out and those channels promptly silted up. Old trade connections were severed and new ones opened up. The war brought an abnormal condition of affairs. The Central Powers were cut off from a great many of their markets; the allies were so busy at home that they were obliged to neglect many of theirs. Neutral countries were enabled to enter many markets they never before had traded in.

## Changes After the War.

Now that the war is over, still another change confronts the world. International trade will not continue in war channels, nor will it revert to its former ones. It can not. There will be new political boundaries. Old routes of transportation will be cut by new frontiers. Commercial sympathies have undergone a tremendous alteration. The capacity for production and consumption of many countries has changed. In short, a reconstruction period will set in and none of us can forecast its development.

It will be the task of the American consular service to observe that development and to make continual reports of its progress. There will be no difficulty about the sale of our raw materials abroad. We need to give ourselves no concern on that score.

But to insure markets for our finished products we must so organize our export trade that our exporters will know how to make it easy for foreigners to buy in the United States. Our consular officers must help us by telling us what the markets of their district need and what their idiosyncracies are.

That is a very broad statement. When the Department of State sends a consul abroad it wants him to study his district until he knows it as well as he knows the palm of his hands; until he knows what it grows and what it makes, where it sells and where it buys; until he knows every railroad junction and every canal.

## Reports of Consuls Analyzed.

The reports of the consuls abroad are forwarded to the State Department

where another great division of the department sits, called the foreign trade adviser's office. The foreign trade adviser has a corps of experts who carefully read and analyze these reports. They distribute them, after they are digested, to various other departments of the Government which may be interested in them, or to organizations, or sometimes to the individual manufacturer who may be particularly interested in the subjects with which they deal.

There is, in particular, in this department, a subdivision known as the Division of Economic Intelligence, which at its head has a corps of scientists, who, from a technical point of view, go into all the details and ramifications of raw products, of tariffs, of foreign exchange or foreign banking, and all the infinite variety of things that have to do with the foreign trade, and which, together with political questions, make up our very matter-of-fact, modern-day diplomacy.

### Economic Intelligence Section.

During the past summer there was established in the foreign trade adviser's office a new economic intelligence section which is equipped to deal with the broad economic and commercial questions which are more and more frequently arising. To supply these economists with the data which they need, the library of the foreign trade adviser's office is to be made an economic and commercial library of the first magnitude; an elaborate clipping and indexing service has been established; and practically all of the monographic and statistical work produced by other agencies in Washington is kept on file for the service of the specialists.

The department has made arrangement with every other Government Department which produces economic material or handles economic questions by which we are kept in touch regularly with the work that they are doing and the material that they are producing and collecting.

The Department of State through the Foreign Trade Adviser's office keeps in touch with commercial associations and other unofficial trade agencies throughout the United States.

### Acts as "General Staff."

The economic intelligence section constitutes, in short, an economic general staff for the Government. It is formed upon the theory that the department, which speaks and acts for the nation in all foreign matters, must be equipped with an intelligence service comparable to the general staff of the Army. It is not, of course, a trade promotion agency in the narrow sense. Its aim is to insure that, before the Department of State formulates a policy or initiates a course of action, every consideration involving American foreign trade shall have been presented in the most effective and scientific manner. The office is, therefore, a constant protection to the commercial interests of the country. It is the economic balance wheel within the Department of State.

It keeps itself informed regarding the policies and programs of other Government agencies, such as the Department of Commerce, the Federal Trade Commission, the Tariff Commission, the Shipping

Board, and the War Trade Board; and, in the light of the foreign situation, of which, naturally, the Department of State knows more than any other department, it is constantly urging upon these Government bodies a revision of their policies or a modification of their programs, when those policies and programs are likely to injure in foreign countries American trade or American commercial prestige.

### Department's Dual Responsibilities.

In other words, that department of your Government, which is vested with the management and control of foreign affairs, both political and economic, realizes the responsibilities resting upon its organization are greater than ever before in the history of the Nation, and I would not do it full justice if I did not recount that it is making every effort to insure that its service will be equal to the strain.

Our international interests to-day are greater than they ever have been before. We have had our eyes opened to a variety of fields; we have thought internationally, and have looked overseas. We have been living in stirring times, through days that have meant much to the future history of the world—to its peace, its prosperity; through times which must necessarily, and I think which have, made an impression upon us.

### Future of the Nation.

I think that out of these experiences there must be some lasting effect. I wonder whether this Nation will again become a Nation with the restricted point of view and with the essentially national interests which it had before the war, or whether it will continue its international point of view and will view the world as a world. I wonder whether the individual, after this chapter we are now writing has been closed, will turn his eyes, as he did before, to the restricted conditions and to his personal activities, or whether he will not retain something that he has got from the impressions and emotions which have coursed through his breast and brain.

### Likened to An Aviator.

I liken it sometimes to an aviator. He rises from the ground and soars up into the bright, pure, and sunny atmosphere of the world. He leaves behind him things that he thought were big and important because he was close to them, and as he ascends he sees them gradually assume their true and proper proportions in the general scheme of the landscape. As he mounts height upon height, his vision broadens; his horizon extends. He leaves behind him the petty and the mean, the bloodshed and the strife and turmoil. He leaves behind him the small and vain ambitions of men. He leaves behind him the individual. He sees mountains and fields, forests and rivers and lakes, cities and towns lying beneath him, and each as a part of the grand phenomena of nature. He moves freely in a pure atmosphere, sees things he has never seen before, and sees familiar objects from a new point of view. His imagination is instigated to greater flights; his mind and soul are awakened. He is inspired! He sees the world as a world—not as a spot, or a place, or a location from which other

things and places are judged. He returns and resumes his place among men. He again becomes the individual; he again becomes a part of the great machine; but I wonder if he will not retain something of those emotions he had on high.

### Has Seen the World.

I wonder if the purposes that are nobler, and the ideals that are higher, inspired by that lofty vision, will not, at least something of them, remain to make him remember that he has been on high. I wonder if he will not remember that he has seen the world. I wonder whether we will not retain some of the impressions that we had, for we have all looked overseas.

We have thought internationally; we have been in an international atmosphere, and I wonder whether when it is over if there will not remain to us, individually and nationally, something of those emotions which we have had. I wonder if we will forget that we have seen the world.

## SALE OF WAR SUPPLIES OVERSEA AUTHORIZED BY DEPARTMENT

Instructions Are Sent United  
States Commanding Generals  
by Order of Secretary

WAR DEPARTMENT,  
Washington, December 15, 1918.

BULLETIN No. 62.

1. The commanding generals of the American Expeditionary Forces are authorized to sell any war supplies, material, or equipment embraced within the provisions of the act of July 9, 1918, relating to "Sale of war supplies," to any person, partnership, association, corporation, or any other department of the Government or to any foreign State or Government which has been at any time since April 6, 1917, engaged in war against any Government with which the United States has been at any time during the same period at war. Unless otherwise authorized by the commanding general of such expeditionary force, such sales shall be for cash at auction or to the highest bidder on sealed proposals, on due public notice, and in such market as the public interest may require. Such supplies as are intended for sale to any other department of the Government or to any foreign State or Government shall, unless otherwise authorized by the commanding general of such expeditionary force, be sold at not less than the invoice price, including cost of inspection and transportation. This authority does not apply to buildings, railways, or other immovable property or equipment connected therewith. A detailed report shall be made monthly of the sales of war supplies, material, or equipment during the preceding month, showing the character of the articles sold, to whom sold, the price received therefor, and the purpose for which sold. A similar report shall be made as soon as practicable of all sales of such nature heretofore made by an American expeditionary force. Sales of guns and ammunition shall be limited to sales to such foreign States or Governments.

2. The proceeds of such sales shall be deposited to the credit of that appropriation out of which was paid the cost to the Government of the property thus sold, and the same shall immediately become available for the purposes named in the original appropriation.
