ORDERS TO COMPLETE PAY OF SOLDIERS IN ARREARS ARRIVING AT CAMPS WITH A "CONVALESCENT CENTER"

INSTRUCTIONS ALSO SENT ARMY HOSPITALS

Detachment Commanders and Disbursing Officers Required to See That Enlisted Men Are Promptly Paid—Reports to Be Made by Wire Direct to Director of Finance, War Department, Washington.

The War Department authorizes the following statement:

Under order of the Secretary of War, instructions have been sent to all camps and cantonment commanders, with the exception of Camps Mills, Merritt, and Stuart, as follows:

"Enlisted men arriving at a camp and attached to a convalescent center will be taken up on the rolls of that detachment and steps taken immediately by the detachment commander to complete payment of all men in arrears of full pay. Casuals in this and other casual organizations will continue on the rolls of their organizations when sick in base or camp hospitals, and detachment commanders and disbursing officers will be required to see that they are paid promptly.

Supplementary Pay Rolls.

"Supplementary pay rolls will be used freely, consistent with proper functioning of personnel and finance offices, to insure payment of all men in arrears of pay who have been omitted from or not paid on the regular pay roll or who arrived at camp after the first of the month. It is urgent that every man in your camp—casuals, patients, and members of regular organizations—be paid promptly all pay in arrears. Before being transferred to another camp all men will be paid in full, when possible, to include the last preceding month.

"Effective February 1, 1919, reports will be made by wire direct to the director of finance, War Department, Washington, D. C., on February 15 and on the 15th of each month thereafter, showing the date on which payment of all organizations was completed, together with the number of individual en-

Army Post Exchanges Are Forbidden to Sell Unauthorized Insignia

The War Department authorizes publication of the following:

Under direction of the Secretary of War an order has been issued as follows:

1. "It has been brought to the attention of the War Department that post exchanges and similar places are selling unauthorized insignia such as service ribbons and gold and silver stars to be worn on the uniform."

2. "Responsible officers will take immediate steps to have such practice discontinued by post exchanges and stores under their immediate jurisdiction. At the same time every effort will be made to influence stores located near posts, camps, or cantonments, to discontinue the practice."

BRITAIN TO PERMIT LIMITED U. S. BOOT AND SHOE IMPORTS

Consul General Skinner, at London, has cabled the State Department that the British Government has decided, as a temporary expedient, to permit importers of American boots and shoes to import one-quarter of the quantities which they respectively obtained in the year 1913.

FUEL ADMINISTRATION GAS REGULATIONS STILL IN FORCE

Owing to an apparent misapprehension in some quarters to the effect that the suspension of certain fuel regulations effective February 1 applied to commodities other than coal and coke, a statement was issued by the United States Fuel Administration to-day calling attention to the fact that natural gas regulations were not canceled by that order.

LOOMS AND SPINDLES TO RUN,

Consul General Robert P. Skinner, at London, cables under date of February 4: Cotton Control Board yesterday withdrew all restrictions on the running of looms and spindles and all manufacturers are at liberty to run machinery as desired. Orders fixing maximum prices of raw cotton remain in force.

TRADE WITH FINLAND MAY BE RESUMED UNDER REGULATION SAYS THE WAR TRADE BOARD

OUTLINE OF PROCEDURE IS GIVEN

List of Commodities Which Do Not Require Import Certificates From Inter-Allied Trade Committee if Applications Are in Order.

The War Trade Board announces, in a new ruling (W. T. B. R. 590), supplementing W. T. B. R. 577, issued February 5, 1919, that arrangements have now been made whereby both export shipments to and import shipments from Finland may be resumed.

All shipments for export to the above-mentioned country must be covered by an import certificate issued by the interallied trade committee, at Helsingfors, except shipments of the commodities listed below.

The procedure for the exportation of commodities to Finland is, in all cases, as follows:

Procedure for Exportation.

1. Exporters should apply for licenses to the Bureau of Exports, Washington, D. C., or any branch office thereof, using application form X or X-A.

2. Exporters in the United States, before filing applications for export licenses, must receive advice from the prospective importer in Finland that there has been issued by the Inter-Allied Trade Committee, at Helsingfors, a certificate stating their approval of the proposed consignment. The number of this certificate should be forwarded by the importer in Finland to the American exporter, who should specify such number on the application for export license.

The details of all import certificates issued in Finland will be transmitted by the American representative on the Inter-Allied Trade Committee to the War Trade Board, Washington, D. C., where the same will be used to verify the applications that are presented for consideration.

Imports from Finland to the United States will be subject to the same rules and regulations which govern the importation of commodities from other countries in Europe.

APPORTIONMENT OF DELEGATES TO GERMAN NATIONAL ASSEMBLY

Advices to the State Department quote the German newspaper announcements of elections as officially given by the Commissioner of Elections, stating the apportionment in the German National Assembly as 163 Democrats, 88 Centrists, 75 German Democratic Party, 92 German National People's Party, 22 Independent Socialists, 21 German People's Party, 4 Bavarian Peasant League, 4 Guelphs, 1 Brunswick Peasant Party, and 1 Schleswig-Holstein Peasant Party.

The reports of the results of the elections to the Bavarian Assembly, including the Palatinate, read 66 Bavarian People's Party, 62 Social Democrats, 25 German Democratic Party, 15 Peasant League, 9 Conservatives, 3 Independent Socialists.

The final returns of the election to the Prussian Diet, including the district of Posen, are given as 144 Social Democrats, 88 Centrists, 65 German Democrats, 50 Conservatives, 24 Independent Socialists, 23 German People's Party, 6 Guelphs, and 1 Schleswig-Holstein Peasant Party.

JOINS FEDERAL RESERVE SYSTEM.

CLEMENCY FOR ARMY PRISONERS CONVICTED BY COURTS-MARTIAL

The Secretary of War to-day made the following statement:

The cessation of hostilities and the return of conditions approximating those of peace render it just and proper that clemency be exercised toward prisoners convicted by general courts-martial for offenses committed since the beginning of the present war. With this end in view, a board consisting of officers of experience in civil as well as military life has been constituted in the Judge Advocate's office to examine the records of these prisoners and enable the Judge Advocate General to recommend to the Secretary of War reduction of sentences as the facts and dictates of justice in each case may warrant. The commandants of the barracks have been instructed to forward promptly to the Judge Advocate General their recommendations as to each prisoner.

Such action will effect a speedy revision of sentences to meet the changed conditions, and will unquestionably result in a substantial reduction of the sentence in nearly all cases save those of the gravest character or where aggravated circumstances exist.

listed men who were in camp on the last day of the preceding month, who on the date of such report (the 15th of the month) have not been paid in full to include the last day of such month, giving general reasons for nonpayment. If payment of organizations is not completed on the 15th of the month this report will be made when such payments are completed. These instructions supersede all prior instructions regarding reports as to prompt payment of troops at camps."

Instruction to Hospital Officers.

Instructions have also been sent commanding officers of all general hospitals as follows:

"Effective February 1, 1919, report will be made by wire direct to the director of finance, War Department, Washington, D. C., on the 1st and 15th of each month showing the number of enlisted patients who had not received pay in full at date of preceding report and have not since that time received pay in full; or in case all such men have been paid, wire report will so state. Also report by letter direct to the director of finance, on the 1st and 15th of each month, showing the name of each enlisted patient transferred since preceding report who at date of transfer out of hospital has not been paid in full to include last calendar month, and showing also the place to which transferred, with reasons for nonpayment. Every reasonable effort will be made to see that men are so paid in full before being transferred. These instructions supersede all prior instructions regarding reports as to prompt payment of enlisted patients in general hospitals."

20,000,000 BUSHEL OF WHEAT SAVED BY THRASHING ECONOMY

The final report of the thrashing division of the United States Food Administration, just submitted by Capt. Kenneth D. Hequembourg, who has had charge of the work, shows that 17 States estimate a saving by reason of the activities of this division of more than 20,000,000 bushels of wheat. In other words, in these 17 States more than 20,000,000 bushels of wheat that would under former methods of thrashing have been lost were made available for consumption from last year's harvests.

Organization of the Division.

The thrashing division of the United States Food Administration Grain Corporation was organized under Capt. Hequembourg's direction last spring to bring about more careful methods by thrashermen and to secure the cooperation of all agencies that could assist in this work. The loss of wheat through hurried and careless operation and inefficiency of thrashing machines under old-time methods was estimated at about 3.25 per cent of the entire crop.

Capt. Hequembourg in his report tells of the organization of the work as follows:

"The Federal food administrators in 32 States, with the cooperation of the Agricultural Department's Extension Service and the State Council of National Defense, were invited to appoint grain thrashing committees in important wheat-producing counties.

Membership Over 75,000.

"Over 1,000 counties were accordingly organized, circulars distributed directing the character of the service and the manner of approach; meetings were held in practically all counties and thrashermen invited to membership in the Food Administration. Over 75,000 certificates of membership were issued, and both farmers and thrashers entered heartily into this plan of conservation.

"It was recommended that machinery be thoroughly overhauled, shock rows raked, thrashing-machine adjustment and clean up more carefully executed, and tight-bottom bundle wagons used in hauling the grain to the machine. Priority in fuel for thrashers' engines, the Department of Labor's cooperation in the distribution of expert operators and the American Railway Express service in the prompt delivery of repair parts and supplies were invited and secured. Forty-five manufacturers of thrashing machinery offered to cooperate, resulting in their national association's resolution of April 6, which brought forth gratis to any thrasher the repair and machinery adjustment service of their mechanical experts to augment the corps of 30 practical thrasher's assistants, which was assembled during May and instructed by the grain thrashing division at Indianapolis. This service functioned through the State food administrator and county thrashing committees to the thrashermen."

Summary of Savings.

In his summary of savings accomplished, Capt. Hequembourg says:

OFFICIAL COMMUNIQUE ON PEACE CONFERENCE

The following official communiques have been made public at Paris:

"February 8.—The fifth meeting of the commission on the league of nations met at 8.30 last evening at the Hotel Crillon. The commission continued with its discussion of the articles of the draft.

"Substantial agreement was reached by the commission on the chief points discussed during the evening. The commission was of the opinion, however, that certain clauses of the draft should be referred to a subcommittee of four for clarification.

"In order that the greatest possible progress might be made with the draft it was decided to resume the sessions of the commission at 10.30 this morning."

"February 8.—Morning communique.

"At 10.30 this morning at the Hotel Crillon the commission on the league of nations held a meeting marked by the same accord of view

operations than ever before. Seventeen States estimate a saving by reason of these activities of over 20,000,000 bushels of wheat. Where shock rows were raked and thrashed, an average of three-fourths of a bushel per acre was realized. Tight bottom bundle wagons saved from 2 to 3 bushels per team per day. Efficiency blanket machine operating tests indicated that 75 per cent of the machines visited created a machine waste in the straw pile of less than three-fourths of 1 per cent, and that the thrashing of the remaining 25 per cent created a wastage of about 2½ per cent. In all instances where this excessive waste was detected, our thrashermen's assistants were able to assist in the adjustment and regulation of the machine, bringing the waste within the one-fourth of 1 per cent average, thus actually demonstrating a saving of 1½ per cent of the machine's output on 25 per cent of the machines visited in the blanket-test campaign."

The Blanket Test.

The "blanket test" which Capt. Hequembourg mentions was a device by which farmers could determine the efficiency of the thrashing machine they hired. The test was made by directing the straw blower against a blanket, sheet, or canvas during the time the weighing device tripped five times, recorded 2½ bushels. If over 1 pint of wheat were winnowed from the straw on the canvas, bad work was indicated. One and one-half pints indicates a loss of 1 per cent. If over 3 pints were found—which means a 2 per cent loss—reasonable time was given to correct the bad operation and a second test was made. If improvement were not secured, the farmer was advised to take steps through the county thrashing committee to discontinue operations until the avoidable waste was corrected.

that has characterized its previous sessions.

"At the end of this meeting the committee finds itself nearing the end of its task. A few matters referred to a drafting committee for clarification still require reference back to the commission and certain points provisionally accepted may be reopened for discussion before the committee makes its report to the conference.

"M. Ricci Bnsati was named to represent the Italian delegation on the secretariate.

"The committee will meet again at the Hotel Crillon at 10.30 on Monday morning.

"On Sunday afternoon the drafting committee above referred to, consisting of Hymans, Bourgeois, Lord Robert Cecil, and M. Venizelos, will meet in Lord Robert Cecil's rooms at the Hotel Majestic in order to prepare a report for the next meeting of the committee."

"February 8.—The supreme war council met this afternoon from 3 till 5 o'clock at the Quai d'Orsay.

"The discussion of the terms of the renewal of the armistice was continued.

"The following resolution, proposed by President Wilson, was approved: 'First, under present conditions many questions not primarily of military character, which are arising daily and which are bound to become of increasing importance as time passes, should be dealt with on behalf of the United States and the allies by civilian representatives of those Governments experienced in such questions as finance, food, blockade control, shipping, and raw materials.

"Second, to accomplish this, there shall be constituted at Paris a supreme economic council to deal with such matters for the period of the armistice. The council shall absorb or replace all such other existing interallied bodies, and their powers, as it may determine from time to time. The economic council shall consist of not more than five representatives of each interested Government.

"Third, there shall be added to the present international permanent armistice committee two civilian representatives of each Government, who shall consult with the allied high command, but who may report direct to the supreme economic council.'

"The next meeting will take place on Monday at 3 p. m."

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RED CROSS RELIEF ACTIVITIES IN THE REGION OF ARCHANGEL

The American Red Cross issues the following cablegram, dated Archangel, January 31:

American fighting men on the various fronts in this part of the world are regularly receiving comforts and supplemental supplies through the medium of the American Red Cross, which has established a continuous sled service between its base at this point and the places where the troops are stationed. Ice breakers are keeping the harbor open so that any additional supplies that may be needed will have no difficulty in reaching this port.

Work of the Hospital.

The American Red Cross hospital, equipped in the most complete manner, is doing splendid work, the American Army medical authorities and the Red Cross workers cooperating in its management to the fullest extent.

Word has just been received from a delegation of Red Cross workers in charge of Maj. C. T. Williams, of Baltimore, head of the Red Cross commission to Archangel, which left here two weeks ago to relieve the distress in the villages bordering on the White Sea. They traveled the 350 miles from Archangel to Kem by sled, the rest of the journey to Murmansk being made by rail.

The pack train of 10 sleds carried medicine, milk, food, and other supplies to the natives of this isolated part of the district, many of whom have been without proper nourishment for two years. Maj. Williams has sent back word that some of the cases encountered were too pathetic to describe. The gratitude of the people was overwhelming.

ADVISES HIGH FOOD PRODUCTION WHEN LOCAL FACTORS WARRANT

Terribly devastated or disorganized conditions in much of Europe and the long time that will elapse before normal conditions can be restored must be taken into consideration by the farmers of the United States in arriving at a basis of sound agricultural practice, says the United States Department of Agriculture in a circular, Crops and Live Stock Production in 1919, just issued from the office of the Secretary.

Conditions Not Fully Realized.

The world does not yet realize, it is stated, how stricken are the European countries and how long it will take them to recover to such an extent that they can make their former material contributions to the world's stock.

The European belligerents, exclusive of Turkey and the Balkan States, are estimated to have lost more than 7,000,000 men killed and more than 14,000,000 wounded, many of them permanently incapacitated, and a burden of great numbers of widows and orphans has been imposed. The destruction of property has been enormous. Industry has been disrupted. Over all of central Europe there has been a tremendous social upheaval that will entail years of struggle before orderly processes are permanently restored. The war debt of all the belligerents will range from \$175,000,000,000 to \$200,000,000,000, a per capita debt running from \$700 in Great Britain to \$200 in Italy.

America's Position Stronger.

In comparison with this, it is pointed out, the United States has issued from the war untouched and unhampered and with its relative industrial, financial, and social position stronger than it was five years ago. In view of those things the Department of Agriculture believes there is no need for alarm as to the ability of the United States to hold its due place in the trade of the world and especially as to the ability of agriculture to maintain its position.

Farm Crop Acreage in United States.

The acreage of farm crops that will be planted in 1919 is problematical. The Department of Agriculture believes that, beyond doubt, the spirit of patriotism and general war conditions were responsible for the large acreage in 1918. The fact that the stability of prices for farm products will be more or less in doubt will influence the planting program for 1919, it is thought.

It is pointed out, however, that the population of the United States has increased during the war, that European markets are opening up for American products, that a considerable demand from Europe for foodstuffs will continue for a year or more, and that, in view of these facts, American farms should maintain as high production as local economic conditions and sound individual farm practice will permit.

Under stress of war-time conditions, it is said, much grass land was devoted to grain which should now be restored as pasture or meadow to the end that more live stock may be kept, the supply of humus in the soil restored, and general fertility increased.

CANADIAN TRADE COMMISSION IS ESTABLISHED AT OTTAWA

The following communication has been received by the State Department from the secretary of the Canadian War Mission with reference to the establishment at Ottawa by the Canadian Government of a Canadian trade commission for the purpose of facilitating trade relations:

"We desire to call your attention to the fact that the Canadian Government has established a Canadian Trade Commission at Ottawa for the purpose of facilitating trade relations with other countries. The chairman of this commission, Sir Charles B. Gordon, will continue to act as chairman of the British War Mission, as he has done for the past two years, and will in consequence spend part of his time at the office of the British War Mission at Washington, D. C. The business of the commission at Ottawa will in the meantime be carried on by Messrs. C. B. McNaught and H. W. Thomson.

"The Canadian Trade Commission will be in close touch with the Canadian Mission in London, under Mr. Lloyd Harris, and will be very pleased to lend its assistance in any negotiations which may be carried on by Governments or citizens of other countries in regard to the purchase of goods in Canada."

farms to the condition in which they were prior to the strain of war, but the department urges other practices which, if more generally adopted, would improve the agriculture of the country over prewar conditions. Among these are guarding against preventable plant diseases by seed treatment for cereals and potatoes and spraying for potatoes and fruits; the harvesting of fruits and vegetables before exposure to frost; the exercise of care in handling to avoid bruising; sorting to remove diseased and injured specimens before decay can spread; storage under conditions that will prevent the development of storage rots; continued organized efforts for the prevention and control of such animal diseases as hog cholera, tuberculosis, contagious abortion, dourine and tick fever; and the eradication of predatory animals and rodents.

The continued active assistance of the Department of Agriculture in solving these problems is pledged.

\$5,000,000 CREDIT TO ROUMANIA.

A credit of \$5,000,000 has been established in favor of Roumania, making a total of \$10,000,000 for Roumania and a total of \$8,678,157,836 for all the allies.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES BRIEFLY TOLD

SENATE.

The vote cast on the suffrage constitutional amendment Monday was within one of the required two-thirds. Advocates of the amendment announced that no further efforts would be made to pass the resolution this session but that the struggle to obtain favorable action in the next Congress would begin at once. The vote on the resolution was cast as follows:

The deficiency bill which provides for a reduction of \$15,000,000,000 in direct appropriations and contract authorizations for military supplies was passed by the Senate and now goes to conference. The bill also provided for \$295,000,000 of deficiencies almost entirely for the Army and Navy. Consideration of the conference report on the war revenue bill began this morning with no indications of any protracted discussion. Senator New, of Indiana, introduced a resolution designed to extend the time for filing income taxes as provided by the war revenue act from March 15 until April 15. Senator Gore introduced a joint resolution requiring the Secretary of Agriculture to conduct an annual investigation of the production cost of live stock, wheat, cotton, corn, and other staple and food products and report annually thereon. Senator Townsend, of Michigan, stating that he was informed the agents of the Department of Justice were operating in Michigan, presumably in connection with the Ford-Newberry senatorial contest, introduced a resolution calling upon the department for information.

Nominations sent to the Senate yesterday afternoon were as follows: John W. Troy, of Juneau, to be collector of customs at Juneau, Alaska; Malcolm A. A resolution was introduced by Senator Smoot, of Utah, to rename the

Panama Canal the "Roosevelt Canal." Senator Borah gave notice of his purpose to move to set aside the rules so as to make germane his amendment to the rivers and harbors appropriation bill granting \$50,000,000 for the resumption of work on reclamation projects in Western States that were suspended during the war.

Before the Agricultural Committee Levy Mayer, counsel for Armour & Co., stated that regulation of the meat packing industry by a commission appointed by the President, representative of the producers, packers, and consumers, would be agreeable to the five big packers. The Commerce Committee adopted a resolution calling upon various Government departments having information upon the subject to supply information relative to the present supply of fuel oil and especially the effect of Mexican restrictions upon the output of oil in that country.

HOUSE.

During consideration of the naval appropriation bill yesterday afternoon Minority Leader Mann made a point of order against the provision for a new three-year building program on the

ground that as no appropriation was carried it was not in order. This point was sustained. An appeal was immediately made to the Committee on Rules to bring in a special rule making the provision reported from the committee in order. The Rules Committee this morning agreed to this special rule by a party vote, and it was submitted to the House and discussion began upon it soon after convening. During the discussion yesterday afternoon Majority Leader Kitchin announced that as soon as the war revenue bill is signed by the President he will introduce a separate resolution to repeal the so-called luxury taxes on articles of wearing apparel.

In a communication to Chairman Kitchin, of the Ways and Means Committee, Secretary Glass asked for immediate legislation authorizing the floating of the Victory Liberty Loan this spring. The bill for the support of the military establishment was reported by the Military Committee. It carries a total of \$1,117,289,400, and provides for a temporary establishment of 27,579 officers and 509,900 enlisted men. In many of its essential particulars the bill differs from that endorsed by the Secretary and officials of the War Department.

Conditions of New Victory Bond Issue Discussed in Letter by Secretary Glass Outlining Draft of Desired Legislation

The Secretary of the Treasury authorizes the following:

WASHINGTON, D. C.,
February 10, 1919.

Dear Mr. KITCHIN:

Now that the revenue bill has passed the House I desire, in accordance with the intimation contained in my letter of January 15 to you and my talk with you and Mr. Fordney, to ask the attention of the Ways and Means Committee to the necessity of the immediate enactment of legislation amending the Liberty Bond acts so as to make possible the funding by a Victory Liberty loan in the spring of the floating debt which has been incurred and will be incurred up to that time. The Victory Liberty loan could not be issued successfully, now that hostilities have ceased, within the limitations imposed by the existing laws.

Terms of the Bonds.

After most careful consideration of the matter and after receiving and considering the views of bankers, Liberty loan workers, and others whose views are most entitled to consideration, very reluctantly I am constrained to say that I can not wisely determine now in February the terms of the bonds or other obligations which it would be wise to offer for subscription in April, when the Liberty loan campaign should probably begin. At the moment we are in a period of readjustment. To the slackening of industrial and commercial activity incident to the termination of active warfare has been added the usual dullness of the winter season. The necessary and desirable contraction of our credit structure has begun and will be greatly facilitated by the enactment of appropriate legislation to permit the liquidation of claims arising under informal army contracts. Steps have been taken to break the deadlock which had arisen growing out of the maintenance, nominally, at least, of war prices in certain basic industries.

Prices of Foodstuffs.

Upon the enactment of appropriate legislation to enable the Food Administration to protect the guaranties given by the United States, I am hopeful that it will prove possible to restore the operation of the law of supply and demand with respect to foodstuffs with, as I believe, a consequent reduction in the cost of living. A period of rising prices and of intense industrial activity such as we have experienced during the past four years is always a period of great apparent prosperity, and a period of falling prices and of the contraction of credits is always a period of depression. The retardation of the process of readjustment by artificial means can only increase the evils inherent in the situation. Buying will not begin and activity will not set in until the community at large is satisfied that prices have reached bedrock. I am very hopeful that measures now under discussion may result in the rapid acceleration of the readjustment and I am firmly convinced that if

that be done, America has before her a new period of great and growing prosperity. I am even sanguine enough to believe that it is within the range of the possible that so much may have been accomplished on the lines above indicated before the expiration of two months from now that the whole whole situation will have been changed and that we may look forward to the successful issue of the Victory Liberty loan on terms which today would seem quite impossible.

Technique of Bond Selling.

Furthermore, merely as a matter of the technique of bond selling, it would be a fatal mistake to fix the terms of the loan so long in advance of the offering. The issue would become stale and its attractions would have been discounted long before the loan campaign begins. It will be remembered that the second Liberty bond act was approved as late as September 24, and the bonds were offered on October 1, 1917; that the third Liberty bond act was approved April 4 and the bonds offered on April 6, 1918; and that the supplement to the fourth Liberty bond act was approved September 24 and the bonds offered on September 28, 1918.

Greater Latitude Desired.

Therefore, and in view of the early expiration of the life of the present Congress and the apparent impossibility of convening and organizing the new Congress in time to enact further bond legislation before the Victory Liberty loan campaign begins, I reluctantly ask greater latitude in the exercise of a sound discretion as to the terms of the Victory Liberty loan than has been conferred by the Congress in respect to previous loans. I should be only too glad to have the Congress share with me the responsibility of this extraordinarily difficult determination, but, believing that it would be a grave mistake to reach a final determination at this time, I must ask authority to deal with the matter as the situation may develop.

Draft of Bill Submitted.

Holding these views, I have ventured to have prepared, and I submit to you herewith, a draft of a bill to amend the Liberty bond acts and for other purposes. This bill would (1) increase the authorized issue of bonds from \$20,000,000,000 to \$25,000,000,000; (2) remove the limitation as to interest rate so far as regards bonds maturing not more than 10 years from the date of issue; (3) authorize the issue of not to exceed \$10,000,000,000 of interest-bearing, non-circulating notes having maturities from one to five years; (4) authorize the issue of bonds and notes payable at a premium; (5) exempt war-savings certificates from income surtaxes; (6) confer authority upon the Secretary of the Treasury to determine the exemptions from taxation in respect to future issues of bonds and notes and to enlarge the exemptions of existing Liberty bonds in the hands of subscribers for new bonds

AMERICANS IN FRENCH ARMY MAY APPLY FOR DISCHARGES

Note from Minister of War at
Paris Cabled to the War
Department.

A cablegram dispatch to the War Department says:

"Relative to the discharge of foreigners, including Americans, enlisted in the French Army for the duration of the war, the following note has been received from the Minister of War:

"Foreigners who enlisted voluntarily for the duration of the war and who request discharge are now authorized to apply for their immediate return to their homes. The head of the corps or department under whose orders they are, will take immediate action on these requests. The soldiers will be ordered to the Army depot in the district in which they desire to reside, and their discharges will be given them by the commandant of each such depot. Those who wish to go abroad will be directed to the depot they may choose."

Transports Change Course; Will Arrive at New York

and notes; (7) exempt from income surtaxes and profits taxes all issues of Liberty bonds and bonds of the War Finance Corporation held abroad; (8) extend the period for conversion of 4 per cent Liberty bonds on the lines suggested in my letter of January 15 to you; (9) create a 2½ per cent cumulative sinking fund for the retirement of the war debt; (10) continue the existing authority for the purchase of obligations of foreign Governments after the termination of the war in accordance with the views expressed by Secretary McAdoo by letter and in his testimony before the Ways and Means Committee; and (11) extend the authority of the War Finance Corporation so as to permit it to make loans in aid of our commerce, thus supplementing the aid which may be given by the Treasury on direct loans to foreign Governments and in a measure relieving the Treasury of demands for such loans.

I am sure that your committee will wish to discuss all of these matters fully with me and I shall not burden you at this time with a fuller statement of my views concerning them.

Epidemic of Typhus At Belgrade, Serbia

A Belgrade (Serbia) dispatch to the State Department states that typhus has broken out in the Serbian capital, especially among the Czech prisoners of war collected there preparatory to repatriation, and among the Serbian soldiers arriving from the south. The United States Sanitary Corps, under Capt. Stewart, assisted by a British sanitary officer, are aiding the Serbian Government in checking the spread of the epidemic.

25 Hostages Imprisoned At Ufa, Russia, Released

The Department of State has been advised by Vice Consul Palmer at Novonico-laevsk, Russia, that he has been officially informed that the 21 hostages imprisoned at Ufa by the Committee of the Constituent Assembly on November 29 last, have subsequently been released by the same committee.

SUPERCARGO POSITIONS FILLED.

The United States Shipping Board announced yesterday (Monday) that the positions of supercargoes have all been filled, and within the last month 8,100 applications have been received.

Lieut. J. Frew Hall, Director of Education, Personnel Division of the Division of Operations, said that the supercargo school was filled for months in advance and that no more applications will be considered for some time.

The Shipping Board has been successful in obtaining men of sea experience and unusual commercial training, who are now being trained to act as supercargoes, according to Lieut. Hall.

NATIONAL BANK RESOURCES PASS \$20,000,000,000 MARK FOR FIRST TIME IN HISTORY

The Comptroller of the Currency authorizes the following:

For the first time in their history the resources of our national banks at the last call, December 31, 1918, passed the twenty-billion dollar mark and amounted to \$20,042,224,000. This is an increase of \$20,820,000 over the preceding call of November 1, 1918, and an advance as compared with December 31, 1917, of \$1,968,916,000.

These extraordinary figures tell us that the total resources of the national banks of the United States have more than doubled since January 7, 1911, when they amounted to only \$9,820,483,000, the increase in eight years having been \$10,221,741,000.

Comparative Statement.

The following figures give a comparison between the statements of November 1, 1918, and December 31, 1918:

Deposits aggregated \$15,423,081,000, an increase of \$371,608,000 over the greatest deposits ever previously reached. Of the increase in deposits, \$101,356,000 was represented by time deposits; the remainder of the increase was in amount due to banks and bankers. Demand deposits showed a slight reduction.

Loans and discounts December 31, 1918, amounted to \$9,918,294,000, a reduction as compared with November 1, 1918, of \$178,646,000. The percentage of loans and discounts to deposits November 1, 1918, was 67.08 per cent, and on December 31, 1918, these had been reduced to 64.31 per cent.

Bills payable and rediscounts on December 31, 1918, were \$1,380,835,000, a reduction as compared with November 1, 1918, of \$186,156,000.

Of the \$1,380,835,000 of bills payable and rediscounts outstanding December 31, 1918, \$817,264,000 were bills payable with the Federal reserve banks; \$61,564,000 were bills payable with other than Federal reserve banks, while the liability for rediscounts due Federal reserve banks and others amounted to \$502,007,000.

Bonds and Certificates.

United States bonds, including Liberty bonds and United States certificates of indebtedness, held December 31, 1918, amounted to \$2,949,878,000, a reduction since November 1, 1918, of \$206,434,000.

Other bonds, securities, etc., on December 31, 1918, amounted to \$1,683,071,000, an increase of \$22,606,000.

Capital, surpluses, and undivided profits of national banks on December 31, 1918, amounted to \$2,293,613,000.

The circulation of national banks December 31, 1918, was \$676,827,000, an increase of \$1,129,000 as compared with November 1, 1918, and an increase of \$2,573,000 as compared with the same date of previous year.

The amount of Liberty bonds of the first, second, third, and fourth loans owned by national banks on December 31, 1918, was reported at \$955,935,000, or 5.62 per cent of the \$17,000,000,000 Liberty bonds placed.

In addition to the Liberty bonds, the national banks reported holdings of

COMMERCE AND INDUSTRIES OF SIAM AND THE KINGDOM'S PART IN THE WAR

Vice Consul Carl C. Hansen, at Bangkok, Siam, says in his annual report dated September 2, 1918:

The most important event of last year was Siam's severing relations with Germany and Austria-Hungary and joining in the war against them on the side of the allies and of the United States. The deportation of enemy subjects living in Siam and the winding up of their extensive business interests was carried out during the year.

The young men of the Kingdom volunteered in large numbers for service in the Siam expeditionary force, which has now landed in France, and the people of Siam by their generous contributions toward the expense in fitting out this force, and by their ready support of all war charities, have indicated their adherence to the cause of justice and right.

Progress in Education.

Progress has been made in the education of girls by opening schools for women teachers, the system of secondary education has been remodeled so that Siamese students now may be admitted without preliminary entrance examinations into many of the universities of the United States and England, and the colleges in Bangkok have also been amalgamated and constituted a university so as to provide instruction in the higher branches of education.

United States certificates of indebtedness on December 31, 1918, amounting to \$982,125,000.

On December 31, 1918, the national banks reported that the amount of money loaned by them on the security of Liberty bonds was \$1,020,436,000, and the amount of money loaned by them on the security of certificates of indebtedness was \$36,667,000.

The reports show that the amount of Liberty bonds of all four issues owned by national banks in the central reserve cities—New York, Chicago, and St. Louis—was \$172,616,000; in other reserve cities, \$250,707,000; and by the country banks, \$532,612,000.

Certificates of Indebtedness.

Of the United States certificates of indebtedness held by the national banks, \$358,532,000 were owned by the national banks of the three central reserve cities, \$266,419,000 by national banks in other reserve cities, and by the country banks \$357,174,000.

Of the money loaned by the national banks on Liberty bonds, the national banks of the three central reserve cities were loaning \$423,677,000; national banks in other reserve cities were loaning \$345,943,000; while the country banks were loaning on Liberty bonds \$250,816,000.

Of the \$36,667,000 which was being loaned on United States certificates of indebtedness, the central reserve cities were loaning \$13,875,000; national banks in other reserve cities were loaning \$20,249,000; while the country national banks were loaning \$2,543,000.

Of the \$955,935,000 Liberty bonds

The American mission schools have been doing a splendid work in the education of Siam's youth and are now crowded with students. Two of these mission schools, the Christian College at Bangkok, and the Prince Royal College at Chieng-mai are famous throughout the Kingdom for the excellency of their educational work.

Public Health and Welfare.

Public health and welfare has been advanced during the year by extending the operation of sanitary regulations to several towns in the Provinces. Two American doctors are now in the Siamese sanitary service. Dr. M. E. Barnes, of the international health board of the Rockefeller Foundation, has successfully continued his work in cooperation with the Siamese health office for the eradication and control of hookworm. The American medical men serving in the mission hospitals throughout the country have worked earnestly during the year in the relief of suffering, and the Siamese people at every opportunity show their high appreciation of these acts of good will on the part of the American people. The work for the relief of lepers, which was started some years ago by Dr. J. W. McKean, of the American mission in northern Siam, has been appreciated by the Siamese Government, and contributions toward the running expenses have been made during the year.

JOY RIDES IN ARMY AIRPLANES BY CIVILIANS NOT PERMITTED

The Director of Military Aeronautics has announced that civilians will not be permitted to make flights or take joy rides in Army airplanes without authority from the Secretary of War. Paragraph 1586 Army Regulations provides that:

"Flights in Air Service equipment for other than training or war purposes will be made only upon the express authority of the Chief of Air Service, and no person in the military service is authorized to permit other than the following to be carried as passengers in such equipment: Heads of executive and judicial branches of the Government, members of the Senate and House of Representatives, officers and enlisted men in the Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and members and employees of the Air Service."

Gen. Kenly directs that no exceptions will be made to the above regulation by the Division of Military Aeronautics. Civilians who desire to take trips must first get authority from the Secretary of War before presenting themselves to the commanding officers of flying fields or the Division of Military Aeronautics with requests for flights. Applications for flights will not be forwarded to the Secretary of War through the Division of Military Aeronautics.

RESUME PARCEL-POST SERVICE BETWEEN U. S. AND BELGIUM

OFFICE OF SECOND ASSISTANT
POSTMASTER GENERAL,
Washington, January 27, 1919.

Postmasters are hereby notified that, commencing at once, parcel-post packages for Belgium, ordinary and registered, may be accepted at the postage rate of 12 cents a pound, with allowable dimensions and weight of parcels: Greatest length, 3½ feet; greatest length and girth combined, 6 feet; and greatest weight, 11 pounds, for dispatch from New York to Antwerp by such steamship facilities as are available.

In the absence of notice from the Belgium administration of other prohibitions, the general prohibitions set forth in section 180, on page 153, of the annual Postal Guide, will apply as well as the special prohibitions in force in 1914, as follows: Air guns and air pistols; knives in the form of poignards, bayonets, sword-canes, and other secret or hidden arms (not including revolvers and pocket pistols); saccharine and similar substances; absinthe; meat, except mutton; articles prohibited by the Phylloxera Convention; horticultural or nursery stock infected with noxious insects.

Postmasters shall correct the annual Postal Guide for 1918, by striking out the word "Belgium" in the second paragraph on page 146 and adding the word "Belgium" to sections 205, 208, and 209 on pages 155 and 156.

To cover acceptable merchandise, the War Trade Board has issued special export license No. RAC-65 authorizing the exportation, without individual export licenses, of any commodity to Belgium except those commodities included in the export conservation list as it now stands or as it may be hereafter from time to time amended.

Senders should be informed that it is unnecessary to apply to the War Trade Board for permission to mail merchandise under special export license No. RAC-65, and that no document issued by the War Trade Board is necessary in connection with the transaction.

It is necessary, however, to write upon the wrapper of each package, in addition to the name and address of the sender and of the addressee, the license number under which the shipment is made, and to have attached thereto a customs declaration filled out as is customary.

SOLDIERS HONORED BY PERSHING FOR HEROISM

The Commander in Chief of the American Expeditionary Forces, in the name of the President, has awarded the distinguished service cross to the following-named officers and soldiers for the acts of extraordinary heroism described after their names:

Second Lieut. CHARLES R. HANGER, 356th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Pouilly, France, November 10-11, 1918. When three of the companies of his battalion had become lost in the dense fog, during the crossing of the Meuse, Lieut. Hanger made five trips through extremely heavy shell fire and guided them to the river crossing, thus enabling the battalion to fulfill its mission in the operation. Home address, J. W. Hanger, father, Laddonla, Mo.

First Lieut. HAROLD KENASTON, 356th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Pouilly, France, November 4-10, 1918. On November 4 Lieut. Kenaston was severely gassed during a heavy shelling, but remained on duty. On November 5, still suffering from the effects of the gas, he volunteered and went to a near-by town to assist in the work of supplying reserve rations for the command, working continuously for two days and two nights under terrific fire. During the night of November 10-11 he guided an element to the pontoon crossing the Meuse, and, while returning, he was rendered unconscious by a shell explosion. Gaining consciousness, he voluntarily started on a search for a part of his command, which had been lost in the dense fog. Home address, Doris C. Kenaston, wife, 130 La Fayette Avenue, Passaic, N. J.

Pvt. ALEX J. BARBIER, Headquarters Company, 356th Infantry. (No. 1595630.) For extraordinary heroism in action near Bautherville, France, October 22, 1918. While engaged in a raid on enemy positions, Pvt. Barbier was painfully wounded in the head, but refused to go to the rear, remaining on duty with his platoon and taking an active part in the action for 24 hours after being wounded. Home address, Mrs. L. C. Barbier, mother, White Castle, La.

Sergt. THOMAS L. COOKSEY, 99th Division, Military Police. (A. S. No. 2239613.) For extraordinary heroism in action near Montigny-Devant-Sassey, France, November 5, 1918. During a very heavy attack in the vicinity of his post, where artillery fire and aircraft machine-gun fire had created a most confusing situation, Sergt. Cooksey calmly directed traffic, aided wounded, and removed obstructions, thereby preventing wild disorder. He assisted the drivers of ammunition trucks in getting their machines to places of safety. Home address, W. F. Cooksey, father, Lamesa, Tex.

Corpl. JOE C. MAY, 90th Division, Military Police. (A. S. No. 2239686.) For extraordinary heroism in action near Montigny-Devant-Sassey, France, November 5, 1918. During a very heavy attack in the vicinity of his post, where artillery fire and aircraft machine-gun fire had created a most confusing situation, Corpl. May calmly directed traffic, aided wounded, and removed obstructions, thereby preventing wild disorder. He assisted the drivers of ammunition trucks in getting their machines to a place of safety. Home address, J. C. May, father, Nola, Miss.

Second Lieut. GORDON STAPLETON, 6th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Vilosnes, France, November 6, 1918. Entering Vilosnes with a patrol, Lieut. Stapleton encountered heavy enemy machine-gun fire. He attacked and killed four Germans, took four prisoners, and forced those remaining to take shelter in a trench. Although greatly outnumbered he held his position, while the French crossed the River Meuse and took many prisoners. Home address, Mrs. Elizabeth T. Stapleton, mother, Ennis, Tex.

First Lieut. L. BARNETT (deceased), 148th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Ivroiry, France, September 27, 1918. Having become separated from his battalion headquarters, Lieut. Barnett, battalion adjutant, on his own initiative, undertook, under heavy artillery and machine-gun fire, to locate machine-gun nests which were hindering the advance. He ignored the warnings of his orderly as to the danger of this work and continued at it until he was killed. Next of kin, Mrs. L. M. Barnett, wife, 1937 Hudson Avenue, Norwood, Ohio.

Second Lieut. BRADLEY V. SARGEANT, Jr., (deceased), 11th Field Artillery. For extraordinary heroism in action at Romagne, France,

October 27, 1918. Under heavy shell fire, dis-regarding his own safety, Lieut. Sargeant remained on duty, superintending the unloading of ammunition until he was mortally wounded. Next of kin, Mrs. Bradley V. Sargeant, Jr., wife, 7 Third Avenue, San Francisco, Cal.

Pvt. WILLIAM W. FINK, Battery A, 124th Field Artillery. (A. S. No. 1378729.) For extraordinary heroism in action near Remonville, France, October 31, 1918. Pvt. Fink, a driver, was seriously wounded by shell fire while going forward to the front line infantry trenches with his platoon, but he remained at his post, refusing to seek medical attention until he fell from his horse, exhausted. Home address, Joseph B. Fink, father, 1800 Whittier Avenue, Springfield, Ill.

Sergt. CLARENCE L. WRIGHT, Battery C, 124th Field Artillery. (A. S. No. 1379056.) For extraordinary heroism in action at Romagne, France, November 1, 1918. After three members of his gun crew had been wounded during heavy enemy shell fire, Sergt. Wright alone continued to keep his piece in action for 15 minutes until assistance reached him. He was wounded in action shortly afterward. Home address, Mrs. J. A. Ogs, mother, 618 Seventh Avenue, Peoria, Ill.

Sergt. JOSEPH D. CASSIDY, Battery C, 124th Field Artillery. (A. S. No. 1168061.) For extraordinary heroism in action near Romagne, France, November 1, 1918. After three members of his gun crew had been wounded during heavy enemy shell fire, Sergt. Cassidy, alone, continued to keep his gun in action. Later, after reorganizing his section, he administered first-aid treatment to the wounded men. Home address, Mrs. Laura E. Cassidy, 264 Vermont Street, Quincy, Ill.

Pvt. (first class) RALPH SILLOWAY, Battery C, 124th Field Artillery. (A. S. No. 1378997.) For extraordinary heroism in action near Romagne, France, November 1-3, 1918. During heavy enemy shell fire, when the other members of his section were all wounded or engaged in first-aid work, Pvt. Silloway alone served his piece and kept it firing. Two days later, when the chief of his section was wounded, Pvt. Silloway took command of the section and followed the barrage. Home address, P. M. Silloway, father, 694 Trendonia Street, Peoria, Ill.

Sergt. GEORGE H. AMMONS, Battery A, 124th Field Artillery. (A. S. No. 1378745.) For extraordinary heroism in action near Remonville, France, October 31, 1918. While in charge of the limbers and horses of a platoon sent to the front line infantry trenches, Sergt. Ammons, although himself wounded, took the place of a driver who had fallen from his horse. He refused medical attention until all the pieces were in position and the limbers and horses taken to a place of safety. Home address, Roy Ammons, brother, 154 South Western Avenue, Chicago, Ill.

Pvt. (first class) MILTON C. WEBB, Medical Detachment, 124th Field Artillery. (A. S. No. 1379461.) For extraordinary heroism in action near Romagne, France, November 1, 1918. Wounded while administering aid to other men during shell fire, Pvt. Webb remained on duty in disregard of his own injury. Home address, Mrs. Webb, 926 South Fourteenth Street, Birmingham, Ala.

Pvt. PERRY F. MODOV, Medical Detachment, 124th Field Artillery. (A. S. No. 1379458.) For extraordinary heroism in action near Romagne, France, November 1, 1918. Pvt. Modrov was wounded while serving at the battalion aid station under heavy shell fire, but he insisted on continuing at work until compelled to go to the rear against his will. Home address, Mrs. Modrov, 1473 Gaty Avenue, East St. Louis, Ill.

First Lieut. MARK DUFFY, Medical Corps, 124th Field Artillery. For extraordinary heroism in action near Romagne, France, November 1, 1918. Lieut. Duffy displayed exceptional bravery in caring for the wounded and directing their evacuation under heavy shell fire. During the action he went under concentrated fire and rescued several wounded men. Home address, Mrs. Eleanor Duffy, 6604 Newgart Avenue, Chicago, Ill.

Corpl. DONALD M. PARKER (deceased), Intelligence Personnel, 2d Battalion, 6th Regiment, United States Marine Corps. (A. S. No. 101588.) For extraordinary heroism in action near Thalucourt, France, September 15, 1918. Corpl. Parker voluntarily joined an officer and with him attacked and silenced a strong machine-gun nest, menacing the left flank of the line. He held the position in the face of strong opposition until he was fatally wounded by a sniper. Next of kin, Mrs. Ester J. Parker, mother, 281 Pleasant Street, Leominster, Mass.

Sergt. PAUL C. SANDERFER, Company M, 119th Infantry, A. S. 1316865. For extraordinary heroism in action near St. Souplet, France, October 10, 1918. Sergt. Sanderfer showed exceptional devotion to duty and bravery during the attack of October 9 and 10. Pvt. (first class) ROBERT McDONALD, Company M, 119th Infantry, A. S. 1317009. For extraordinary heroism in action near St. Souplet, France, October 9 and 10, 1918. Pvt. Pvt. ERNEST B. GREEN, Company D, 118th Infantry, A. S. 1310736. For extraordinary heroism in action near Bellcourt, France, September 25, 1918. Pvt. Green, although stunned and bruised by a shell which burst in his trench, went to the aid of a comrade outside of the trench and brought him to safety. This was in full view of the enemy and under heavy shelling. Home address, Mrs. J. M. Greene, 18 South Valley Street, Cotacord, N. C.

First Lieut. DANIEL B. BYRD, Company F, 119th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Escaufourt, France, October 10, 1918. Leading a small detachment under heavy fire, while the regiment was making an advance, Lieut. Byrd encountered stiff resistance which threatened to cut his detachment from the main line. By his utter disregard of the great danger and the prompt placing of his automatic rifles he made it possible for his detachment to return to the lines. Lieut. Byrd was wounded by shrapnel, but he remained with the men until ordered to the rear by his commanding officer. Home address, Mr. W. J. Bird, brother, Fayetteville, N. C.

First Lieut. EDWARD T. FOGG, Company C, 120th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near La Selle River, France, October 19, 1918. When his company had received orders to advance from the front line, Lieut. Fogg, then in command, led the company to its objective, despite severe wounds he had received prior to the start of the attack. He refused treatment until the mission was complete, when he went to the dressing station. He returned as soon as possible and remained with his company during the entire operations. Home address, Wallace L. Fogg, father, 720 Broadway, Willsville, Ohio.

Sergt. HERMAN F. BREMER, Machine Gun Company, 119th Infantry, deceased, A. S. 1317082. For extraordinary heroism in action near Bellcourt, France, September 29, 1918. Sergt. Bremer displayed coolness, excellent judgment, and efficient leadership in keeping his platoon intact while advancing with the regiment. Exposed to fire from all sides, he set his guns and engaged the enemy. While leading his men to a new position he was instantly killed. Next of kin, Miss Eleanor W. Bremer, sister, 16 Charlotte Street, Charleston, S. C.

Cook OLLIE R. LINK, Company M, 119th Infantry, A. S. 1316897. For extraordinary heroism in action near St. Souplet, France, October 9-10, 1918. Hearing that the casualties in his company were very heavy, Cook Link left his place in the kitchen and joined his comrades on the front line. From there he advanced alone a distance of 200 yards and located two machine-gun nests, the journey being done in the face of heavy enemy fire. Home address, Mr. Jesse B. Link, father, Boise Creek, N. C.

Sergt. ROBERT P. COOK, Company G, 120th Infantry, A. S. 1320798. For extraordinary heroism in action near Bellcourt, France, September 29, 1918. When his platoon was held up by machine gunfire during an advance, Sergt. Cook, although suffering from a painful machine-gun bullet wound in the hand, personally killed the gunner and put the gun out of action, thus permitting the further advance of his platoon. Home address, William P. Cook, father, Altoona, Pa.

Sergt. JAMES N. HUDNALL, Company G, 120th Infantry, A. S. 1230880, deceased. For extraordinary heroism in action near Bel-

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licourt, France, September 29, 1918. After being twice wounded, Sergt. James N. Hudnall continued to lead his platoon in attack, capturing two machine guns. In later action he received additional wounds which caused his death. Next of kin, Miss Eva Hudnall, sister, Critz, Va.

Pvt. WALTER L. FOSTER, Company D, 119th Infantry, deceased, A. S. 1866552. For extraordinary heroism in action near Bellcourt, France, September 29, 1918. Acting as a runner, Pvt. Foster carried frequent messages between his platoon leader and company commander, exposed at all times to heavy enemy fire of artillery and machine guns. While performing this meritorious work he was killed by machine-gun fire. Next of kin, Miss Lizzie Foster, sister, Haw River, N. C.

Pvt. (first class) FRED E. WALLACE, Company F, 119th Infantry, A. S. 1995437. For extraordinary heroism in action near St. Souplet, France, October 17-19, 1918. Pvt. Wallace volunteered and located the right flank of Company G and the left flank of Company H, 119th Regiment, under heavy machine-gun fire. He was wounded while on this mission, but returned with the desired information. Home address, Mrs. Maura B. Wallace, mother, Rood House, Ill.

Pvt. PHILLIP MILLER, Company D, 118th Infantry, A. S. 1314485. For extraordinary heroism in action near Vaux-Andigny, France, October 13, 1918. Seeking shelter with his company from the severe artillery and machine-gun fire of the enemy, Pvt. Miller entered a shell hole. Here he found a severely wounded soldier, and without hesitation carried the man 50 yards, under plain view of the enemy and exposed to terrific fire, to a place of safety with some of his company. Pvt. OLLIE POPE, Company C, 130th Infantry, A. S. 1319961. For extraordinary heroism in action between St. Quentin and Cambrai, France, October 9, 1918. Pvt. Pope was wounded in action between St. Quentin and Cambrai, France, and after having his wounds dressed, he was unable to locate his company. He returned, however, to the front line, and fought throughout the day, locating and returning to his own organization after dark. Home address, Mrs. Martha M. Pope, 1101 Worth Street, Durham, N. C.

Pvt. DECATUR F. ROSE, Company K, 119th Infantry, A. S. 1316532. For extraordinary heroism in action near St. Souplet, France, October 11, 1918. During an attack by his regiment, Pvt. Rose was carrying a message from his platoon commander to company headquarters. On the way he met an enemy patrol, and, although alone, immediately opened fire upon them, continuing to fire after being wounded in both legs, until the enemy had been completely routed. Home address, Mr. Stephen L. Rose, father, Uuala, N. C.

Pvt. WILLIAM E. ROBBINS, Company A, 119th Infantry, A. S. 1314788, deceased. For extraordinary heroism in action near Bellcourt, France, September 29, 1918. During an attack by his regiment, Pvt. Robbins was wounded in the leg. Having dressed his own wound, he continued to advance with his Lewis gun and ammunition until he was killed by shell fire. Next of kin, Mr. L. Robbins, father, Wilson, N. C.

Pvt. HENRY G. SCHWER, Company B, 119th Infantry, A. S. 2158718. For extraordinary heroism in action near Bellcourt, France, September 29-30, 1918. During an attack by his regiment, Pvt. Schwer was wounded, but continued his work as stretcher bearer throughout the night, refusing to be evacuated, while able to render assistance to his comrades. Home address, Mr. Berry F. Schwer, father, Falmouth, Ky.

Pvt. REMI VERBEKE, Company D, 118th Infantry, A. S. 2150438. For extraordinary heroism in action near Bellcourt, France, September 26, 1918. After receiving a painful wound in the shoulder, Pvt. Verbeke delivered a message to his company headquarters. He then had his wound dressed, returned with another message through shell fire and under direct observation of the enemy and reported for continuous duty. He later voluntarily assisted in driving back a strong enemy patrol and was severely wounded in the encounter. Home address, Emil Voldoyck, Climax, Minn.

Pvt. BENJAMIN B. SMITH, Company A, 119th Infantry, A. S. 1314600, deceased. For extraordinary heroism in action near Bellcourt, France, September 29, 1918. After be-

ing wounded twice in making attacks with his own organization, Pvt. Smith joined Australian troops and attacked with them, being wounded a third time before he consented to be evacuated. Home address, W. M. Smith, father, Ash, N. C.

Second Lieut. JULIAN K. MORRISON, Tank Corps. For extraordinary heroism in action in the Bois Quart de Reserve, France, September 12, 1918. Preceding his tanks on foot, Lieut. Morrison captured a machine-gun nest. Though he was twice wounded, this officer continued in action for two days thereafter. For the following acts of extraordinary heroism in action near Vervy, France, September 28, 1918. Lieut. Morrison is awarded a bar to be worn with the distinguished service cross. During the attack on Charpentry and the Bois de Montrebeau Lieut. Morrison led a platoon of five tanks, directing his tanks on foot 400 yards in advance of the Infantry under intensive fire. Three of his tanks were put out of action by artillery fire, but he continued in action with the remaining two until dark, when he directed the work of rescuing the crews. Home address, A. J. Sergt. CHARLES C. YOUNG, Company A, 345th Battalion, Tank Corps, A. S. No. 243375. For extraordinary heroism in action near Apremont, France, September 27, 1918. Although wounded twice by fire from tank guns, during the attack, Sergt. Young continued at his post, refusing to be sent to the rear. Home address, Mrs. Dora Young, mother, Millbrook, Mich.

First Lieut. TOM W. SAUL, Tank Corps. For extraordinary heroism in action near the Bois de Remières, France, September 12, 1918. Lieut. Saul coolly exposed himself to enemy fire by standing on the parapet of a trench and directing his men in work of getting the tanks forward. Home address, Mrs. Tom W. Saul, wife, 440 East Seventeenth Street, Portland, Ore.

Second Lieut. JOHN GLEASON, Tank Corps. For extraordinary heroism in action near Cheppy, Montrebeau Woods, and Exermont, France, September 26-October 4, 1918. During the action at Cheppy, Lieut. Gleason led his platoon against a strong point defended by machine and antitank guns, leaving his tank and leading his command on foot through a mine field under heavy rifle and machine-gun fire. Two days later in Montrebeau Woods he led his platoon against machine-gun nests, cleaning them out and leading a battalion of Infantry forward to occupy this position. On October 4, he continued in the attack on Exermont, though he had been twice wounded and ordered to the rear. Home address, Mrs. K. J. Gleason, mother, 168 Forest Avenue, River Forest, Ill.

Corpl. WILLIAM A. BROPHY, A. S. No. 243403, Company A, 345th Battalion, Tank Corps, United States Army. For extraordinary heroism in action near Argonne Forest, France, October 6, 1918. Although wounded in the arm, Corpl. Brophy insisted upon returning to his tank, and taking part in the counter-attack. He remained with the tank doing very effective work until the attack had been repulsed. Home address, Miss Katharine Brophy, aunt, Hetersville, Pa.

Corpl. ALBERT J. ZIMBORSKI, deceased, A. S. No. 237697, Company C, 345th Battalion, Tank Corps. For extraordinary heroism in action near Bois de Montrebeau, France, October 4, 1918. While running his tank into a woods to route a machine-gun nest his tank was hit and set on fire. He fought on until compelled to leave because of the excessive heat. While he and his gunner were leaving the tank, they were both wounded, and when making an advance on a machine gun, Corpl. Zimborski received further wounds, which caused his death. Next of kin, Mrs. Albert J. Zimborski, wife, 2 Foye Place, Jersey City, N. J.

Pvt. CHARLES D. MERRITT, A. S. No. 170273, Company C, 345th Battalion, Tank Corps. For extraordinary heroism in action near Cheppy, France, September 26, 1918. While Pvt. Merritt was directing a column of tanks through a mine field, assisted by another soldier, his companion was wounded, but Pvt. Merritt continued with his work until all tanks had safely passed through. Returning, he assisted his wounded comrade to safety, after which he carried messages through an intense bombardment of artillery and machine guns. Home address, Mrs. Susie Merritt, mother, 246 Grant Avenue, Jersey City, N. J.

First Lieut. ALFRED N. BERGSTEIN, Medical Corps, 18th Infantry. For extraor-

inary heroism in action near Exermont, France, October 8, 1918. Under heavy shell fire, Lieut. Bergstein cared for the wounded, although he had been severely wounded and was suffering great pain. He refused to be evacuated until all the wounded had been treated. Home address, Samuel Bergstein, 624 Minersville Street, Pottsville, Pa.

Maj. PAUL DALY, 18th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Soissons, France, July 19-22, 1918. Although wounded, Maj. Daly took command of the first battalion of his regiment after the previous battalion commanders had been wounded, displaying highest courage in advancing and holding the objective of his battalion. Three days later he was again wounded, but remained with his command, until he was ordered to the rear by his regimental commander. Home address, Daniel Daly, Nassau Street, New York City, N. Y.

Pvt. JOHN C. OLSON, A. S. No. 44219, Company L, 16th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Bois de Fontaine, France, May 11, 1918. This soldier displayed conspicuous bravery by going from the front line, to an advanced post, and rescuing, unaided, a wounded comrade, in the face of heavy machine-gun fire. Home address, Emanuel Olson, Valparaiso, Nebr.

Second Lieut. ALAM RAMSAY COLE, 16th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Soissons, France, July 18, 1918. Although wounded early in the morning, Lieut. Cole continued to lead his platoon in the front wave, personally silencing machine-gun nests, displaying wonderful courage, leadership, and devotion to duty, during the entire operations. He remained with his platoon until ordered to the rear by his battalion commander. Home address, H. R. Cole, father, High Street, Bridgton, Me.

Maj. HIRUM E. ROSS, Medical Corps, 18th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Villers-Tournelle, France, May 3-4, 1918. While under heavy bombardment, and working in an area saturated with gas, Maj. Ross showed extreme gallantry and efficiency, in caring for the more dangerously wounded, removing his mask at times during the attack, to better ascertain the extent of the wound. It was, while thus acting that he was severely gassed. Home address, H. W. Ross, father, 409 Chandler Street, Danville, Ill.

Capt. MALCOLM RICE, 16th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Exermont, France, October 1-8, 1918. During the advance on October 8 Capt. Rice was severely gassed and although suffering greatly from the effects, he remained with his company for four days, after which he was forced to evacuate on account of temporary blindness. Sergt. JAMES R. MANSFIELD, A. S. No. 1783727, Medical Detachment, 311th Machine Gun Battalion. For extraordinary heroism in action near Montfaucon, France, September 29, 1918. Administering first aid in a most exposed position Sergt. Mansfield rendered most valuable assistance not only to casualties from his own command, but also those from other organizations. He continued with his work, although wounded, and refused to leave for the rear, until ordered to do so by his commanding officer. Home address, Mrs. Mary V. Corpl. JOHN J. POILLON, A. S. No. 1783996, Company C, 311th Machine Gun Battalion. For extraordinary heroism in action near Montfaucon, France, September 29, 1918. Although engaged as company clerk, and when the platoon to which he was attached was required to advance over a heavily shelled territory, Corpl. Poillon volunteered and carried messages from his company commander to the platoon, the journey being made under most hazardous conditions and under severest shell fire. Pvt. PERRY W. WILT, A. S. No. 3112819, Company C, 311th Machine Gun Battalion. For extraordinary heroism in action near Montfaucon, France, September 29, 1918. While performing his duties as company runner, Pvt. Wilt passed through an intensely shelled area on six different occasions, and expressed a willingness to make several more trips, as the situation required. While making his last journey across the area he was severely wounded. Home address, Mrs. Eliza V. Wilt, mother, R. F. D. No. 2, Wanton, Md.

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Pvt. EDWIN S. MILLS, A. S. No. 1752701, Company D, 312th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Grandpre, France, October 23, 1918. Pvt. Mills, while acting as a runner, volunteered and carried messages through several heavy barrages and under direct enemy fire, always accomplishing his mission. Home address, Mrs. Catherine Mills, mother, 116 Collins Avenue, Collingswood, N. J.

Pvt. (First Class) SAMUEL F. GILLILAND, Jr., A. S. No. 1039408, Medical Detachment, 11th Field Artillery. For extraordinary heroism in action near Laneville, France, November 9-10, 1918. Pvt. Gilliland made repeated trips over a road which was under continuous shell fire, he being the only driver who would risk driving over this road. On one trip his ambulance was struck by a shell, which wounded him, killed one of his patients, and caused fresh wounds to several others; but he continued on duty, evacuating the wounded of his own and other organizations. Home address, Samuel F. Gilliland, father, South Boston, Va.

Maj. ALEXANDER N. STARK, Jr., 61st Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Cote St. Germain, France, November 7, 1918. His battalion, stopped by machine-gun fire in the attack of November 7, 1918, Maj. Stark personally led his battalion in a renewed attack and thus succeeded in gaining Cote St. Germain. Maj. Stark personally captured a machine gun and 13 prisoners, this personal example of fearlessness encouraging his men to advance against odds. Home address, Col. Alexander N. Stark, Medical Corps, United States Army, father, care War Department, Washington, D. C.

Maj. J. L. PEATROSS, 353d Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Bantheville, France, November 2, 1918. Though he had been wounded the day before, and was so weak from exposure that he could hardly talk, Maj. Peatross remained with his battalion and led it in assault on enemy machine-gun nests north of the Bois de Barricourt. Under his personal direction without artillery support, the machine-gun nests were flanked and the day's objective reached in spite of the most determined resistance. Home address, Mrs. J. W. First Lieut. G. S. SCHWARZWALDER, 21st Machine Gun Battalion. For extraordinary heroism in action near Vieville, France, November 1, 1918. Lieut. Schwarzwaldler remained in an exposed place administering first aid to a wounded officer and two soldiers throughout a heavy barrage of gas shells and high explosives, after his platoon had withdrawn from the position. He had the wounded men removed to a less exposed place and remained with them until they were evacuated. Home address, Mrs. Dina Schwarzwaldler, Gilbora, Schoaire County, N. Y.

Sergt. HARRY E. IMHOFF, A. S. No. 1159836, Company D, 21st Machine Gun Battalion. For extraordinary heroism in action near Vieville, France, November 1, 1918. During a heavy barrage of high explosive and gas shells Sergt. Imhoff assisted an officer to give first aid to a wounded officer and two soldiers after the platoon had withdrawn from the position. Corpl. THOMAS L. E. REILLY, A. S. No. 793032, Company D, 21st Machine Gun Battalion. For extraordinary heroism in action near Vieville, France, November 1, 1918. During a heavy barrage of high-explosive and gas shells Corpl. Reilly assisted an officer to give first aid to a wounded officer and two soldiers after the platoon had withdrawn from that position. He went to the rear for medical aid and passed through the barrage the second time and returned. Home address, Mrs. Annie Reilly, mother, 252 East One hundred and twenty-eighth Street, New York City.

Capt. EUGENE S. COHN, 364th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Exmorieux Farm, France, October 2, 1918. After being painfully wounded by shrapnel, Capt. Cohn refused to go to the rear and remained on duty with his company in the front line without medical attention for 54 hours. Home address, Mrs. Martha R. Cohn, wife, R. F. D. No. 6, Seattle, Wash.

First Lieut. ARTHUR TRUMBULL LEE, 364th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Tronsol Farm, France, September 28, and at Leauwken, Belgium, October 31, 1918. On the afternoon of September 28 Lieut. Lee advanced with his platoon to Tronsol Farm under heavy artillery and machine-gun fire and captured seven machine guns and much ammunition. Forced to retire he re-

turned with his capture and platoon in good order. On October 31, while attempting to locate machine-gun nests which were holding up his advance, he was so severely wounded that, in spite of his desire to continue, he was unable to do so. Home address, Rev. George H. Lee, Newberg, Oreg.

Pvt. MANUEL SIMAS, A. S. No. 2266516, Company C, 364th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Eclisfontaine, France, September 28, 1918. After being wounded by a machine-gun bullet, early in the afternoon he remained in action and without making his wound known, willingly offered and held a very dangerous outpost until late the next morning, when he was ordered to the hospital. Sergt. FRED OLSEN, A. S. No. 2266496, machine-gun company, 264th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Eclisfontaine, France, September 27, 1918. With two other soldiers Sergt. Olsen volunteered and went 300 yards beyond our outpost lines, through heavy shell fire, to bring in a wounded private of his regiment. The mission was promptly and successfully accomplished. Pvt. ALBERT L. SMITH, A. S. No. 2265542, Company M, 363d Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Eclisfontaine, France, September 27, 1918. With two other soldiers Pvt. Smith volunteered and went 300 yards beyond our outpost lines, through heavy shell fire, to bring in a wounded private of his regiment. The mission was promptly and successfully accomplished. Home address, Mrs. Luey P. Robertson, aunt, Fillmore, Cal.

Pvt. EUGENE ALONZO, A. S. No. 2284326, machine-gun company, 364th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Eclisfontaine, France, September 27, 1918, and October 4, 1918. On September 27 Pvt. Alonzo, with two other soldiers, volunteered and went 300 yards beyond our outpost lines, through heavy shell fire, to bring in a wounded private of his regiment. On October 4 he remained in the open, under heavy shrapnel and high explosive fire, giving first aid to our wounded men until he was wounded by shrapnel. Home address, Mrs. Louise M. Pinon, 135 West Third Street, Los Angeles, Cal.

Corpl. JOHN C. LOWE, A. S. No. 2266478, Company C, 364th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Leauwken, Belgium, October 31, 1918. With three other soldiers Corpl. Lowe skillfully worked his way under heavy fire to the flank of a machine-gun nest, which was holding up the advance of his platoon with enfilading fire, killed six Germans and captured three machine guns. Pvt. EDWARD WO BORTON, A. S. No. 2267407, machine-gun company, 364th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Eclisfontaine, France, October 4, 1918. After obtaining permission to go to the aid of wounded soldiers Pvt. Borton remained in the open, under heavy shrapnel and high-explosive fire, giving first aid to our wounded men until he was wounded by shrapnel. Home address, Mrs. Ida I. Pvt. JOHN S. SORENSON, A. S. No. 2289565, machine-gun company, 364th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Eclisfontaine, France, October 4, 1918. Pvt. Sorenson volunteered and remained with a wounded comrade in a gun position when his division was relieved. He gave all the aid possible and then went some 500 meters through heavy shell and machine-gun fire for further medical assistance and returned with it to his companion. Sergt. MILTON G. BURTON, A. S. No. 2273452, Company E, 316th Engineers. For extraordinary heroism in action near Eclisfontaine, France, September 28, 1918. While attached to an Infantry unit, Sergt. Burton evidenced great bravery in bringing in four severely wounded men from the front lines to the dressing station. After reaching the dressing station, he immediately administered first aid to the men, being continually exposed to the machine-gun and sniper fire. Home address, Mrs. Milton G. Col. E. M. LEARY, 358th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Stenay, France, November 10, 1918. Under heavy machine-gun and artillery fire Col. Leary personally led two sections of machine guns and

two platoons of Infantry to the assistance of one of his battalions in order to protect its flank. Home address, Mrs. E. M. Leary, 40 Chapel Street, Augusta, Me.

Capt. HERBERT S. HILLBURN, 359th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action at Villers-Devant-Dun, France, November 2, 1918. Under heavy machine-gun fire Capt. Hillburn repeatedly went to the rear of his company to rally and reorganize it and then rushed forward to lead his men on. Having taken the town of Villers-Devant-Dun and the Cret beyond, he held it with only 16 men until the next morning, against superior numbers of the enemy. Home address, William C. Capt. DAN C. LEEPER, deceased, 359th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Villers-devant-Dun, France, November 2, 1918. In the face of intense machine-gun fire Capt. Leeper led his company forward to its objective, capturing a machine-gun nest and making possible the capture of a strong enemy position on a hill. This officer was severely wounded during these operations, but his courage was an inspiration to his men in consolidating their position. Home address, Mrs. Dan C. Leeper, wife, Denison, Tex.

First Lieut. RAYMOND A. SCHOBERTH, deceased, 359th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Bantheville, France, November 1, 1918. Lieut. SchobertH continued to lead his platoon after being wounded in the arm by a machine-gun bullet. He set an excellent example for his platoon by his courage and disregard for personal danger. This gallant officer was later killed by a shell fragment. Next of kin, Anthony SchobertH, father, Versailles, Ky.

First Lieut. VERNON B. ZACHER, 359th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Bantheville, France, November 1, 1918. Without regard for his own safety, Lieut. Zacher led his platoon to the capture of two machine guns which were holding up the advance of his battalion. Although painfully wounded he would not stop until his objective had been reached. Home address, Fred Zacher, father, 311 Penn Avenue, South Jamestown, N. Dak.

Sergt. ALFRED BUCHANAN, A. S. No. 2229446, Company G, 360th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Le Grand Carré Farm, France, November 1, 1918. After being severely wounded early in the action Sergt. Buchanan had his wound dressed and started to rejoin his platoon, but passed through a gap in our lines and reached the German lines instead. He returned from there, located his platoon and led it with marked courage and coolness until he was severely wounded the second time. Home address, R. S. Buchanan, R. F. D. No. 6, Bryan, Tex.

Sergt. CHARLES W. ALLEN, A. S. No. 2216868, Company E, 357th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near Bantheville, France, October 23, 1918. During a fight between his company and superior force of the enemy Sergt. Allen observed a machine gun in action on the flank of his platoon. He charged the emplacement and captured the crew of six men. Home address, Mrs. Vinay Allen, Drummond, Okla.

Sergt. FRANK D. LOESCHER, A. S. No. 2230212, Company K, 360th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action at Le Grand Carré Farm, France, November 1, 1918. Although wounded in the arm early in the attack, Sergt. Loeschler continued to lead his platoon in the attack on a strong enemy position, and by the use of rifles, rifle grenades, and hand grenades, and after capturing several machine-gun nests, including one dugout containing 70 Germans, forced the entire strong point to yield, including two German companies armed with machine guns, which had been holding up the advance of the whole company. Corpl. FRED W. DALLAS, A. S. No. 2811224, Headquarters Company, 360th Infantry. For extraordinary heroism in action near the Bois de Argonne, France, November 2, 1918. Although his arm was shattered by a machine-gun bullet, Corpl. Dallas refused to go to the rear, but continued to advance under extremely heavy machine-gun fire until he received two more wounds, one piercing his leg and making it impossible for him to advance further. While crawling to the rear he encountered another wounded man and assisted him to the dressing station. Home address, Mrs. Bellzora Dallas, mother, 652 Orleans Street, Beaumont, Tex.
