



AMERICA HOPE OF WORLD, PRESIDENT WILSON SAYS IN ADDRESS AT BOSTON ON PEACE CONFERENCE WORK

COUNCIL AT PARIS HEARS "WHOLE CASE"

*United States Not Only Held
Ideals, but "Acted Ideals
Before All Nations"—Has
Tried to Speak for Amer-
ica, and Believes He Has
Represented True Sentiments
of American People.*

Following is the text of President Wilson's speech in addressing an audience at Boston, Mass., February 24, 1919, on his return from the peace conference at Paris, France:

"Governor Coolidge, Mr. Mayor, fellow citizens: I wonder if you are half as glad to see me as I am to see you. It warms my heart to see a great body of my fellow citizens again because in some respects during recent months I have been very lonely, indeed, without your comradeship and counsel, and I tried at every step of the work which fell to me to recall what I was sure would be your counsel with regard to the great matters which were under consideration.

Greeting Not Personal.

"I do not want you to think that I have not been appreciative of the extraordinarily generous reception which was given me on the other side. In saying it makes me very happy to get home again. I don't mean to say I wasn't very deeply touched by the cries that came from greater crowds on the other side. But I want to say to you in all honesty, I felt them to be the call of greeting to you rather than to me. I did not feel that greeting was personal. I had in my heart the over-crowning pride of being your representative and of receiving the plaudits of men everywhere who felt that your hearts beat with theirs in the cause of liberty. There was no mistaking the tone in the voices of these great crowds. It was not the tone of mere greeting, it was not the tone of mere generous welcome, it was the calling of comrade to comrade, the cry

Industrial Board of Commerce Department Formed to Adjust Prices for the Basic Materials

BRITISH ADMIRALTY SUSPENDS SHIP EXAMINATION SERVICE

Advices to the State Department state that the British Admiralty has announced the suspension of examination service at all British Empire points except the Firth of Forth, Cromarty, and Scapa Flow. It also announced that all vessels are prohibited from entering the area 1 mile in length, extending in a 293 degree direction north 52 degrees west magnetic and 113 degrees south, 52 degrees east magnetic, direction 2 cables wide. The southeast corner of the area is 7 1/4 cables 304 degrees north 41 west magnetic from No Man's Fort Light.

SUBSCRIPTIONS TO JANUARY 16 TREASURY NOTE ISSUE CLOSED

The Secretary of the Treasury yesterday announced that the issue of 4 1/2 per cent Treasury certificates of indebtedness of Series T-2, dated January 16, 1919, and maturing June 17, 1919, would close at the close of business February 24, 1919, about \$370,000,000 of these certificates having been subscribed for to date.

Final figures of the subscription by districts will be promptly announced upon receipt of final reports from the Federal reserve banks.

AMERICAN Y. M. C. A. MEN TO AID ENEMY PRISONERS IN SIBERIA

The American ambassador to France advises the State Department that the French Government has given its assent to the proposal that American secretaries of the Young Men's Christian Association be authorized to aid in the disbursement of enemy funds in Siberian relief work among the German and Austro-Hungarian prisoners of war.

Credit of \$15,000,000 Extended to Serbia

A credit of \$15,000,000 has been established in favor of Serbia, making a total of \$27,000,000 for Serbia and \$8,674,657,836 for all the allies.

OUTLINE OF PROGRAM

High Price Conditions Declared in Statement by Secretary Redfield to Be Cause of Most of Business Inactivity and Work of Board Will Be to Remedy That Situation as far as Possible.

The Secretary of Commerce has issued the following:

Having received approval from the President of the plans proposed to readjust prices, "the Industrial Board of the Department of Commerce" has been formed, composed of representative men from industry, labor, and the Government, who are being selected under the chairmanship of George N. Peek, formerly vice chairman of the War Industries Board. They are to put into practical effect a program for the readjustment of prices for basic materials in such a fashion as to create a firm foundation on which the consumer can base his future purchases, and the producer can form necessary estimates. The Industrial Board has the assistance of the Council of National Defense.

The following is a summary of the industrial situation and an outline of the work of the board:

1. General Conditions.

1. There exists at the present time an abnormal situation in the industrial world. It is a condition of stagnation of business and industrial activity. Mills and factories are idle or are producing but a small part of what they are capable of doing; building operations, now deferred for several years, are not beginning—and, in fact, resumption is not contemplated until the confused conditions of the transition period are clarified. Many enterprises, such as street railway companies in various municipalities, laboring under restrictions of charter contracts are confronted with advanced wage scales and unprecedented prices of materials needed for repairs and necessary extensions. Unemployment exists and this unemployment is increasing at such a rate as to challenge the best thought that can be given to the situation.

INDUSTRIAL BOARD TO READJUST PRICES OF BASIC MATERIALS

2. One of the striking features of the present situation is the high prices demanded for practically all articles and commodities of trade and commerce. This high-price condition is undoubtedly the cause of most of the business inactivity, and, therefore, also is the cause of the widespread unemployment of labor.

3. The living costs of the present are unusually high and will continue high until there are substantial reductions in the cost of the necessary staple food-stuffs.

4. A large and it is believed satisfactory latent buying power exists in the country—an abundance of money—but it is not being used to employ labor and to purchase goods and materials.

5. The present conditions have come about by a series of unusual happenings due to the war. The industries and labor of the country were diverted into new and unnatural channels in order to mobilize all efforts possible in the winning of the war.

The capacities of many factories were expanded, new ones built, abandoned plants remodeled and put into production, and industry was managed and operated in accordance with war necessities.

This control and direction of effort and change of policies resulted in the complete suspension of the ordinary operation of the law of supply and demand, the demand for war commodities and the necessary agreements with industries as to prices and terms of conversion of industry to war work, etc., had the effect of inflating prices to an abnormal extent, so as to encourage maximum production, even by producers operating under the greatest handicaps and at the highest costs. Prices were advanced disproportionately, some articles showing increase in selling prices over prewar prices of 250 per cent, while others showed but approximately 50 per cent. The law of supply and demand is really inoperative at the present time, for the reason that it is found difficult, if not impossible, for this law to resume normal functioning on account of the fact that at the present time the price relations between the industries producing basic essentials are out of balance and not properly adjusted to efficiently meet peace-time conditions.

6. It therefore is apparent that the trouble resulting in the present stagnant, unsatisfactory condition of industry is due to the continuance of the high, uneven, unstable prices of war times, which were, in many instances, agreed to by agencies of Government functioning for war purposes and not to any unhealthy general condition. These abnormal prices still remain because there has been provided, up to this time, no agency to bring about the necessary reductions.

II. Some Suggestions which Ought to be Observed in Seeking a Solution of the Problem.

1. A wise solution is equally important to the Government, to industry, and to labor, for their true interests are so indissolubly connected and united that no detriment can be suffered by one without a harmful effect and reaction upon the others.

2. The vital need of the situation is resumption of industrial activity to the

fullest extent possible, and it should be the aim to find the wisest and most effective way to accomplish this.

3. It is felt that the proper basis of selling prices for the present will be found to be upon a scale higher than those of the prewar days. However, the level should be established on the lowest plane possible, having due regard for industry, labor, and Government. The announcement of such a plane of prices will immediately create confidence in the buying public.

4. It is believed that the reductions from the high prices to the proper level, so that consumers may be justified in buying, should be made at once by one reduction.

The effort should be to wholly eliminate the abnormal, unbalanced stimulation that business has had and the inflated prices that have resulted, and to start anew upon a normal level, and thereafter industry, having adopted that level, can safely rely upon the law of supply and demand to govern future values. Such a policy adopted and announced will, it is believed, when understood by the consumers, induce at once sufficient buying to start factories, fill empty yards and warehouses, and to inaugurate the interrupted building and other programs.

5. Industry and labor have a mutual interest in remedying present conditions, but industry should take the first step by the reduction of prices of commodities and should require of labor only reasonable aid.

III. Procedure: Remedy.

1. It is believed that a remedy for these conditions can be had by a comparatively simple program. As the President has approved my appointing a board which will make a study of the subject and take action thereon and as it will be made plain that the Department of Commerce and its board has the support of the President, there can be no doubt that industry generally will be glad to cooperate with the board in an endeavor to arrive at a solution of the difficulties.

2. Therefore, one of the first steps which the board should take would be to call into consultation and conference the leaders of industry in such numbers and by such groups as it may be felt is wise. Probably the first of these conferences should be with representatives of industries producing basic materials, such as iron, steel, lumber, textiles, cement, copper, brick, and other construction materials, and from time to time thereafter such others as may be deemed proper. It is believed, however, that industries dealing in finished products will be able to largely (if not entirely) adjust their prices in line with the above policy, without material aid from the committee.

3. At such conferences the general situation or conditions outlined above, and as they may change up to the time of the conference, should be considered and carefully understood, and the above-mentioned principles which ought to apply and govern the solution of the problems should also be fully understood and appreciated. It is believed that these principles and views will be readily accepted by the great majority of those called into conference, and further, that if any

of those who come into conference question these principles and views, a discussion thereof in the conference will, without any considerable delay, lead to a unanimous acceptance thereof.

4. In addition to giving assistance to industry in reaching satisfactory price bases the board ought to be able to give valuable advice in regard to such questions as the disposal of surplus war materials, it being desirable to accomplish this in such a way as to have as little detrimental effect as possible upon private industrial activities.

It will be the endeavor of the board to act promptly by consulting and interchanging views with these representatives of industry in the fullest and freest manner possible, with a view to aiding and assisting industry in general to resume activities to the fullest practicable extent. The immediate object is to bring about such reduced prices as will bring the buying power of the Government itself, including the railroads, telephones, and telegraphs, into action and make it possible for the Government to state that it is willing to be a buyer for its needs at the reduced prices. If these conferences result in such an understanding on the part of the Government with respect to the important basic industries concerning proper prices and bases for prices at which purchases may be made by it, and these are approved by the board, it is believed that upon announcement thereof to the country in general the public will feel justified in promptly beginning a program of extensive buying.

Such a procedure will in substance establish immediately a basis upon which to resume activities, and in this way the law of supply and demand will be enabled to come into play and from that time forward it will control the changes and readjustments in selling prices of materials and the trend of prices, it is believed, will be upward and not downward.

NEW PROCEDURE GOVERNING EXPORT LICENSE TO SWEDEN

The War Trade Board announces that a new series of import certificates are being issued by the Statens Handelskommission in Sweden, bearing serial numbers beginning with USA-100.

These certificate numbers will be honored by the War Trade Board notwithstanding the ruling in paragraph 4 of W. T. B. R. 496, issued January 10, 1919, that the correct serial numbers of certificates will be higher than 10832.

AMERICAN SCHOONER SUNK.

The Navy Department has received a dispatch stating that on the morning of February 22 the U. S. S. *New Mexico*, in latitude 33° 51' north and longitude 41° 47' west, found the American three-masted schooner *Charlotte J. Sibley* in sinking condition. The *New Mexico*, after taking off the master and all the crew, sank the wreck by gunfire.

ACTION URGED TO PROTECT HOLDERS OF LIBERTY BONDS AGAINST UNFAIR METHODS OF "MONEY SPECULATORS"

HEARING BY FEDERAL TRADE COMMISSION

*Testimony Given Asking
That Powers Be Exercised
to Curb Practices of Brokers
Alleged to Be Operating
Under False Pretenses.
Said to Come Under Inter-
state Commerce Control.*

The Federal Trade Commission issues the following:

Immediate use of the powers conferred on the Federal Trade Commission by Congress to prevent unfair methods of competition in interstate commerce, to curb "blue sky" practices of misrepresentation in the sale of stocks and securities, was urged of the commission at a public hearing by representatives of the Treasury Department, Capital Issues Committee, and Federal Reserve Board.

The commission was asked to employ its authority in cooperation with the Treasury Department and others, especially at this time to protect the great number of Liberty bond and war-savings stamp holders subject to the offerings of inferior stocks by unscrupulous promoters. In a public statement, the commission said that it is appreciated that holders of Government war securities "are being sought out by stock promoters with very tempting baits under such attractive disguises that they hook and land great numbers of those who have started upon systematic plans for saving as a result of the Government's campaigns."

Testimony Before the Commission.

Those appearing before the commission urged that powers granted it in the act creating the commission would be effective in curbing the operations of large numbers of brokers now active throughout the country in attempting by false representations to induce Liberty bondholders to part with their bonds for various "gilt edge" securities.

That the practice has assumed interstate proportions placing it under the immediate jurisdiction of the Federal Trade Commission as an unfair method of commerce in interstate commerce was urged. Recent decisions of Federal courts, it was pointed out, have held that stocks and securities are articles of commerce. The commission already has taken these decisions under consideration; but heretofore concrete cases which have come before it have been disposed of either by reference to the postal authorities of the Department of Justice or upon the facts developed in those cases.

72,951 DEATHS IN OVERSEAS FORCES AND 34,493 AMONG TROOPS AT HOME

The following statistics showing the number of deaths during the war in the American Expeditionary Forces and among troops in the United States have been prepared by Statistics Branch, General Staff, War Department.

Figures for the United States are from April 1, 1917, to February 14, 1919; for the American Expeditionary Forces, to February 16, 1919.

The hearing was upon the question of whether the commission shall at once adopt the policy of active cooperation with the Treasury in a Nation-wide effort to curb unfair practices in the sale of securities. The commission's statement follows:

"This public hearing is the result of requests from representatives of the Treasury Department, the Capital Issues Committee, and the Federal Reserve Board, that the Federal Trade Commission give consideration to what is generally recognized to be a serious situation throughout the country in connection with the sale of speculative stocks under circumstances of misrepresentation.

"The commission is authorized under the Federal Trade Commission Act approved September 26, 1914, to prevent unfair methods of competition in interstate commerce and to require all corporations and others who know about its affairs to inform the commission as to their business methods and practices and to make public so much of the information which it obtains as it may deem to be in the public interest. Ample powers for the enforcement of its powers are given under section 9, and heavy penalties are imposed upon persons or corporations under section 10 who fail to answer its lawful inquiries, produce documentary evidence required, or who make false statements or destroy documentary evidence.

Decisions of Federal Courts.

"The commission has already considered recent decisions of the Federal courts holding that stocks and securities are articles of commerce. The concrete cases which have heretofore come before the commission have been disposed of either by reference to the postal authorities or the Department of Justice, or upon the facts developed in those cases. The gentlemen present will develop the necessity for the commission's immediate consideration of the important question

of policy as to whether it will cooperate with the Treasury Department and others to curb unfair practices in the sale of stocks at this time and thereafter unless Congress provides some legislation dealing expressly with this important question.

Imposing on Investors.

"The fact is appreciated that there are a great many inexperienced investors in Liberty bonds, and war-savings stamps, who are being sought out by stock promoters with very tempting baits under such attractive disguises that they hook and land great numbers of those who have started upon systematic plans for saving as a result of the Government's campaigns."

"We have found this practice widespread," said James A. Gill, representing the Federal Reserve Bank of New York, "that promoters of fictitious and doubtful securities turned over their sales forces during all of the Liberty loan campaigns for the sale of Liberty bonds. The names of all bond purchasers were carefully card-indexed and now these salesmen are attempting to show that in peace times the 4½ per cent interest on Liberty bonds is not sufficient return. They are offering par and sometimes par and a premium for Liberty bonds providing that the Liberty bonds are exchanged for oil or other stocks that are alleged to yield in some instances as high as 50 per cent, and which are for the most part worthless."

Warning to the Public.

Speakers urged that the public should be warned at once against advertising and circulars presenting unusual "propositions" in stocks. Especially are worthless oil stocks being offered the public, it was declared; suggestions frequently being made that Liberty bonds will be accepted in payment.

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JUGO-SLAV ENVOY THANKS U. S. FOR RECOGNIZING NEW NATION

Serbian Legation to Represent Kingdom of Serbs, Croats, and Slovenes.

The Department of State is in receipt of the following communication from the Serbian Minister to the United States, Dr. Slavko Y. Grouitch, addressed to the Acting Secretary of State:

SIR: I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your note of February 10, No. 2, by which you have kindly informed me that the Government of the United States welcomes the union of the Serbian, Croatian, and Slovenian Provinces within the boundaries of the former Austro-Hungarian monarchy with Serbia and recognizes the Serbian Legation as the Legation of the Kingdom of the Serbs, Croats, and Slovenes.

I have not failed to communicate the text of your note to my Government together with the statement that the United States Government recognizes that the final settlement of territorial frontiers must be left to the peace conference for determination, according to the desires of the people concerned.

I am certain that my Government will note with deep appreciation the decision taken by the Government of the United States and will feel intensely grateful for the formal recognition of the union of the Serbs, Croats, and Slovenes—union which is the consecration of the principle of self-determination and for which so many sacrifices have been borne and so many lives given. The fact that the United States Government is the first to recognize the will and the wish of the Serbs, Croats, and Slovenes will serve only to deepen the gratitude of the Jugo-Slav Nation which is conscious that it owes the realization of its aspirations to the moral and material support of the great American people.

I beg you to accept the assurance of my highest consideration.

Photographs of Identified Graves of U. S. Soldiers in France Will Be Sent by Red Cross to Their Relatives

Plans have been perfected by the American Red Cross whereby photographs of the identified graves of American soldiers in France will be sent to the relatives of the heroes in this country. Several hundred such photographs have already been forwarded to the families of men who died in service overseas, and an announcement from Red Cross headquarters to-day says that the work of obtaining photographs has been speeded up to the point where production from now on is expected to reach about 7,000 every month. The photograph is sent to the dead soldier's next of kin.

The Red Cross has taken over the task of photographing the graves at the request of the War Department and is acting under the authority of Lieut. Col. C. C. Pierce, of the Graves Registration

Service. The headquarters of the service is at Tours, France. Each photograph is mounted in a cardboard folding frame, one side of which contains data concerning the dead soldier.

While all requests for such photographs should be forwarded to the bureau of communications of the American Red Cross, and not to the Graves Registration Service of the Army, such requests are not really necessary and will not hurry the receipt of the photograph. Neither will special requests receive any special consideration. Every identified grave in France is to be photographed under a plan worked out by the Army and the photographers will not be permitted to deviate from this arrangement in order to take the picture of any particular grave. The American Red Cross will forward the photographs to relatives as soon as they are received at headquarters.

REINSTATING CIVIL SERVICE EMPLOYEES WHO SERVED IN THE U. S. ARMY OR NAVY

In a circular recently distributed by the United States Civil Service Commission attention is called to an Executive order promulgated by the President on July 18, 1918, which provides that "A person leaving the classified civil service to engage in the military or naval service of the Government during the present war with Germany and who has been honorably discharged, may be reinstated in the civil service at any time within five years after his discharge, provided that at the time of reinstatement he has the required fitness to perform the duties of the position to which reinstatement is sought."

The Civil Service Commission states that, in recognition of the services rendered by civil-service employees who entered the military or naval service during the present war, the commission will make special effort to assist these men in securing suitable positions in the Government service rather than to leave upon them the entire burden of finding suitable vacancies.

A man who is eligible for reinstatement under the order may apply to any office or establishment of the Government under which he desires reinstatement, but, if he prefers, he may request the Civil Service Commission or one of its district secretaries to enter his name upon a reinstatement list which will be brought to the attention of appointing officers when vacancies are to be filled.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE CONGRESS BRIEFLY TOLD

SENATE.

Senator Lewis, Democrat, of Illinois, was the only speaker yesterday who discussed the constitution of the proposed league of nations and defended it against the attacks that have been made upon it. Senator Ransdell, Democrat, of Louisiana, addressed the Senate on the subject of the American merchant marine, discussed what has been accomplished by the Shipping Board in ship construction, and predicted that within a few months the Shipping Board would own one-half of the ocean-going American owned merchant ships.

Measures finally acted upon yesterday included the following bills and resolutions which were passed: District of Columbia appropriation bill carrying a total of around \$14,500,000. House bill to authorize commanding officers in the field or territorial departments or divisions, to remit or mitigate sentences imposed by courts-martial, which under existing law can only be done by the President. A bill for the survey and classification of unentered and cut-over lands with a view to disposing of them to discharged soldiers and sailors. A bill authorizing the Secretary of War to acquire land in France for a cemetery for Americans who fell there in battle, the grounds to be known as "The American Field of Honor." Joint resolution authorizing the creation of a joint congressional commission to recommend appropriate legislation for participation by the Federal Government in the observance of the 300th anniversary of the landing of the Pilgrims at Plymouth Rock. A resolution calling upon the Alien Property Custodian to furnish the Senate with a description of all property taken over by him, an estimate of its value, names of the owners, and the final disposition of such property. A bill to transfer the jurisdiction of Fisherman's Island, Va., from the Treasury to the War Department for fortification purposes.

The agricultural committee favorably reported House bill appropriating \$1,000,000,000 to maintain the Government guaranteed price of the 1919 wheat crop at \$2.26 per bushel. The military committee, in considering the Army appropriation bill, provided for a temporary army for the next fiscal year of 538,498 officers and enlisted men, and continued the existing pay of enlisted men for the next fiscal year, the House having restored the peace-time pay which cut the allowance to enlisted men one-half. The naval committee, in considering the naval bill, also provided for a continuance of increased pay for the enlisted men of the Navy. The agricultural committee recommended legislation along the lines of the McKendrick bill for the regulation of the meat packing industry. The banking and currency committee, by a vote of 9 to 4, ordered a favorable report on the nomination of John Skelton Williams to succeed himself as Comptroller of the Currency.

Senator Ransdell, of Louisiana, introduced a joint resolution extending the powers of the President to construct or requisition ships to meet war emergencies

until 18 months after peace has been proclaimed. Under existing law this authority can be exercised only for a period of six months after peace. Senator Walsh asked for immediate consideration of the bill reported from the Judiciary Committee to prohibit and punish the display of the red flag or other radical emblems and the dissemination of unlawful and seditious propaganda, but Senator Gore, of Oklahoma, objected and the matter went over until to-day. Republican opposition blocked consideration of the compromise resolution reported from the Elections Committee designed to preserve the evidence in the Ford-Newberry senatorial election contest from Michigan.

HOUSE.

The Ways and Means Committee reported the legislation authorizing the sale of short-term notes instead of bonds for the Victory Liberty loan late in April. The committee made it known that the loan probably would be \$5,000,000,000. The measure was taken up for consideration in the House to-day. The rules committee agreed to give a privileged status to the Moon bill providing for the end of Federal control of wire systems of communication December 31 next; the bill to make public lands available for farm settlement by returning soldiers, and the bill establishing a pensions retirement system for civil-service employees.

The Judiciary Committee favorably reported a bill to enforce war-time prohibition, effective July 1 next. It would bar all beverages containing more than one-half of 1 per cent of alcohol. Conference on the oil land leasing bill agreed to the elimination of the provision extending the act to lands in Alaska. Bills were introduced yesterday as follows: By Mr. Lundeen, of Minnesota, providing for the submission of the adoption of the proposed league of nations to a vote of the people. By Mr. Gould, of New York, a bill designed to prevent and punish the wearing of war decorations by persons other than those to whom they have been officially awarded.

LISBON CONGRESS DISSOLVED.

Portugal to Elect Representatives to Revise the Constitution.

Advices to the State Department from Lisbon, Portugal, state that the Government has decreed the dissolution of both Houses of Congress and the disarming of the police, and calling for meeting of the electoral colleges for the purpose of election of representatives with full power for the revision of the constitution, the convocation to be held on April 13.

WORK AT CANTONMENTS TO GO ON.

The American Red Cross has appropriated an additional \$100,000 for the maintenance of its sanitary units and dispensaries at the military cantonments of the country to the end of June. The plan of the Red Cross to continue its activities in this direction has the approval of Surg. Gen. Blue of the United States Public Health Service.

ATTENTION CALLED TO SWINDLE UPON NEXT OF KIN OF SOLDIERS

NOTE TO CORRESPONDENTS.

The War Department will very greatly appreciate the cooperation of the newspapers in scotching a contemptible swindle that is being practiced by crooks, with next of kin of soldiers as victims.

You will recall that early in 1918 relatives of soldiers were swindled by sharpers who sent telegrams to them, purporting to come from soldiers, stating that the soldier had a furlough, and requesting that funds be wired "waiving identification," or mailed in "care of general delivery," to enable the soldier to visit his home. After the newspapers, at the suggestion of the War Department, had given wide publicity to this swindle no more cases were reported during 1918. Now, however, there is evidence that, demobilization being under way, the relatives and friends of soldiers are again being swindled by sharpers who telegraph in the name of some soldier for funds with which to "come home."

It is perfectly obvious to you that no discharged soldier needs to telegraph his kin for funds for travel. When discharged he is paid off with ample allowance for travel expenses to his home, and this fact should itself warn relatives that telegrams requesting funds should be investigated. There is ordinarily no reason why a soldier should ask to have his mail sent in care of general delivery.

The post office authorities and the Department of Justice will assist the War Department in an effort to arrest these swindlers, and the good offices of the newspapers will be appreciated.

INTERVAL BETWEEN ASSIGNMENT FOR CONVOY AND ACTUAL SAILING

The following statistics were prepared by statistics branch, General Staff, War Department:

The time interval between the assignment of units in the American Expeditionary Force to priority for early convoy and actual sailing varies greatly. Some units have sailed in less than a week, while others placed on priority in November have not yet sailed. Of the total, 50 per cent have remained on priority more than one month, 15 per cent more than two months.

Considering only the organizations which have been placed on priority and which have sailed between November 11 and February 15, the following figures show the per cent that remained on priority any specified number of weeks before sailing.

TEXT OF THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS AT BOSTON

(Continued from page 1.)

that comes from men who say we have waited for this day when the friends of liberty should come across the sea and shake hands with us to see that the new world was constructed upon a new basis and foundation of justice and right.

Voices of the Crowd.

"I can't tell you the inspiration that came from the sentiments that came out of these simple voices of the crowd. And the proudest thing I have to report to you is that this great country of ours is trusted throughout the world. I have not come to report the proceedings or results of the proceedings of the peace conference—that would be premature. I can say that I have received very happy impressions from this conference, impressions that while there are many differences of judgment, while there are some divergencies of object, there is nevertheless a common spirit and a common realization of the necessity of setting up a new standard of right in the world. Because the men who are in conference in Paris realize as keenly as any American can realize that they are not masters of their people, that they are servants of their people, and that the spirit of their people has awakened to a new purpose and a new conception of their power to realize that purpose, and that no man dare go home from that conference and report anything less noble than was expected of it.

Slowness in Paris.

"The conference seems to you to go slowly; from day to day in Paris it seems to go slowly, but I wonder if you realize the complexity of the task which is undertaken. It seems as if the settlements of this war affect, and affect directly, every great, and I sometimes think every small, nation in the world. And no one decision can prudently be made which is not properly linked in with the great series of other decisions which must accompany it, and it must be reckoned in with the final result if the real quality and character of that result is to be properly judged.

Must Hear All Sides.

"What we are doing is to hear the whole case, hear it from the mouths of the men most interested, hear it from these who are officially commissioned to state it, hear the rival claims, hear the claims that affect new nationalities, that affect new areas of the world, that affect new commercial and economic connections that have been established by the great world war through which we have gone. And I have been struck by the moderateness of those who have represented national claims. I can testify that I have nowhere seen the gleam of passion. I have seen earnestness, I have seen fears come to the eyes of men who plead for down-trodden people whom they were privileged to speak for,

but they were not tears of anger, they were tears of ardent hope; and I don't see how any man can fail to have been subdued by these pleas, subdued to this feeling that he was not there to assert an individual judgment of his own but to try to assist the cause of humanity.

Seek the United States.

"And in the midst of it all every interest seeks out first of all when it reaches Paris the representatives of the United States. Why? Because—and I think I am stating the most wonderful fact in history—because there is no nation in Europe that suspects the motives of the United States. Was there ever so wonderful a thing seen before? Was there ever so moving a thing? Was there ever any fact that so bound the Nation that had won that esteem forever to deserve it? I would not have you understand that the great men who represent the other nations there in conference are disesteemed by those who know them. Quite the contrary. But you understand that the nations of Europe have again and again clashed with one another in competitive interest. It is impossible for men to forget these sharp issues that were drawn between them in times past. It is impossible for men to believe that all ambitions have all of a sudden been foregone. They remember territory that was coveted, they remember rights it was attempted to extort, remember political ambitions which it was attempted to realize, and while they believe men have come into different temper they can not forget these things, and so they don't resort to one another for dispassionate view of matters in controversy.

Resort to Friendly Nation.

"They resort to that nation which has won enviable distinction being regarded as the friend of mankind. Whenever it is desired to send a small force of soldiers to occupy a piece of territory where it is thought nobody else will be welcome they ask for American soldiers. And where other soldiers would be looked upon with suspicion and perhaps met with resistance, the American soldier is welcomed with acclaim. I have had so many grounds for pride on the other side of the water that I am very thankful that they are not grounds for personal pride, but for national pride.

Pride in the U. S. Soldier.

"If they were grounds for personal pride, I'd be the most stuck-up man in the world. And it has been an infinite pleasure to me to see these gallant soldiers of ours, of whom the Constitution of the United States made me the proud commander. Everybody praises the American soldier with the feeling that in praising him he is subtracting from the credit of no one else. I have been searching for the fundamental fact that converted Europe to believe in us. Before this war Europe did not believe in us as she

does now. She did not believe in us throughout the first three years of the war. She seems really to have believed that we were holding off because we thought we could make more by staying out than by going in. And all of a sudden, in short, 18 months, the whole verdict is reversed. There can be but one explanation for it. They saw what we did, that without making a single claim we put all our men and all our means at the disposal of these who were fighting for their homes in the first instance, but for the cause—the cause of human right and justice—and that we went in, not to support their national claims, but to support the great cause which they held in common. And when they saw that America not only held the ideals but acted the ideals, they were converted to America and became firm partisans of those ideals.

The Reflex of Time.

"I met a group of scholars when I was in Paris. Some gentlemen from one of the Greek universities who had come to see me and in whose presence, or rather in the presence of the traditions of learning, I felt very young indeed. And I told them that I had had one of the delightful revenges that sometimes come to men. All my life I have heard men speak with a sort of condescension of ideals and of idealists, and particularly of those separated, enclastered persons whom they choose to term academic, who were in the habit of uttering ideals in a free atmosphere when they clash with nobody in particular. And I said I have had this sweet revenge. Speaking with perfect frankness in the name of the people of the United States I have uttered as the objects of this great war ideals and nothing but ideals, and the war has been won by that inspiration.

Change in Fighting Men.

"Men were fighting with tense muscle and lowered head until they came to realize those things, feeling they were fighting for their lives and their country, and when these accents of what it was all about reached them from America they lifted their heads, they raised their eyes to heaven, then they saw men in khaki coming across sea in spirit of crusaders, and they found these were strange men, reckless of danger not only, but reckless because they seemed to see something that made that danger worth while. Men have testified to me in Europe that our men were possessed by something that they could only call religious fervor. They were not like any of the other soldiers. They had vision, they had dream, and they were fighting in dream, and fighting in dream they turned the whole tide of battle and it never came back. And now do you realize that this confidence we have established throughout the world imposes a burden upon us—if you choose to call it a burden. It is one of those burdens which any nation ought to be proud to carry.

TEXT OF THE PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS AT BOSTON

Any man who resists the present tides that run in the world will find himself thrown upon a shore so high and barren that it will seem as if he had been separated from his human kind forever.

The Europe of To-day.

"Europe that I left the other day was full of something that it had never felt fill its heart so full before. It was full of hope. The Europe of the second year of the war, the Europe of the third year of the war, was sinking to a sort of stubborn desperation. They did not see any great thing to be achieved even when the war should be won. They hoped there would be some salvage; they hoped they could clear their territories of invading armies; they hoped they could set up their homes and start their industries afresh. But they thought it would simply be a resumption of the old life that Europe had led—led in fear, led in anxiety, led in constant suspicion and watchfulness. They never dreamed that it would be a Europe of settled peace and justified hope. And now these ideals have wrought this new magic that all the peoples of Europe are buoyed up and confident in the spirit of hope, because they believe that we are at the eve of a new age in the world, when nations will understand one another; when nations will support one another in every just cause; when nations will unite every moral and every physical strength to see that right shall prevail. If America were at this juncture to fail the world, what would come of it?"

America Hope of the World.

"I do not mean any disrespect to any other great people when I say that America is the hope of the world. And if she does not justify that hope results are unthinkable. Men will be thrown back upon bitterness of disappointment not only, but bitterness of despair. All nations will be set up as hostile camps again; men at the peace conference will go home with their heads upon their breasts, knowing they have failed—for they were bidden not to come home from there until they did something more than sign the treaty of peace. Suppose we sign the treaty of peace and that it is the most satisfactory treaty of peace that the confusing elements of the modern world will afford and go home and think about our labors we will know that we have left written upon the historic table at Versailles, upon which Vergennes and Benjamin Franklin wrote their names, nothing but a modern scrap of paper, no nations united to defend it, no great forces combined to make it good, no assurance given to the downtrodden and fearful people of the world that they shall be safe. Any man who thinks that America will take part in giving the world any such rebuff and disappointment as that does not know America. I invite him to test the sentiments of the Nation.

"We set this Nation up to make men free and we did not confine our conception and purpose to America, and now we will make men free. If we did not do that all the fame of America would be gone and all her power would be dissipated. She would then have to keep her power for those narrow, selfish, provincial purposes which seem so dear to some minds that have no sweep beyond the nearest horizon. I should welcome no sweeter challenge than that. I have fighting blood in me and it is sometimes a delight to let it have scope, but if it is challenged on this occasion it will be an indulgence. Think of the picture, think of the utter blackness that would fall on the world! America has failed! America made a little essay at generosity and then withdrew! America said, 'We are your friends,' but it was only for to-day, not for to-morrow! America said, 'here is our power to vindicate right,' and then next day said, 'let right take care of itself and we will take care of ourselves.' America said, 'we set up light to lead men along the paths of liberty, but we have lowered it—it is intended only to light our own path.'

Liberty, True and Ideal.

"We set up a great ideal of liberty, and then we said 'Liberty is a thing that you must win for yourself.' Do not call upon us and think of the world that we would leave. Do you realize how many new nations are going to be set up in the presence of old and powerful nations in Europe and left there, there, if left by us, without a disinterested friend? Do you believe in the Polish cause as I do? Are you going to set up Poland, immature, inexperienced, as yet unorganized, and leave her with a circle of armies around her? Do you believe in the aspirations of the Czechoslovaks and Jugo-Slovs as I do? Do you know how many powers would be quick to pounce upon them if there were not guarantees of the world behind their liberty? Have you thought of the sufferings of Armenia? You poured out your money to help succor Armenians after they suffered. Now set up your strength so that they shall never suffer again.

World Force to Guarantee Peace.

"Arrangements of the present peace can not stand a generation unless they are guaranteed by the united forces of the civilized world. And if we do not guarantee them can not you not see the picture? Your hearts have instructed you where the burden of this war fell. It did not fall upon national treasuries; it did not fall upon the instruments of administration; it did not fall upon the resources of nations. It fell upon the voiceless homes everywhere, where women were toiling in hope that their men would come back. When I think of the homes upon which dull despair would settle if this great hope is disappointed, I should wish for my part never to have had America play any part

whatever in this attempt to emancipate the world.

"But I talk as if there were any question. I have no more doubt of the verdict of America in this matter than I have doubt of the blood that is in me. And so, my fellow citizens, I have come back to report progress, and I do not believe that progress is going to stop short of the goal. The nations of the world have set their heads now to do a great thing, and they are not going to slacken their purpose. And when I speak of the nations of the world, I do not speak of the governments of the world. I speak of peoples who constitute the nations of the world. They are in the saddle, and they are going to see to it that if their present governments do not do their will, some other governments shall. The secret is out, and present governments know it. There is a great deal of harmony to be got out of common knowledge.

"There is a great deal of sympathy to be got of living in the same atmosphere, and except for the differences of languages, which puzzled my American ear very sadly, I could have believed I was at home in France or Italy or in England when I was on the streets, when I was in the presence of crowds, when I was in great halls where men were gathered irrespective of class. I did not feel quite as much at home there as I do here but I felt that now, at any rate, after this storm of war had cleared the air men were seeing, eye to eye, everywhere and that these were the kind of folks who would understand what the kind of folks at home would understand; that they were thinking the same things.

Glad to "Speak U. S."

"It is a great comfort, for one thing, to realize that you all understand the language I am speaking. A friend of mine said that to talk through an interpreter was like witnessing the compound fracture of an idea. But the beauty of it is that whatever the impediments of the channel of communication the idea is the same, that it gets registered, and it gets registered in responsive hearts and receptive purposes. I have come back for a strenuous attempt to transact business for a little while in America, but I have really come back to say to you, in all soberness and honesty, that I have been trying my best to speak your thoughts. When I sample myself, I think I find that I am a typical American, and if I sample deep enough and get down to what probably is the true stuff of the men, then I have hope that it is part of the stuff that is like the other fellow's at home. And, therefore, probing deep in my heart and trying to see things that are right without regard to the things that may be debated as expedient, I feel that I am interpreting the purpose and the thought of America; and in loving America I find I have joined the great majority of my fellowmen throughout the world."

COMMISSION OF MINING EXPERTS TO VISIT FRANCE AND BELGIUM

Secretary of the Interior Lane has appointed a commission of five mining and metallurgical experts from the Bureau of Mines and the Geological Survey to visit Europe to observe and study reconstruction methods in the devastated regions of France and Belgium. The chairman of the commission, Dr. Frederick G. Cottrell, chief metallurgist of the Bureau of Mines, and George S. Rice, the chief mining engineer of the same bureau, have just sailed for France to take up this work. Frank H. Probert, consulting engineer of the bureau, and professor of mining in the University of California, another member of the commission, left several weeks ago and is now on the ground. F. H. Cameron, consulting chemist of the bureau and expert on potash matters, and Hoyt S. Gale, of the Geological Survey, another expert on potash, are expected to leave early in March.

The commission in addition to visiting France and Belgium will go to several other countries to study present methods in mining and metallurgical practice and give all the countries the benefits of American methods and American mining machinery.

BUILDING TRADES DISPUTE IN NEW YORK IS ADJUSTED

Adjustment of the building trades dispute in New York, involving 125,000 men, was reached yesterday afternoon at a conference called by the Secretaries of War and Labor, held in the War Department.

It was agreed that the men should return to work to-day, leaving their grievances to be settled by a conference of employers and employees. If, however, no settlement can be reached by this method within three days, then all questions on which they can not agree will be referred to Judge P. H. Dugro of the New York Supreme Court, as umpire.

The dispute was solely over wages. The men ask \$6.50 a day, and are now receiving \$5.50. The employers had expressed willingness to concede an advance. Those present at the conference included, in addition to the Secretaries of War and Labor, representatives of the workmen and of the employers, and of the American Federation of Labor, and Henry J. Meaning of "Nonresident Alien" Explained to Revenue Collectors

TREASURY DEPARTMENT,
OFFICE OF COMMISSIONER
OF INTERNAL REVENUE,
Washington, D. C.

To collectors of internal revenue and others concerned:

"Nonresident alien individual" means an individual (a) whose residence is not within the United States, and (b) who is not a citizen of the United States. Residence will be determined in accordance with the following:

(1) Establishment of residence.—Any alien living in the United States who is not a mere transient, as explained below, is a resident of the United States, for purposes of the income tax. Whether he is a transient or not is determined by his intentions with regard to his stay. If he lives in the United States, and has no definite intention as to his stay, he is a resident. The best evidence of his intention is afforded by the conduct, acts, and declarations of the alien. The typical transient is one who stops for a short time in the course of a journey through the United States—sometimes performing labor, sometimes not—or one who enters the United States intending only to stay long enough to carry out some purpose, object, or plan not involving an extended stay in the United States. A mere floating intention, indefinite as to time, to return to another country, is not sufficient to constitute him a transient.

(2) Proof of residence.—An alien's statements as to his intention with regard to residence are not conclusive, but when unequivocal will determine the question of his intention, unless his conduct, acts or other surrounding circumstances contradict the statements. It sometimes occurs that an alien who genuinely intends his stay to be transient may put off his departure from time to time by reason of changed conditions, remaining a transient though living in the United States for a considerable time. The fact that an alien's family is abroad does not necessarily indicate that he is a transient rather than a resident. An alien, who enters this country intending to make his home in a foreign country as soon as he has accumulated a sum of money sufficient to provide for his journey abroad, is to be considered a transient provided his expectation in this regard may be reasonably be fulfilled within a comparatively short time, considering the rate of his saving.

(3) Loss of status as a resident.—It will be presumed that an alien who has established a residence in the United States as outlined above, continues to be a resident until he or his family evidence an intention to change residence to another country by starting to remove. Thus, alien residents who, following the armistice agreement of November, 1918, take steps toward returning to their native countries as by applying for passports, are to be regarded as residents for that portion of the taxable year which elapsed up to the time such step was taken.

(4) Practice of employers in determining status of alien employees.—Aliens employed in the United States are prima facie regarded as nonresidents. If wages are paid without withholding the tax, the

employer should be provided with written proof of facts which overcome the presumption that such alien is a nonresident. Such facts include the following: (a) If an alien has been living in the United States for as much as one year immediately prior to the time he entered the employment of the withholding agent, or if he has been regularly employed by an individual resident in the United States or by a resident corporation in the same city or county for as much as three months immediately prior to any payment by the employer, he may be treated as a resident in deciding as to the necessity of withholding part of such payment, provided no facts are known to the employer showing that he is in fact a transient, such as one of the types mentioned under (1). The facts with regard to the length of time the alien has thus lived in this country or has been so regularly employed may be established by the certificate of the alien; (b) the employer may also obtain evidence to overcome the prima facie presumption of nonresidence by securing from the alien Form 1078, revised, properly executed or an equivalent certificate of the alien establishing residence. Having secured such evidence from the alien, the employer may rely thereon unless the statement of the alien was false and the employer had reasonable cause to believe it false, and may continue to rely thereon until the alien ceases to be a resident under the provisions of the preceding paragraph. An employer who seeks to account for failure to withhold before this date if he did not at the time secure Form 1078 or its equivalent, is permitted to prove the former status of the alien by any material evidence.

(5) Treasury decision 2242 is modified so far as inconsistent herewith.
